The back-up activities throughout the rest of the Whatever weeks are numerous and varied, including music, art, seaplane rides, an Intertribal Pow Wow, fireworks, a carnival in Gardiner for four days, guided tours of the Arboretum, daily demonstrations at Old Fort Western, a Trail-O-Thon, bake sales, yard sales, library events, and the Black Fly Follies at the Theater At Monmouth. Complete and detailed schedules have been distributed to many local businesses and gathering locations and are available on the Internet at www.AugustaMaine.com.

One of the most important functions of the Whatever Family Festival is that it makes participants aware of the return options in the greater Augusta area, such as the Capitol Complex with its historic State House and Governor's Mansion, the Blaine House, which are both open to visitors, the Maine State Museum, the Kennebec River Rail Trail



- a scenic six and a half miles from Augusta to Gardiner, the beautiful parks in all three towns, the weekly waterfront concerts in Hallowell and Augusta, and the historic downtowns where shops and boutiques, restaurants and picnic areas, museum in the street signs and architectural sites await.

But back to Whatever! Kids Day in Capitol Park, 11 am-3 pm on Saturday, June 25 is Whatever's signature day with more than 80 free events and activities, a large variety of mascots and character figures, three stages with nonstop entertainment which include the Capital Stage, a Dance Stage and a Kids Stage and a major Touch A Truck display.

The Hallowell Riverfront Celebration on Sunday, June 26 features an Outdoor Art Fair, 11 am-4 pm and "Hallowellness," a Celebration of Body, Mind & Spirit Health, 11 am-4 pm.





The Pilgrim Land Grant to the Kennebec

Tounded in September 2008, the Sidney Historical Society has a come a long way in a very short time. Following its mission of preserving and sharing the history of Sidney, the Sidney Historical Society can count among its accomplishments the following:

-Monthly meetings/programs - free and open to the public. Examples of programs include Benedict Arnold's March, the Appalachian Trail, reminiscenses by members, making May baskets, dating and documenting homesteads, and a pot luck super annual meeting.

-Membership/dues structure, for example, an Individual is \$10 per year, a Senior is \$8.

-Space - the basement of the Sidney Grange Hall has been renovated, thanks to the very hard efforts of volunteer workers and is available for meetings, displays and storage of memorabilia. In March 2011 the society held its first Open House with displays that included a cider press, a corn-shelling machine, a candy scale, a yarn winder, old china and glassware, a handmade tablecloth, household furniture and utensils, a braided rug and farming implements.


A long-term goal of the Sidney Historical Society

THE Proprietors of the Kennebeck Purchase from the late Colony of New-Plymouth, hereby inform the Publick, That besides the twelve Townships mention'd in their Advertisement of the 16th of February last, they have agreed to ap-propriate a Tract of Land on each fide of Kennebeck River for the Accommodation of fuch Families as may be inclined to fettle there. Watershed Wisdom '

In the roughly 20,000 years since the last ice Lage, the lakes of Mother Nature's watersheds in Maine have evolved from crystal clear melted ice water totally devoid of life to carefully balanced watershed ecosystems that support a diverse spectrum of native aquatic plants, plankton, insects, fish and other animals. The natural aging process of lakes is called "eutrophication." After forming a crystal clear, sterile lake by melting a giant mass of ice, Mother Nature begins to fill it back in through erosion of the surrounding land by precipitation. This erosion transports sediment and chunks of plant material with attached nutrients into the water. This allows first bacteria, then algae, then plants to begin growing in the lake, followed by zooplankton and insects to eat the plants, and eventually fish to eat the insects and zooplankton. If the fish begin to get overpopulated, ospreys, eagles, and bigger fish will move in to eat the smaller fish. Mother Nature is very good at keeping her systems balanced and aging slowly through the process of natural selection. She keeps the surrounding watershed vegetated so that erosion is gentle and at a very controlled rate and adds plants and animals slowly over geologic time so growth doesn't get out of control, always ensuring there are checks and balances in terms of predators and prey, with survival of the fittest.

