WARRANT

To *E. M. Crowell*, a Constable in the town of Orrington, *Greeting:*

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Orrington, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, the twelfth day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To act on the report of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Assessors and Overseers of Poor.
- Art. 4. To act on the report of the Board of Health and the Health Officer.
- Art. 5. To act on the report of the Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will fix the compensation of the following town officers for the ensuing year: Selectmen, Assessors, and Overseers of Poor, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Road Commissioners, Sealer of Weights and Measures and any others that may be deemed necessary.
- Art. 7. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, including a Collector of Taxes.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will grant and raise money for the following purposes: for the Support of Schools, Books and Supplies,

WARRANT

To *E. M. Crowell*, a Constable in the town of Orrington, *Greeting:*

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Orrington, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, the twelfth day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To act on the report of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Assessors and Overseers of Poor.

Art. 4. To act on the report of the Board of Health and the Health Officer.

Art. 5. To act on the report of the Superintendent of Schools.

Art. 6. To see if the town will fix the compensation of the following town officers for the ensuing year: Selectmen, Assessors, and Overseers of Poor, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Road Commissioners, Sealer of Weights and Measures and any others that may be deemed necessary.

Art. 7. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, including a Collector of Taxes.

Art. 8. To see if the town will grant and raise money for the following purposes: for the Support of Schools, Books and Supplies,

Repair of School Property, Tuition, Support of the Poor, Mothers' Aid, Repair of Roads and Bridges and pay of Snow Bills, Patrol Maintenance, Pay of Town Officers, Miscellaneous Expenses and any other town charges.

Art. 9. To see if the town will grant and raise money for Memorial Purposes.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriation and raise money necessary to entitle the town to State-aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 11. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00, for the Improvement of the section of State-aid Road, as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amount regularly raised for the Care of the Ways, Highways and Bridges, the above amount being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 12. "By request." To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$500.00 for the Repair of the Club House and Brewer Lake Road, or what sum it will raise, if any.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to Purchase a Road Machine and grant and raise money for the same.

Art. 14. "By request." To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$350.00 for the Repair of the Road from the corner near Jos. D. Bowden's house to the Bucksport line.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote, grant and raise the sum of \$200.00 to be used jointly with the State Highway Commission on the 50-50 plan, for the Repair of the Dow Road.

Art. 16. "By request." To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$500.00 for the Repair of the road from Prahm's Corner to the foot of the Hewey Hill, so-called.

Art. 17. "By request." To see if the town will pay Mary L. Atwood \$21.06 for gravel hauled for the town, by Palmer Parker in 1921, and raise money for the same.

Art. 18. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$50.00, as a trust fund, the income from the same to be used for the perpetual care of the Henry G. Reynolds burial lot in the Marston Cemetery.

Art. 19. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$100.00 and accrued interest, the income from the same to be used for the perpetual care of the Joseph King burial lot in Oak Hill Cemetery.

Art. 20. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$50.00 as a trust fund, the income from the same to be used for the perpetual care of the Isaac A. Billington and Samuel Smith burial lot in Pine Hill Cemetery.

Art. 21. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$50.00 as a trust fund, the income from the same to be used for the perpetual care of the Albert N. Smith burial lot in Pine Hill Cemetery.

Art. 22. "By request." To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money to rebuild the Bridge on the Pollard Road, so called, near the Railroad Crossing.

Art. 23. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money for the Repair of the Town House and Stable.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to maintain a Street Light at the corner near George K. Stubbs's residence.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to instruct its Treasurer to loan the credit of the town, if necessary, to defray Town Charges, not to exceed \$4,000.00.

Art. 26. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$25.00 for the Repair of the Pound.

Art. 27. To see what action the town will take in regard to the Care and Letting of the Town Hall.

Art. 28. To see what action the town will take in regard to the Purchase of Motor Equipment for town use.

Art. 29. To act on any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting, for the purpose of revising the list of voters.

