Sir,

I have the
honor to acknowledge your communication of the 16th stating the desired details - of pay to privates of Cahary - Also a copy of the General Order to persons enlisting recruits.

Your other communication is recd. containing a second copy of the General Order in which I notice particular attention is desired to the necessity of the enlistments being in triplicate.

All requirements shall be car-

suit out to the letter.

Will you inform me if it will be necessary for me to go on to Augusta with the men as soon as the quota is furnished?

I am engaged in the business for the benefit of A. B. Spurling Esq - who is now in charge of the men enlisted drilling them by squads - He is the man with whom the movement originated & at whose request I was induced to procure the order of enlisting the Hancock quota - Now he will pick his men & have them in good order & discipline before the company is organized and now that the order have come I feel although I should like Spurling, to have all the glory & responsibility -

Get all things are under my immediate control & will be until I learn that upon my recommendation Mr. Spurlin, may take charge. —

Where will the company meet & organize and who will take charge of transporting the men to the place and preside at the election? I would like a suggestion from you on these points as I desire to see the thing through & with the view of aiding, Spurlin, to obtain the Captaincy, would like to have the business of presiding & transporting them from here to the place of organizing. —

Will you favor me with such facts on the matter as you

deem advisable - informing me
how soon I may move with
my quota of men & to
what place.

Suppose that in two
days after the receipt of your
reply the number required
are enlisted how soon
can we expect to go to the
place of organization?

Please furnish me with
the data of expenses
allowed to a country of-
ficer & inform me if
it will not be necessary
for me to go to Augusta
to acquire such accounts
How shall two good men

here get place in the general
employ. Who has the
Washington Co. quota
to raise? & how soon
will they be raised?

Don't fail us on the basis
of Facts—

We will the men every
day & they are getting
honor of our citizens to
practice with—

Don't allow the
servants the office in
honor—must they be
enriched like the
recruits or can they
take any one they
desire for servant.

you help me in the
matter named above
