Bear Spring Camps: 100 Years, One Family!

n 1910, George D. and Alice R. Mosher and their two sons, Durwood and Bertram, moved to Rome, Maine, from Connecticut, bought a farm, built six cottages on the shore of Great Pond, converted a woodshed into a dining area, and Bear Spring Camps was born.

Waterskiing and tubing behind speedboats are popular summer activities on Maine lakes, but behind a seaplane? What was initially done for fun turned serious when Barrett entered the image in a National Captain Morgan's "Calling All Captains" photo contest which had a \$50,000 Grand Prize....and it won!

They rented to families traveling from Boston and New York who wanted a simple, peaceful vacation, good wholesome meals in a central dining hall, rustic but cozy cabin accommodations, and a place they could return to year after year, generation after generation. Bear Spring provided all these traditions plus one other important quality for loyal camp guests who love changelessness; it stayed in the same family for the next 100 years.

In 1911, Bertram married the girl next door, Irma Richardson, and began to run the family business, adding 15 more cottages over the next 35 years. Summers were spent working at Bear Spring and winters were spent building furniture, cutting ice, and enjoying family time.

In 1946, their only son, Bertram Jr., married

Marguerite Tobin and they began running the business. Bert and Marguerite added eleven more cottages, installed indoor plumbing, and expanded the dining area. They ran the camps until Bert's death in 1987 when their youngest daughter Peggy and her husband Ron Churchill took over.

Marguerite continues to live at Bear Spring Camps where her recollections are a valuable part of the camp and family heritage. She points out, for example, that when she started working at Bear Spring Camps in 1942 there was only one cottage below Bear Spring on Jamaica Point. Today there are over 100!

Marguerite used to manage and hostess the dining hall and supervise all the camp cleaning

but her real claim to fame was being an outstanding seamstress: she sewed all the blankets and curtains for the camp, made better than 800 napkins, and replaced the table cloths four times over.

Age 87 "and glad to be here," Marguerite is a

legend with many of the guests, some of whom predate her. One of the ladies who visited Bear Spring this summer first came to the camp in 1941. Fortunately for the camp's history, Marguerite's daughter Peggy is taping conversations about Bear Spring with her mother.

Peggy and her husband Ron have a great interest in the history of the camp much of which has been chronicled in recent newsletters. As part of the 100th year celebration they are inviting all guests to share any memorable moments for

a Book of Memories.

They have Old Photos and Old Letters displayed throughout the dining room and lobby. And each week this summer a Guest Group Photo is being taken in front of the main house, a part of the celebration that could be repeated each week







Watershed Wisdom '

Climate Change: Coming Soon to a Planet Near You!

Te have written several columns about plants this year including two about invasive plants. This has raised awareness about this important issue and I have had people coming into my office all summer talking about how suddenly they are seeing all these plants "they never had before" and "they must be invasive," usually bringing me a sample in a plastic bag or bucket. Others are reporting clumps of "green cotton candy-like clumps" they never noticed before. Some of this is due to increased awarenessmore people are paying attention to plants, which is good. In almost all cases, the plants they are noticing are in fact, native plants that have always been in the lake. But this year there seem to be bumper crops of native plants such as common waterweed or bladderwort that are superficially similar to invasive milfoils or hydrilla. And there is definitely much more of the green, cotton candy-like clumps of metaphyton. Why

Those of you who live here year round will recall that ice out occurred in most of our lakes in the third week of March, nearly a month ahead of "normal." It was so early that the governor opened the open water fishing season two weeks early. This early ice out has essentially lengthened the growing season by a month and resulted in water temperatures rising much earlier than normal. The lack of snowmelt and below average precipitation has resulted in low, and in most cases, clearer than average lakes. This has allowed light to penetrate deeper than normal and created near ideal conditions for aquatic macrophyte plants and the relatively long lived filamentous algae that forms the clumps of metaphyton that are so prevalent this year.

While many lakes are clearer than average, mainly due to the below average precipitation resulting in less stormwater runoff and lower than normal sediment entering the lakes, there are some lakes, such as East Pond, that are much greener than average. Why do the same conditions make many lakes clearer than average and many others more opaque? The early ice out that allowed more light to penetrate has also resulted in the lakes stratifying earlier and stronger

than normal. Stratification in lakes occurs because warm water is less dense than colder water and as the surface waters warm, the warm water forms a layer of lighter water that floats on top of the heavier, cooler bottom waters. As the wind blows across the surface of the lake and the temperatures continue to rise, a mixed layer forms at the surface. The depth off this mixed layer is a function of the size and shape of the lake and the strength of the wind. Large lakes such as Great Pond will form a mixed layer on the order of about 30 ft by mid-summer whereas smaller lakes such as East Pond or North Pond will form a mixed layer more on the order of 20 feet. The bottom of the mixed layer is known as the "thermocline," where there is a rapid decrease in temperature that forms a density discontinuity that inhibits mixing between the warm surface waters, which limnologists call the "epilimnion," and the colder bottom waters, known as the "hypolimnion."

