





This column is devoted to telling the milfoil story; **I** what it is, what problems it can cause, what's being done to stop it and what you can do to help.

Non-native milfoil is an invasive plant that has the potential to greatly diminish the recreational value of our lakes, alter the balance of the eco system in our watershed and adversely impact our entire community. It's a serious threat to everything we cherish and want to protect and preserve about this area.

Last fall, variable milfoil was found growing in North Bay in Great Pond. The good news is that it is confined to a relatively small part of the lake and an aggressive action plan is underway to remove it and keep it from spreading. This column is devoted to telling the milfoil story; what it is, the problems it can cause, what's being done to stop it and what you can do to help.

WHAT IS MILFOIL?

Milfoil is a rooted, submersed , perennial aquatic plant. There are actually nine different kinds of milfoil in Maine. Five of them are native. These native milfoil species have been in our lakes for eons. They are not a problem because they are part of the natural ecology of the lakes. The native milfoils are a primary food source of a small water bug, the watermilfoil weevil, which keeps them in check.

The other four types of milfoil are the problem: variable milfoil, Eurasian milfoil, hybrid milfoil and parrot feather. The weevils don't have an appetite for these invasive species so they're left to grow unchecked in our lakes. They really have no natural enemies. WHAT DOES MILFOIL LOOK LIKE?

You might already know what milfoil looks like. In fact, you may have had it in your fish tank when you were a kid. It was the very fine feathery plant that grew on long stems from the bottom of your tank right up to the top forming a thick mat in which your fish could hide. To be a little more descriptive, variable milfoil, which is the species in Great Pond, grows in clumps with branching stems emerging from dense spreading roots. Stems are most often thick, robust and reddish brown in color. Small root hairs grow at nodes along the length of the stem.

Milfoil in Your Fish Tank

for two different plants.

In the spring and early summer, when the plant is totally submersed, the variable milfoil densely packed whorls of 4 to 6 around the stem. These tightly arranged delicate leaves give the plant a bottlebrush or raccoon tail appearance.

In midsummer, when the plant grows up and reaches the surface, the stems can stick out of the water 3" to 6" and form spikes. The leaves that grow on these emergent stems are solid and stiff, about 1" in length, bright green in color and usually have serrated edges. Very small white flowers can grow on the spikes.

In an aquarium the milfoil grows up from the bottom and floats on the surface creating a thick mat that can fill the whole top of the tank. It does the same thing in our lakes. Upon reaching the lake surface, the milfoil branches out in great profusion and grows horizontally creating a dense canopy.

But there is one important difference. The milfoil in an aquarium can only grow a foot or two in length. In our lakes it can grow right from the shoreline all the way out to where the water is 15 to 20 feet deep. That means milfoil could grow around virtually the entire shoreline of Great and Long Ponds and totally fill the shallower bays. The resulting thick mat of milfoil would not only greatly reduce the recreational value of our lakes but also block out sunlight to submersed plants changing the entire character of the lake eco system.

To get a better understanding of what milfoil looks like, visit the Maine Lakes Resource Center in Belgrade Lakes Village. Right inside the front door you'll find an aquarium planted with variable milfoil. While you are there, pick up a Milfoil ID card to help you identify the plant when you are on the water.

MIFOIL ACTION PLAN UPDATE

New England Milfoil has completed their second full week of work in Great Meadow Stream and North Bay in Great Pond. They have removed over 3600 gallons of milfoil! That's more than the total amount removed in 2010 and 2011 combined. So far, no significant milfoil infestations have been identified outside the restricted area. New England Milfoil will resume their work on Great Pond later this month and continue right into mid-August. The BRCA mil

foil team removed 43 benthic barriers from the stream for repair and reinstallation.

She steered me to a plant with blossoms ready to appear, but pointed far into the shrubbery and there – sitting as if alone – was a quiet, unmoving bird. People peeking at her was of no concern. As I watched, my friend explained: "I was making the bed one morning and looked out over the back, open field. There was a beautiful mallard duck flying overhear. It seemed to be seeking something but what, I could not imagine. It truly amazed me."

After that part of the story was told, she continued, "Maybe a day or two later in the garden I pulled away some weeds and right there, next to the steps into the house, this female duck was kicking dirt over what I discovered was a new egg!"

