he woods: a canopy of green. The waters: a shimmer of silver. The fields: a carpet of color.


Summer is here with all its lessons in renewal, with all its reminders of the perseverance of nature, with all its magic for those who live here, summer here or just pass through – and then return time and again.

n Saturday, June 2, REM will hold its annual Community Volunteer Awards Ceremony from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. in the Waterville Opera House. The public is encouraged to attend.

REM, whose initials stand for "Revitalizing the Energy in Maine," is a Waterville-based nonprofit that promotes civic engagement. According to its website, REM "supports a network of citizen volunteers working to improve the quality of life in Central Maine. In REM, work is cooperative, diversity is honored, selfreliance is promoted, and civic life is renewed."

Each year, REM holds a ceremony where REM and other area nonprofit organizations each honor one or more volunteers of their own choosing. Each honoree receives a crystal medallion, two inches in diameter, which can be displayed on a wooden stand or attached to a handmade, beaded necklace.



### Colby Grads Offered Life Advice from Former Prime Minister Tony Blair

- Two: Maintain an open mind to those of different faiths, cultures, races, and nations.
- Three: Giving is as good as getting. Compassion is as important as ambition. Don't enterprise, fair play – these values that define just choose a career, choose a cause.
- Four: Friendship matters, and family matters most. It's in the family that you learn one of the humanity's best hope for the future." most important lessons of life: that it is not all

about you.

- Five: Be a leader, not a follower. Be a doer and not a critic. Progress is forged by the courage of the change-maker. Courage is not the absence of fear, it's the overcoming of fear... All leaders have their doubts, anxieties, periods of acute lack of confidence, worry.
- Six: Make use of the interconnected world. It's a fascinating and energizing and exciting world out there. Take advantage of it. See the world. See its possibilities.
- Seven: This time of challenge presents unprecedented opportunity and hope for the future.



# Milfoil Matters

### elgrade Lakes, Maine. For many of us the **D**name is almost magical. It's a refuge from that other world...a place with deep family traditions...where kids learn to swim, fish and boat...where life takes on a whole new meaning...where time almost stands still.

At the center of it all is our lakes. It's our lakes that brought us all here and that bind us together. It's our lakes that we most cherish and most want to preserve for the generations to come. And it's our lakes that are at great peril threatened by a small feathery aquatic plant called mil-

No one is sure how it got here...maybe on a boat propeller, the bed of a boat trailer or even a duck decoy. But what is certain is that variable milfoil is in Great Pond. And without action, our lakes may never be the same again.

A thick mat of milfoil could grow around virtually the entire shoreline of Great and Long Ponds...all the way out to where the water is 15' to 20' deep. Once an area is infested with milfoil, we can't swim in it or navigate a boat through it.

### Milfoil In Great Pond

Like it or not, we are in for one tough fight with this aggressive invader. There's an awful lot at stake...loss of a traditional way of life...and an uncertain future for generations to come.

But there is good news. The milfoil is now confined to a very small area in Great Pond. With aggressive action, it's believed the milfoil can be contained so that it will not spread to other parts of the lake. Achieving this kind of success will require an all out effort. Every one of us is going to have to play a part to stop this milfoil.

The first thing we have to do is fully understand the threat posed by this invasive plant. A special edition of the Belgrade Lakes Association - "BLA" (representing Great and Long Ponds) newsletter was the initial step in a campaign designed to educate shorefront property owners, renters, visitors and the watershed communities about milfoil. Copies are available at the Maine Lakes Resource Center on Main Street in Belgrade Lakes Village.

Subsequent steps have included initiating a BLA Stop Milfoil Capital Campaign for \$500,000, obtaining a "Surface Use Restriction" from the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife and the Department of Environmental Protection, and hiring New England Milfoil, a professional milfoil mitigation company, to begin removal work in the infested area (North Bay) for nine nonconsecutive weeks, which will be complemented by Belgrade Regional Conservation Alliance volunteers and Colby College interns. commencing May 21.

With the campaign in place, it is time to expand reach of the education and to provide more extensive feedback on the Stop Milfoil effort. To date the news is good.

By the end of May, the capital campaign has received \$129,355 in pledges and donations from 156 individuals, New England Milfoil has removed 1200 gallons of the invasive plant, and their survey of the infected area shows no spreading since last summer.

### Conservation -

ennebec Messalonskee Trails, the City of Waterville and Waterville Main Street will host a walk and celebration of the opening of the "Waterville Connector Trail" and the "2-Cent Plaza" on National Trails Day, Saturday, June 2nd.

