The house on the town farm and all the contents burned March 6, and a special town meeting was called to see what action the town would take in regard to rebuilding, or to sell the farm and buy another.

The town voted to sell and buy another farm, and to use the money received from the sale of the farm and insurance on the house to pay for the farm and furnish the house.

Roscoe Tuell and A. O. Corbett were chosen to act with the selectmen. The farm and stock were sold at auction, April 22. The committee purchased the farm of Mrs. E. A. Jackson for \$2,250, possession to be given April 1, 1906.

There is a balance of \$1,100 to furnish the house and make the repairs on the buildings. What was received from the sale of the stock will be more than will be needed to stock the farm. It seems as though there will be quite a balance left to carry to the poor account or for future expenses on the farm.

The expenses of the poor and insane the past year have been large, a part of which we could not control.

George Swan was committed to the Insane Hospital from Greenwood and died there. His expenses were over \$200. Mrs. Joseph Ratcliff was sick and by the advice of Dr. Packard was sent to the hospital. Her expenses were over \$125. Alton Dean's family and Winfield Estes' wife were sick and their expenses were nearly \$150.

The town farm inmates have had to be boarded and nearly all clothing furnished. Their expenses have been over \$300.

Instead of recommending a larger appropriation for the poor and insane for the ensuing year, we have an article in the warrant to see if the town will authorize the selectmen to draw from the miscellaneous account to pay the outstanding bills, as the balance of the miscellaneous account in the hands of the Treasurer is sufficient, and there will be a balance left.

Report of the Crocker Fund.

This fund is invested in a thirty-year \$1,000 bond in the City Water Company, Washington, Indiana. The coupons become due April 1st and Oct. 1st of each year at the following rates: Four years at 4 per cent., 20 years at 4 1-2 per cent. The company are in the hands of a receiver. No interest has been received for two years. Interest account:

Report of Superintending School Committee.

To the Citizens of the Town of Paris:

The work of the School Department is so fully detailed in the report of the Superintendent that ours is necessarily brief.

The organization for the past year was made in March by the election of George M. Atwood as Chairman and Alton C. Wheeler as Superintendent of Schools and Secretary of the board, ex-officio.

On July tenth the committee and the town met with an almost irreparable loss in the death of Dr. Horatio Woodbury, whose long experience, covering a service of more than twenty years on the Paris School Board, coupled with ripe educational qualifications, sterling integrity and unswerving faithfulness, made him an exceptionally valuable public servant. Dr. Woodbury's work for the public schools was a labor of love and in its execution he rose above prejudice and policy to the broader vision of duty and did that duty as becomes a man, without fear or favor. His worth is known; no word of ours can add to the lustre of his memory.

Mr. Charles H. Howard of South Paris was chosen to complete the unexpired portion of the year. As the term of the chairman also expires with the present year, two vacancies are thus created to be filled by the town at its annual meeting.

In view of the fact that the recommendations of the committee were cut down so seriously that we found it impossible to complete the schools without overdrawing the funds provided, we have no desire to again undertake the task, therefore, Dr. Wheeler, whose term expires next year, hereby tenders his resignation and the two whose terms expire this year, announce that under present conditions they will not accept a re-election; thus giving the town a free hand to elect an entirely new board that shall more nearly conform to its ideas of economy.

In relation to the schools that require action by the town in order to be re-established on account of having failed to

maintain an average attendance of eight pupils during the past year, we recommend that schools be maintained in the Mountain, Whittemore, Tubbs, Biscoe and Forbes districts, and simply as a matter of form to get the question before the annual town meeting, we recommend schools for the Snow's Falls, Hall and Bolster districts.

In the matter of recommendations we make the following:

The recommendations for text books and repairs we have reduced from last year's figures on account of unexpended balances standing to the credit of these accounts.

The recommendation for high schools we have increased to \$1800.00 as the experience of the past year has demonstrated that this amount will be necessary if the town is to continue giving two years of the high school grade at Paris Hill and West Paris.

The recommendation for common schools is the same as that made by the committee last year and considerably reduced by the town at its annual meeting, an action that this committee and many interested citizens believe was a grave mistake, the penalty for which must of necessity be visited in varying degrees upon the scholars in the grades for the few succeeding years.

We offer these recommendations with the assurance that whoever your committee for the ensuing year may be, it will need at least these amounts to properly carry forward the work of our schools. The town can ill afford to be niggardly in the matter of the education of its rising generation. With a constantly increasing school population and an increasing demand in the quality of the work that our schools are called upon to perform, an increase in expenditures is but the natural sequence; it must be met if we are to keep step with the progress of to-day.

