## STAIN GOT S100.

And It Went on Record to Nail Some  
of His Lies.

Evidence Regarding the Young Ro-  
man's Movements Piling Up.

A Carriage Accident Locates Him in  
Gardiner in 1877.

(Special to the Press.)

ACQUITTAL, March 11.—Another important  
development in the way of new evidence in the  
Stain case came on last Saturday. It was  
discovered that Charles Stain, after leaving  
Mr. Lamb's in Winslow, the first of  
August, 1877, went directly to Gardiner,  
where he stopped at the house of one, Wm.  
Davis. On the evening of August 8th, at  
Messrs. Davis and Stain were driving in  
West Gardner they went through a bridge.  
Their wagon was damaged and the two men  
claimed to have received personal injuries.  
The records of West Gardner show that on  
August 10, the town paid Charles F. Stain  
\$100 and Davis \$50 for damages to their  
carriage. This fact, which is corroborated by  
the records of the town, shows that Stain came  
to his home several days before the accident  
and left at once on receiving the money.  
It is also shown that Stain was in Gardiner  
at the time of the accident. The evidence  
corroborates the developments of the  
last few days, showing that Young Stain  
spent the summer of 1877 in Maine, instead  
of in New York, as he has been claiming.  
The jury trial, now progressing, is ex-  
pected. He was not at his father's house in  
July when he represented that the burglar  
took him from his secret hiding place. He  
was at home in August after the alleged  
July trip, when he said the locksmith came  
down from Blackstone street in Boston and  
placed a half at his father's house. The  
evidence is piling up against him.

Some important developments are at  
hand. The new evidence is causing a large  
amount of speculation, and nearly everybody  
is talking about it. The jury trial is ex-  
pected to be a very interesting one. The

kill. She pleaded not guilty. The case is  
assigned for trial next Friday.
