

Changes In The Channel

o the first explorers (1770s) the waterway was just a stream, connecting one lake to another and looking pretty much like a good site for a mill - or two or three.

To the first settlers (1790s) the waterway was a mill stream where a little bit of damwork could raise the water level and create a lot of power to fuel at least three mills - an Excelsior Mill, a Saw Mill and a Spool Mill - and, like most mill centers, that's where the community formed and developed, first as Locke's Mills in 1800, then Chandler's Mills around 1810, and Belgrade Mills in 1829. Docks and boathouses for commercial use appeared along the

banks. The Mills nomenclature was dropped and Lakes added around 1900 about the time all the mills burned, It was the end of industry; tourism had begun.


To the first wave of tourist/vacationers (early 1900s), staying at grand hotels, the stream was an idyllic route to idyllic fishing, easily accessed by oars (manned by local farmer/guides). For major transportation and mail needs, steamboats plied the stream aptly captained by seasoned lakes men for whom the navigation was easy. No mat-

To the next wave of tourist/vacationers (1910-20) with their preference for personal rustic cottages and big, heavy inboard boats, the stream was an ordeal - narrow, shallow and full of rocks that often required a navigator leaning over the deck to direct the driver where to steer let alone what to do when another

boat was approaching from the opposite direction. But steer the stream they did, often daily from their remote cottages for gas, newspapers, ice cream and a little contact with the rest of the world. Docks and village access points were plentiful.

In 1923 at the request of boat and camp own-

ers, Central Maine Power Company, the owner and controlling entity (for electric power) of all the dams in the Belgrade chain, dredged the stream at Belgrade Lakes. Hence, "The Channel," a name poignantly meaningful to grateful stream users for several generations. Channel became a beloved buzzword for the many water-

craft owners who enjoyed the new easy navigation. They also enjoyed the convenient "public" docks at Day's Marina (site of the current Post Office) and the covert use of sundry private docks along the west bank of The Channel.

Some of these private docks were the answer to a growing dilemma for owners of heavy inboards, many of whom didn't have their own boathouses: winter storage. Starting in the 1920s, twenty slips were constructed under a roof along the western side of the stream. Renting for \$20 a season, each slip had a block and tackle with which each boat could be hoisted above the water (ice) and supported for the winter. Putting up and taking down cost extra. The arrangement proved popular until the coming of outboard motors, lighter boats and alternative storage options. By the late fifties the slips had disappeared.


Interestingly, little seemed to change along The Channel for the next several decades. It was always a safe bet dockwise to boat to the Village. Day's Marina gave way to the Post Office, a real estate company, a bagel shop and The Mill Stream Cafe, and the docks remained more or less available....until 2003 when an eight-foot fence prevented access to the Village by boat for the first time in the community's history and the docks began to deteriorate.

This July, under the auspices of a major Docks to Doorways initiative, and in conjunction with the soon to open Maine Lakes Resource Center in Belgrade Lakes, the docks on the stream are back.







Summertime in the Belgrades



ast week I described a few simple things that everyone can do to help protect water quality. The Maine Congress of Lake Associations (MCOLA) has published a "Laker's Dozen," which I printed in one of my columns last year (see: http://www.mainecola.org). The Belgrade Lakes Association (BLA) has been publicizing some of these tips in an ad running in this paper through the summer. Most of these commonsense tips are very similar to BLA's original recommendations when they began in 1908. ľm sure that those who have the interest and take the time to read a column entitled, "Watershed Wisdom," already think about their actions a bit and are careful about what they do around the lake in order to minimize their impact. In a sense I am "preaching to the choir" here. While the choir can lead the song, everyone must join in to protect the lakes. The lakes are suffering from "death by a thousand cuts,"- the cumulative sum of many small impacts. To improve the water quality, we need to reverse the trend and get people to realize that "every little bit helps" and that everyone needs to change their behavior a bit for the good of all. We need to figure out how to get more people involved in the choir, or at least swaying to the music.