In closing, your committee wishes to express its confidence in the ability, efficiency and integrity of its Superintendent of Schools. His work of the past year has been done under exceptionally trying circumstances, yet done in a manner that is worthy of commendation.

Report of Superintendent of Schools.

To the Superintending School Committee of the town of Paris:

Gentlemen,—My fourth annual report of the condition of Paris schools follows the arrangement of my former reports and aims to present the essential points in the business of the school department. The financial statement contained in the body of the Selectmen's Report exhibits the balances of the several appropriations as figured by the school department, and it is fitting to say here that such balances as are indicated therein have been compared with the balances on the books of the town treasurer, and the two sets of books agree almost exactly. Whatever variations occur are less than \$10, I believe, and are caused by small uncashed orders held back by some one unknown.

And I desire to mention the fact that all school money belonging to the town of Paris is paid out only by the Town Treasurer on written order of the Selectmen. To illustrate: When Mr. K. presents a bill to the school officers for payment, a school order is given Mr. K. directed to the Selectmen. The Selectmen receive that order from Mr. K., place it on file, and give him a new order which is directed to the Town Treasurer. Mr. K. receives his money from the Treasurer on surrender of his Selectmen's order, and signs a receipt for his money. In this manner there are three vouchers filed, viz.—

one on the files of the school department; a second one retained by the Selectmen; and the third is retained by the Treasurer, whose books also have on them the signature of Mr. K. when he receipts for his money. Thus the town is protected from fraud and mistake, and the school authorities are protected by retaining itemized vouchers of school expenditures. As in previous years, permit me to invite all citizens to inspect the books and accounts of the school department, with vouchers on file, which are always open to examination.

School money in the town of Paris is divided into departments or appropriations largely determined by state laws regulating what items are proper to be paid from this or that department, and very little choice in the matter is left for us to exercise. These appropriations are as follows: I.—Common school appropriations; 2.—Text book money; 3.—Repairs money; 4.—Appropriation for insurance, apparatus, and appliances, etc., etc.; 5.—Money for free high school. And in addition to these is the sum paid the Superintendent of Schools for his salary and expenses, which is drawn from the appropriation for town officers' salaries. I take up these appropriations in the order named above.

COMMON SCHOOLS.

In the past year we have maintained twenty weeks of school in this department. The attendance has been unusually good, and teachers have worked to good advantage. The fall term produced remarkable results because both teachers and pupils realized the necessity of putting forth extraordinary endeavors to get the most out of the short school year.

In the matter of teachers we have experienced considerable difficulty. Never before have we lost so many by resignation; and never before has it been so hard to secure teachers. In several instances on this account we could not open school at the appointed time. By reducing the appropriation for common schools last March the voters set us a hard task—harder no doubt than they realized. For as soon as it became known that our school year would be short, our teachers began

to look elsewhere for situations, because teachers, like other people, have to earn a livelihood, and many of our teachers are paying for their education. Throughout the year we have been compelled frequently to fill vacancies by hiring young teachers and to contend much over salaries. And in notable instances we have had to put young teachers into difficult schools, and also have had to raise the pay in other cases to retain experienced teachers.

But I wish not to be understood as complaining on this point. Rather do I express genuine satisfaction in our teachers who have labored through the difficulties of the year and remained loyal to the schools during a storm of unfavorable comment. The town of Paris has reason to be proud that the surrounding towns in Oxford County are this month employing nearly a score of Paris teachers. And it is a stinging comment on the assumed poverty of this town that of all those teachers who obtained employment in other towns, only one secured less salary than we paid her, and several secured substantial advances. There is a market price for teachers just as surely as there is a market price for commodities. just so long as Paris fails to pay the market price, so long shall we be compelled to hire beginners; and when these beginners become proficient, they secure more lucrative positions in other towns.

This appropriation shows an overdrawn amount of \$231.94. I hope it has been made clear to the citizens of the town that your committee caused this overdraw for the purpose of maintaining the twentieth week of school required by law. By this I mean to state that had we maintained only nineteen weeks of school, while we should have kept within the appropriation, we should have endangered our chance of receiving the state stipend next year. This stipend, or share of the mill tax, amounts to about \$2300 and costs a town nothing to obtain it, provided said town maintains twenty weeks of school. In view of the amount involved it seemed to be good business sense to incur an overdraft of \$231.94 to guarantee about \$2300.