Sometimes Man short circuits the natural systems. Overdevelopment of shoreland areas increases nutrient loading and can trigger algae blooms that prematurely age the lakes. We will talk about that in more detail in future columns. Another way the natural systems are disrupted is through the introduction of an "alien invader," either plant or animal, from a totally different ecosystem. Sometimes this is intentional such as purposefully introducing a fish that is not native to local waters. If done carefully by trained biologists after long study, this can create a new sport fishery in an area. More often than not, new fish introduction is done by "bait bucket biologists" who don't really understand that by introducing a new top predator such as the northern pike, they could be decimating an existing native trout or salmon fishery that is more appropriate for the existing ecosystem. This is currently happening in the Belgrade Lakes Watershed.

Combating Alien Invaders

Alien species can be introduced unintentionally by people discarding unwanted aquatic pets or plants from their aquariums into the nearest waterbody. Eurasian milfoil was most likely introduced into this country in the 1940's been declared as "most unwanted" by the when someone dumped an aquarium into the Potomac River near Washington DC. It quickly became established and then spread by clinging to boats and trailers as boaters moved between watersheds. It is now present in every state except Hawaii and North Dakota. The invasive plants tend to outcompete the native plants because the natural predators that control the plants in their native waters are not present. These plants then grow rapidly to the surface and form a dense mat that shades the bottom, further disrupting the growth of the native plants. This changes the mix of aquatic organisms that live in the lake and causes ripple effects through the entire ecosystem altering populations of fish etc. Additionally, it completely changes the character of the water and the type of recreation that is possible. It is virtually impossible to swim or water ski through a dense mat of milfoil. Last summer, a woman in Idaho drowned when her kayak

capsized in a dense mat of milfoil and she became entangled and couldn't get to the sur-

There are eleven species of plants that have Maine DEP. One of these, variable leaf milfoil, is present in Messalonskee Lake and the Belgrade Stream in our watershed and last summer was discovered in the Meadow Stream between North Pond and Great Pond. Another, Eurasian water milfoil (EWM), was discovered three years ago in Salmon Lake. The BRCA, in partnership with Maine DEP and the local lake associations has been working hard to control, and hopefully, eradicate this menace to our lakes. An herbicide treatment was done two years ago and initial indications are that it was very effective. We found no signs of EWM in Salmon Lake last year. Beginning this week the DEP divers will be back, surveying the infested cove to look for signs of regrowth. We are keeping our fingers

Watershed Science Program 1000 student Milestone!



The Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed's school year education efforts, the Watershed Science Program, has hit a milestone for the first time in the organizations' 10 year history: serving over 1000 students during the 2010-2011 school year! Offered free of charge to schools located within, or enrolling students that live within, the Cobbossee Watershed, the Watershed Science Program brings hands hand-on and multi-disciplinary lessons into the classroom. Topics covered include aquatic ecosystems, water resources, water quality, sources and effects of pollution and land use decisions.

Education Director, Tamara Whitmore believes that watersheds are the perfect realworld context for the skills that students are learning in school. "Literally all of our area children have had some sort of experience with our local lakes, ponds or streams, whether it is swimming with friends during the hot summer months, ice-fishing with family during the winter or just exploring the frog pond beyond their house. The goal of the Watershed Science Program is to help students connect their own experiences to current and future environmental dilemmas by using math, language arts and analytical skills to understand key ecological concepts, and create environmentally literate and engaged stewards of our natural resources in the future."

In 2004, the Friends Board of Directors iden-



tified the need to establish a year-round education presence as a critical component to the organization's effectiveness and sustainability in meeting its mission to "protect and improve the 28 lakes and streams of the Cobbossee Watershed". In 2005, the Friends were awarded a 5-year, \$150,000 grant from the Unity Foundation in Unity, ME to add a full-time Education Director on staff.

