Sale of power plant set

BUCKSPORT — The power plant at the former paper mill will be sold tomorrow (11/1), thanks to last-minute but crucial steps taken on Tuesday.

The sale to Stonepeak Kestrel Holdings III, a New York-based investment firm had to clear two hurdles. The 360-foot smokestack next to the generating station had to be razed, and a Planning Board endorsement was needed to add some 3.3 acres to the small site around the power plant.

The stack was impeded with a charge of explosives about 8 a.m. on Tuesday and then about 7 that night the board gave its unanimous consent to the subdividing of an already subdivided lot owned by the local affiliate of American Iron & Metal (AIM).

At that session, a town official suggested the lot from which the land was taken later may be sold to Whole Oceans LLC, the firm developing an onshore salmon farm on the adjacent property it previously acquired this year from the AIM subsidiary.

Whole Oceans and the Maine Maritime Academy, which is developing a mariners' safety school on the paper mill site, both sent letters endorsing the additional subdivision. The decision the board made came after reviewing the paperwork for just over 20 minutes.

New deed documents had

GONE ... BUT HARDLY FORGOTTEN

Up and down the Penobscot on Tuesday were small clusters of people, some gathering before the dawn; others arriving with the first rays. For those who had labored at the paper mill the wait for the detonation of the smokestack looming above the powerhouse was more a wake than a celebration. The chit-chat in the retreating darkness was not of machines or the massive buildings that housed them. It was of the people who had worked there, and the feelings still lingering in their guts. Moments before 8 a.m., the 360-foot stack of Bucksport's past ceased to be. The memories - many good, some not - endure.

Meth gear confiscated

BUCKSPORT — For the third time in about a year, authorities descended on a home at 396 Central Street, and seized equipment that can be used in manufacturing methanphetamines.

One person was arrested on each of the previous visits, but both of those individuals still were in jail and not involved in



the latest situation.

The local police on Sunday afternoon called in the Maine Drug Enforcement Agency's Downeast Task Force, and safely removed the potentially dangerous gear from a shed near the house. No arrests were made this time, but the investigation isn't over.

The initial assessment by local police resulted in bringing in the additional personnel, including a state drug lab team. Three reaction vessels and other evidence of a potential "one-pot meth lab" were confiscated.

Bucksport fire and police personnel were at the scene.

Linking of police and fire departments approved

BUCKSPORT — The Town Council, as expected, last week endorsed the town's manager's recommendation to consolidate the police and fire departments under a director of public safety. Police Chief Sean Geagan will continue to hold that title when he takes command of the two agencies as the leader of departments.

Deputy Chief Michael Denning will continue to oversee the day-to-day operations of the fire department and Sgt. David Winchester will do the same at the police department.


Town Manager Susan M.

Lessard has allocated some \$24,000 on raises for the four top personnel of the two departments. Her plan also calls for recruiting another full-time firefighter/EMT and another police officer; as well as dividing Winchester's current duties as the police sergeant and detective.

The jobs will be advertised, at first internally, and then more widely, she said. Lessard said it could take a year to fully move to the new management arrangement. The full annual operating cost of the arrangement was not discussed.


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

— From the margins of the editor's notebook — Yes, Ned, you're warmly remembered

Those who frequent the BookStacks shop knew him well, the distinguished fellow who like Leo, the store cat, favored the rocking chair from which to soak in whatever sun there might be that day.

But no old codger, oblivious to the news of the day — no that was not Edward G. Clement Jr.

Ned was a rollicking good listener and more than a fair raconteur. From his perch, watching the passing scene on Main Street, Ned could enter into just about any conversation, no matter the subject, and more than likely add a whole lot to the discussion in the process. He also asked wicked good questions.

Today's headlines . . . yesterday's radio technology . . . pocket watches . . . boats and anything related to boats . . . Ned knew all about it — and he couldn't wait to learn more.

Out at the municipal animal shelter on Central Street, the temporary occupants knew that, at least for a time, there would be one constant in their lives, the gentle, caring touch and genuine concern of Ned and his adoring, supportive wife, Grace. Neither would forget any of them.

The trips from the Clement home in Prospect to the shelter were almost daily, for the Clements' concern for all of the critters reflected the closeness and support of their own relationship.

