

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Visual Anchors and Touchable Bronze

Telcome to the twelfth summer season of the Spring Gallery and **V** Sculpture Garden in the Belgrade Lakes Region. Established in 2000 by Modern Art Foundry, Spring Gallery exhibits a diverse collection of sculpture and other works of art. Varying in size, edition, and price, the majority of works on display are cast in bronze but there is also aluminum, wood, plaster, some paintings, drawings and jewelry.

A word from owner, Jeff Spring...

"Modern Art Foundry is a family owned and operated fine art foundry located in Astoria, New York. We have been serving artists and communities since 1932. The company was started by my grandfather, John Spring. My father, Bob Spring, managed the day-to-day operations since the early 1970s and just around 2000, my sister Mary Jo and I began running the business. Last year we celebrated our seventy-ninth year in business and continue to provide sculpture casting in non-ferrous metals such as bronze and aluminum, commemorative design services, conservation and maintenance of outdoor and indoor sculpture, exhibition space, and educational opportunities.

We recently loaned a work to the Holocaust and Human Rights Center of Maine in Augusta and a work to the city of Waterville for outdoor display in their downtown square. Last year we also loaned an outdoor sculpture to the neighborhood church here in Belgrade Lakes. Other works cast at Modern Art Foundry and installed in Maine are the "John Ford Monument" in Portland, "General Joshua Chamberlain" in Brunswick, "Man for All Seasons - Harold Alfond" in Orono, the "Samantha Smith Memorial," and "Law Enforcement Memorial" in Augusta. This year we have the work of three Maine artists displayed in the gallery: Richard Klyver, Antje Roitzsch, and Bill Meyer."

Colby Presents Painter Alex Katz

For decades American painter Alex Katz has split his time between New York City and Maine. From July 14 through Dec. 30, 2012, the Colby College Museum of Art, which holds the world's largest collection of Katz's work, will present an exhibition focusing on the themes of the city and the country in Katz's work from the 1950s to the present.

Drawn from the Colby Museum's collection and loans, Alex Katz: Maine/New York is curated by the New York poet and critic Carter Ratcliff, an expert on Katz's work. The exhibition will include 28 paintings and one multipart sculpture and will be accompanied by a catalog published by Charta and the Colby College Museum of Art.

Katz's connection to Maine dates to 1949, when he attended the Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture. His relationship with Colby began a few years later.

A quintessential New York artist, Katz is also a summer resident of Lincolnville, Maine. Thus his subject matter varies widely, from landscape to cityscape, from rural vignette to Manhattan interior. A master of urban portraiture at its most elegant, he also paints "portraits" of trees and flowerstrewn meadows. Whatever his subject, Katz -- a painter of atmosphere -evokes the distinctive light of a particular time and place.

In Alex Katz: Maine/New York, the viewer will be immersed in the haze of a city afternoon, the flickering green

light of a rural path, the glare of a fashionable event, the dusk as it descends on a pond in the Maine woods. At every step are encounters with the remarkable people who populate Katz's

paintings. Members of his family, friends, and others who might be described as iconic figures represent the large themes that shape this artist's world -- night and day, city and countryside.

A special installation of the Colby Museum's permanent collection, selected and arranged by the artist, will complement the exhibition. This exhibition, Interior Visions: Selections from the Collection by Alex Katz, will be on view from July 14 through Oct. 7, 2012 and is the third installment of the Rediscoveries exhibition series. Rediscoveries invites members of the Colby community to offer new perspectives on the permanent collection. Interior Visions will be accompanied by a catalog featuring an introductory essay by critic Sanford Schwartz and poems by John Godfrey and Jim Brodey.

After graduating from Manhattan's Cooper Union in 1949, Katz quickly found his way to the New York art world. While most of his contemporaries were following the path blazed by Willem de Kooning, Katz took a different direction. A highly accomplished draftsman, Katz possesses a refined command of his materials. He has transformed the openness of the all-over image, which is usually abstract, into the large scale and striking immediacy of a major realist style. This transformation, along with Katz's eye for the telling detail, is demonstrated by the paintings in this exhibition.

Guest curator Carter Ratcliff is a poet and art critic who has lived in New York since 1967 and has been writing about Alex Katz for almost as long. His publications include Alex Katz (Phaidon, 2005), Out of the Box: The Reinvention of Art, 1965-1975 (Allworth Press, 2000), Alex Katz: Cutouts (Cantz Verlag, 1997), and The Fate of Gesture: Jackson Pollock and Post-War American Art (1996, Farrar, Straus, Giroux).

The museum will present three films on Alex Katz and his work Sunday, July 15, at 7 p.m. at Common Street Arts (20 Common Street, Waterville): Alex Katz Painting (1978, 28 mins.), Alex Katz: Five Hours (1996, 31 mins.), and Alex Katz: What About Style? (2003, 56 mins.).

The Colby College Museum of Art, formally established in 1959, now comprises four wings, more than 7,000 works of art, and over 28,000 square feet of exhibition space. It holds a significant permanent collection that specializes in American and contemporary art. The museum is currently undergoing an ambitious expansion of its facilities led by Frederick Fisher & Partners Architects.

Milfoil Hitches a Ride North

This column is devoted to telling the milfoil story; **I** what it is, what problems it can cause, what's being done to stop it and what you can do to help.