Your committee purchased the usual quantity of fuel last spring, and much of it remains on hand as assets for the coming year, for we have not been using fuel for a winter term. This action was upon the unanimous vote of the committee, for all were of the opinion that it would be unwise to face the winter with no fuel, especially as there were then strong probabilities of a winter term; for even if no further funds should be provided, there always was the possibility that we might omit the fall term and run a winter school. Hence we purchased a full supply of fuel. In one item alone we paid \$371.40 for coal. This coal, and the dry wood now on hand, were purchased at a much less price than they could be bought for now, and whatever amount remains is good assets in the hands of the town for the ensuing spring term. We have estimated the fuel on hand at \$350, and the estimate is conservative.

I present for your consideration the following cases where schools have failed to maintain an average attendance of eight and therefore stand discontinued until re-established by a vote of the town at a regular meeting, after a favorable written recommendation by your committee. Such schools are the Mountain, Whittemore, Tubbs, Biscoe and Forbes. Following the practice of several years past we have maintained no schools in the Hall, Bolster, and Snow's Falls districts.

TEXT BOOK MONEY.

Under this head we show an unexpended balance of \$157.47 and the only liability outstanding here is a small account for which we are entitled to return certain old texts as soon as they are released from use. It will be recalled that we asked for \$700 for books last spring and that we received only \$500; and some may enquire how it is that we return an unexpended balance under such circumstances. The explanation is clear. We desired to make certain changes and renewals in text books, but the \$500 appropriation permitted only one complete change, and this one we made. Of course a third term would have made further demands on this fund; but as it is I think \$450 and this unexpended balance will provide the necessary books for the coming year.

The change made in books was the adoption of Smith's Arithmetics to replace the Wentworth Primary. Our teachers had properly rebelled at the Wentworth for a long time; and it is gratifying to note that both teachers and pupils are securing excellent returns from the new books. We retained the Wentworth Practical Arithmetic for the upper grades. In this exchange we secured the right to return our old, worn out books toward the price of new ones.

REPAIRS.

We present an unexpended balance of \$5.18 in this department. We have done the usual amount of painting and have made quite an outlay for fencing which we were called upon to build under the new law in relation thereto. We were unable to buy the furniture for the Webber house referred to in our last report. The repairs for the Biscoe house are needed as outlined in our report of last year. There is outstanding in this case a small bill of about \$3.50.

INSURANCE, APPARATUS AND APPLIANCES.

In this appropriation we return \$18.02 unexpended, but there is one outstanding bill of about \$16 against this money. Reference to the list of orders drawn against this fund shows that we have paid considerable money from it for other purposes than insurance, and this method has been criticised by some. But one has only to consult article 9 of the warrant for the last annual town meeting to see that expenditures for appliances and apparatus must be paid from this fund, and from no other.

HIGH SCHOOL.

Paris High School has had a very profitable year. Under the management of efficient and experienced teachers the aims and methods of the institution have become favorably known to all. The policy of the school is safe in the control of instructors who possess skill, professional knowledge, and experience in this line of school work where the rapid course of progress puts the rest of us out of touch in the short space of two or three years. Prof. Clason is now on his second year in this school; Miss Rounds has completed her second year as first assistant; and Miss Jewett is completing her fourth year as second assistant. During a part of the year we have employed a pupil teacher to relieve the regular teachers. The attendance remains in the vicinity of 90 and the interest of all the classes is strong. Mr. Clason receives a salary of \$900 per year; Miss Rounds receives \$12 per week; Miss Jewett, \$10 per week. We are fortunate in retaining these teachers at such prices. In the cases of two at least we could not thus retain them, if there were not definite reasons for their willingness to remain in South Paris.

The financial statement shows a balance of \$127.34 unexpended for high school on Jan. 31, 1906. But before this report goes to press school will have closed and then we shall have paid the current bills excepting about \$161 due Mr. Clason. There will be collectable about \$35 in tuitions to apply on that debt. So we present a liability of about \$125 in this department.