Once the lake stratifies, the hypolimnion no longer receives a constant replenishment of oxygen from the surface. However, organic detritus continues to fall to the bottom, which results in oxygen being consumed as it is broken down by bacteria that live in the hypolimnion. This can result in the hypolimnion becoming anoxic, which results in chemical reactions (specifically, "reduction" for those who still remember their high school chemistry) that can release phospho-

rus from the sediments back into the water column. In East Pond, which is about 25 feet deep in some areas, this often results in a warm, oxygen-rich 20-ft thick epilimnion floating on top of a cooler, low-oxygen but high phosphorus, 5-ft thick hypolimnion. If you then get a large thunderstorm with strong winds, this can trigger a mixing event that mixes the high phosphorus bottom water into the surface waters, triggering an algae bloom that suddenly turns the lake green. So the same conditions that can cause one lake to be clearer than average can cause another to be more opaque simply because the depth and shape of the lake or composition of the bottom sediments are dif-

As our climate changes due to increased carbon dioxide emissions, the on average warmer atmosphere can hold more water, which leads to intensification of the hydrologic cycle, with more extreme weather events such as the tornadoes that recently swept across portions of Maine. We can expect more years with above average precipitation like last year and more with below average precipitation like this year. And we can expect average ice out dates to occur earlier more often and our lakes to stratify earlier and stronge. So what will climate change mean for our lakes? I'm sure we will discuss this in future columns. If you are impatient, stop by the BRCA office and we

Youth Plant Patrol (YPP) on the Lookout For Invasives

Prevention efforts like Courtesy Boat Inspections (CBI) may be the "first line of defense" against the threat of invasive aquatic plants IAP), but Early Detection initiatives like Invasive Plant Patrols (IPP) are equally important. With no real success stories for eradication once a non-native plant takes hold, early detection and rapid response efforts are vital components at limiting the spread of IAP's.

The Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed's CBI program is on pace to top 10,000 inspections at 10 public launch sites this summer. Last year,

the Friends established a Youth Plant Patrol (YPP) team who surveyed and mapped the vegetation of 18 of the 28 lakes and streams that comprise the Cobbossee Watershed. Included in the survey were 12 public boat launch sites, major inlets & outlets for each water body, and other highly susceptible areas. This year, their YPP team is back, staffed by Whitney Grass, the Friends' AmeriCorps summer intern and recent Bowdoin College graduate; and Ethan McGuire, a senior at the Maine School of Science and Mathematics in Limestone, Maine. Both Ethan and Whitney completed plant identification training provided by the Maine Center for Invasive Aquatic Plants, part of the Volunteering Lake Monitoring Program.

The YPP program is made possible due to funding support provided by Friend's members, along with business sponsors Knowlton-Hewins-Roberts Funeral Services, Energy, Downeast Wolfington Group, Homestead Realty, and Kristie Rowell Insurance Services; local lake associations from Torsey, Maranacook, Annabessacook, Cobbossee, Berry/Dexter/Wilson and Tacoma Lakes.

Kennebec Land Trust Releases Book

The Kennebec Land Trust will release its first book, "Between Person and Place: Conservation Histories from the Kennebec Land Trust," on August 22, 2010 at 12:30 pm at the Small-Burnham Conservation Area in Litchfield. The book is based on a series of interviews conducted by KLT intern Katie Epstein, from Davidson College, in the summer of 2009.



Conservation Too -

his construction season the Kennebec SWCD has been focusing much of our work on projects in the China Lake, Webber Pond and Pleasant Pond watersheds. We have an arrangement with the China Regional Lakes Association to oversee and direct their Youth Conservation Corps. Much of our staff time is therefore in that area.

However, like most of our summers, roadwork has been a frequent part of construction projects. As I have worked with road associations over the years, some common questions come up that people with unpaved or gravel roads want answered. This year, the Maine DEP has focused even more attention on the issue of unpaved/gravel roads. They are making efforts to address many of the erosion problems which occur on gravel roads. Part of that effort has been to make it clear to people that you don't need to have a camp to have a 'camp road'. As a result, we try and use the term 'gravel road' as a more accurate and inclusive term.

We work with a road group and explain what needs to be done to maintain their road. One common question relates to road widths. People are often concerned that their road seems to get wider with each passing

Gravel Roads – Transporters of Sediment and Phosphorus

year. There are usually two possible explanations for and the annual grading does not bring the road back this phenomenon. One may indicate that the road is being maintained fairly well. The other may indicate that the maintenance needs to be improved.

