Summertime in the Belgrades

Watershed Wisdom

'n previous columns I have described Mother **L**Nature's watershed design and the importance of trees and vegetated buffers in protecting lakes and streams. This week I'm going to discuss two human programs designed to help protect watersheds based on Mother Nature's principles-Maine DEP's LakeSmart Program and the BRCA Youth Conservation Corps. These programs are proactive in the sense that they try to prevent degradation rather than remediating badly damaged ecosystems. There is an old saying that "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." In terms of managing lake watersheds the expression should be "an ounce of prevention is worth a ton of cure." Keeping pollutants out of the water in the first place is much easier and cheaper than repairing the damage after the fact.

Roads, camps, and houses built near the lakes disrupt Mother Nature's system and can bypass some of her protective buffer systems. Through normal every day activities, people introduce phosphorous and other contaminants into the watershed including road dust, fertilizers, pet waste, soaps, garbage, detergents, eroded soil, oil and grease from vehicles, septic effluent, grass clippings, raked leaves, and others too numerous to mention. Additionally, the creation of impervious surfaces such as roofs, driveways, and roads provides areas where stormwater runoff is concentrated and picks up speed while it rolls downhill. The kinetic energy of the flowing water exacerbates the situation by increasing erosion and transporting all the extra pollutants quickly down hill toward the lake. This can potentially increase the pollutant load to the lake a hundredfold or more compared to an equivalent area of undeveloped forest.

With smart design and a few simple management practices, the vast majority of this increased pollutant load can be prevented from reaching the lake. Use common sense and apply a few simple principles aimed at preventing pollution in the first place, **disperse and slow the flow of water** as much as possible, taking advantage of any opportunities to **infiltrate** (soak into the ground) or **filter** (run through a vegetated buffer area) the runoff before it reaches the lake. And above all, **don't dump anything directly into the lake.**

To prevent pollution, make sure simple things like routine maintenance on your septic system or vehicles gets done. Don't drive around with oil leaks in your car or boat. A few drops of oil can contaminate hundreds of gallons of water. And it doesn't have to actually land in the water- any-

thing that lands on the pavement will wash off with the first good rain. Upgrade your old twostroke outboard to a newer four-stroke model. Don't fill your gas tanks in the boat- wherever possible, take them out, fill them carefully away from the water and carry them back to the boat. Inspect your septic system yearly and pump the tank every 2-5 years. Systems 20 years of age and older should be inspected by a specialist. Use phosphorus-free cleaners and detergents. Stagger laundry loads. Minimize water use. Don't put toxics or grease down the drain.

Keep your property functioning as much like Mother Nature's system as possible. Don't let water run straight down your driveway toward the lake. Use berms, rubber razors or simply crown the road to divert the water off into the woods. Don't let runoff concentrate and pick up speed. Avoid bare soil- don't rake up the leaves and pine needles under the trees. Leave the natural duff layer in place. Don't cut your grass to the water's edge and especially don't dump the clipping in the water. Maintain a good vegetated buffer along the waters edge. Conservation Corps assist visit. For the past fifteen years, the Corps has been doing erosion control projects to protect our lakes while providing meaningful jobs for area youth. They have completed nearly 700 projects in that time. If you call soon, the Corps may be able to design an effective project for you and provide some free labor in the next few weeks.

Another excellent program is LakeSmart, sponsored by Maine Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). Most of the lake associations in our watershed are participating in this program, which recognizes property owners who adopt lake-friendly practices on their properties. This program mimics Mother Nature's methods and focuses on stabilizing eroding areas, reducing the use of chemicals, diverting rainwater into vegetated areas, and minimizing lawns and other impervious areas. Properties are evaluated in four areas: driveways and parking areas; structures and septic systems; lawns, recreation areas and footpaths; and shorefront and beach areas. If the property passes in all four areas, the property is certified

Staged every year at historic Cumston Hall, the show allows Monmouth's repertory members to present their many talents some of which might not be seen in the regular summer shows.


Past "Follies" acts have included song and dance, comedy, improvisation, fiery tap dance, stand up, drumming, and much, much more.

