The annual report of the Board of Trustees of the Old Orchard Public Library is herewith presented for your consideration.

While work the past year has been largely routine, substantial gains have been made, as noted in the Librarian's report.

The aim has been to work towards the fulfillment of the new State rules and requirements for libraries which became effective in January, 1920. To this end we hope the coming year, by rearrangement of present facilities, to provide a table and special shelves for the use of the young children. We have already arranged to have a bulletin board placed in the post office, where book lists may be posted from time to time. We hope by these means to call to the attention of the citizens many books which are available but unread because of the lack of space in which to display them.

Among adult non-fiction books purchased lately are a number of interesting and instructive books which will be listed on the bulletin board soon. An effort has been made to raise the standard of juvenile fiction, and with careful selection of instructive non-fiction we hope to accomplish much in this line.

The coming year we must purchase an addition to the index system, and there are quite a large number of books which should be rebound or replaced. Because of this and other repairs and changes needed, the Trustees recommend that the sum of \$400 be appropriated for the maintenance of the library the coming year.

SCHOOL REPORT

TO THE CITIZENS OF OLD ORCHARD:

In this, my seventh annual report on the school conditions in Old Orchard, I am happy to state that progress has been made during the year in perfecting and stabilizing those changes which were made in quite rapid succession during the past three years.

HEALTH DEVELOPMENT.

Special attention is invited to the development of health-giving and health-maintaining features in the schools,—features which are truly for the conservation of children.

Of course the basis of all health improvement is healthful school conditions and along this line an absolutely unsanitary condition existing in our schools has been remedied during the year.

The work in physical exercise, through the so-called gymnastics, has been carried on in all the grades. For the older pupils, there has been a variety of athletic activity including basket ball, track work and other games. The younger pupils have the benefit of supervised play.

Weighing and measuring of pupils were started last year. This has been supplemented by medical examination and "follow-up work" through the Health Crusade. Such "follow-up work" has been found to be necessary for the best results, and still further extensions of this work will be the chief recommendation for the coming year.

TRAINING FOR CITIZENSHIP.

Next to health, good citizenship and community spirit should be the purpose of the school. In our efforts to train for better citizenship, the course in community civics started in the junior high school last year was continued.

Furthermore, in order to make it possible for the student to put into practice the community spirit which he learned in the course, various opportunities have been given for the pupils to serve the school and town. For instance, the pupils assisted in making an inventory of school property, and through their school paper, *The Oceanic*, they have done much to make their school and town favorably known in many parts of the country. The success of the latter endeavors is more clearly set forth in the report of Principal Jewett, who has given valuable assistance in this and other supplementary activities.

Co-operation and generosity have been shown by the pupils in their contributions to the funds for needy European children and for the memorial to be built in France in commemoration of America's part in the world war. Pleasant co-operation has also been continued with the Boy Scouts.

To develop the means by which forceful leadership in community life may be obtained, namely, the ability to think and speak clearly, courses in public speaking have been a valuable part of the school work. Such things as the proposed participation in a public speaking contest of York County schools, also bring benefits from contacts with other schools and pupils.

FINANCES.

It should be gratifying to citizens to learn that the school committee has been able to maintain and improve the schools and still have at the close of the fiscal year, in both high and common school funds, a balance slightly larger than that with which the year was started. Financial details will be found in the financial statement. Considering the serious difficulties and economic uncertainty as well as the increase in cost of practically all factors which go into school management, this is a remarkable achievement. Only in the matters of repairs and books and supplies was it found impossible to keep the costs of proper facilities within the allotted funds, and in both cases the extra expense came from unforeseen and unforeseeable emergencies.

This record is the more remarkable in view of the fact that Old Orchard has been able to maintain a superior teaching force and give that group of teachers satisfactory conditions under which to work, while in many other places the year has been marked by deterioration.

Such management has been made possible only through the most careful and business-like attention to school affairs by members of the committee. In addition to the innumerable conferences and the handling of details by individual members, there have been fourteen meetings of the school board and one joint meeting with the selectmen.

FOR THE FUTURE.

The greatest need for the coming year is the extension of the work for good health through the agencies of the schools. It is a mere platitude to say that good health is the basis of all success whether in school or out. Parents and all other citizens are urged to familiarize themselves with the aims and purposes of this work. Much can be learned from the health score cards provided for the pupils, and all people connected with the schools will be glad to give further information.

The investigations show also the need of dental clinics for the further determination and possible remedy of the many evils which the medical profession is tracing more and more to poor teeth.