One day, Ned showed up at *The Bucksport Enterprise*. He wanted to know what it would cost to run a weekly column to call attention to the pets who each were awaiting adoptive homes. The newspaper agreed to run an abbreviated column at no charge as a community service, but that did not keep Ned from sending along a generous check. His support was far more than verbal when it came to aiding all sorts of creatures.

His later years rocking in the sunshine from BookStacks' front window in no way reflected the vast lore Ned freely and matter-of-factly shared.

He spent a life learning about boats, and spent

many years at sea along the Atlantic coast. He was not a passenger; he was a man on a quest for better ways to keep mariners in touch with those on shore.

Climbing down into the vessels and up into their masts, he used a few skills he had learned from books and radio operators to fashion better solutions to old problems. And he did it simply because he could.

Building better anything was a lifelong goal, one acquired before he was a teenager. He listened closely to his curiosity, knowing it would lead him to he knew not where. Still, in the process of each journey of mind and heart, Ned definitely, absolutely, positively knew he was on the trail to figuring out for himself something that would satisfy his curiosity — and, also his soul.

In his final months, Ned was, well, let's just say Ned was not Ned. The loss of his license to drive was devastating, one of the rarest of moments when his emotions were not positive about life and what's to be learned by living it.

He recovered, but a string of challenges that accompany a debilitating disease proved inevitable, and they took their toll on both Ned and Grace.

Still, to see the two of them together in the comfy chairs at BookStacks rekindled glimpses of what a remarkable couple they have been. Their eyes still sparkled with memories only they could possess, and as Ned once had done for Grace, Grace now did for him.

Those of us who attempt to continue to chronicle what's happening today can find it hard to come to grips with what may lie ahead. Most of the trite sayings by those who have not yet gone there are hardly helpful travelogues.

Still, Ned comfortably traveled without a guidebook. While he usually did his research well before departing, he found the true zest resided in the adventures that cropped up along the way.

Ned belonged to the Blue Hill Pistol and Rifle Club along with the Bucksport Rod and Gun Club.

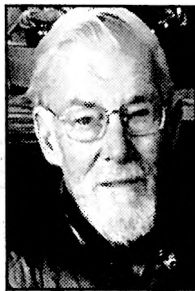

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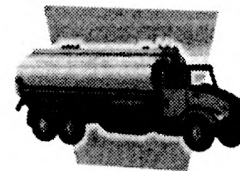

The generating station, which once powered the mill on River Road, is being sold to an investment company specializing in acquiring utility companies like the one here that no longer are serving their original

purpose. Instead of powering the mill, the plant here now serves as a backup to the electrical grid.

On Tuesday, Luke Chiavelli, the code enforcement officer, described the requested change as, "very minor but it has to be done by Friday" to allow the sale to occur. He also noted the request was, "somewhat rushed."

Several members of the board also made it clear they weren't in the mood to "rubber stamp" the request, and there were some signs some members still were smarting over having to make more decisions because AIM and others planning to use the site had not gotten their paperwork right the first time around.

The change gives the power plant ownership of land formerly used as an easement to reach an electrical substation. It's not clear if that land will be used for any new purpose.

Included in the subdivision request was a change to relocate the boundaries of what is being called the loop road through the paper property. Instead of legally having some of it on property now owned by Whole Oceans, it now will be part of the adjoining lots, although there are no current plans to change the route on the ground at this point, the applicant said.

Also amid the newest paperwork and site plans is some language to clarify and, in some cases, correct errors made in previous filings with the board, an attorney for AIM said. She described those changes as "minor housekeeping." The board adjourned and then signed off on the paperwork.

The polls at the G.H. Jewett School will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. for the town council election. The voters will select three town councilors, one for a two-year seat. They also will decide if the town will authorize a new swimming pool and whether to authorize an issue to underwrite three years of stepped-up local road projects. An ad hoc committee which has been examining the far less-costly solution. Passage of the road bonds would require higher local property taxes to payoff the bonds unless the town votes to increase the millage rate.

