CASH

As far as could be ascertained, all receipts were recorded and the cash was deposited in the bank. Ex-

penditures were made by check from properly authorized warrants, supported by invoices and payrolls on file. The cash balance was reconciled with the bank statement.

TAXES RECEIVABLE

The 1945 tax commitment was found to be in agreement with the warrant of commitment of the Assessors. At February 16, 1946, there was \$113.28 outstanding in taxes receivable, the detail of which may be found on Schedule A-4 of this report. Verification by mail was made of a representative number of tax accounts.

TAX LIENS

Payments received on tax liens were found to have been applied against the proper items.

DUE GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES

The withholding tax deductions were examined and appeared to have been properly recorded.

NOTES PAYABLE

During the year notes payable were reduced \$1,000 by appropriation, but a temporary loan of \$1,000 was not paid.

NET DEFICIT

At the close of the year the Net Deficit amounted to \$2,487.81 as compared to a Net Deficit of \$3,478.64 at February 18, 1945. This represented a decrease of \$990.83 during the year under examination, the detail of which may be found on Exhibit E of this report.

GENERAL

The 1945 excise tax receipts numbered 26 to 54, and the 1946 excise tax receipts numbered 1 to 23, were verified with the copies of the receipts and all monies were found to have been deposited with the Treasurer.

The children have had all the necessary text and work books. This has been of help to both teacher and pupils. The progress of the school, considering the many subjects to be taught each day, with a minimum of time, has been good.

The motivation and activities engaged in condition the child to accept school. School must be a happy experience for any child. It becomes valueless unless the child is emotionally adjusted. Interest equals success in school. Mrs. Crocker has a richly motivated program as well as activities conducive to socialization of the children.

The School Committee has attended to the building so that it presents a comfortable, clean and pleas-

ant appearance. It compares favorably with schools of this type in Maine.

It will be necessary to maintain the building by an appropriation, as it receives considerable wear each year.

I am very glad to see so many of the young people enrolled in high school, and I hope that all the graduates this year will continue with their education.

The cooperation of the School Committee has been of much assistance, and I wish to extend my thanks to them. The cooperation of the other town officials is gratefully acknowledged.

Public Health Nursing Annual Report - 1946

The high cost of living has made it necessary for the careful planning of the foods which is needed for the health, growth, and development of the children. Several visits have been made in the homes to advise mothers in the care of those under their supervision.

As diphtheria and other communicable diseases have been quite prevalent in the state this year it is hoped that more parents will see the importance of protecting their children from these preventable communicable diseases. All parents should take the responsibility of reporting all communicable diseases of those ill in the home to the local Health Officer as required by law.

The school has been visited to discuss any problems with the teachers and to plan for the patch test for tuberculosis this winter.

An investigation for venereal disease was made.

Warrant For Town Meeting

To HARVEY L. MOSIER, a Constable of the Town of Westport, in the County of Lincoln.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Westport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Town Hall in said town on Monday, the seventeenth day of March, A. D. 1947, at 10 o'clock A. M., E.S.T., and then and there to act on the following articles, namely:—

ART. 1 To choose a Moderator for said meeting.

ART. 2 To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the town officers, and the audit for the municipal year ending February 16, 1946.

ART. 3 To attend to and act upon the report of the Superintendent of Schools, and town account of Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor and Treasurer.

ART. 4 To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing.

ART. 5 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools.

ART. 6 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor, repair of bridges, repair of highways and town buildings for the year ensuing.

ART. 7 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay officers, interest, abatements and insurance for the year ensuing.

ART. 8 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of Superintendent of Schools for the year ensuing.

ART. 9 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow bills, State and County Tax, and contingent expenses for the year ensuing.

ART. 10 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provision of Sections 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R. S. 1944 as amended.

ART. 11 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, and if so, how much, to be used for applying bituminous surface to the State Aid Road, beginning at the termination of the 1946 tarring program and extending in a southerly direction along the so-called State Highway.

ART. 12 To see what sum of money the town vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of State Aid Highways for the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Section 18 of the Public Laws of 1913.

ART. 13 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of improved sections of third class highways, or to be used in conjunction with the State apportionment for

the reconstruction of third class highways as provided in Section 52, Chapter 20, R. S. 1944, the least amount being \$175.00.

ART. 14 To see what sum of money, if any, the town will recommend to take from the Joint State Aid Account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads built within the past five years in accordance with provisions of Chapter 271, Public Laws of 1931.

ART. 15 To see what action the town will take in regard to cutting bushes along improved sections of third class highways and raise and appropriate money for same.

ART. 16 To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$25.00 for public health nursing in Westport. Said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service.

ART. 17 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8.00 to be spent for dental hygienist service in the Town of Westport under the direction of the State Bureau of Health and Welfare, in cooperation with local authorities.

ART. 18 To see what action the town will take in regards to flags and halyards for the school and raise and appropriate money for same.

ART. 19 To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of

the State of Maine, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

ART. 20 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45.00 to be used to pay the audit of the municipal year ending February 15, 1947.

ART. 21 To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any property which the town holds by virtue of tax deeds or liens, and to execute and deliver on behalf of the town such deeds as may be necessary to transfer the right, title and interest of the town.

ART. 22 To see what action the town will take in regards to Fire Wardens for the year ensuing.

ART. 23 To elect a Fire Inspector.

ART. 24 To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire, in anticipation of taxes, such sums of money as may be necessary for the year ensuing.

ART. 25 To see if the town will vote to set a date when taxes shall be payable and what interest shall be collected thereafter.

ART. 26 To see if the town will vote to continue membership in the Maine Municipal Association; and if the town does so vote, to authorize the officials to pay membership fee from contingent fund.

ART. 27 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care of Veterans' Graves.

ART. 28 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70.00 for Town Clerk's Filing Case.

ART. 29 To see if the town will vote to hire a power shovel for road work for the year ensuing.

ART. 30 To see if the town will vote to set a wage scale for hand labor, trucks and teams.

ART. 31 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$80.00 for maintenance of the Thomas Hill Fill, so called, the same being a special resolve from the State.

ART. 32 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for maintenance of Gate Hill, the same being a special resolve from the State.

ART. 33 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, if any, to repair the Old Post Office Road, so-called.

ART. 34 To see if the town will vote to elect a caretaker for the fire equipment, raise money for same or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 35 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise in regard to the payment of the bridge note, at the First National Bank of Bath.

ART. 36 To see what action the town will take in regard to wiring the Town Hall and North School, or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 37 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for a fill or all repairs necessary to make the Mill Bridge, so-called, passable and safe for motor traffic.

ART. 38 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in accordance with Revised Statutes, Chapter 32, Secs. 53-58.

ART. 39 To see if the town will vote to hire a surveyor to survey the Oat Nut Park, so called, and raise money for same.

ART. 40 To see what action the town will take in regard to rent and janitor service for the Town Hall for the year ensuing.

ART. 41 To see if the town will vote to adopt Daylight Saving Time for the period specified by the State of Maine.

ART. 42 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall in the Town of Westport on Monday, the 17th day of March, A. D. 1947 at 9:00 A. M. for the purpose of correcting the voting list.

You are hereby directed to serve this by posting at the Town Hall at least seven days before said meeting.

Hereof fail not and have this Warrant with your doings thereon at the above place and time.