She went on to estimate there were already nine eggs and she has been wondering how long before they break their shells and take flight? I know there is no real concern because she has located a book in her own library that tells her much about the life, habits and births of Maine wildlife. To my way of thinking this small bird family has located a perfect place to start their family. Not a place more fitting than the front yard, carefully tended, is the home of the late Rev. Phillip Palmer and his delightful wife, Sylvia. The birds are as safe there as anywhere in Maine!

I recounted the story later in the day to Hallowell's historian, Sam Webber. He added a bit of historic bird-lore from his childhood in Hallowell. The story goes that Sam was helping farm the land around what is now Rollins Furniture Store. It was a chicken farm and a man by the name of Jere Snell gave Sam 3 'ducklings.' He built a home for them and tended them but, alas, when the group grew in numbers (72 in all) demands were more than he could handle - work and dollars-related and he gave the herd to the Rollins family.

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
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


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




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Cobbossee Corner —

Inspecting Boats is First Line of Defense in Preventing Invasive Plants in Maine Lakes

 \mathcal{T} ith Memorial Day Weekend, the summer boating season has officially begun! And that means the Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed's Courtesy Boat Inspector Team will be greeting boaters at 10 of the busiest launches throughout the watershed on weekends and holidays. The Courtesy Boat Inspector (or CBI) staff consists of over 20 local high school and college-aged individuals that are trained to inspect boats entering and leaving the lake for any plant fragments. Any fragments that are considered "suspicious" of possibly being an invasive are sent to the Maine Center for Invasive Aquatic Plants for official identification. This service is provided as a courtesy to lake boaters to hopefully prevent any invasive plants from entering the water body during peak recreational use periods, as well as to serve as an educational effort to encourage boat owners to inspect their own boats. Last year, the Friends CBI program inspected nearly 9,000 boats, with a total number of over 50,000 boat inspections in the programs 9-year history!

While the numbers are impressive and the success of the program is evident in the current lack of invasive aquatic plant infestations in the majority of lakes and ponds in the Cobbossee Watershed (knock on wood!), long term viability will depend on an increasing responsibility taken by boat owners. As John McPhedran of the Maine DEP Invasive Species Program notes that considering the "approximate 120,000 boats registered in Maine for use on 5,700 inland waters, the odds are that the next confirmed infestation will occur beyond the reach of the CBI program."

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This vast number of water bodies to protect, coupled with increasingly tight budgets, will necessitate individual boat owners taking an increased responsibility of inspecting their own boats. This summer, the Friends CBI team will be encouraging all boaters to take the initiative to "check your boat before (and after) you float." If we make this simple procedure a natural step in launching our boats, and share this habit with others, we will double our efforts in preventing the spread of unwanted aquatic plants!

The Friends CBI program is funded by a combination of sources, including donations by local lake associations, surrounding towns, Friend's member donations and grant funding from the Maine Department of Environmental Protection via sales of the Maine Milfoil Sticker, and a grant received from the Ram Island Conservation Fund of Maine Community Foundation. The program is also funded by several area business sponsors, including: Knowlton Hewins & Roberts Funeral Homes, Smart Eyecare Center, Kristie Rowell Insurance Services and LA Harley. 


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Summertime in the Belgrades

Conservation Too -

The 2012 field season began early this year with **L** above normal temperatures and an early spring. Work that comes in "off the street" and isn't part of an existing program seems to have increased this spring. We like to think that this is a sign of an improving economy but only time will tell.

The District would like to welcome some new faces to the Kennebec County conservation scene as leadership at some of our partnering organizations has changed recently. Each year we work closely with our partners to bring conservation work to Kennebec County. The list of organizations we work with varies from year to year but there are some groups we work closely with each year. The Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed and the Belgrade Regional Conservation Alliance are two such groups.

The Belgrade Regional Conservation Alliance (BRCA) welcomes Charlie Baeder as their new Executive Director. Charlie has worked with the District on many projects over the years and is a

familiar face for us. Currently we are working with BRCA to implement the second year of the Long Pond/Great Pond Water Quality Improvement Grant through Maine DEP. Last year the District assisted BRCA with many of the technical aspects of the project and created upwards of 15 gravel road management plans. This year, another 10 plans are scheduled as well as other work aimed at improving water quality on Long and Great Ponds. Recently we have also partnered with Charlie and BRCA on preparing grant applications for future projects.

The Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed has quickly become one of the most successful watershed organizations in Maine. Their educational programs, led by Tamara Whitmore, are top notch and like BRCA, Friends operates a Youth Conservation Crops each year addressing problem sites in the watershed. This spring, John Blouin takes over as Executive Director of the organization. John is well known in the Central Maine area for his career in the family car business. He also grew up on Cobbossee Lake and has served on the Friends Board of Directors for several years. The District looks forward to our continued work with the Friends and partnering with John and Tamara on many projects.

Boats Banned from Great Meadow Stream, Portion of Great Pond

DELGRADE – As boating season begins, the **D**Maine Departments of Environmental Protection and Inland Fisheries and Wildlife are reminding recreationists of a temporary ban of all boats on Great Meadow Stream and a portion of Great Pond in the Belgrade Lakes Region to enable effective control efforts of a variable leaf milfoil infestation on the popular waterway

The expanded surface use restriction extends from where Route 225 crosses Great Meadow Stream in Rome and Smithfield southward into the northern portion of North Bay in Great Pond. It went into effect in April and will continue through September 21.

Buoys labeled "Area Closed," deployed and maintained by DEP with assistance from the Maine Department of Conservation's Boating Facilities Division, mark the southern boundary of the restriction.

By the order, signed by DEP Commissioner Patricia Aho and IFW Commissioner Chandler Woodcock, no watercraft may enter or travel these waterways except in emergency situations or when state officials and endorsed partners are doing survey or removal work related to the variable leaf milfoil infestation.

Starting September 22, non-motorized watercraft including kayaks and canoes will be allowed in those waterways, but motorized craft will remain prohibited through the year's end.

The state anticipates the surface use restriction will limit the spread of the plant, which is Maine's most common aquatic invasive and accounts for 17 of the 23 infested lake systems documented in Maine. The restriction will also allow DEP staff and local partners including the Belgrade Lakes Association and Belgrade Regional Conservation Alliance safe space to do plant removal work.

"Temporary surface use restrictions are a rarely-used but integral tool to tackle invasives and their devastating impact. We are confident that this short-term inconvenience will have a long-term payoff in protecting Great Pond's water quality, habitat for native fisheries and wildlife, recreational opportunities and values of lakefront property," said John McPhedran, director of the DEP's Invasive Aquatic Plants program.

In Maine's largely successful fight against invasive aquatic plants, prevention is the priority. The most effective prevention effort continues to be the Courtesy Boat Inspection Program, through which the DEP contracts with the Lakes

Environmental Association and the Maine Congress of Lake Associations to train volunteers and organize a statewide inspection program. In 2011, these trained inspectors conducted 76,105 inspections on 116 waterbodies, making 287 saves that stopped the spread mostly of variable leaf milfoil plant fragments.

In an effort to bolster the Courtesy Boat Inspection Program, DEP encourages all boaters to commit to self-inspecting their boat and related equipment, which takes just a few minutes and should be conducted both before and after a boat floats. Boaters should check for and remove any found plant debris from the anchor, lines, live well, bilge, motor prop, all fishing gear and their trailer and related equipment including the hitch, trailer axle and license plate.

CSA: Community Supporting Arts



Community Supporting Arts is a program designed to highlight Maine's artists and its farming communities, as they are both vibrant, idealistic groups key to the state's unique sense of place. The project started with the belief of the Kennebec Valley Art Association that artists can use the power of their artistic voices to effect social change.

The Closing of the Brass Knocker

fter 65 years, the Brass Knocker Gift f AShop is closing. The gift shop started in the dining room of my parents' home at the suggestion of my father (Albert). He had seen all the folks walking the town from the Old Belgrade Hotel, the Lakeshore and the Locust House. My mother had quit teaching when my dad returned from the war and was a new mother with a new baby and bored. She was a Phi Beta Kappa grad from Colby and needed something to keep her occupied. The shop grew to take over the entire first floor of our house with the exception of the kitchen. When Paul Provandie renovated the Locust House to become the Village Inn he invited my mother to move the shop "downtown". It remained there until 1998 when my dad died. The owners of the Inn had decided to convert the space back in to lodging rooms. At 80, Mother was too young to give up her shop, so that winter she built the current building to house the shop. In hindsight it was a blessing in disguise as it allowed her to keep an active role in the shop until she died.....and it gave birth to Lydia's geese and all their costumes!

