*Push, pull
& lift*

A barge-mounted crane was brought in yesterday (7/17) to do some work near the fuel dock on Bucksport's waterfront. The pier still is owned by an American Iron & Metal (AIM) affiliate, but is leased to an oil firm.

Local roadwork detailed

BUCKSPORT — The Maine Department of Transportation (MDOT) is making safety improvements to State Route 46 here. The agency also is beginning work on similar improvements along U.S. Route 1-A in Holden.

The work in Bucksport on Route 46 will have crews using temporary traffic signals to control traffic during construction. Drivers should expect minimal delays.

The work should be complete by August 30.

The contractor on the job is R.F. Jordan Inc. of Ellsworth.

The work in Holden will be on U.S. Route 1-A (Main Road) southeasterly for three-quarters of a mile to Copeland Hill Road.

The work will begin at 7 p.m. on July 21, and all of the activity will

be done between 7 p.m. and 6 a.m.

Drivers should expect traffic to be reduced to one lane during those work hours. The anticipated completion date of this project is Sept. 19.

The contractor is Pike Industries of Fairfield.

The Holden project is to improve the safety of Route 1A by adding a two-way, left-hand turn lane along two stretches of the road.

Accidents have been happening in this area when drivers slow down to make left-hand turns and are hit from behind by motorists who are distracted, impaired, or unaware of slowing traffic. The new center lane for left-hand turns is to reduce the frequency and severity of such accidents. The work also will help preserve the pavement.

Salmon farm land purchased for \$7.2 million

BUCKSPORT — The details of Whole Oceans LLC's \$7.2 million purchase of a portion of the paper mill site are listed in the tax assessor's office.

Whole Oceans on May 20 bought lots at 2 River Road from Bucksport Mill LLC, an affiliate of American Iron & Metal (AIM).

The main 89.3-acre lot where an indoor Atlantic salmon farm will be built, sold for \$6,899,510. Other lots sold for \$308,950 (11.9 acres); \$8,650 (1.25 acres) assessed at \$8650; 1.25 acres and two other lots purchased for \$12,720 and \$20,170.

Rosen facing GOP challenge

BUCKSPORT — State Sen. Kimberley Rosen found herself announcing plans to seek re-election well ahead of schedule after a fellow Republican, state Rep. Lawrence Lockman, announced he'll seek the seat. Lockman will be term-limited out of his state representative's seat at the end of his current term.

Rosen, now in the first year of her third term in the Senate, turned back a well-financed Democratic challenger, former Brewer Mayor Beverly Uhlenhake, in the last election.

The Senate District 8 seat has been targeted by the Democrats in the past, and last year drew record contributions from party donors across the country.

The Bucksport senator said the Bradley state representative called her last week to advise her he'd run. She termed it, "disappointing that he would do this."

This week Lockman, a self-described "outspoken conservative", held a press conference in Brewer, where he was supported in person by former Gov. Paul R. LePage. Throughout his time as governor, LePage frequently sparred with his fellow Republicans in the Senate, saying they were not supportive enough of his policies.

Rosen yesterday (7/17) in a telephone interview from the Rosens' camp in Aroostook County, said she's concentrating on her duties during the remaining year of her current term.

She also said she will be back in Bucksport in time for

the Bucksport Bay Festival parade on Saturday.

In a statement, she said, "Serving as your senator continues to be the greatest privilege granted me as a citizen and daughter of Maine."

Noting, "we are now midway through the legislative session with much accomplished and more challenges to face when we return to the State House next January. As always, I am interested to hear from you and hope we see one another as I travel throughout the district this summer and fall."

She said, "my dedication and enthusiasm for the work remains high, and I am energized to carry on and continue to deliver for the Maine people. I intend to run for re-election. Nothing has occurred to change my plans."

Lockman claimed he's the first Maine lawmaker to oppose a sitting Republican senator in a primary.

Senate District 8 includes parts of Penobscot and Hancock counties.