The 2-mile Waterville Connector Trail, which extends from Waterville's Quarry Road Recreation Area across the 2-Cent Bridge to the Winslow School Trails is the first trail in the community to connect several of the shorter trails already developed. It is paved throughout, is handicapped accessible, and is the first trail to transition between off-road trails and City streets with sidewalks and bicycle lanes. An informational kiosk is located at the 2-Cent Plaza overlooking the Kennebec River.

The National Trails Day event will start at 10 am at two locations. A 2-mile walk will start at the North Street end, opposite MaineGeneral's Thayer campus Emergency Room entrance, while those with limited mobility or in wheelchairs will start at the parking lot of the Pleasant

### Hallowell Veterans' Monument Dedication



n Monday, May 28, 2012 a new Veterans' Monument was dedicated at the Hallowell Cemetery. For the past several years Michael Madden, Arthur Moore and his wife, Florence, Larry Auger and other members of the Veterans' Committee and many community people have been working to assure that no soldier's name from the Spanish-American War, World War I, World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Granada, Kuwait, Iraq or Afghanistan would be missing from the to-be dedicated memorial.

Goodrich-Caldwell American Legion Post 6 has considerable respect for the two soldiers whose names represent their Post. Frank Goodrich joined the Canadian Army, was shipped to France and later joined the Royal Air Force. Mrs. Janice Bowman of Palmyra, Maine is a direct descendent of the Caldwell family and was present to preside at the unveiling of the monument. She has been told, and the public is aware, of the pride Post 6 has that she accepted their invitation to be present at the unveiling of the monument.

"Post 6 in Hallowell has worked to renew and bring a 'seal-tag protected' display of all the Hallowell people who have served their country over the past years. The dedication of this granite monument, however, is due in very large part to the multitude of local volunteers, financial backers, promoters and important data that has made this event possible," Madden says of the monument dedication.

The dedication ceremony was well attended and the new monument is now on view for the public at the Hallowell Cemetery.







# Collaboration Key to Protecting Watersheds

The Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed was formed in 2001 to connect citizens to actions they could take to help protect our lakes, ponds and streams. Since then, it has become abundantly clear that success in protecting watersheds comes not from the work of one organization working with individuals, but rather from a dynamic and complex collaboration of organizations, agencies, businesses, schools, communities and local citizens working together.

The Friends focus on two main threats to local water quality, nonpoint source pollution and invasive aquatic plants, is greatly aided by the partnering with state, regional and local agencies such as the Maine Department of Environmental Protection, the Kennebec County Soil and Water Conservation District and the Cobbossee Watershed District. These agencies provide resource information, technical guidance and often administer grant funding that incorporates the work of Friends programs, such as Slow the Flow, Youth Conservation Corps, Courtesy Boat Inspections and Milfoiler (Invasive Aquatic Plant Control) programs.

Lake Associations are another key partner in the work of the Friends, providing opportunities to connect with lakefront property owners and promote the resources that the Friends can offer. The Friends are often included in lake association annual meetings and assist associations via providing administrative support overseeing Courtesy Boat Inspection and plant control programs. Lake Associations also often connect with individual towns, to help promote the valuable work of the Friends and advocate for town funding support for programs that help protect property values.

Businesses are another key partner in protecting the Cobbossee Watershed, as they provide sponsorship support to most of the Friends programs. Sponsors not only benefit from the positive advertising of supporting a local organization doing good work, but also help protect their bottom lines by helping to protect the natural resources that bring valuable tourist dollars to the area. Even schools are an essential partner in the Friends conservation work, as they incorporate watershed related issues into their curriculum via the Friends Watershed Science and Field Experiences programs. By educating our children to become environmentally literate citizens, schools are helping to create stewards of our natural resources for the future.





### An Alphabet Soup Regarding Water Quality

And so we start the 2012 conservation season. It seems like ages ago that the water surface was covered with ice and snow but it is time to get your feet wet and enjoy the summer season in the Belgrade and Cobbossee watersheds. What better time to start the discussion about water quality in our ponds and streams?

The Kennebec District is primarily concerned with Non Point Source (NPS) pollution throughout Kennebec County. Non-point source pollution means just what its name implies. It comes from many sources instead of a single spot. It includes the rain runoff from roofs, parking areas and roadways. It includes the runoff from your yard or a farmer's field. It even includes the water runoff from a local car wash. NPS at all of those sites add up and have a cumulative effect on our lakes and ponds.

How do we address these NPS sites? We use another three letter abbreviation, a "BMP" or Best Management Practice. A BMP is a practice done to address the problems caused by the Non-Point Source. Confused yet? It doesn't need to be that complicated. Staff here at the Kennebec District are able to identify different types of BMP's designed to intercept water runoff and

either remove or decrease that runoff's impact on a stream or pond. There are even BMP's to address the soapy water used at that car wash mentioned above.

