Report of Superintending School Committee.

To the Citizens of the Town of Paris:

Inasmuch as the Superintendent of Schools has given to you a very full report concerning our work, a brief word from your Board is sufficient.

Your committee met soon after the last annual town meeting and elected Dr. Wheeler Chairman of the Board.

The first important consideration was to find and elect a Superintendent of Schools, to succeed Mr. Alton Wheeler, who declined a re-election. We took into consideration every available candidate, and finally selected Rev. H. A. Clifford, for that office. After a year of work with him, we feel that we made no mistake, for in our judgment, Mr. Clifford has conducted the office with unusual ability, bringing to us his six years of experience, gained in serving other towns in this capacity. Little do people realize the work required to conduct the office of Superintendent, or the many perplexing problems he must solve, as he deals with parents, scholars and teachers. As a Board we unite in our testimony to the conscientious work of our Superintendent in behalf of our schools, and believe that he has given the town an unusual administration of school affairs.

We have held seven board meetings and endeavored to discharge faithfully the duties expected of us.

The recommendations will be found in the Superintendent's report, and are given to the town after a most careful study of the needs of our schools.

Report of Superintendent of Schools.

Fellow Citizens of the town of Paris:

The work of giving proper direction to the varied interests of our public schools is much more difficult than many suppose. In our good state of Maine there are to-day too few capable men who are willing to give much time to the training of youth, and yet no work is more important. The schools of Maine suffer for the lack of expert supervision. No citizen should attempt to escape his duties to the rising generation. Pestalozzi, Froebel and Horace Mann are good examples of faithful and distinguished educators, and in those hours when we may desire to avoid the burdens of honest citizenship we can get new courage by a study of their efforts to help young people to a larger life.

Your honorable school committee, Dr. F. E. Wheeler, George M. Atwood, Charles H. Howard, and former superintendent Alton C. Wheeler have rendered constant kindness and aid to the present superintendent. The committee serve without pay except a small sum allowed to Dr. Wheeler for expenses.

COMMON SCHOOLS.

Our town is large and there are twenty-four teachers in the common schools. Every school has been visited at least six times during the year, and only one regular visit was omitted. We have had six meetings of teachers for the discussion of school improvements. The able superintendent of Auburn, Mr. Payson Smith, addressed one meeting. He kindly came at his own expense and brought an excellent exhibit. Miss Iva McArdle gave a valuable address on drawing. The teachers have taken various school papers, and have manifested zeal for their work. It has been our effort to learn our mistakes and correct them. A record is now kept of work done each term and the rank of every pupil in town.

In every school some photographs have been used to aid in the study of geography and history. We have had special

drills in arithmetic and grammar. Most teachers have taught their pupils important facts. We now have a grammar grade diploma good for any district. The "School Improvement Leagues" have raised special funds in several districts for pictures and books. I gave a lecture to aid the Partridge district League. In the midst of these many plans and efforts we were between two opposing voices which said: "Give us longer terms," and "Do not overrun the appropriations." Please consider the following facts:

Last year bills were paid for common schools amounting to \$7,407.81, while the total funds available for this year were \$6,374.14, or over one thousand dollars less. The pupils were in need of at least 33 weeks this year in order to be properly graded. An estimate showed that we might have nearly 28 weeks if we were not obliged to pay high school bills for fuel, janitor and water from common school funds. In sending the money raised by our pupils in aid of the San Francisco school fund, I asked our state superintendent about these expenses for the High School. He replied as follows:

AUGUSTA, June 26, 1906.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS, South Paris.

Dear Sir:—Enclosed find receipt for the check, \$6.40, sent by you for the San Francisco fund. Please thank the scholars in my name as well as your own. If the town raised no money for the purposes named I can only say they must not be charged to the common school fund. Either to incidentals or overdraft but never to common schools.

The law is plain and it will help conditions if we keep the law. There was no provision this year to meet these items but we can correct our error at the town meeting and so have a clean record with the state. We have paid this year for high school fuel and janitors, \$353.51. We needed this money for our teachers in lower grades who patiently wait for \$455.50 due on the winter term. About \$50 are due for other bills to be paid from common school funds. The water bills on the Shurtleff and South Paris Grammar buildings were paid for two years to January, 1907. There was enough coal in stock for the grammar school as Mr. Alton Wheeler stated in his last report.

HIGH SCHOOL.

This institution continues to maintain a high grade and to send graduates to various colleges without special examinations. The June graduation was held in the Universalist church when diplomas were granted to the following persons: Carrie Clifford, Mae Field, Bessie Haggett, Lilla Swift, Maude Lunt, Carrie Bennett, Donald Chapman, Edna Easson, Chester Merrill, Mildred Parlin, Merton Sumner, Robert Wheeler, Lucy Wing.