You will note that Miss Ruth Stearns and Miss Grace Dudley received orders out of this fund, for instruction at Paris Hill and West Paris. This money was paid for high school instruction at those places and not for common school instruction, for the town maintains high school instruction in both of those schools. And there can be no doubt about the requirements of the law in relation to paying for high school instruction out of high school money rather than from common school money. I make no controversy with any one who criticises the acts of your committee on this point, but I assert my conviction that it is strictly in accord with right and justice that the children of Paris Hill and West Paris should retain their present opportunities to pursue high school studies in their own schools; and surely it is right that it be paid for out of high school appropriation. It is for the town, not for any individual, to decide what shall be the policy of the future in regard to this matter. It has been the duty and privilege of the Superintendent and School Committee to follow our instructions from the town and from our superiors in the educational department at Augusta.

SALARY OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

During the last year I have been employed at the rate of \$3 per day and expenses. And in obedience to the instructions of the Committee I have made only the absolutely necessary visits to the various schools and have endeavored to cut the expenses as low as possible. I have made no charges for the numerous hours and half-hours, aggregating many days, when I have been compelled to surrender my time in my office to the demands of those who wished to consult me on school business, or to investigate the various complaints presented in the course of a year. Those matters and the time and attention necessary to ensure uniform work from the various departments of the teaching corps, and the time which agents and callers on other lines of business consume, make me say that the pay computed on such basis is entirely inadequate, and no one with any other business can afford to attend to the work of Superintendent for the sum paid. After deducting cash paid out for expenses I find that my personal services have netted me the sum of \$168.89 for my year as Superintendent. And it ought to be borne in mind that much of the work of this position has to be done precisely the same for 20 weeks of school in a year, as for 30 or 50 weeks.

I append a table showing the expense for Superintendent's salary for several years past, as the items are not easily to be obtained from the town reports.

The work of this office has increased of late. The teaching force is constantly growing, and the schools are making a steady growth. There are now twenty-eight teachers on the pay roll. From these teachers, excepting those at the high school, reports are required each two weeks on forms like the one below:

17. State here fully what supplies your school needs.

18. State here fully what supplies you have purchased on the account of the town; of what dealer; price; and date of purchase. Did you instruct the dealer to enter your name as the person to whom these supplies were delivered?..... Signed, Teacher.

This report must be filled out in full and returned promptly to the Superintendent of Schools at the end of each two weeks. A failure to comply with this regulation will be held as cause for dismissal. The report should be mailed or handed to the Superintendent on the Saturday at the end of the two school weeks.

An examination of this form shows that all the features of the work are reported to the Superintendent every two weeks and are considered by him. These reports are then filed in his office and a general report is given to the Committee. This system has worked such good results in the last year and a half that I hope it will be continued. Not the least advantage from these reports is in this respect that the Superintendent can interview any teacher whose report shows irregularities in school routine, and thus many a young teacher is helped to avoid common mistakes. Often such reports reveal errors on the part of the teacher that can be corrected by a letter of advice from the Superintendent or Committee.

In conclusion let me commend the faithful work of our teachers, and thank your committee for its support and courtesy in my final year's work as Superintendent of Schools. I still hold to my statement made when I accepted the position of Superintendent for 1905-6, and am not a candidate for re-election. Accordingly herewith I transmit to you for delivery to my successor such books and accounts as have been in my custody as Superintendent and Secretary of your Committee.

- ART. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor and insane for the ensuing year.
- ART. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town officers' bills for the ensuing year.
- ART. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay snow bills of the present winter.
- ART. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.
- ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to build an iron bridge at Trap Corner and what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the same.
- ART. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay on town debt and interest.
- ART. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for miscellaneous bills for the ensuing year.
- ART. 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to draw from the miscellaneous account the sum not exceeding five hundred dollars to pay the outstanding poor bills.
- ART. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise any sum of money to be expended by William K. Kimball Post, G. A. R., in observing Memorial Day, and if so, how much.
- ART. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to extend the sewer in South Paris village.

ART. 20. To see if the town will vote to pay the bill claimed by A. W. Walker & Son for extending the sewer in 1904.

ART. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on state road.

ART. 22. To see if the town will vote to expend the one hundred dollars paid by the state on the state road.

ART. 23. To see if the town will vote to accept the road as laid out by the Selectmen from Main Street past the residence of James L. Chase, Paris Hill, Maine.

ART. 24. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all unpaid taxes after the 1st of January, 1907.

ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes of 1906, if paid before January, 1907, and if so, fix the rate.

ART. 26. To see if the town will instruct the Superintending School Committee to maintain schools in the Biscoe, Forbes, Partridge, Snow's Falls, Hall, Whittemore, Tubbs and Bolster districts.

The selectmen will be in session at their office at nine o'clock A. M. of said day of meeting, to revise the list of voters.
