## Whole Oceans' parent seeking tribal fish farm

BUCKSPORT — Until its announcement last month that it finally had acquired its site here, Whole Oceans, the land-based salmon farm entrepreneurs had said little or nothing publicly about its parent company.

That firm, Emergent Holdings, also based in Portland with some of the same managers, now is moving ahead with an effort to buy control of a British Columbia land-based salmon farm.

Emergent wants to close on its equity stake in the Kuterra operation now owned by the Namgis First Nation tribe by next month. The terms haven't been disclosed. The business has been for sale for at least two years.

The fish firm's board has recommended the offer to the Namgis tribal council.

The small scale operation - the first land-based salmon farm in North America and the second in the world - was built with \$9.5 million in Canadian government and charity money.

The Canadian farm is to be a research center for Emergent's Whole Oceans operation here. It also will be used to train the staff to operate the Bucksport site.

In operation since 2014, Kuterra, with an annual capacity of 470 metric tons of salmon, now is producing 300 tons, and is said to be breaking even. Emergent wants to increase the capacity there to 500 tons, a tenth of the initial projected capacity of the Bucksport farm.

While Kuterra's technology

already is considered somewhat dated, Emergent wants the place to be profitable and will invest several million dollars to do that.

Canadian analysts claim Kuterra must reach 1,000 tons to be viable long-term, but that doesn't seem to be happening.

The tribal operation has had its challenges, requiring more oxygenating of the water, reducing carbon dioxide and meeting "biological challenges", including early sexual maturation, a failure to grow and fungal infection, according to a *Vancouver (B.C.) Sun* account.

On-shore fish farming is proving more expensive than initially expected, but its backers say a better quality, premium product will justify the higher price.

Canada plans to nearly double its production of salmon from 200,565 tons in 2016 to 381,900 in 2028.

Whole Oceans executives told another Canadian publication the firm is ahead of schedule in its Bucksport efforts.

However, the firm is well behind its original timetable, and now won't begin major sitework here until late this year, according to the latest forecast.

Jason Mitchell, the president of both Emergent and Whole Oceans, has visited the Canadian fish farm several times.

Nordic Aquafarms Inc. yesterday (6/5) said it has hired Gilbane Building Co. and Landry French Construction to build its 850,000 square-foot salmon rearing plant in Belfast.



## Student earns prestigious internship

BUCKSPORT — A Bucksport woman has received a summer research grant from National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

Claire Baker of Bucksport of the Class of 2022 at Saint Joseph's College in Standish, is part of a study being financed through the Maine Space Grant Consortium to gather and ana-

lyze hemispherical photos of the leaf canopy along Mount Washington in New Hampshire and Sebago Lake in Maine.

The digital photos will let the team of researchers determine the size of the forest canopy and establish a baseline for establishing how that canopy shifts with changes in elevation, time and ecological zone.

Baker said she's pleased to be part of the team, for it's important to do ground-based studies because they have the potential for greater resolution and accessibility than is currently practical with satellite data."

The data they generate will result in one of the first quantified studies of forest canopy density in the two-state area.

## IN THE WORKS... Weekly tidbits about what may lie ahead

IN ORLAND — On Tuesday, the polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. as voters choose a selectman from among five candidates and an RSU member from among two. The only referendum on the ballot is whether or not to ratify the \$15.76 million RSU 25 budget for 2019-2020. The annual Town Meeting will be at 7 p.m. on Wednesday at the community center.

*Bucksport, Prospect and Verona*

*Island voters also will vote on the RSU budget on Tuesday.*

### SHORTER & NARROWER

— After a public hearing which drew two members of the public on Tuesday to consider amending Bucksport's Town Code to reduce the minimum size of a parking space in downtown lots, the Planning Board recommended the Town Council adopt the idea.

*If adopted, parking spaces*

*must be at least nine feet wide and 18 feet long, whether the space perpendicular, parallel or angled to the curb. That's a foot narrower and two feet shorter than the existing minimum.*

### BIG TICKET ITEMS —

Bucksport's proposed 2019-2020 municipal budget sets aside \$323,000 in reserve accounts for major purchases and projects.

*Highway equipment, \$120,000;*

*highway improvements, \$30,000; ambulance, \$35,000; fire department, \$40,000; police, \$37,000; waterfront, \$35,000; public safety building, \$25,000; and information technology, \$10,000.*

CAP FEES? — The site development review and building permits for the first phase of the Whole Oceans' salmon farm are estimated at \$28,000, Jeffrey Hammond, the code officer, said.

