



Festivities will be from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday, August 20 and 21st at the Historical Society on Town House Road. There will be something of interest for everyone

Visitors can walk all through the encampment and learn about the various aspects of camp life. Several local artisans will be displaying their wares, as well as demonstrating some of their techniques. There will also be food, antiques, music, dancing and featured speakers on both days. Historian David Cook of Winthrop will speak at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday on "Maine and the Great Rebellion." Mr. Cook is an exciting speaker and is writing a book on the 3rd Maine's participation in the Civil War. On Sunday at 2:00 p.m., the speaker will be Helen Neff, who will offer a discourse on "Quilts of the Underground Railroad." The Belgrade Lakes area is a special place, dominated by the 7 large lakes of the Belgrade Lakes chain (East Pond, North Pond, Salmon Lake-McGrath Pond, Great Pond, Long Pond, and Messalonskee Lake) but also containing numerous smaller ponds, especially in the Kennebec Highlands. The State of Maine has over 6000 "great ponds" of over 10 acres. Maine lakes bring in almost \$4 billion dollars per year to Maine's economy. It is incumbent on all of us to understand and protect these lakes and hopefully the new Maine Lakes Resource Center that opened this week will help us do that.

Maine residents take lakes for granted– we've always had lakes as part of our landscape. These lakes are here because of the last ice age when large masses of ice were moving across Maine in a southwesterly direction, gouging out the earth's surface and piling up rocks ahead of the ice. About 20,000 years ago, when the glaciers began to melt and recede, they left behind large chunks of ice in low points in the landscape. These ice chunks melted and formed Maine's lakes and ponds, most of which are elongated north to south along the glaciers' direction of movement at the peak of the ice

Deadline is September 2 for NRCS Money

September 2, 2011 is the deadline for applications for the following Natural Resources Conservation Service financial assistance programs:

-Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (WHIP) for Maine landowners, including non-agricultural and forestry landowners, who would like assistance in developing, improving, or managing wildlife habitat or restoring natural ecosystems.

-New England-New York Forestry Initiative, through WHIP, for Maine forest land owners to improve wildlife habitat, forest health and productivity, and water quality.

-Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP), to help farmers restore farmland, including pastures, which were once wetlands to create fully-functioning wetlands again. This is a great opportunity for many landowners who may have land that is poorly drained and difficult to cultivate, landowners who are looking to cut back on farming but don't want to sell the land, or those landowners interested in establishing and protecting prime wildlife habitat.

Lake Processes

age. In terms of geological time, lakes are transient phenomena. Once lakes are formed, Mother Nature begins to fill them back in. As water goes through the hydrologic cycle, it is evaporated from the lakes, becomes water vapor in the atmosphere, and then condenses first into clouds and then cloud droplets combining to form precipitation. This precipitation falls back to earth, eroding the earth's surface as it flows downhill, sometimes after melting in the spring. Over geological time scales, these erosion processes turn rock into soil but they also eventually fill in low points in the landscape including lakes and ponds.

This is why the southern states have very few lakes. Without the glaciers to reform large numbers of lakes every 50 thousand years or so, there are very few natural processes that form lakes. Beavers will dam streams or rivers to form ponds, volcanoes will form crater lakes (e.g., Crater Lake, OR), meandering rivers will occasionally split off an "oxbow" lake, and sometimes meteors will crash into the earth forming depressions (kettle lakes of NC) or tectonic plates will rise from the sea (Lake Okeechobee) or collide (Lake Tanganyika). But these are uncommon events. Generally speaking lakes in the southern US are actually impoundments formed by damming a river or stream. This is why southerners are especially fascinated by Maine's natural lakes.

Newly formed glacial lakes contain nothing but water. They are what limnologists (people who study lakes) call "oligotrophic" or nutrient poor (think Lake Superior). Water flowing towards the lake dissolves minerals from the rocks and picks up soil particles including nutrients such as nitrogen and phosphorous. Over time, as this water enters the lakes, the water in the lakes becomes enriched and can support aquatic plants and animals including fish. This natural enrichment process is known as "eutrophication." A little eutrophication is a natural and necessary part of a lake's life cycle. But like many things in life, too much of a good thing can be disastrous and lead to premature death or illness. We talked about that earlier in some of our phosphorus columns and why we need to focus on erosion control.