Since that point, the Friend's suite of educational programs has grown by leaps and bounds – in program offerings as well as numbers of participants. In addition to the Watershed Science Program, the Friends offer Outside After School, an opportunity for students to connect with the natural resources around their school yard; Nature Day Camps, offered during the winter, spring and summer school vacation periods; and now three levels of Tadpole Patrol, the Friends first and still highly popular educational program aboard their 22' pontoon boat, the OTTER II.

The Watershed Science Program is made possible through grants from private foundations, as well as area business sponsorships and donations from FOCW members and the general public. 

Conservation Too **-**

Trecently attended an excellent workshop Leseries on trees, five meetings covering tree ecology, identification, planting, pruning, insect and disease problems, and woodlot management. It was put on by the Belgrade Tree Committee, in partnership with the Lakes Regional Conservation Belgrade Alliance, Kennebec County Soil and Water Conservation District, Kennebec Woodland Partnership, the Maine Forest Service and the Small Woodland Owners Association of Maine.

It was a winter "Wonder" series which started on March 21 while we were still slogging through snowy weather, but by the time it finished up on April 25th, spring was in the air. So while it certainly wasn't "Summer in the Belgrades," the weather was good enough that we were treated to a number of field trips, several just a step outside on the grounds of the Center for All Seasons and a morning spent visiting a local tree farm.

I enjoyed the enthusiastic, knowledgeable presentations and found the whole series to be very educational. My training in Biology has

been on fauna rather than flora, so I found it all considering getting in a licensed forester to to be very useful. The tree identification was an excellent refresher and stimulus to get out the ID book and really take a look, and so I'm now seeing more sugar maples and white pines and less and less "generic trees". Tish Carr will be glad to know that her pruning tips have been put to good work around my yard already. I now know to start to cut outside the use my land. I don't mind if local people hunt branch bark ridge and not cut too close so as to damage the branch bark collar, rather than just hacking off the branch right against the trunk. And when planting a tree, instead of always just picking a favorite species, I am now looking to see what kind of tree makes sense in that specific location. As a new woodlot owner I especially appreciated hearing the "Ten Biggest Mistakes Woodland Owners Make" by Tom Doak of SWOAM. It was exactly the insects, they really are remarkable little creainformation I needed to manage my woodlot, I can increase the health of the trees and wildlife and harvest some firewood, while decreasing my property taxes. I have walked my woods

with Mort Moesswilde of the Maine Forest

Service, visited my local tax assessor and am

draw up a plan and getting some acres included in the "Tree Growth" program. That would significantly reduce my property taxes now and also inheritance taxes later on. It was also very good to hear that Maine has a strong landowner protection law that protects me whether or not I grant permission to others to in my woodlot, but thought I was liable if someone hurt themselves in my woods. So that news has saved me some worry and the trouble and expense of posting the property.

However my favorite talk of all was by Charlene Donahue, the Maine Forest Service Entomologist. Yes, you guessed it, my biology training is in bugs. I always enjoy meeting someone who shares my fascination with

new Farmers' Market has opened at **1** Viles Arboretum, on Route 9 in Augusta, and it offers the perfect opportunity to walk or bike the six miles of trails, to enjoy the 224 acres of fields, forests, wetlands and botanical collections and to buy fresh produce, flowers, meats, cheeses, preserves and baked goods, and more.

Held every Friday from 2-6 pm, the Viles Arboretum Farmers' Market offers easy access, ample parking, picnic tables, restrooms, and a variety of educational exhibits. The market already has over ten vendors, with more having indicated an interest.

Although the farmers' market is new to the Arboretum area, farming isn't.

In the early 1800s, the land belonged to several adjoining farms. These were purchased and consolidated between 1835 and 1905 by the State Hospital and for more than a century the hospital farm provided crops and livestock as well as occupational therapy and exercise for hospital patients. The farm grew to 600 acres and in the late 1800s achieved the desired ratio of one acre per patient, an amount considered adequate to provide all patients with the opportunity for employment, which was believed to lead to cure and good health. The current site of the Arboretum was used for crops, hay and pasture



while the land west of Hospital Street housed the major farm buildings with the exception of a new piggery built on the east side following several years of a fatal swine virus outbreak. Hence the name for Piggery Road, near the north boundary of the Arboretum property.