Terming himself a "Maine First" person, Lockman's kickoff rally drew several current and former state lawmakers from the area. "This campaign is about giving a voice to the forgotten Mainers who have been shoved aside and left behind by the political elites at the State House," Lockman said.

Rosen said she received assurances from several in the party's leadership that they will support her in the primary.

IN THE WORKS . . .

Tidbits gleaned from the news . . .

RUBBISH — Bucksport is continuing to send all of its trash to the new Fiberight rubbish handling plant in Hampden, although that operation is having trouble getting its full operation up to speed. The Fiberight's management recently announced yet another delay in the efforts to get the entire plant up to its designed capacity.

Fiberight management had promised to be able to service all of its participating communities by now. Some municipalities have to find alternate sites and are still burying some of the trash.

Susan M. Lessard, Bucksport's town manager said this week that the town is paying a net of \$65 per ton of trash, plus \$35 per ton for recycling the material. And it is not clear when the plant will be in full operation.

COMING DOWN! — The second and tallest of the two remaining stacks at the paper mill is tentatively scheduled to be taken down sometime in September. Town officials were upset earlier this month when the owner of the site took down the original stack without any advance notice to anyone.

Town Manager, Susan M. Lessard said she has been assured by the manager of the property that advance notice will be given before the next tower comes down. That tower services the now-abandoned bio-mass operation which cost millions of dollars. Only the 160-foot stack will remain.

LIGHTS OUT! — "Bucksport's night lights." — The flashing red strobe lights atop the stacks of the paper mill have been out for a number of weeks. Ordinarily, government regulations require such lights on most structures over 200 feet tall.

The lights are required to improve the safety of persons flying overhead.

TAXES — The affiliates of American Iron & Metal (AIM) this year will pay taxes on the former paper mill site on property now valued at \$13,550,000. That includes the lots that were assessed in April. Next year, Whole Oceans LLC ordinarily would pay the taxes on the 87 acres it recently bought from AIM. However, the salmon fish farm will remain tax-free during the initial years of its 20-year agreement with the town for a tax incremental financing incentive. It will become tax-exempt next year because it is owned by the state.

AIM still has one industrial lot, which is expected to be sold shortly. The metal recycler will retain a fourth lot, the one where the electrical generating station stands.

POOLING IDEAS? — The Town Council next Thursday (7/25) will receive

information on replacing the municipal swimming pool. They also will have information on cost of building, operating and maintaining an indoor pool as another option.

The information is coming after talks with two representatives from Down East Family YMCA, Peter Farragher and Nick Tymoczko, the town manager and others. Meanwhile Tymoczko has provided several pages of information about the possibility of having swimming and other recreational activities at Silver Lake. However, since Silver Lake is a public reservoir, that would require holding a public hearing before moving forward.

SIT-A-SPELL — Thanks to the Senior Resource group and Michael Gross and his carpentry class of RSU 25, the town now has four more benches scattered downtown and at a small shopping center off U.S. Route 1.

Simply return the questionnaire on this page and we will pass the information on to the Town Manager and council.

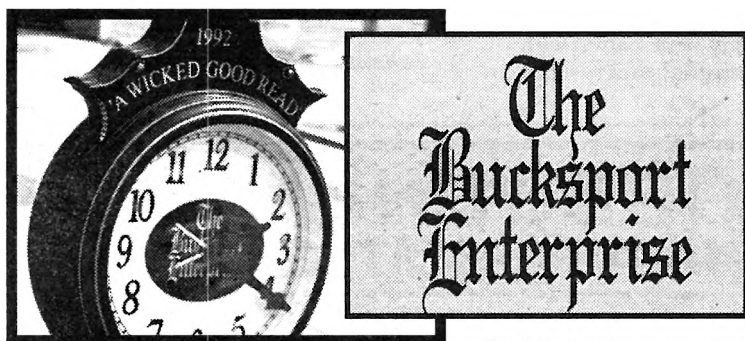
Lights out for the mill!