Getting people to change their behavior is one of the most difficult tasks of all. The LakeSmart program I described last week is one example of a "social marketing" program that attempts to change social mores around the lake, by providing positive rewards to those who give up their manicured lawns and instead maintain a natural vegetated buffer. As more people adopt these practices, peer pressure works to influence the rest.

Watershed Managers understand most of the causes of Nonpoint Source (NPS) Pollution affecting our impaired watersheds. We also understand most of the solutions to slow or reverse these NPS impacts. These solutions include Low Impact Development (LID) techniques such as porous pavers or rain gardens, and other conservation best management practices (BMP) such as riparian buffer strips or improved gravel roads and septic systems. NPS pollution is a byproduct of how we live in the watershed; reducing NPS requires getting a large percentage of the watershed population to actually change the way they live in the watershed and adopt and implement conservation BMPs. Effecting this behavioral change is a significant

ases of Lyme disease are increasing in Maine. Lyme disease is commonly carried by deer ticks, which are found in wooded or grassy areas. While you and your family are exploring the natural beauty of the Belgrade Lakes Region this summer, learn the facts about protecting yourself from and treating Lyme disease, sponsored by the Belgrade Regional Health Center.

Symptoms of Lyme disease may include:

• Rash: Lyme disease often causes a bull's eye like rash. A red, fingertip size bump with a white center forms at the bite site.

• Flu-like symptoms: fever, chills, fatigue, and headache may accompany the rash.

• Joint pain: Several weeks or months after the initial symptoms joint pain may occur.

 Neurological symptoms: If left untreated, serious symptoms may arise such as facial paralysis and muscle weakness. Look for headache, stiff neck, as well as confusion and extreme sleepiness. Meningitis may also occur, which could be fatal.

Treatment:

 Contact your health care provider. Oral antibiotics are effective with early diagnosis.

• A more serious infection will require a hospital stay and intravenous antibiotics.

Tips for avoiding Lyme disease:

· Cover up exposed skin when you are in wooded or grassy areas.

 Look for and remove any ticks that you find. Deer ticks are just slightly larger than a pin head - look carefully. Using blunt tweezers, grab the head of the tick as close to the skin as possible Pull upward applying even pressure. Do not crush the tick. Once the whole tick has been removed, wash and disinfect the area. Early detection decreases your risk of contracting Lyme disease. Continued on page 19...

Augusta's Museum in the Streets Features Sites Along the Kennebec



Water Street, Front Street, Cony, Willow and Canal Streets form the Kennebec riverfront area that is Augusta's Museum in the Streets. Finished in 2009, the downtown tour of historic places is a project of the Augusta Historic Preservation Commission and made possible through the generous support of the Maine Community Foundation, Kennebec Savings Bank and John Bridge.



Featuring 38 historic locations, the Museum tour is marked by signs that are in both English and French and contain detailed site descriptions.

The First Kennebec Bridge, for example (site number 10), a two-span wooden toll bridge built in 1797, gave Augusta the distinction of having the first crossing over the Kennebec River as well as having the largest bridge in the District of Maine. It decayed and collapsed in 1816 and was replaced by a new covered bridge in 1818.

Today's Calumet Bridge is in roughly the same





location and connects Museum tour-followers to the cluster of historic sites on the east side of the Kennebec where the Old City Hall (not a sign location) is a prominent, but converted (to elderly housing) landmark on the bridge.

Augusta's most historic landmark on the east side of the Kennebec River is Old Fort Western, built in 1754 as part of the strategy to expand and strengthen Massachusetts' territorial claims along the Kennebec River. It has remained intact through a variety of mercantile and housing functions and provides an outstanding stop and visit for those following the Museum in the Streets tour.