As anyone with a gravel road knows, dirt roads need maintenance and lots of it. Many of the roads we have seen recently have had their annual grading done. Proper grading is essential to maintain the road crown, eliminate the snowplow and tire berms that form on the shoulders and to keep your surface gravel out of the ditches.

Road graders, Front Runners, and York rakes can all accomplish this task when used properly. These tools will pull material back into the road/crown and allow for storm water to reach the ditches. Once completed, the shoulder that has grown vegetation and seemed to narrow the roadway will be scraped off. It looks as if the road is 2-3' wider. In many cases, no additional gravel has been added. The vegetation had established itself slowly and isn't really noticed until it is gone. The road appears to be wider.

It is possible for a road to become much wider over time. This is no illusion. If an association is spending a good portion of its budget on adding gravel each year,

into shape, that gravel is being lost somewhere. Most often, into the ditches, woods or the lake! As ditches fill in and surface gravel migrates to areas that graders cannot reach, the road will actually become wider. It can become a bigger risk to the water quality. Sediments and phosphorus will end up moving more quickly to the water body without being filtered and treated.

Spending excess money on gravel year after year indicates larger problems that should be addressed. Often, investing some money into the road to bring it up to par will save money in lost gravel over time. Adding some gravel to roads of this type is often unavoidable. Over time, some of the fine materials are lost to storm water or in the form of dust. But, annually reclaiming as much of the migrating material as possible will ensure your road doesn't become wider each year.





----- Fishing **-**

Cummer fishing for white perch, yellow perch, Sunfish and black crappie can be an exciting and tasty way to pass the hottest month Maine has to offer. For whatever reason, many Mainers seem to skip over these fish during the summertime, never even giving pan fish a second thought once the temperatures start to rise. It's a shame really because this time of year can offer some excellent fishing opportunities. East Pond is a great example of a watershed that has truly awesome pan fish opportunities and anglers can catch black crappie throughout the summer. It helps to have decent electronics because the schools of fish will be deep and they cruise around searching for baitfish. Crappie are primarily minnow eaters, so it's a good idea to either troll the lake with small Rapala's or Yo-Zuri lures (or something similar) or streamer flies until you contact a school. If you are good at sewing on bait, that's another excellent trolling option (probably the best overall option). Sometimes if you are lucky you can find a mess of crappie near sunken timber. They love to hide in and around fallen trees, so if you can find some wood structure that is in the shade, you just might find some crappie hiding in there too. My personal favorite lure to cast to crappie is a roadrunner. I've attached a picture of one in case you've never seen it before. Pink, yellow and white are always good choices and you can tip the hook with a small curly tailed grub for added action. It's amazing how many big bass suck in a roadrunner while you are trying to get crappie too. Seriously, if you fish this little bladed bait nice and slow and let it sink down into the holes in the timber, you never know what you'll pull out! The last way to catch crappie is probably the best overall choice and that is with live bait. This summer live minnows have been hard to come by unless you catch your own. Nikki's Tackle over on Route 8 has bait on occasion along with Castle Island Camps, but with the warm water temps, catching and keeping bait alive has been tricky. If you can find or catch minnows in the 1-2inch range, you'll certainly have increased your chances at catching crappie.

When targeting pan fish, the right rod and reel combination is key. Light tackle and even lighter line will certainly help up your odds of catching some slabs. A six foot, six inch light weight pole is a

good option spooled with 4 or 6 pound fluorocarbon line. When fishing live bait or crappie tubes, attaching a slip bobber on the line and set the bobber stop at the depth you are marking the fish. You might need to add a small split shot above your bait to help it sink down to the fish especially if it's windy outside. Sometimes in the Belgrade's, the crappie will be 15 – 25 feet down, making them more difficult to catch. This bobber stop system will help you get down to the fish easier and the extra light rod will help you feel the strike because crappie are famous for their very light bite and paper thin mouths.

A quick fish story: My family decided to take a trip to the coast to visit the in-laws. They live right off a beautiful beach in southern Maine (walking distance to some awesome striped bass fishing), so of course I packed my surf casting poles and a ton of gear! My favorite thing to do down there is simply get up before the sun and walk the beach with my golden retriever, watch the sun come up and search

the surf for bass. Well, on the last morning I got into them and Gabby (that's my dog) and I had a blast! There were a lot of big bass holding tight to a rock pile that I could just barely reach. We caught six fish in short order including back to back 37 inch bass. What fighters – what fun! Unfortunately, the last fish I hooked into was a monster and the fish simply headed out to sea, spooling my reel and breaking everything off. What an experience. Next year I'll bring heavier equipment and an extra spool of line too! Rumor has it that the striped bass fishing in the lower Kennebec is hot right now and the bluefish are definitely in (we caught blues on this trip too). One of my favorite things about living in the Belgrades is that you can scoot down to the coast in less than an hour!