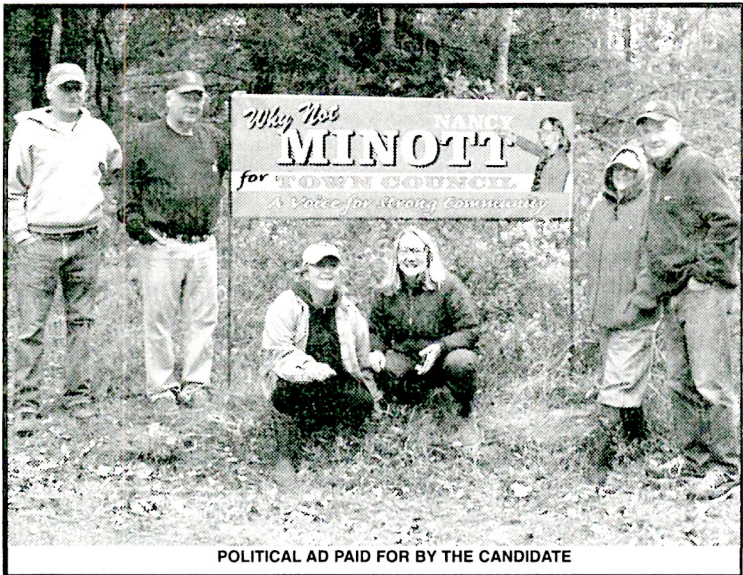

I am James Morrison, many of you know me as Jim, but the people I grew up with still call me Jimmy.

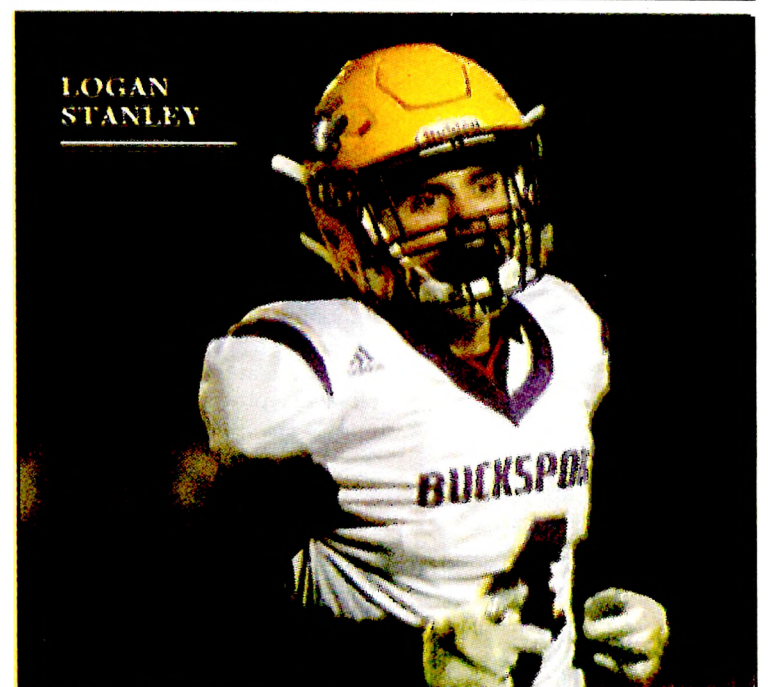
I graduated from Bucksport High school in the early '70s. I joined the military shortly after and spent four years in the Navy Seabees.

The Bucks finished their regular season having allowed but 27 points, the fewest allowed in any class of high school football in Maine this year.

The team's next contest will be the opener in the playoffs, a match-up on the Bucks' home at the Robert F. Carmichael Sr. Field on Friday, Nov. 10.

Ordinarily, the Bucks' coaching staff tends to back off when the score starts going lopsidedly in their favor, by there are exceptions to every rule. Apparently, this was a night for an exception.

On Friday, the Bucks followed the prescribed plan of attack: score early and score hard. Make their presence felt, and then just keep on pounding away.

And that's exactly what they did.

Josh Miller finished the night with over 150 yards and two touchdowns.

As a result the Bucks finished the game with a 53-0 win.

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

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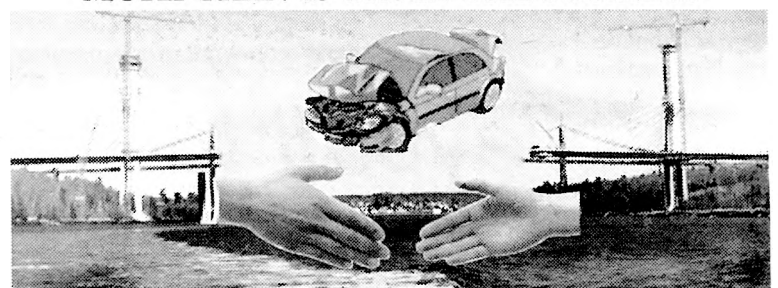