Belgrade woke up suddenly this morning, as if my teenager flipped the hunted, never have I heard a turkey get so angry switch on her stereo, blasting a modern day tune filled with multiple beats that simply don't jive in my head, but somehow have a harmony to them. A symphony of sounds that really shouldn't go together but strangely make beautiful music. The dawn concert started with my favorite sound of the season, a tom turkey gobbling as he flew from his roost. He's about 500 yards away or so, making that guttural noise that bird's metabolism rate? Just for one day? causes my heart to pound every time I hear that for his lady friends, wondering where they flew this case wing). This is common spring behavior for a turkey and he will gobble to stir up his girlfriends or he will holler when he hears an owl or crow. Only this morning he's gobbling Belgrade style; he's gobbling each time the loon out front

s I sit out on the back deck listening to the wails. I've been turkey hunting most of my adult $m{\Lambda}$ world wake up, I'm enthralled by the life and have a pretty good understanding of how the game is played, but in all the places I've at a loon! So now the band consists of two of the larger birds found here in the area and they are really setting the tone for the morning concert. There are also a couple of crows cackling and a hummingbird is feeding only a few feet from me. Hummingbirds really are beautiful, so sleek and fine tuned with just a hint of red highlighted on his neck. Don't you wish you had a humming-

So now there are more bird noises than I can sweet gobble. . . . gobble. . . . gobble. He's searching pinpoint and my little piece of heaven is really awake when I hear the motor of a fisherman to and trying to keep them close at hand (or in trolling down the lake. Ahhh, now that's a sound I really like! I've got to finish typing and get my fanny in my boat soon too, but there's still coffee in my cup and one last sound that's worth waiting for. Speaking of noises, loons have four basic calls that make up their vocal communication. This information came from the Sigurd Olson Environmental Institute.

- The **yodel** is a territorial call given by male loons. The call begins with three notes that rise slowly and are followed by several undulating phrases. It communicates to any loons in the area "I am a male loon, I'm on my territory, and I'm prepared to defend it."
- The wail resembles a wolf howl. Individual loons use this call to locate other loons. If you listen closely, you will hear a wailing loon saying, "where are you?" Indeed, that's what they are
- The **tremolo** sounds like a quavering laugh. It is typically used when loons are disturbed. A variation of the tremolo is the flight call. It is usually given over lakes and is a loon's way of requesting clearance for landing. If a loon on the lake responds with a yodel, the one in the air usually flies on to the next lake.
- The **hoot** is a soft, one-note call loons use in close quarters to call to chicks, mates, or even other loons in a social flock. In social groups, the hoot can be thought of as the loon's way of saying "hi."

Now that the coffee is gone and I've received my good morning hug and kiss, it's time to go fishing! June is my favorite month to fish the local waters because there is so much variety available to anglers. Trout and salmon fishing shifts into high gear right now and some beautiful fish have been caught locally on Mooselook Wobblers and Sutton Spoons along with smelt imitating streamer flies like Jerry's Smelt & Gray Ghosts. Most of the trout are still relatively high in the water column, especially at dawn or dusk, so a couple of colors of lead core line on a fly rod should get you into fish. Mooselooks come in a wide variety of sizes and colors and are a staple in every trollers tackle box. Back when I was a

O My Itchy Dog!

If we spend enough time with our pets, eventually we all have that long lack Lnight with an itchy dog or cat. Thump, thump, thump, scritch, scritch, scritch, lick, lick, lick - no one gets much sleep. You feel bad for your pet, you feel bad for your sleep-deprived self, and more often than not, there is a SMELL involved. For some pets this is a short episode that may last only a couple of days or weeks; for others, it's a way of life. For many dogs, summer is prime itchy time.