In 1951 my parents started going to Florida for with winter and a large part of the endeavor was The Brass Knocker Gift Shop in Boca Raton, Florida that she ran until 1981 when she "retired". Of course, that meant she would still keep her Maine shop. The Florida shop started as a seasonal shop but after three or four years was going full time. Each summer we would come home to Maine and our staff in Florida became trusted friends as well. There were two things that Mother wanted as she began to decline these last couple of years. She wanted to be able to stay in her own home (s)! and also to keep her gift shop. Last summer she was able to wash, arrange and get the shop ready on her own before her decline progressed to the point of her being able to be in the shop for just a few minutes at a time during the day. I'm



The Brass Knocker shop in Belgrade Lakes. sure you remember the story we told at the funeral of Mother making it in to the shop the very last day the shop was open and the very last customer coming over and showing Mother what she had purchased and telling how much she always loved the shop! Two days later Mother finally gave in.

It is just not possible to run the shop the way my mother would have wanted it to be carried on with me still running my own business in Portsmouth. So, we have decided to close the shop and will be selling the inventory over the next month or so. We will start with 25% off for the weekend of June 16/17 and June 23/24 and be open from 11-3 both days. We will open June 29th for about two and a half weeks and hope to have things closed down by July 15th or so. Our plan (subject to change !) is to be open from 11-3 each day. The family has decided to tithe the June sales in Lydia's memory with the funds going to the Trustees of the Union Church memorial fund.

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Fishing -

Loons, Lightning & Fish

he female loons have started sitting on their L nests already. This seems early, but then again everything is a little early this year. The first nest I saw was on Friday, May 18. We could hear the female loon making a "hoot" call, followed by the male hooting back. The "hoot" call is very specific and not very loud. The loons use it to stay in contact with each other and you'll hear it often when you come upon a nesting site. It's hard to describe, but it sounds like the loon is softly calling out a "hoo – woo – whaoo" noise. They also use this call after the chicks are born to keep them close to the nest or to find their location if they start bobbing around. So as we came around the point in this quiet and calm backwater, we could hear this soft calling and I figured there must be a loon nesting somewhere close by. I've never seen a nest in this area before, but sure enough the female was hiding in the bushes just off the shoreline. I took a picture of her and attached it with this article. It will be very interesting to monitor her progress while keeping my distance at all times. She has a lot of work to do protecting her chicks and the last thing she needs is some nosy fishermen bugging her all the time! All we can hope is that all this rain will not wash her eggs into the water. This happens often with loons because they nest so close to the shoreline. I'll keep you posted on her progress.

The fishing this past week was amazing! We focused mostly on bass and pike, but some of my friends have been fishing the Kennebec River in Waterville and Augusta for striped bass. The river is full of alewives right now and they bring the stripers up from the ocean. As for the Belgrades, they are prime-time right now for a wide variety of

fish. Smallmouth bass are on their nests now, so we try to leave the bedded bass alone. I don't like to stress them out too much this time of year, but the females are close by the beds and are biting plastic worms, tubes and jigs. We didn't get to use too much topwater last week because of the windy conditions, but the next calm day ... WATCH OUT! Largemouth bass are starting to bed on North and East Pond, making for some exciting fishing too. Fishermen who are good at casting a jig accurately can sight fish the largemouth and catch some real trophies this time of year. White perch fishermen are having a blast catching big humpbacks on all the lakes right now. Large schools of perch are cruising the shoreline and once an angler finds a school they can easily catch a bunch for a chowder or fish fry. Lastly, the delicious black crappie has moved shallow and anglers should take advantage of this beautiful fish. Crappie like to hold up in fallen timber or overhanging trees this time of year. They will also be along weed edges on dark bottom coves. This is prime spawning habitat for them. Salmon Lake and McGrath Pond are excellent choices if you'd like to chase down some black crappie.