More desirable than either of the above methods,—and containing means of accomplishing them,—would be the employment of a district nurse, and for such a step in advance I most earnestly plead. Such a nurse might be engaged on one of three possible bases:

A nurse on part time for work among the school children only.

A nurse on full time for health work, assisting all members of the community, giving whatever time is necessary for work in the schools.

A nurse on full time, employed through the joint action of and for the benefit of Old Orchard and another nearby town.

The second greatest need for the coming year is the provision for suitable apparatus for physical training. By this is meant some gymnasium equipment for class exercises during the winter months. The athletic supplies are now provided by the students themselves through entertainments and other methods of obtaining funds. To change such an arrangement by having this material provided by the town, I believe would be a mistake, as their efforts in obtaining these things is a good piece of civic activity for the pupils and creates a sense of responsibility in the taking care of the supplies so obtained.

I would also recommend that consideration be given to the possibility of extending the use of the school equipment by opening evening classes, if there is a demand for such work. This plan would make further education possible for adults who wish to study special subjects, such as business subjects, which were not provided in the older type of education, as well as for the boys and girls who have been forced to leave school before their education was satisfactory for business progress.

I would also remind you of the statement last year that the time is approaching when it will be necessary to consider the erection of a new school building. This is becoming increasingly necessary and will supply three definite needs: the need for facilities for vocational and physical training which, while being carried on as satisfactorily as possible, is seriously hampered by the lack of adequate room and equipment; the need for a social center which may be used for the education and enjoyment of all citizens; the need of taking advantage of possible opportunities for educational extension in the evenings,—and even possibly during the summer.

TOWN AND SCHOOL.

The co-operation of various citizens, especially several very busy men, in support of school activities has been a big factor in the development of educational facilities. Such social service has also an invaluable effect as a character-building example. All citizens are urged to

participate in the efforts and success of the schools as they so splendidly did in supporting the financial program of the committee last year.

Most of the co-operation so far has been service of citizens and outside agencies for the good of the schools. To get complete community, it now seems necessary that opportunities be given for the schools to assist in civic enterprises. For instance, it might be possible for the schools, through the business department and otherwise, to assist the board of trade in its work of making Old Orchard better known. Other and better examples of such co-operation will undoubtedly come to mind and suggestions are welcomed. By thus participating in the activities of the town, the pupils will not only have an opportunity to show their appreciation of the efforts in their behalf but will also be provided with a motive for better and more patriotic service.

TO F. H. B. HEALD, SUPERINTENDENT OF THE PUBLIC
SCHOOLS OF OLD ORCHARD:

It is with pleasure that I submit to you my third annual report of progress and growth in the work of Old Orchard Junior-Senior High School and the needs for further development.

Just as the old adage "seeing is believing" is true, so also it is true that in such a brief report it is impossible for me to describe the conditions as they actually exist and the progress that has been made during the past year. One should visit the school and see for himself just what is being done.

Our enrollment last fall was about the same as in past years. The students which made up this enrollment were very different. They were back to school for a purpose,

every one of them. Thus far we have not lost a scholar. Three have been transferred to other schools, two out of the State. This is the best record since the Junior-Senior High School started four years ago.

There has been one change in our faculty of full time teachers. Miss Clancy left us during the summer, and Miss Elwyna Haskins, a graduate of the University of Maine, was secured to fill the vacancy. I take this opportunity of expressing my appreciation of her work. Two part time teachers have been added. These additions were necessary as the full time teachers are teaching the maximum amount of time allowed by the State Law. The additions were Miss Sinclair for physical training, and Miss Cushman for vocal culture. Miss Sinclair is securing excellent results in physical training. Miss Cushman's work has but just begun this term. Through her efforts we hope to be well represented in the York County Speaking Contest which is to be held for the first time in March.

We are a small school. That fact, however, does not signify that we are unable to accomplish results. We have a school paper which is not only a credit to our school but also to our town. This paper is sent to high schools in over thirty different states. This not only gives us a standing among the schools of our country but brings us into close relationship with these schools through their exchanges. Again our athletic activities and accomplishments this year have been worthy of a school of two or three hundred students. Last fall we sent a cross country team to Waterville to compete with the high schools of the whole State. No school represented had less than two hundred students and yet we won seventh place. In November we won out in a triangular cross country run with Scarboro and Cape Elizabeth. This winter we have two basket ball teams. Each team has a schedule of twelve games. The smallest school on our schedule has more than twice the number of students in our high school. While the boys have lost three games, the girls have met defeat only once.