*That lead Hammond this week to suggest the town might want to impose a maximum fee on large projects to encourage development. That would take a council vote.*

## Physician relocating

### Dr. Duvefelt returning to The County

BUCKSPORT — Dr. Hans Duvefelt, long associated with the Bucksport Regional Health Center here, has decided to cut back on his clinical and administrative duties and will be relocating permanently to Aroostook County.

His last day of seeing patients here will be July 1.

Duvefelt will be succeeded as the medical director of the center on an interim basis by Dr. Stanley Whittemore, who also has had long ties to the Bucksport center.

Duvefelt's patients will be seen by Whittemore and other medical professionals on the staff.

Meanwhile, the center is seeking a permanent full-time medical director.

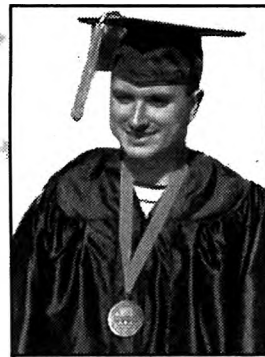

## 75 years ago today!

Many of those alive at the time had distant memories of "The War to End All Wars," but now the United States of America was being called upon to embark upon another savage enterprise to maintain freedom as we had come to know and enjoy it.

The threat of war - a potentially world-wide conflict — was becoming increasingly ominous, and after long months of seeking to avoid the brutality we suddenly were in it. As our European allies fell or, at the least, faltered, this nation moved from being a provider of the supplies of war to being a supplier of troops as well as armaments.

After the British disaster at Dunkirk it would take a monumental effort to stop Adolf Hitler and his Nazi panzers, luftwaffe blitzkrieg attacks and cold, hard, stubborn resolve to impose the fuhrer's narrow views on the world.

Fortunately, that monumental effort was successfully waged on a scale never seen before. At the center of that effort was a growing cadre of young, we-will-not-be-stopped soldiers, sailors, airmen and merchant marines. 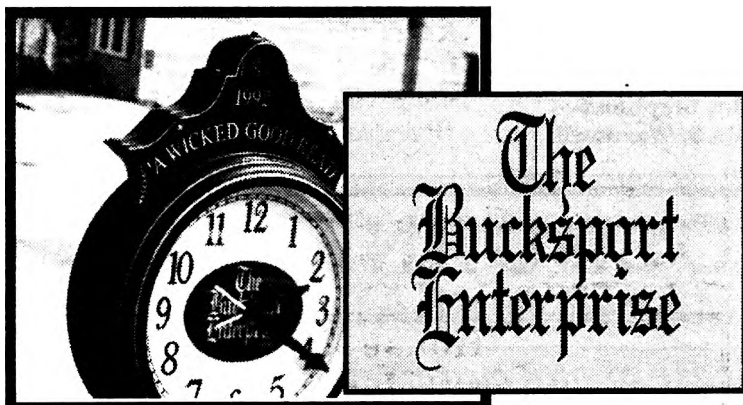

## You had to hear it to believe it!

Hooperville High School had a very strong football team ("*The Mighty Hawks*"), especially for such a tiny school. The marching band was an afterthought.

The original idea was for the band to spell out H-O-O-P-E-R-V-I-L-E. and march that name right down the center of the field. However, with less than 20 musicians, that wasn't going to happen. The backup was the marching "H" formation, but that didn't work either for the drum major tended to gently tweet when he should have power-whistled his commands. The resulting mayhem inevitably transformed that capital "H" into a lower case "h" and, sometimes, even a lower case "b" and, once, something resembling an ampersand on steroids.

One school board member had enough. He said it was vital to start the musicians off at a younger, more malleable age. Thus was born the Hooperville Middle School Marching Band. To say the effort was launched on a shoestring would be an overstatement. There was, in fact, no budget.

The lads and lasses were to wear their own black pants and skirts and white shirts or blouses. A couple of mothers sprang for a few bolts of cheap green wool, fashioning tunics to complete the ensemble.

The instruments were high school castoffs and other donated musical flotsam and jetsam that hadn't been played in decades. An obliging dad filled his pick-up with the clutter and applied first aid, dousing dollops of WD-40 wherever it could be sprayed or poured. He then used half a roll of duct tape to keep the various pieces from falling off the instruments onto the line of march.