Here's the scenario for the following story: a cancelled fishing trip, some good planning, a lot of rain, and lightning with an attitude. Add to that list a lucky but petrified fishing guide and you have one scary day on the water. If you read this column often, you'll notice that I talk about lightning and safety a lot. Partly because one of my biggest fears in life is lightning, but also because it's a good forum to talk about safety issues. This time I didn't practice what I preach and it almost cost me. The

day was going to be awesome and I was excited about the fishing trip because I was taking out a good friend of mine and his young son. But we had to cancel the trip due to bad weather. Fortunately, I'd driven my truck and trailer to the boat launch the night before so I could pull the boat after our trip was over. That piece of planning might have saved me (and my boat) from further damage. When I left my dock that morning to pull the boat it was only raining and very windy, but the weather service did issue a severe thunderstorm warning for our area. I tried to outrun the storm and get to the boat launch ... but the storm beat me there. The lightning was amazing; it was everywhere cracking loudly right over my head. I got to the boat launch, quickly secured the boat to the dock, and ran to my truck, only to remember that I left the keys to the vehicle back in the boat! One more lap back and forth and I was safely shaking inside the truck. I ended up sitting in the vehicle for about an hour and a half waiting out the lightning storm that knocked out power to most of our area. With that, I hope everyone will be careful this summer on the water and heed the weather warnings. Let's hope this close call will be the only one for all of us this year. Good luck this week!

Lnight with an itchy dog or cat. Thump, thump, thump, scritch, scritch, a SMELL involved. For some pets this is a short episode that may last only summer is prime itchy time.

For every itchy (and smelly) dog or cat we see, we need to identify WHAT is making them itch. This usually involves a potpourie of bacteria, yeast, parasites, skin oils and other discharges. For the most part, getting these under control can be done with a combination of shampoos, topical treatments and, at times, antibiotics and other medications. The longer the problem has persisted however, the more issues become involved. For example, a dog with a simple superficial bacterial skin infection who stays in the water all day and chews all night, can often end up with a more dramatic skin infection known as a hot spot. There are only so many things that rash. usually make the skin raw, itchy and nasty - when I examine an itchy pet, the WHAT is usually apparent.

The harder question to answer for many itchy dogs is WHY they ended up with the WHAT. Often the cause is clear. For example, fleas, insect bites, being wet too long, or a cut, bite or scratch might be the culprit. When the WHY is not as apparent, we need to "dig deeper" to identify the cause. What lies beneath can include allergies (including food allergies or allergies to almost anything in their world), hormonal imbalances, small parasites we cannot see (such as sarcoptic mange mites), and some uncommon issues that crop up only rarely (e.g. diseases of the immune system or cer-



f we spend enough time with our pets, eventually we all have that long tain types of skin cancer). Identifying and treating the WHY can often be the frustrating part, for most of these reasons just don't go away on their scritch, lick, lick, lick - no one gets much sleep. You feel bad for your pet, own. Often we can make a pet happier for a while just by treating the you feel bad for your sleep-deprived self, and more often than not, there is WHAT he has, but if we don't address the WHY, he'll be back itching again.

There are some nasty infections that affect the skin on the entire body of a couple of days or weeks; for others, it's a way of life. For many dogs, a dog or cat, but some of the worst problems affect only certain parts. For instance, the ears are a common spot for itchy misery on an allergic dog, or a dog with mange. Left untreated over time, more and more organisms get involved in the misery which is a canine ear infection. Another serious and painful outcome from a lot of itching, digging and licking is a raw, open bleeding area on the skin known as the "hot spot". Quickly, a hot spot can spread like a wildfire across the skin, causing more extensive damage and pain. Both ear infections and hot spots need prompt attention. Of course, as we begin to treat the WHAT, we also must take into account the WHY the dog ended up with the hot spot, ear infection, assorted skin bumps or

> Fortunately, with prompt attention, the majority of itchy dogs and cats can be given relief quickly. For those whose WHY is more involved, more extensive diagnostic tests, labwork, regular follow ups, and longer term treatment may be necessary to get to the bottom of things. A lot of folks want a quick and lasting fix to the itch. In reality, treating itchy pets can be trying and require a lot of perseverance and patience. But take heart, there is usually a WHAT that can be treated to give them relief while we are getting to the bottom of the WHY they itch and scritch and lick. -





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