I mention these outside activities so that you may know we are doing things which are not regular school work.

To take part in any athletic activity a student must maintain a standing of at least C or between 75 and 80% in all subjects.

Briefly I have outlined what we are doing. It is very difficult to estimate how much more might be done if we had a modern school building and the equipment to do with. It seems to me that the time has come when the townspeople should give this matter their serious consideration. A new building with modern equipment is not impossible for Old Orchard. In the near future something must be done in the way of new buildings, for the whole school system is outgrowing its present accommodations.

In conclusion let me state that the success which we have attained this year is not due to any one person or group of persons, but to the splendid co-operation of students, teachers, superintendent, superintending school committee, parents and other citizens. I want to publicly thank them for this co-operation.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

TO THE CITIZENS AND TAX PAYERS OF THE TOWN OF OLD ORCHARD:

According to custom, we herewith present for your inspection and acceptance the annual reports of your several officers, giving detailed statements of receipts and expenditures in each department, as well as the recommendations of several of the heads of same.

We are especially pleased to show that most of the departments have unexpended balances, a few are overdrawn, but in most cases it was unavoidable, on account of the increased costs of material and labor, especially was this so in the Sanitary and Sewer Departments.

There has been added to the report this year a full statement of our assets and liabilities, which give a clear understanding of the financial status of the town at the close of the fiscal year.

In conjunction with the Budget Committee, we have made a careful estimate of the needs of the town for the coming year, and if recommendations are fairly well followed there will be a sizable reduction in the tax rate for the coming year.

Our tax rate was abnormally high in 1920, but no different from the surrounding communities, or, in fact, from the general run of localities throughout New England. The Assessors were called upon to raise a large sum of money in accordance with the increased appropriations made by you at the last annual meeting.

You will all be glad to note that besides taking up the two Serial Bonds provided for in the appropriations, we have paid the three Gould notes (so-called) which have been carried as a floating debt since 1898; these were for one thousand dollars each, making a total reduction of the debt of \$5,000 for the year.

You will also find that we have retained in the treasury a cash balance of about \$8,000, which can be used to reduce the appropriations and consequently the tax rate for the coming year.

Our bonded indebtedness, which is all the debt the town now has—generally speaking—as we do not include the Fuel Yard in our figures, and never have, as that is carried as a separate proposition, is \$58,000. We could have a bonded debt of \$125,000 and still not overrun the 5% debt limit which all towns are allowed by law; this shows that we are far from bankrupt, as some would have you believe, in fact our assets at a fair valuation overrun our liabilities by a good margin.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

TO THE SELECTMEN AND CITIZENS OF OLD ORCHARD:

The Board of Health submits its annual report.

It is a matter for special thankfulness that the town has been exempt from epidemics especially dangerous. It is true that during the summer measles prevailed to quite an extent among the children, including some adults, but no deaths resulted therefrom.

The sanitary interests of this town is a matter of much more importance than most of the people imagine. And the perplexities and difficulties and expense of keeping the town free from disease-breeding conditions increase year by year, and danger conditions multiply year by year, requiring greater diligence and care on the part of the Board of Health to preserve the town from contagious diseases that are constantly breaking out in the towns around us; and it is a matter of special interest and gratification that this town has been exempt from epidemics of all kinds.

The demands upon this department are multiplying each year, as Old Orchard is developing, and the amount of garbage and rubbish to be disposed of is increasing rapidly. Hence, more liberal appropriations must be made in order properly to meet these requirements. The tax-payers in towns and cities generally, and health resorts particularly, are realizing more fully in the present age that they must be fair and generous in providing for adequate sanitation.

The Board of Health would suggest to the town the importance of furnishing a dump for wet waste; it has been a problem this year to dispose of it.

We have exerted ourselves to accomplish during our term of office the best results possible with the means at our disposal, and we feel that a fair measure of success has attended our efforts. For all assistance and encouragement extended to us, we at this time express our appreciation.