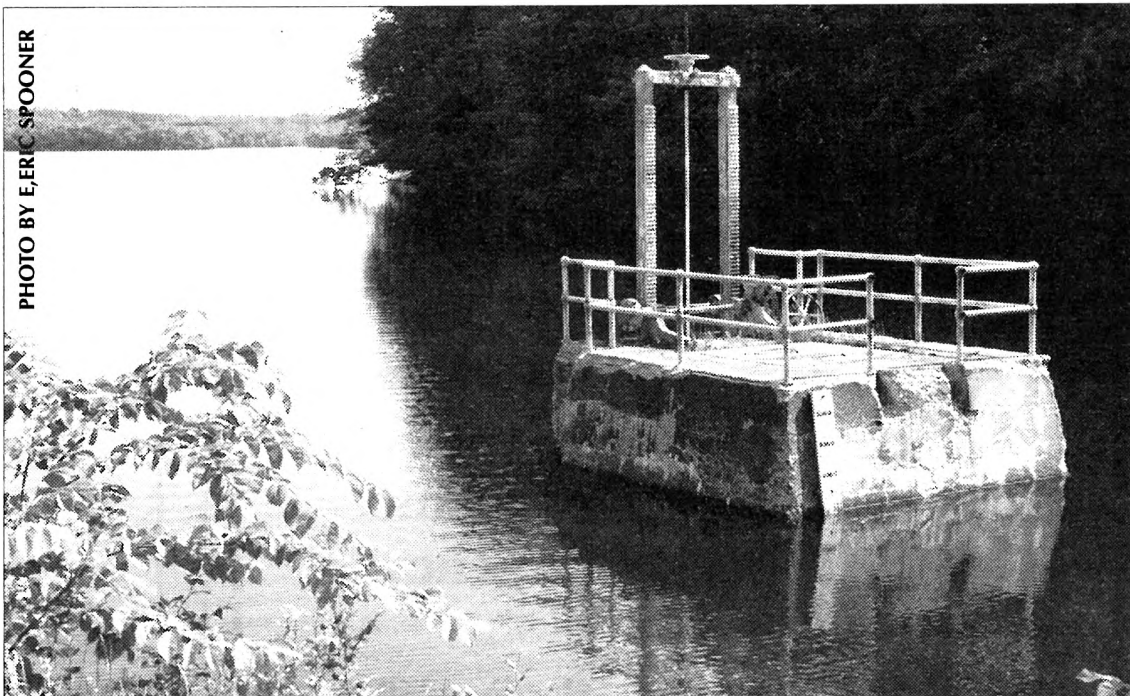

WATER LEVELS in the man-made Silver Lake have remained high all summer, thanks to winter runoff and plenty of storms since the snow melt. The lake and the water in it belong to the firm that purchased the paper mill, although the firm which operates the public water system here has a long-term contract to tap into it. The planned Whole Oceans LLC Atlantic salmon farm also will use some of the water. Town officials now are trying to learn what residents think of the idea to use a section of the lake for public swimming and other recreational activities.

Those favoring the idea suggest the arrangement would provide a broader range of outdoor recreational activities - not far from downtown. It also could be a stopgap measure as town officials wrestle with what to do with the severe leaks which have closed down the municipal swimming pool this summer.

The man-made lake serves as the reservoir for the portion of the town hooked up to the privately owned water service and soon will provide some of the water to be used by Whole Oceans LLC for its on-shore salmon breeding farm.

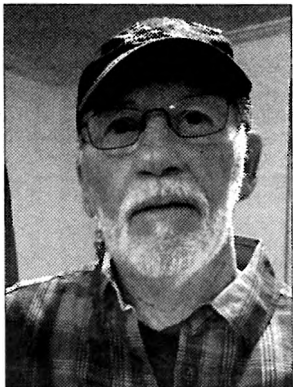
Michael K. McKnight, 1953 - 2019