The other sites on the east side of the Kennebec River are fascinating but require some imagination since the structures either burned or were torn down. In some cases, like the 14-room Federal style mansion built in 1799 by Arthur Lithgow and home to one of Augusta's most prominent nineteenth century citizens, Reuel Williams, it is possible to appreciate the house's majesty by observing other historic homes in the neighborhood.

The majority of the signs and sites are on the west side of the Kennebec River where some of the stately structures described, especially the Old Post Office building, still stand. Trains and steamboats, mills and other hallmarks of history all come to life along the Kennebec River during a tour of the Museum in the Streets. For more infor-

Conservation Too -

Project permitting is one of the least understood aspects of getting your project completed and it can be the most time consuming unless you fully understand what is expected of you, the landowner or contractor. The need to obtain proper permitting before a project can begin requires some knowledge of the Maine DEP and municipal permitting system as well as where to find help.

"Under the state's Shoreland Zoning Statutes, the shoreland zone is generally defined as all areas located within 250 feet of rivers, lakes, ponds, some non-forested wetlands, coastal waters, and within 75 feet of some streams" (Maine Nonpoint Source Training and Resource Center, 2009). Maine has lots of water so much of our real estate is found within the shoreland zone. Municipalities are allowed to enact their own shoreland rules as long as they are still meeting all state Shoreland Zoning rules and some towns choose to have stricter standards than the state minimums. In most cases, construction of any kind within the shoreland zone will require both, a permit from DEP as well as

beer at Day's, he is welcome to. In the process of walking up our meandering, mulched path between two rain gardens planted with native plants, we hope he will learn how the native vegetation is helping to clean up the lakes. Visitors coming to the Belgrade Lakes Farmers' Market on Sunday to buy fresh produce will be walking across porous pavers in our parking lot and walkways and then over reinforced turf that can take heavy traffic without eroding. We hope they will realize that they could do something similar at their own shorefront property and we will be prepared to show them how and point them to DEP-certified contractors who can help them with the installation. We will be doing interesting lake science with Colby College and have a weather station that can be checked on line to find out the weather, as well as the water

one from the town. It is best to discuss your project with the municipal codes officer first before significant money is spent on planning.


The Maine DEP has created a straightforward permitting process for small projects within the shoreland zone called Permit by Rule. Larger, more complex projects will require different tiers of permitting and can take much longer to be approved due to the review process required. Review can take as little as two weeks for a Permit by Rule or up to a year for a multiple tier NRPA permit so start the permitting process early in the game.

Two very important items to be aware of are the Certified Contractor Requirement which goes into effect January 1, 2013 and the newly discovered Dig-Safe rule about road maintenance. Beginning in 2013, "all excavation work in excess of one cubic yard done in shoreland areas, must be supervised by an individual certified in erosion control practices by the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP)" (Maine Nonpoint Source Training and Resource Center, 2009). All contractors who plan to do work in

And then there's our secret weapon- the only public flush toilets in the village. Visitors are welcome to come in to use them. Hopefully we can teach them something about the importance of proper septic management and maintenance in the process. We have a very sophisticated septic system that we would be happy to teach them about and will be conducting research on modifications to make it even more effective at removing phosphorus.

We will be hosting an art show in the new center beginning July 23rd and will have a grand opening on the 30th. There will be other exciting programs all summer long. Come on in and bring your friends. Help us make conservation a tradition in our community.



Routine maintenance of gravel roads usually includes grading and cleaning the ditches and this kind of maintenance occurs all over the state on thousands of miles of gravel roadways each year. This June, it came as a surprise to many of us, including Maine DEP that a state law requiring a Dig-Safe ticket is required for even routine grading and ditch cleaning. This requirement could seriously handicap the gravel road maintenance that has been occurring without incident for years so a group has formed that will be meeting to discuss this issue. Stay tuned!