We work with various pond and lake associations and individual landowners. Over the summer months we will address issues people should focus on. This isn't just people who own camps on the water either. It is everybody who uses the resources in that area whether you simply walk on the beach, live year-round on the shoreline, or occasionally drop a boat into the water. Regardless of where you live, you are in some watershed. The water that leaves your property ends up in one of our streams or ponds. Even if it seems to disappear down a storm drain, that water runoff ends up somewhere.

What can you do to help protect and even improve the water quality of the ponds, lakes and streams that make up our marvelous watersheds? There are a number of ways for us to minimize our impact on the water quality. Some people focus on managing their yard and property. Use only phosphorous free fertilizer and then only fertilize in the fall. Cut back on the amount of lawn you maintain and keep the lawn well

back from the water's edge. A good buffer planting of shrubs and bushes does a much better job of intercepting water runoff and filtering it before it gets to the lake. Control the water runoff from your buildings or driveway and parking. These impervious surfaces can concentrate rainwater runoff and funnel it into the lake. Divert that water into the woods or otherwise filter it so it doesn't transport soil, chemicals, or other toxics into the water. If you have a driveway or share a camp road, make sure it is designed and maintained to collect the rainwater and divert it into rain gardens or other vegetative area where the water is filtered before it gets to the lake. Check the road surface, the ditches and the culverts to see that they are not eroding. If you use a boat, keep it maintained. Don't spill or drain engine fluids into the water. Make sure you check your boat and trailer for any petroleum residue and/or other pollutants.

Remember, there is a lot to do in order to protect water quality.





### Another Year of Exploring the Belgrades!

Everett Day caught this big largemouth bass last week in the Belgrades.

The bass was hiding in a fallen tree in about 3 feet of water



We've been spending a lot of time targeting largemouth and smallmouth bass on the lakes; although fly fishing the local ponds and streams is always fun too.

The smallmouth bass fishing is off the charts right now! Because of the early spring and above average temperatures, anglers are getting to experience awesome fishing a little earlier in the season than usual. Right now the male bass are

busy making nests and are easily found up and down the shorelines. The bigger females are often found hanging in 8 – 10 feet of water somewhere off-shore near the beds. The tricky part is getting her to bite. Baits like Senkos, plastic worms and tube jigs probably account for more smallmouth bass than any other options, but topwater lures can often trick the biggest fish. If conditions are right, fishermen can expect intense strikes as the bigger bass crush slowly moving surface plugs. Another option this time of year for the bigger bass is to use slash baits like the Rapala X-Rap. These baits can cover a lot of



water and work well when casting away from the shoreline. Once you find a series of bass beds that have male bass protecting the nest, try fan casting out toward deeper water to search for his girlfriend. Chances are she's out there waiting for just the right moment to move shallow.

As for largemouth bass like the beauty in this picture, we've been finding a lot of quality fish on a number of the Belgrade lakes. The largemouth fishing has been very impressive so far. The bass seem to be holding in traditional heavy cover, especially fallen trees and sunken timber. They have also been stacking up near currents like culverts or dams. We've been having good luck on jigs in black with pumpkin/red flake trailers. If you catch a couple of crayfish out of the lake you'll notice that many of them have small bright red marks down their backs. So it only makes sense to try red flake trailers on your jigs.

As you can see by the other attached picture, I made a few furry friends early this spring. This was a very special treat indeed because otters are one of my favorite animals to watch. Otters are much more active at night and like to play and feed in backwaters, so most anglers never see them. I first spotted this group about a week after ice out. They were very active and playful. When you think about it, otters are very social, love to frolic with their friends, are wicked cute, and go fishing every day! No wonder they are my favorite critter! This group was extremely curious and would hang around my boat each time our paths crossed. There were five otters in this group, but I couldn't get a picture of all five at once. They would swim like a porpoise around the boat and then stop and pop their heads up to watch us. But as soon as I would move the camera they would scatter. It's amazing how long they can stay underwater – we estimated up to 4 minutes and they would cover a couple of hundred yards before popping back up for air! Hopefully they will show up again soon so I can take some more pictures! Good luck!

# Ticked Off

It is an opinion universally acknowledged, that ticks are gross. And they are, with their creeping, sticking, attaching, blood sucking and bloating ways. They lurk where our furry friends like to go, and those same friends can pick them up and inadvertently bring them into our households, even our beds. While for the most part, they are just a nuisance, they hurt, and more significantly, they can potentially transmit some pretty nasty diseases in this area. While their population here has blossomed in the last 20 years, undoubtedly reflecting the wildlife populations they like to parasitize, such as deer, fortunately our arsenal against them has increased as well.