Our summer is rapidly reaching an end- days are getting shorter and the nights are getting cooler. As air temperatures decrease, the warm water at the lake surface also cools. Because the cooler water is denser than the water below, it sinks until it reaches the level where it is no longer cooler than the surrounding water. This sinking water creates downward convective currents that both cool the water column and bring oxygen rich water from the

surface to deeper depths. As the lake cools, eventually it reaches a point of maximum density where the water is the same temperature $(4^{\circ}C = ~39^{\circ}F)$ and density throughout and is well oxygenated from top to bottom. Because it is of uniform density, there is little resistance to mixing and the lake mixes easily with wind or flowing water currents. This is known as "turnover." Cold water can dissolve more oxygen than warm water so this is the time of year when oxygen in the water column is maximized. Because water has a maximum density at 4°C, further cooling results in water that is less dense than the deeper water and the surface water stops mixing downward and eventually freezes, resulting in a protective insulating blanket that allows the rest of the lake to remain as liquid water through the winter.

In the spring, as the ice melts and the water warms, the lake again reaches a point where it is the same density throughout and easily mixed. Because of this, lakes in temperate regions like Maine turn over twice a year, in spring and fall. Limnologists (scientists who study lakes) call these types of lakes "dimictic" lakes. This turnover ensures that the entire water column gets well oxygenated at least twice a year. In other parts of the world, the temperatures don't get cold enough to turn over deep lakes. In these lakes, which limnologists call "meromictic," the deep waters become anoxic and there is a permanent "dead zone" in which poison gases such as hydrogen sulfide can build up. Occasionally an unusual event such as an earthquake will disturb the stratification and the lake will belch poison gas such as Lake Nyos in Cameroon did in 1986, causing nearly 1,800 deaths. Next time you find yourself feeling like our cold Maine winters are a problem, think about what the cold is doing to help turn over our lakes and keep them healthy.

It took the British four attempts to locate and kill Father Sebastian Rasle, a Jesuit Missionary, in his settlement on the Kennebec River in Norridgewock. He was the second recorded white man to arrive in the area, in 1697, the builder of the first church edifice in town, the founder of the first Native American school in the region now known as the state of Maine, the author of an Abenaki dictionary, and a true apostle in the faith who remained among the Abenakies for 34 years.

Father Rasle, giving the Indians counsel and acting as their representative in many conferences with their enemies, won the hatred of the English. When the Indians asked the English to vacate lands which they had seized, the English blamed Rasle and called out the troops. On their 4th attempt, when English troops set out from Boston in whale boats they achieved a surprise attack on the village. Cobbossee Corner

Diver Assisted Suction Harvester (DASH) Boat is a Step Up in the Effort to Control Milfoil

The Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed DASH L boat has been working in Cobbossee Stream since it got a brand new motor from Clark Marine in Manchester. It is picking up tremendous amounts of milfoil which is being disposed of according to plan.

Friday, it will move to Lower Pleasant Pond where it will remove milfoil for the rest of the summer. Variable Leaf Milfoil was discovered in Upper and Lower Pleasant Pond in 2001 and it suspected to have been there for quite a long while before it was discovered, so it has a large start in the area.

The DASH unit was built last year with funding from a grant from the Maine Milfoil Initiative and matching funds acquired from the Four Towns Watershed Association through the towns of West Gardiner, Richmond, and Litchfield.

The boat is used in conjunction with a Certified Diver who is schooled in the removal of Variable Leaf Milfoil plants without leaving fragments of roots or the plant itself.

The diver descends and scoops out the plant, and places it into the suction device from the boat. The suction device takes plant and water up onto the boat, and deposits everything into waiting baskets. These baskets allow water to pass through, but the plant and all fragments remain. The baskets

are then emptied into a harmless compost pile. Mert Hickey from West Gardiner has graciously offered his services to empty the baskets for the Friends as often as needed.

Variable Leaf Milfoil has infested Pleasant Pond, Cobbossee Stream, Horseshoe Pond, and Purgatory Stream. It is not native and is very aggressive and will live in water up to 30 feet in depth. It takes oxygen from the water, and kills the naturally occurring plant life. It significantly lowers shorefront property values and renders the water unusable. It is spread mostly by "hitchhiking" which means that boats moving from one lake or pond to another might pick up a plant fragment and drop it in the next lake or pond where it can take root. Once in, it is very difficult and expensive, if not completely impossible, to remove.

The Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed is an organization celebrating its tenth year in existence and fights to protect and improve the 28 lakes and streams in the Cobbossee Watershed. The organization uses Educational Programs to create great stewards for its watershed, and runs a Courtesy Boat Inspection program as well as a Benthic Barrier Program in order to stop Invasive Aquatic Plant Species.