Assistance is available to help sort out permitting, laws and rules pertaining to construction and maintenance of roads and shoreland areas. Municipalities and the Maine DEP are both available to answer questions and help in obtaining useful information






Other programs include: July 20 - printmaking, July 27 - works with mixed media art, August 3 - pastels, August 10 - watercolors, and August 17 - pencil.


Friends of Belgrade Library 3rd Annual Golf Tournament

Fishing -

It's Been a Great Week...

here were so many highlights from this past **L** week that's it hard to pick a starting point! The fishing was great, the company was even better and the weather was really pretty good too. So many memories and stories to tell, but how about critters starting with all the little running, swimming, jumping, hopping and waddling around. For example, on Thursday morning around 5 a.m. I spotted my first flock of baby turkeys. There were three mother hen turkeys and 19 chicks (give or take a few – they are hard to count, and in my defense they all look the same). The hens kept a close watch on their brood and every time I tried to get close enough to take a picture they would shepherd the little ones away. I didn't want to harass them too much, so I left well enough alone and headed to the lake. Once on the water, I had the privilege of fishing with my good friend Marty and his wife Gwen. My New Jerseyian friends come up and stay at Whisperwood every year, and we had a blast throwing Yamamoto swimming Senkos and spinnerbaits for largemouth bass. They even caught a few on top water, which is always a thrill. While on our trip, Marty told me that he has taken up photography and moments later a mother loon with two babies on her back swam around the corner. It was fate, karma, a gift from the loon gods! When the loon first rounded the bend, she didn't realize we were there and dove to catch some fish. The little fluff balls bobbed around and minutes later momma popped up right next to them. As soon as she saw us, the babies were back up on

their feathered raft! In the blink of an eye, the mother loon lifted her wing and hid the babes under the protection of her arm. If you didn't know the babies were there, you would never have seen them. It was a great experience. Marty did get some photos of the loon and some terrific eagle shots later in the day. The bald eagles seem to be thriving this year, and it's rare to not see an eagle on a morning's fishing trip. Of course the baby ducks and geese are everywhere, along with lots of small turtles. Speaking of turtles, kudos to whoever had traffic stopped the other day on Route 27 in front of Hammond Lumber Company. That stubborn snapping turtle just didn't want to cross the road, but you helped him make the trip safely. Being hit by cars is one of the leading causes of death for snapping turtles, which can live to be over 50 years old. Plus, they lay a clutch of eggs that should be hatching in the next few weeks. Nice job

So in addition to all the little critters there's also a lot of baby fish swimming around this time of year. The smallmouth bass have entered their post spawn time, meaning they have begun to move off beds and spend more time in deeper water. The big females have the feed bag on now, so anglers should be able to catch some bigger fish in 10-15 feet. One observation from the past week is that the smallies are keyed on little crayfish. The crayfish are about an inch long and seem to be very abundant. If worms and minnow imitating baits are not working, try a crayfish imitating bait like a jig or crayfish colored crankbait. The sunfish (known in some places as bream) are also on their beds in the shallow weedy water and you can bet that their fry will attract the largemouth bass. Once the fry pop and start swimming around, the largemouth fishing will be excellent!

Trout fishing is in high gear right now for trollers and fly fishermen. The big mayflies are everywhere and they are drawing trout to the surface. These next few weeks offer fly fishermen a chance to catch trout on the surface on the lakes and ponds in the area. Dusk fishing seems to be the best time to catch cruising browns and brookies. If river fishing puts the wind in your sails, you might want to head up the Shawmut section of the Kennebec River. The river levels are excellent right now and wading options abound in this stretch of river. Elk hair caddis flies and green or brown drakes (big mayflies called Hexagenias) are a great option this time of year on the river, but be aware, the fish here are smart. Light tippets and proper presentation are key to catching the browns and rainbows in this area. Good Luck

More Pain Relief Please

They say the only good thing about pain is when it stops. Actually pain does serve a purpose when it alerts us that potential damage will occur if the body continues to be used in ways which cause the pain. It does serve to remind us not to run on a sprained ankle, causing more permanent damge to our ligaments. It does remind the dog with a broken toe not to put too much weight on that foot because the bone will not be able to heal with constant motion. This warning system is somewhat crude, though, and at some point, when we get the warning loud and clear, it is OK to make the pain stop.