Conservation Too -

We at the Kennebec Conservation District have had a unique opportunity over the last couple of years to educate ourselves about the emerging industry of alternative energy. Through partnerships with the Farm Energy Partners, a consortium of agricultural professionals, and Efficiency Maine, as well as others, we have participated in and led energy conservation programs aimed at decreasing greenhouse gas emissions and increasing farm business sustainability.

While we have traditionally focused on water and soil conservation, the District sees energy conservation as a pressing need and one that aligns with our mission. No matter what opinion one holds regarding the validity of the theory of global warming, it is not a stretch to suppose that more greenhouse gases in our atmosphere will lead to diminished water quality and other negative impacts to aquatic wildlife ("acid rain" ring a bell?). Basically we have increased the District's ability to respond to the needs of Maine farmers.

With rising fuel costs continuing to negatively affect our costs of living, renewable energy

sources are on many peoples' minds, especially business owners. The cost of energy in Maine has always been high and is routinely cited as one of the top three hindrances to the business climate overall. Maine farmers and other electricity users pay some of the highest electricity rates in the country. A business's utility costs may be the difference between making it or breaking it. In order to survive and thrive, Maine businesses must reduce exposure to the external forces that control energy costs and seize upon the opportunity to both use less energy, and develop homegrown energy sources. Many wonder if solar thermal, geothermal or photovoltaic technologies may be useful and beneficial for them. In some cases the most obvious choice may not end up being the right choice – it all depends on the needs of a particular business. It may be simply a combination of efficiency upgrades instead of installation of renewable energy equipment.

Thanks to a grant from the USDA – Renewable Energy Development Assistance (REDA) program, the District is able to provide help to farmers and small business owners in Maine with assessing their energy needs and sorting through

the various solutions. We also can help guide business people toward grant and loan programs to ease the financial burden of going green. The first energy-wise option should always be increasing efficiency. It makes no sense to install a solar thermal water heating system to replace electric water heaters if at the same time there are other outdated, inefficient pieces of equipment on the farm gobbling up energy. An energy audit (available through Efficiency Maine) will help identify and prioritize items that could increase energy efficiency.

Rural small business owners in Maine have the opportunity to take advantage of free expertise to help them make informed decisions about their energy futures. District staff are available to answer questions and visit your site to begin charting your course toward lower energy costs, or potentially even making your own. Give your Conservation District a call.







- Fishing

The Kennebec River between Waterville and **L** Augusta is a fun place to explore this time of year because the striped bass have arrived. It's a relatively small window of opportunity to catch stripers this far inland as the fish will head back down toward the ocean in a few weeks. The primary reason we have stripers up here is because they are chasing the annual alewife run. After the alewives leave the river, we also get a blue back herring run that keeps the bass in the river a little longer. By mid July the water warms too much and the majority of the striper bait heads back to the saltwater, followed by the If you would like to try and catch stripers. some of these fish off shore, consider fishing Halifax Park in Winslow (you might want to stop by the Lobster Trap for some awesome Lobster Stew) or Water Street in Augusta. Casting Lunker City Fin-S Fish or big Sluggos is a good idea, along with poppers. Be aware that the river does have a quick current and some rapids, so if you want to put a boat in, choose a canoe, kayak or flat bottomed boat. Putting a big boat in the Waterville boat launch will only cause heartache and a bill for lower unit repair.

Smallmouth bass fishing continues to dominate the fishing scene around this area, and rightfully so. The bass are just about all spawned out now so fishermen can expect to catch smaller buck males near the shoreline and bigger females out in deeper water. Once the bigger fish throw off the stress of the spawn, they will feed aggressively and usually can be found in 10 – 15 feet of water. Tube jigs, gitzits, and weighted worms will get the job done along hair jigs and jig/pig combinations. with Brown trout trollers are catching fish in 25 - 32feet of water with some consistency. Although trout trolling can be slow at times, when you hit it just right, the rewards are worth the wait! Great and Long Pond have been producing nice fish. Long Pond has some good sized salmon swimming around and they are keyed on smelts while Great Pond has some huge brown trout and they are feeding on alewives and crayfish. Trolling a night crawler on a worm harness rig is also a good idea on Great Pond.

