Supplies, Repair of School Property, Tuition, Support of Poor, Mothers' Aid, Repair of Roads and Bridges, Pay of Snow Bills, for Repair of Ditches and Culverts, Patrol Maintenance, pay of Town Officers, Miscellaneous Expenses and any other town charges.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will raise for Memorial Purposes.

Art. 10. To see if the town will authorize its Selectmen to sell the Pest House Property, so-called, also a part of the land bought of G. B. Tibbetts.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 12. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the Improvement of the Section of the State-aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the Care of the Ways, Highways, and Bridges. The above being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 to be used jointly with the State Highway Commission on the 50-50 plan for new construction on the Dow Road.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for the purchase of an Adding Machine.

Art. 15. To see what action the town will take in regard to the purchase of Motor Equipment for use on the highways, and to raise money for same if necessary.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to establish the time when Taxes on personal estates shall become due and payable.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to instruct its Treasurer to loan the credit of the town if necessary to defray town charges not to exceed \$5,000.00.

Art. 19. To see what action the town will take in regard to the Sale of its unused School Buildings.

Art. 20. "By request." To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$200.00 to be used for gravel on the Richardson Road, the gravel to be given by the Enoch Richardson Estate.

Art. 21. By petition of Fred A. Mossler and nine other legal voters and taxpayers in the town of Orrington. To see if the town will accept as laid out, a road near the residence of F. A. Mossler, in said Orrington, running easterly by said Mossler's land one hundred and fifty feet or more, as laid out on a plan of said land known as Elm Heights, recorded in Penobscot Registry of Deeds, said street to be known as Harrison Avenue.

Art. 22. By petition of A. E. Freeman and seventeen others. To see if the town will vote to accept and maintain that part of Garfield Avenue, so-called, as already built from its junction with McKinley Avenue, northerly about one hundred and seventy-five feet and raise \$25.00 to gravel same.

Art. 23. By petition of A. E. Freeman and seventeen others. To see if the town will vote to accept and maintain that part of Roosevelt Avenue as now built that lies in the town of Orrington, being approximately one hundred and twenty-five feet in length.

Art. 24. To see if the town will accept \$50.00 from estate of Lizzie Ayer for perpetual care of the Mahlon Ayer lot on Oak Hill Cemetery.

Art. 25. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$500.00 in trust from Dr. H. L. Dobson the interest of same to be used for the perpetual care of his lot in North Orrington or Marston Cemetery.

Art. 26. To see if the town will accept from the estate of Nelson P. Smith, the sum of \$100.00 the interest of same to be used for the perpetual care of his lot in North Orrington or Marston Cemetery.

Art. 27. To see if the town will accept from the estate of A. A. George the sum of \$100.00 the interest of same to be used for the perpetual care of his lot in North Orrington or Marston Cemetery.

Art. 28. By petition of P. E. Curtis and five other taxpayers in the town of Orrington. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to lay out or extend and build the Brooks Road, so-called in a northerly direction about 400 ft. to connect with the old town road that begins near the old Town House site, a strip of land 30 ft. between the points named being donated for said road. To raise money to build same if necessary.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to instruct its Road Commissioner to expend the sum of \$150.00 of the regular road fund on the road leading from the King Schoolhouse to Ernest Bowden's.

Art. 30. To see if the town will accept from M. N. & E. F. Atkins the sum of \$100.00 the interest on same to be used for the perpetual care of the Emery E. Atkins Cemetery Lot in Marston Cemetery.

Art. 31. To see what action the town will take in regard to the letting and care of the Town Hall.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting for the purpose of revising the list of voters.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Orrington:

I take pleasure in submitting at this time my second annual report of the progress and needs of your schools.

This year has been one of progress and change in the school system. Shortly after the last annual town meeting we felt that some definite plan for improving the school buildings should be adopted. It was either a case of remodeling the old one-room buildings to meet the requirements of the State or consolidating and erecting a new building. After a careful survey of all the local conditions it seemed advisable to consolidate the schools on the river road into two two-teacher schools. This arrangement would require the erection of a new building at North Orrington and the remodeling of the two-room building at South Orrington. This plan was presented to the citizens at a special town meeting and accepted. Owing to the difficulty in securing the desired lot the work on the new building was not commenced until the last of August, therefore was not ready for occupancy until after the Christmas recess. This is one of the most modern and attractive two-room schoolhouses in the State.

The South Orrington building was painted on the interior, chemical toilets, also jackets for the stoves with cold air intakes were installed in each room. The building now needs to be painted on the exterior and new outside doors.

The children from Snow's Corner and Pierce Schools attend school at the new building and those from the Nickerson School are conveyed to South Orrington. The conveyance is very satisfactory for the attendance has been better than in the other districts where the children have to walk a long distance. Much credit is due the driver, also town officials, for making it possible to make regular trips during the heavy snow storms.

The town voted to maintain the Orrington Corner School for the lower grades but as the other building was not ready at the opening of school it was thought advisable to allow all grades of the district to attend this school for the year. I feel that after the first experimental year has passed successfully, every parent will be eager to have their children conveyed safely and comfortably to the modern school. This school offers a division of teaching, therefore better instruction, more competition and interest for the child, a well ventilated, heated and lighted building.

The school at Swett's Pond should be discontinued and the children conveyed to South Orrington. The distance is short and only a few children. This would provide good housing conditions for all of the children in the town with the exception of those at the Center and Baker Districts. If the school at the Center is to be maintained the schoolhouse should be remodeled, approved toilets built and a jacket purchased for the stove. This is the largest one-teacher school in town and ought to be the next to be improved. It is impossible for one teacher to do justice to the eight grades and twenty-seven pupils that are there this year.

The teaching force was changed some this year. Only three of last year's force returned. With a single exception the ones employed have either a full or partial Normal school training. Several attended Summer school during the past Summer. The teachers generally have shown themselves well qualified for their work and have worked for the best interest of their schools. A fine spirit of cooperation has prevailed throughout the year.

Mrs. Alice White, who attended the Special School at Castine for Helping Teachers conducted by the State Department of Education, was engaged for the Helping Teacher. Her work has been very beneficial.

Hot lunches are being served in nearly every school with very good success. This is new for the most of the schools and needs the support of the parents.

HIGH SCHOOL TUITION

There are thirty-three students attending Bangor High School, six attending Eastern Maine Conference Seminary, sixteen attending

Brewer High and one attending Higgins Classical Institute. This is an increase of seven over the number attending last year.

I feel that the school officials should keep in close touch with the work of the students attending secondary schools. This year the ranks are received each ranking period and filed at the office of the Superintendent. In this way we are able to check up the work each student is doing, thus finding the weaknesses of our schools. Our aim is to increase the efficiency of the Elementary schools so that the children can compete with those from larger school systems.

FINANCES

The cost of maintaining the schools this year is slightly more than last year. This is partly due to the increase cost of tuition. If the school at the Corner was discontinued there would be a financial saving to the town of nearly \$700 besides giving the children better school facilities. This would make the schools less expensive and far superior than under the old system.

The repair account shows an overdraft of \$447.75. We have received \$500 from the Equalization Fund for the conveyance bus and expect the balance next year, which will nearly cover this overdraft.

Your attention is respectfully called to the statistics, financial statement and other data following this report.

I wish to thank the Superintending School Committee, Town Officials and Teachers for their hearty support and cooperation during the year.