Conservation Too -

This spring and summer we have received a number of calls to help camp/gravel road groups. The good news is that we now work with a number of different camp/gravel road associations in their efforts to improve their gravel roads. That improvement results in less stormwater runoff into the lake. We'd like to think that neighbors who share the use and responsibility for their road are trying to work together in order to become better stewards of their property and their watershed. As the saying goes, "Hope springs eternal".

Camp road groups have always struggled to work together. Like any social organization, it is always easier to get along with each other when only a minimal amount of money is involved i.e. road maintenance fees, and the willingness to bring a good plate of food to the annual meeting is the most rigorous demand. Once the focus of the group is on financing a major road repair or the costs of a more elaborate road maintenance plan, friction can test the group's ability to get along and work together. This year there seems to be a renewed focus by watershed

create a better plan for working together. There are even some efforts to help groups who have not yet become formal "associations" to do the needed work to become a Statutory Road Association or a Nonprofit Corporation Road Association. While an informal road group needs to do some work to become either, there are substantial benefits to the group if they want to get work done on their road and protect themselves with some legal benefits.

There are reasons to form an "Association". 1] It is able to make plans for maintaining and fixing your gravel road. 2] It can move forward with the needed work to put that plan into action. And perhaps most importantly, 3] It can collect dues/fees from the landowners in order to pay for the work that has been planned.

The group can't depend on the long history of "neighborliness" to see it through a divisive and

potentially expensive problem that will cost the road group serious money.

Resources include: The Maine DEP produced manual, "A Guide to Forming Road Associations" which has a new 2009 edition. The 2009 Edition includes changes in State law which effect Road Associations and the work they do to improve camp roads. www.maine.gov/dep/blwq/docwatershed/camp/roads/index.htm

Water runoff can cause severe erosion and carry some pretty unhealthy "stuff" into our waterways. A buffer's job, as the name implies is to come between that water runoff and the waterbody we wish to protect. The term for such a buffer when located near the water's edge is a riparian buffer. It is located in the riparian zone. For our purpose, that might include colorful short shrubs adding planning. Start thinking about your site





excessive drinking and as a result, more urine. Medications such as prednisone or furosemide can also cause some excess urine production.

Although coming home to find urine on your floor, bed or carpet is no fun, it can be a message that something is not OK with your pet. There are a number of good products available that are designed to chemically neutralize the odor and stain of urine with emzymes. It's best to apply such a product to areas where your pet has gone; animals can smell very small amounts of their old urine and may be stimulated to use the area again when they smell it. If the problem continues, have your pet and their urine examined. A great deal of information can be gleaned by your vet from a simple urine sample. If you are not able to collect one at home, your vet has a number of tricks (and help ful staff!) to obtain a sample in the office. Having the problem diagnosed and effectively addressed will be a relief for you and your pet.



'm sitting on a bench seat at Hayden Park, just Lsouth of Hammond Lumber, enjoying the shade of the trees and watching three loons' fish for their dinner. They don't seem to want their picture taken because each time I focus the camera lens they dive back down. It's frustrating to the point where I've given up. Don't they know they could be famous? We could put their picture in the "Summertime in the Belgrades" for the entire world to see! Anyway, back to my park bench and this article. It's breezy today, the wind blowing out of the south but it's a very pleasant 77 degrees with no humidity to make things sticky. I'm waiting for some of my friends to finish their kayaking trip so I can help shuttle their boats and bring them back to Great Pond.

I like where I'm sitting even though it's pretty close to the busy Route 27 thoroughfare. That road means so many different things to people. For some of us, it's a way to get to work or the grocery store or a boat launch, but for many travelers it's the first sign they are approaching their favorite place in the world! When heading north on 27 you catch your first glimpse of southern Messalonskee Lake, followed by the Hammond Lumber Company sign. That visual means good times are fast approaching! It might mean shopping in the Village, sweeping the spider webs off the porch at camp, a ham Italian at Days Store, a hike up in the Kennebec Highlands, or maybe a little fishing on the lakes . . .