Most ticks have a relatively long life cycle, requiring three hosts to feed on during their life stages, which include the egg, larva, nymph and adult forms. Ticks lay eggs in the hundreds to thousands in the spring and the tiny larvae which hatch must quickly seek a blood meal, usually from a rodent or bird, before they fall to the ground and become nymphs. The nymph stage can remain inactive over winter but start moving again early the next spring, seeking another blood meal from a rodent, deer, pet or human. Nymphs tend to be tiny, like the head of a pin or a freckle. After they feed for 3 to 5 days, they detach from the host, lay dormant and in late summer, molt and become adults. Throughout the fall, adult females attach to another host, feed and mate there with males. After a week or two, ticks detach and the female lays low during the winter, only to lay all those

eggs again in the early spring.


How to avoid becoming a "host" or "blood meal" is a concern for us and our pets. Outdoors, environmental control for ticks can include sprays for the yard, ideally those which are not harmful to the environment or wildlife, not to mention pets. There are a number of effective products that can be used on your pet to prevent attachment and/or to kill the tick before it has a significant meal. These include monthly topical liquid applications such as Vectra®, Frontline®, Advantix®, Parastar® and others. With the exception of Frontline® and Easyspot®, many of these flea and tick products can be quite toxic to cats and caution must be used. With the increase in tick prevalence in the area, many people have also turned back to collars with chemicals which will repel and kill ticks, such as the Preventic® or Scalibor® collar. Again, only a few are safe for and even to be used around cats. Although products like Vectra are labeled as water repellant, avid swimmers may do better with a collar. Collars can also be removed and safely stored for periods of time when the pet is inside, shortening the time that the chemical needs to be in contact with the pet. Never use products intended for use on human clothing or around the house directly on a pet.

Of course, just a "touch and look" check of your pet every night can help find and remove any unwanted guests before they get a good bite. Ticks generally like to move up as high on the pet as they can before attaching. Often they attach around the head, ears and neck, but they can be anywhere. If a tick has started to attach, the safest way to remove it is to use rubbing alcohol and a pair of tweezers, or a small gadget like an O Tom tick Puller or Tick Key. Dab rubbing alcohol around the head area of the tick and grasp it as close to the skin as possible with tweezers; use steady pressure to pull it out. Sometimes it's not possible to get the whole tick, and parts of the head may remain. Tick bites can get nasty. Swelling, redness and crusting are not uncommon, but should resolve within a week. Sometimes antibiotic ointments are helpful. Never squish a tick because it could inject or be carrying disease causing organisms. Put it in alcohol to kill it.

In addition to the "ick factor", tick bites can be the cause of disease because ticks feed on multiple hosts. They can act as a "vector", spreading germs from one mammal to the next. These include Lyme disease, and other rickettsial diseases such as Ehrlichiosis. In the Northeast, the bacteria that causes Lyme disease (Borrelia Burgdorferi) is carried by a relatively small tick known as Ixodes Scapularis. Many people don't notice these ticks on their pet, particularly in the nymph stage, because they are so very tiny. Like other ticks, when the nymph or adult attaches to feed, it must keep the host's blood from clotting in order to get a good blood meal. It achieves this by regurgitating various enzymes from its midgut that keep the blood flow liquid and smooth. It is during this process of regurgitation that the Lyme bacteria is brought up from the tick's gut to its mouth parts, and into the pet or person.

In dogs, there is a vaccine to prevent Lyme disease ... Continued on page 27

# Businesses "Adopt" Food Pantries

that is effective in preventing infection (although not one hundred percent). Most vets also recommend yearly screening for exposure to Lyme bacteria and other rickettsial diseases with a quick blood test that is done right in the clinic. If exposure is detected, prompt and appropriate measures can be taken to prevent serious sequelae in dogs, such as kidney disease, arthritis or neurologic disease. Early detection can allow treatment before the disease progresses from an acute to a chronic state. Fortunately, in many cases, when treated early after exposure (i.e. the "acute" state), even sick dogs respond well to antibiotic therapy. Generally, cats are considered resistant to clinical

In addition to the growing demand of more people out of work and out of money, local food cupboards are receiving less donated food from the U.S. Department of Agriculture food distribution program because supplies are going to areas of the country affected by natural disasters such as tornados and hurricanes.

The Smithfield effort to help local families with free food is based at the town office on Village Road.

Lyme disease.

If your dog is known to have been exposed to Lyme disease, be aware that you and your family are in the same environment that your dog was when he was exposed; he may have also brought infected ticks closer to you. While a tick is needed to transmit bacteria from one animal to another, and you cannot get Lyme disease directly from your dog, there are usually a large number of ticks in a given area, many of which may have fed on the same host, such as an infected deer. Make sure to consult with your physician if you have any concerns about exposure in yourself or your family.