When we are sensitive to the mood and behavior of our four legged friends, it is often apparent when they are feeling pain. Once the cause of the pain has been identified and the risk of reducing it assessed, giving them relief is an important next step. For traumatic injuries, often relief is needed in varying degrees for a relatively short period of time. Chronic pain may require a longer term solution.

Some folks tend to reach for medicines that they take themselves and give them to the their pets. This is not advisable because several are not safe. For instance, an adult dose of Tylenol can cause death in cats. Cats are also very sensitive to NSAID medications such as aspirin as well. Frequent doses of aspirin given to a dog may relieve pain for a while, but can cause stomach ulcers, sometimes even perforations. It is best to consult your vet when starting or changing pain medications. Veterinarians now have a number of prescription medicines designed and approved for pets that are effective and when given as directed, safe.

When it comes to chronic pain, there are a number of other things owners can do to help a pet enjoy a better quality of life. One of the key things that will help an overweight pet with joint pain is weight loss.

This makes sense but it is often an obstacle for an owner who feels food is love or a pet can't lose weight because he's too painful to exercise Sadly, with muscles it's a case of "use it or lose it", and muscle loss can make joint pain even worse. With medication, reasonable low impact exercise may be possible. Being overweight can contribute to pain in another way as well. Interestingly, science is telling us that excess fat tissue increases inflamation in the body.

For many years vets have prescribed supplements that help protect and lubricate joints in our patients. These are known as chondroprotectants, or proteins that the body uses to protect and heal cartilage. Many owners have at least heard of chondroitin sulfate and/or glucosamine supplements because they take them themselves. Because the intestinal tract in companion animals differs from ours, veterinary versions of these supplements are more likely to be properly absorbed by your pet. There are also injectable forms known as PSGAGs that can be given in the office that may offer relief more quickly.

Another group of nutritional supplements that may help reduce pain and joint damage are essential fatty acids, or EFAs. Also known as omega acids, these supplements may contain fish oil, flax seed oil, primrose oil and others. With specific omega acids known as EPA's there are potential benefits for pain relief at higher doses. Again, consult a vet to make sure the dose and combination of these omega acids is appropriate for your pet.

An effective approach to pain relief can require some lifestyle and diet changes but these changes need not be huge. A combined approach of rational gentle exercise, weight loss and supplements is a great place to start. When needed, medication can help improve a pet's quality of life. Fortunately the more we learn about pain and and our pets, the more we can do to prevent unecessary pain.

Skowhegan Kneading Conference Gets \$48,000 Grant

That began as a grassroots project to revive the struggling Skowhegan economy by bringing back local grain production and artisan bread baking has grown into an annual event that brings over 250 farmers, millers, novice and professional bakers, bread-lovers, and wood-fired oven enthusiasts to central Maine each July.

Now in its fifth year, the Kneading Conference is the model of regional enterprise that connects the local grain farmer to the miller, the baker, and the consumer. It also is the recipient of a substantial grant that benefits Skowhegan, Somerset County, and the state.

Conference by the Quimby Family Foundation is funding a portable baking kitchen, a commercial scale wood-fired masonry oven, and housing for both at the Somerset Grist Mill in downtown Skowhegan. With the new equipment, the Kneading

Conference will expand its educational program by taking to the road with grain-to-bread workshops for farmers and school children across Maine.

The new oven will also be used to bake breads to sell at the Artisan Bread Fair, a free event held annually at the Skowhegan State Fairgrounds, whose goals are to promote the return of Maine to a grain producing state. The Artisan Bread Fair and the Kneading Conference also show the employment possibilities in small grain farming and artisan baking.