While sitting here on my bench going over the last five days of fishing I realize that sometimes I fish too fast - that's a fact. Run and gun fishing, 90 m.p.h. Fish a spot, move to the next then scoot to the third. Heck, I even tried to persuade my wife into letting me buy a faster boat. Guess how that conversation went? Now that we are in the heat of the summer our pace should slow down and our fishing pace should too. This past week one of the best mid-day tactics on largemouth and smallmouth bass has been a shaky head jig. A shaky head is a special jig head tipped with a specific type of worm that offers excellent wiggle when slowly worked off the bottom. It's all the rage in many parts of the country and certainly is effective here in the Belgrades. The downside of the shaky head is that if you fish it too fast, you get hung up. Along with fishing shaky worms

Water Works

One thing that can certainly strain our relationship with our pets is inappropriate urination. It may be a one time "accident", or it may become a frequent occurence. Sometimes the reason is logical, i.e. slightly too long between opportunities to go, being too young to "hold it", inconsistent house training, or it may be a valid physical problem that results in our dog or cat going where they shouldn't and normally wouldn't.

Cats tend to be much more fastidious in their urination habits. Even from a young age they seek out areas that are designated for the purpose i.e a litter box. When they start "missing the box" the cause may be straightforward. Sometimes a change in the type of litter (e.g. clay vs pine) or a change in the size or placement of a litterbox can trigger a pattern of "accidents". Stress or interpersonal rivalaries between cats can also result in "contests". A rule of thumb for households with multiple cats is to provide a separate box for each cat, with an extra one as well. Offering different types of litter, and a variety of locations for the boxes may alleviate these behavioral issues. Mature intact male cats are very likely to "mark" or spray inside the house, leaving in a strong smell that is meant to last! Neutering male cats before sexual maturity (6 or 7 months) is very helpful in preventing this behavior. Urine marking behavior in male dogs can be avoided by timely neutering as well.

Unfortunately, a syndrome known as Feline Lower Urinary Tract Disease (or FLUDT) affects many cats, young and older alike. Although the exact cause is unknown, FLUTD results in a combination of urine abnormalities that include bleeding of the bladder, crystal (and even bladder stone) formation, and bacterial infection. Often owners note that their cats begin urinating inappropriately in obvious places, such as the sink or the bath tub. This is helpful in some ways because their owners can see the blood in their urine. Urinating in other areas such as laundry, beds, clothing or shoes may be their way of getting their peoples' attention. Cats are certainly prone to routine bacterial urinary infections but FLUTD is often the initiating cause and can result in recurring "infections". It can be a life threatening issue for males who become "blocked". If left untreated, obstruction can lead to serious complications such as kidney failure, heart arrhythmia and death. Diet change along with medication are usually necessary to help control this chronic disease.

Dogs also are prone to bacterial bladder infections, particulary female dogs. Often it is not possible to "see" blood or pus in a dog's urine (unless it's winter here in Maine!). Often the more obvious signs are the dog needing to go out more often, passing small amounts of urine at a time, continually straining without producing urine, and of course, leaving urine spots in the house. Other causes of primary bladder problems in dogs include bladder stones, ulcers or polyps of the bladder wall, and cancer. Bladder stones in male dogs can be an emergency if the stones move into the urethra and cause obstruction; if a male dog is straining to urinate with little or no urine production, he should be seen by a vet as soon as possible.

Female dogs can also become incontinent, even at a young age. Usually they leak or dribble urine when asleep or relaxed on the couch, and may not even notice they are passing urine. Medication can be prescribed to control this type of incontinence. Older dogs of both sexes may also develop incontinence due to spinal disease or disease that affects the sphincter of the bladder, such as bladder cancer. Many incontinent dogs are more prone to bacterial infections because they are frequently wet.

Beyond those caused by primary bladder problems, there are a number of systemic disorders that lead to excessive drinking and urination. Both dogs and cats can develop kidney disease/renal failure. This insidious condition can come on quickly, or slowly, but often it is not discovered until irreparable damage has occurred. The only way to detect early kidney disease is through bloodwork and urine tests. Hormonal imbalances, such as adrenal gland diseases or diabetes mellitus, may also cause ...Continued on page 20

ollowing a facilitated brainstorming process Γ to develop a plan for sustainable business growth in Downtown Gardiner, a group of business and community leaders have presented a plan to the Gardiner City Council for official and for public feedback.

The plan recognizes three important facets of growth that the group believes will work together to boost economic growth in Downtown Gardiner.

Facet or phase one is the development of a business attraction incentive fund. After identifying critical business types needed downtown, Gardiner will attract these businesses by offering incentives which may take the form of a forgivable loan, grant, or other such subsidy. The Bank of Maine has generously offered up a challenge of \$125,000 to match contributions by other local businesses to capitalize this fund.

Phase two is the coordination of a brand development and marketing effort for Downtown Gardiner. With business attraction incentives in hand, the group seeks to leverage efforts to market Libby Hill by recognizing that Libby Hill and Downtown Gardiner are the City's two biggest economic