For every itchy (and smelly) dog or cat we see, we need to identify WHAT is making them itch. This usually involves a potpourie of bacteria, yeast, parasites, skin oils and other discharges. For the most part, getting these under control can be done with a combination of shampoos, topical treatments and, at times, antibiotics and other medications. The longer the problem has persisted however, the more issues become involved. For example, a dog with a simple superficial bacterial skin infection who stays in the water all day and chews all night, can often end up with a more dramatic skin infection known as a hot spot. There are only so many things that usually make the skin raw, itchy and nasty - when I examine an itchy pet, the WHAT is usually apparent.

The harder question to answer for many itchy dogs is WHY they ended up with the WHAT. Often the cause is clear. For example, fleas, insect bites, being wet too long, or a cut, bite or scratch might be the culprit. When the WHY is not as apparent, we need to "dig deeper" to identify the cause. What lies beneath can include allergies (including food allergies or allergies to almost anything in their world), hormonal imbalances, small parasites we cannot see (such as sarcoptic mange mites), and some uncommon issues that crop up only rarely (e.g. diseases of the immune system or certain types of skin cancer). Identifying and treating the WHY can often be

the frustrating part, for most of these reasons just don't go away on their own. Often we can make a pet happier for a while just by treating the WHAT he has, but if we don't address the WHY, he'll be back itching again.

There are some nasty infections that affect the skin on the entire body of a dog or cat, but some of the worst problems affect only certain parts. For instance, the ears are a common spot for itchy misery on an allergic dog, or a dog with mange. Left untreated over time, more and more organisms get involved in the misery which is a canine ear infection. Another serious and painful outcome from a lot of itching, digging and licking is a raw, open bleeding area on the skin known as the "hot spot". Quickly, a hot spot can spread like a wildfire across the skin, causing more extensive damage and pain. Both ear infections and hot spots need prompt attention. Of course, as we begin to treat the WHAT, we also must take into account the WHY the dog ended up with the hot spot, ear infection, assorted skin bumps or

Fortunately, with prompt attention, the majority of itchy dogs and cats can be given relief quickly. For those whose WHY is more involved, more extensive diagnostic tests, labwork, regular follow ups, and longer term treatment may be necessary to get to the bottom of things. A lot of folks want a quick and lasting fix to the itch. In reality, treating itchy pets can be trying and require a lot of perseverance and patience. But take heart, there is usually a WHAT that can be treated to give them relief while we are getting to the bottom of the WHY they itch and scritch and lick.



Snow Pond/Messalonskee Lake Association has changed its name to Friends of Messalonskee - recognizing that the lake is used by all area people and that the issues surrounding the lake including invasive plants, water quality and recreation affect everyone.

On June 25, 10 am-3 pm, the Friends of Messalonskee will hold its second annual Milfoil Awareness Day to help everyone identify, understand and manage this menacing invasive water plant that grows quickly, can choke out other plants and interferes with recreational activities such as swimming and boating. It is often spread from lake to lake by boaters.

Milfoil Awareness Day is a kickoff to surveying the lake to identify milfoil hot spots as part of an ongoing milfoil management plan. Attendees will learn about the plant, take boat rides to see it and learn how they can help in the control efforts, which include State-approved methods such as Benthic barriers, which are underwater mats that block sunlight and kill milfoil, and the use of divers to manually rip the plant out or remove it with a suction-harvesting machine.

June 25 activities will also include a presentation of the program for youth, "Hooked on Fishing - Not on Drugs." An educational tool sponsored by the Department of inland Fisheries





and Wildlife, the program encourages good decision making and family togetherness as the ultimate goal, with teaching youth the art of fishing as a secondary success. The concept of Hooked on Fishing - Not on Drugs began in 1986 and has



expanded to over 1000 programs in 30 states. In Maine, the program is used by over one hundred trained volunteer instructors, runs year round, and has teamed with youth fishing derbies, "Learn for Fish" days and family events. Loaner fishing equipment and bait will be on site. Parents are requested to accompany their children.