WARRANT

*To Elmer E. Googins, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard,
in the County of York.*

GREETING:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Old Orchard, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town, on Monday, the 7th day of March, A. D. 1921, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2nd. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- 3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.
- 4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to pay of town officers.
- 5th. To see what sums of money the town will raise: 1st, for common schools; 2nd, for free high school; 3rd, for free text books; 4th, for making and repairing highways and bridges; 5th, for the support of poor; 6th, for the pay of town officers; 7th, maintaining street lights and electric lights; 8th, for contingent expenses; 9th, for sanitary expenses; 10th, for town interest; 11th, for repairing school houses; 12th, for the public library; 13th, for heating, lighting and care of town property; 14th, for moth nests; 15th, State road patrol; 16th, public toilet; 17th, school supplies; 18th, for transportation of high school scholars; 19th, for advertising.

6th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commission and abatements.

7th. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the collector for collecting taxes for all moneys actually collected.

8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection and what rate of interest, if any, will be charged thereon, thereafter.

9th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes and not exceed the same.

10th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.

11th. To see if the town will authorize the Assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

12th. To see what action the town will take and what sums of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain fire department; to maintain town team; for hydrant rental; for interest on debt incurred in fire department, sewers and loans, all within the limits set out in Section IV, of the act of incorporation of the town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

13th. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

14th. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,128.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above

amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913, or such other sum as is deemed necessary.

15th. To see if the town will vote to set apart the sum of \$1,000.00 from the regular appropriations for sidewalks and highways, for the purpose of maintaining and constructing highways and sidewalks in that part of Old Orchard known as Ocean Park, to be used by and under the direction of the Ocean Park local committee.

16th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money sufficient to pay for the services of a school physician as required by Chapter 73 of the Public Laws of 1909.

17th. To see what sum the town will vote to appropriate for the purpose of cleaning beach during the summer season.

18th. To see if the town will vote to provide extra lighting on the sea wall during the summer months, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

19th. To see what action the town will take in regard to extra lighting of streets during the summer months and how much it will appropriate therefor.

20th. To see what streets or parts of streets the town will vote to lay dust during the summer months, the cost thereof to be assessed against the property thereon as now provided by law.

21st. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money, if any, the town will raise to maintain a winter patrolman.

22nd. To see what action the town will take in regard to lighting sign, now located at foot of Old Orchard Street, and what sum of money they will raise therefor.

23rd. To see what action the town will take in regard to continuing and maintaining the Municipal Fuel Yard and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

24th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or set apart to be paid on the town debt.

25th. To see if the town will vote to have a plan or map of the sewer system of the town made in book form or otherwise, by a competent person or persons, for the future use of the town, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.

26th. To see if the town will vote to locate additional electric lights, as follows: on Lake Avenue, on Cedar Avenue, on Cleaves Street, on Saco Road near town limit line, at Wildwood Glen Cottage, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

27th. To see if the town will vote to accept that part of the Cascade road as newly laid out by the Selectmen, and vote to abandon that part of the old road as discontinued by the Selectmen.

28th. To see if the town will vote to build a cement walk on southeasterly side of East Grand Avenue, being an extension of the walk now on said avenue; a continuation of walk on West Grand Avenue from Tioga Avenue easterly; on southwesterly side of Evergreen Avenue; on easterly side of Cedar Avenue; on easterly side of Union Avenue, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

29th. To see if the town will grade and gravel First Street, Cleaves Street, Third Street, Old Orchard Avenue, Forest Avenue, Oak Avenue, Maplewood Avenue, Evergreen Street, and Surfside Avenue, and what sums of money they will appropriate therefor.

30th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen in regard to permitting peddling on the Beach, or the taking of pictures thereon by transient photographers.

31st. To see what action the town will take in regard to permitting automobiles, motorcycles, aeroplanes, and other fast moving vehicles on the Beach during the so-called beach season.

32nd. To see if the town will vote to maintain a permanent fireman at the Town Hall for the purpose of driving the fire truck when required and doing other work about the building, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

33rd. To see if the town will vote to establish an electric light on the Portland road near the residences of L. N. Ellis and others, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

34th. To see if the town will vote to buy 300 seats for the Town Hall auditorium, and what sum of money it will appropriate therefor.

35th. To see if the town will vote to locate a hydrant at or near the Googins property on the Portland road, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

36th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200, or such sum as is deemed necessary, to purchase oil and apply the same for the extermination of mosquitoes.

37th. To see if the town will vote to build a sewer on Highland Avenue from Washington Avenue to Third Street, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor, or how said expenses shall be provided for if built.

38th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a building inspector for the ensuing year and determine his compensation.

39th. To see what action the town will take in regard to the operation and licensing thereof of frankfort stands, so-called, in booths and windows along the highways and walks of the town, and what charges, if any, shall be made therefor.