Report of Superintendent Schools

To the Superintending School Committee, and the Citizens of the town of Orrington:

From the records left by your former Superintendent, and from my personal supervision, I submit the following report of the Schools and school property of this town.

TEACHERS

The Fall Term opened with three changes in the teaching staff. On account of the changes and transferring of teachers, Miss Mabel Stover was the only teacher who returned to the same school taught during the past year. The following transfers were made, Mrs. Goldie M. Rollins, from North Orrington, to the Nickerson, Miss Ella M. Jarvis from Snow's Corner to Pierce's, Mrs. Mabel Gowan from East Orrington to Snow's Corner, Mary P. Bowden from the Pond to King's, Miss Helen Lindsey from the Center to Orrington Corner. It was found necessary to reopen the Orrington Corner School on account of the increased number of pupils in that section of the town. Miss Elizabeth Snow was secured to fill the vacancy at the Pond School, Miss Thelma Smith Center, and Miss Helen Lamb at East Orrington. All the teachers have had experience, with one exception, and are doing satisfactory work. If we are to continue to make our schools efficient and progressive, it will be necessary for us to pay higher salaries to the teachers of some of the schools than we are paying at the present time.

ATTENDANCE

The attendance has been very much broken up in some of the schools on account of the severity of the weather, and the bad roads.

With a few exceptions, the parents have tried to cooperate with the teachers in maintaining a good attendance. It is necessary for the pupils to be in school every day in order to derive the most benefit from their school work.

TEXT-BOOKS

The most of the text-books are in a bad condition, but it will be necessary to replace some of the old books, with newer editions. Some more supplementary readers will have to be purchased for the lower grades. Reference books are needed very much in most of the schools.

REPAIRS ACCOUNT

I am giving below, a statement of the repairs made during the year, also condition and needed repairs on each building.

SOUTH ORRINGTON

This building is in a very good condition, and will need only a few minor repairs.

NICKERSON

The school building has been shingled, but the schoolroom needs to be painted and papered, also the toilet system should be changed.

PIERCE'S

No repairs have been made on this schoolhouse, it is in a very good condition.

ORRINGTON CORNER

Only a few repairs have been made on this building, the underpinning should be reset, and minor repairs made.

CENTER

This school building is in a very bad condition. The schoolroom should be painted, and blackboards reslated.

EAST ORRINGTON

It will be necessary to shingle one side of the roof of this school building. The outbuildings are in very bad shape.

SNOW'S CORNER

This building has been shingled and other repairs made. Something must be done in regard to the toilet system the coming summer, as it is in a very bad condition.

POND

The school building is in very good shape, minor repairs have been made. The shed should be painted.

KING'S

Two new doors should be purchased for this schoolhouse, and the shed painted. This building is in fair condition.

Something should be done in regard to the toilet systems of the above schools. They do not now even meet the minimum requirement of the Educational Department of the State. I respectfully call your attention to Chapter 33, Section 1, of the School Laws of the State, which requires, after September, 1924, that all school buildings must meet a certain standard, acceptable to the Educational Department.

CONCLUSION

Any school system reflects the interest and support of the people of the town. I have every reason to feel that the people, will demand

and will gladly support our effort to maintain a strong educational system. No school system can remain stationary, but it must expand and progress if it is to keep step with the schools of today. Necessary changes must be made to meet the demands and conditions of the present time.

Parents should strive to cooperate with the teachers in every way in order to obtain the best results. The attitude of the pupil toward the teacher is often a reflection of the sentiment of the home, and the pupil can do his best work under any teacher only when the home influence is favorable.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Superintending School Committee, other Town Officials, Teachers and Citizens, for their hearty cooperation and courtesy received, since my election, as Superintendent of this District.

To the Ex-Superintendent of Schools, Miss Abbie M. Buck, I acknowledge my indebtedness for her valuable suggestions, and information.