By the way, have you seen the big mayflies

cruising. And some lucky angler will catch a big old brown trout off a dock or near shore that's sure to make a facebook page. These giant bugs draw all the fish topside, so look for big fish in the next week or two. Fly fishermen already know this, but sometimes spin fishermen staying at camps or local cottages get an early Christmas present when a bunch of big fish show up around 7 p.m. This hatch is quite similar to the striper run up the Kennebec. The fish are active because there's a lot of yummy bait to eat. But once the bait leaves, the fish follow. So let's all make some hay while the sun shines! Good luck.

Where Does it Hurt?

Tremember once having a kind nurse ask me during a hospital stay how much pain I was in. On a scale of 1 to 10, how much does it hurt? So many times since I have regretted that none of my patients could ever give me a direct answer to this question. I have seen and hopefully helped many animals who I know were in pain, but I've never been exactly sure how much they hurt or how much what I was doing was helping. I have, and continue to, rely on an educated set of clues to help me assess this. I also project my own perceptions and experience of pain. I remember how hard it was to put weight on a broken leg or pass a kidney stone. Still, it is often an assumption, or at best an educated guess, about how much an animal hurts.

For people, the International Association for the Study of Pain (IASP) defines pain as " the unpleasant sensory and/or emotional experience associated with actual or potential tissue damage". It might be a little tricky, but I think we can apply this to animals. Do they have our emotions (I believe they have many but not all of them)? Do they anticipate pain in advance from prior experience (I'm pretty sure they remember)? For the most part pain for them is like pain for us. There is no doubt that they often can't communicate clearly how much it bothers them, but they try. Dogs usually seek out their people for comfort and help; cats on the other hand tend to hide and reject attention. Both species vocalize at some point when they are in overt pain. Even within a species, this kind of vocalizing - whining, crying, growling or hissing - varies a great deal among individuals. One thing I know for certain is that the vast majority of animals are more stoic than the majority of people. I always give my patients the benefit of the doubt if I think they may be in pain.

Pain is unpleasant and even though it can warn of imminent danger, often it is unnecessary for an animal to suffer from it. Sadly it has been only in the last century that society at large has recognized that animals are sentient beings whose behavior in the face of painful situations registers the perception of discomfort as we know it. It is not hard to understand the pain an animal experiences when suffering trauma, such as being hit by a car or having a face full of porcupine quills. It is sometimes harder to assess and understand the pain an animal has from osteoarthritis, bladder stones, torn ligaments or developmental joint disease such as hip dysplasia.

Animals are not usually vocal complainers when they have these sort of diseases; we have to look carefully at their behavior to figure out how much they hurt. Even a young dog who is reluctant to jump in the car may have severe hip pain. He doesn't appear "lame" because both hips hurt about the same. When a Frisbee appears he seems to literally forget he hurts, at least until later. His pain is as real as the elderly Daschund who can't get on the couch any more because she has slowly developed increasing pain and muscle loss from disk disease in her back. Maybe the emotional trauma to our four legged friends is about what they can no longer do. If going upstairs with you in the evening is now too painful, that's got to hurt in more ways than one.

The good news here is that veterinarians as a profession have raised our awareness substantially even in the last 25 years. In 2003 the International Veterinary Academy for Pain Management (IVAPM) was founded by some of the brightest minds in the profession to explore and understand animals' pain. They are delving into the recognition, alleviation and the prevention of pain with an ever growing determination. More effective short and long term pain medications have become approved for animals. We have grown to understand how to use these tools to manage even long term pain safely with careful monitoring, such as bloodwork. Alternative methods of relief such as orthopedic manipulation are becoming more widely available. As always, it's usually an animal's family who notices changes in his behavior. It's always a rewarding thing for me to be able to help isolate the pain and offer relief, especially when it allows your friend to go back to doing what he loves.


For visiting and touring Gardiner, as well as links that detail the town's history in such areas as logging, ice harvesting, river transportation,