Mr. E. F. Clason was re-elected principal at \$900 per year, Miss Sue Rounds teacher at \$450 per year, Miss Beulah Purington teacher at \$9 per week for the fall term and at \$10 per week for the balance of the year.

The school committee adopted a new diploma with a fine cut of the building and ordered one hundred. The balance of \$23.75 is due April 1st, and the supply of diplomas will last several years.

Our high school course needs revision in the interest of the average practical life. Some man of wealth could aid the school by providing apparatus for physics and manual training.

The high school water bill for three years to January, 1907, amounts to \$160.76, and is unpaid for lack of funds. Some delay in paying water bills has been caused by a discussion concerning the accuracy of water meters. There is now due \$250 from the state. This money with tuitions due will probably cover expenses of the term not yet completed. Money paid janitor from this fund should be returned according to law.

TEXT BOOK ACCOUNT.

Each school has been well supplied with books and there has been no radical change in any series used. Some geographical and other readers have been used to the great satisfaction of the pupils and I suggest a better supply for another year. Most of the schools are now well supplied with maps. Dana Farnum assisted in caring for the books and sent two boxes of useless books to Boston for which the town received a credit of \$14.13. All book bills are paid to date and there is a balance unexpended of \$82.34.

REPAIRS ACCOUNT.

The High School building, the South Paris and West Paris Grammar school buildings have been painted. The Biscoe school house has been sheathed and supplied with desks. Blackboards have been furnished for several schools and more are needed. After we had completed the repairs expected, it was necessary to buy two large stoves for West Paris. Accounts of W. S. Jackson & Son, \$35.77, N. D. Bolster & Co., \$24.74, S. P. Maxim & Son, \$11.23, are unpaid.

"INSURANCE, APPARATUS, APPLIANCES, Etc., Etc."

So the title reads in the state account book, and under this appropriation I suggest that each year the town raise what is needed for these items including the high school fuel, water and janitor expenses. The appropriation of last year was not adequate for these purposes. Accounts of J. P. Richardson, \$1.31, C. P. Dunham, \$1.00, F. A. Shurtleff & Co., \$7.50, are unpaid.

CONVEYING PUPILS.

The law reads: "The superintendent of schools in each town shall procure the conveyance of all public school pupils residing in his town, a part or the whole of the distance, to and from the nearest suitable school, for the number of weeks for which schools are maintained in each year, when such pupils reside at such a distance from the said school as in the judgment of the superintending school committee shall render such conveyance necessary." The judgment of the committee must decide what is right in the matter of conveyance. It often costs more to maintain a small school than to convey the pupils to a larger school where they usually have better advantages. The town needs to consider what is best for the schools in Forbes, Porter, Whitemore, Biscoe, Mountain and Tubbs districts which do not maintain an average attendance of eight pupils.

SALARY OF SUPERINTENDENT.

The cost of superintendence is \$300, out of which are paid all bills for official postage, car fares, livery teams and \$15 for school census. One town in Maine not requiring much more labor pays the superintendent \$700 per year.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

Your committee voted to ask the town for enough money for 33 weeks in common schools the coming year. One town report says: "We have had the usual 32 weeks," but we need to regain some of our losses. Your committee suggest the following sums for next year :

ART. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of school books for the ensuing year.

ART. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school repairs for the ensuing year.

ART. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school house insurance, apparatus and appliances, high school fuel, water and janitor, for the ensuing year.

ART. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor and insane for the ensuing year.

ART. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay snow bills of the present winter.

ART. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.

ART. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town officers' bills for the ensuing year.

ART. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay on town debt and interest.

ART. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for miscellaneous bills for the ensuing year.

ART. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to underdrain the road near Frank Bennett's.

ART. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be used for cutting bushes in the limits of the highway.

ART. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to extend the sewer in South Paris village.

ART. 20. To see what action the town will take in relation to public sewers, and if the town will choose a committee to examine into the legality and liability for such sewerage, with the right to employ counsel reasonably and to pay the same, and authorize the selectmen to pay such committee out of the miscellaneous fund \$1.50 per day for time and expenses.

ART. 21. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to be expended by the William K. Kimball Post, G. A. R., in observing Memorial Day, and authorize the selectmen to draw the same from the miscellaneous appropriation.

ART. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended on state road.

ART. 23. To see if the town will vote to expend the three hundred dollars paid by the state on the state road.

ART. 24. To see if the town will vote to take action to protect the town from the moth pests, and provide means therefor.

ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all unpaid taxes after the 1st of January, 1908.

ART. 26. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes of 1907, if paid before January, 1908, and if so, fix the rate.

ART. 27. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as revised by the municipal officers.

ART. 28. To see if the town will instruct the Superintending School Committee to maintain schools in the Biscoe, Forbes, Partridge, Snow's Falls, Hall, Whittemore, Tubbs, Bolster, Porter and Mountain districts.

The selectmen will be in session at their office at 9 o'clock A. M. of said day of meeting, to revise the list of voters.