In command was "Hodge" Flaherty, Hooperville's "Music Man". Hodge couldn't read music, but on a honky-tonk piano he, entirely by ear, could knock off a rousing rendition of any tune he'd ever heard over the years. Hodge was very popular, a fine showman but not much use to the trumpeters, the clarinetist, the tuba player or any of the rest of this musical conglomeration.

Hodge was counting on the percussion section, expecting it to drown out the more-subtle instruments. The percussionists consisted of three drummers, who each played well but not together; a novice glockenspiel player totally unaware her instrument lacked three keys, two of them critical; and the lone cymbalist, who was issued one tinny cymbal and one so badly cracked only two six-inch strips of duct tape kept it together. Playing those artifacts was like smashing two garbage can lids.

Finally, there was Frankie, the bass drummer, the biggest guy in the school who didn't qualify for the football team. Frankie had two issues: (a) he was totally uncoordinated and (b) he couldn't out-think a flea. But he was eternally jolly, hence his nickname, "Jolly Frankie."

Hodge tried everything, but he couldn't get Jolly Frankie to strike the drum methodically, thus setting the cadence for the entire parade. Finally, he told Frankie succinctly, "Look, every time I raise my arm, you bang that drum." Hodge and Frankie became as one, inseparable.

The cymbalist was ruffling and flourishing. The piccolo player was inhaling - and then spitting - little droplets of WD-40. Frankie was riveted to Hodge. Up went Hodge's arm, and Frankie belted that drum with the gusto of a teen who knows but one emotion: jolly.

That lasted about twenty paces. Then, Hodge began to wave at some of his many friends lined up along the route: BAM! BAM! BAM! BOOM. Jolly Frankie was on a roll! The parade was racing out of control. The veterans saw the band, now at a full trot, but they couldn't run. The trumpeters hit the reed players, the drummers all but wiped out the horn section.

That's when the cymbalist suddenly uncorked his best maneuver yet: He caught Mary Farquard's ponytail right between his cymbals, ever so briefly yanking her head back while rendering her tone deaf for at least a block. Mary turned and gave the cymbalist a look, causing him to drop one - unfortunately, the good one.

## Ex-motel manager's charges detailed

### Records claim assaults on children and drug possession

BUCKSPORT — The former manager of the Spring Fountain Motel is alleged to have assaulted three young children entrusted to his temporary care and had a large quantity of high-powered opioids in his room at the U.S. Route 1 business.

Among the charges listed in the court records is one that Kaleem Adnan, 30, tied the hands of a 6-year old girl, bound her feet together, covered her mouth with duct tape, and then suspended her upside down in his office at the motel.

The records include additional reports by local police that Adnan placed the girl in an unplugged refrigerator, and then proceeded to rock the refrigerator back and forth while she was inside.

The accounts differ significantly from those offered earlier by the current owner when he called *The Bucksport Enterprise* from his home in New Jersey to criticize the paper's coverage of repeated police calls to the Bucksport business since the beginning of the year.

The owner contends he offered Adnan the job here when he was released from a prison in an effort to give him a fresh start. He claimed Adnan was the victim of overzealous police and other local authorities as well as false accounts by the children involved.

The mother of the three children was staying at the motel when the incident first surfaced, but reportedly has since relocated.

Adnan will be back in court late this month and again sometime next month to respond to the charges.

In accounts filed by Bucksport police with the district attorney and the courts, the young girl had severe bruises on her buttocks. She also had visible signs of bruising on her face, neck, wrists and legs.

Her 10-year-old brother is alleged to have been hit with a stick that had a nail in it, according to the same records.

The charges also detail the finding of six grams - enough for 270 bags - of heroin or fentanyl

Adnan's room.

The motel at 94 U.S. Route 1, now reportedly being offered for sale, remains in violation of various life and safety code violations, according to local and state inspectors.

Jeffrey Hammond, the town's code officer, said the town is continuing to try to work with the business and is reluctant to shut it down.

While smoke and carbon monoxide detectors have been installed in every room and other improvements have been made, the motel still is not in compliance with fire safety codes requiring the boiler room to be entirely enclosed with fire-resistant material.

The state fire marshal's office has done a detailed report on the situation, as has the local fire department.

Meanwhile, the motel continues to operate without either local or state innkeeper's licenses, and has been doing so since it was sold to the current owner last year for some \$600,000, using a government-backed Machias Saving Bank loan.

Town officials have not acted on a request for a permit while the code issues remain pending.