Non-native milfoil is an invasive plant that has the potential to greatly diminish the recreational value of our lakes, alter the balance of the eco system in our watershed and adversely impact our entire community. It's a serious threat to everything we cherish and want to protect and preserve about this area.

Last fall, variable milfoil was found growing in North Bay in Great Pond. The good news is that it is confined to a relatively small part of the lake and an aggressive action plan is underway to remove it and keep it from spreading. This column is devoted to telling the milfoil story; what it is, the problems it can cause, what's being done to stop it and what you can do to help.

WHERE DID INVASIVE MILFOIL COME FROM?

Eurasian milfoil, the species that was in Salmon Lake, was brought into this country from Southeast Asia as a fish tank plant and sold in pet stores. It's not hard to imagine how it got out. One fish tank carelessly dumped into the Potomac River in Maryland was all it took. That happened in the 1940's and its been spreading across the country ever since.

Variable milfoil, the species that is in Great Pond and Lake Messalonskee, is actually native to our southern states from Florida to Texas but very foreign and destructive elsewhere, including Maine.

All species of invasive milfoil are spread primarily by hitching a ride on boats and boat trailers. A boat pulled out of an infested lake can easily and unknowingly transport milfoil to a non-infested lake, changing it forever.

That's why the Courtesy Boat Inspection program is such an important part of our invasive plant program. And why it's so critically important for all boaters to inspect their boats and trailers before putting them in and after taking them out of any freshwater pond, lake, stream or river.

Invasive milfoil has spread throughout the U.S. all the way to our western states and into Canada. It has followed the I-95 corridor right up the east coast. Maine was one of the last states to see non-native milfoil invade its lakes. Now it's in 26 of Maine's lakes, Great Pond being one of the last to be added to the list.

Even our winters won't help. Like most perennial aquatic plants, milfoil winters over below the ice. In Minnesota, where the temperature in January regularly drops to 20 below zero, many of its renowned 10,000 lakes are loaded with milfoil.

Milfoil reproduces in three ways: by spreading along horizontal shoots, by seed and by fragmentation. The last one is the real culprit.

plant, they can stay alive in the water for many days. In that time the fragments can be moved around the lake by water currents, the wind, on a boat anchor line, a fisherman's hook or a hunter's decoy. When those fragments settle in a new part of the lake, the root hairs, that grow all along the stem, find their way down into the sediment and a whole new infestation breaks out.

It's because of this fragmentation capability that it's so critical for all of us to not only inspect our boats and trailers but anything that goes in the lake and might snag milfoil. And why it's equally important for everyone to stay out of all





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

Spindleworks Comes To Hallowell

Years ago I visited Spindleworks in Brunswick and was impressed with what that group was doing for handicapped people. Little wonder their arrival in Hallowell delighted me. Let me tell you why.

I firmly believe that every person has unexplored talent they have never known – or were interested in – embedded in their selves! That fact might be more relevant when we think of handicapped, disabled or mentally challenged people.

In 1967, "Independent Association" was founded by Maine families to assure educational programming for children with mental or physical limitations. For nearly 50 years this agency has carried out its promise to encourage, educate and display works by young people who, too often, are overlooked by the general public. Little wonder the arrival of that group in Hallowell bodes well for not only the city but for its inhabitants.

A short time ago I dropped in and surveyed all the artwork displayed on the wall, saw young people and, yes, some adults, bent over their table, paint brush in hand, creating a work of ART! It's a daily routine and, believe me, I doubt the painters are enjoying their creations more than the staff there to assist, aid and encourage them in their efforts.

Whatever their interest, music, painting, weaving or building, each artist plans whatever they do that day with assistance from the staff. It is also amazing the encouragement and help each participant receives from fellow artists. They learn but they also create a lot of friendship along the way.

Spindleworks focuses on strength, creativity, and finding one's own expressive voice, and being part of a warm, caring community is the thoughtful way it identifies itself. From what I have witnessed over the past years, Independent Association has well carried out their reason for being!

I dare say you would be as impressed as I have been in the cultural benefits this group has brought to Hallowell. Stop in at Spinoff Studios right across the street from Slate's restaurant on Water Street in this 250-year-old city and see for yourself the talent that is being initiated and the delight each has received from the efforts. A genuine plus for young people who might never have been aware of their abilities!

Not only is the artwork to see, but it is sold at the shop and at events throughout the year. The artist receives 75% of the article's cost. Can you think of


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


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

Cobbossee Corner —

Get Outside and Play

Kids don't play outside anymore. In this tech savvy world where most people are glued to their phones or tablets all day and many children would rather play video games than sports, it's no wonder there's a national problem with less and less kids playing outside.

This concept was first brought to national attention in 2004 with the release of Richard Louv's book Last Child in the Woods (first edition). In the book, Louv coined the term "Nature Deficit Disorder" which makes the connection between lack of outdoor time and physical, cognitive and emotional challenges in young people. Last Child in the Woods sparked an entire movement, including follow-up books by Louv, the creation of the Children & Nature Network and other similar organizations.

What information are these concerns based upon? According to Be Out There.org, a National Wildlife Federation movement to get kids outside, over the last twenty years, there has been a shift from kids spending most of their time outside to spending it inside with electronics, namely, kids are only playing outside half as much as children did two decades ago. This dramatic decrease in time outdoors can be connected to the United States' childhood obesity rate doubling during the same time period and the U.S. becoming the leading consumer in ADHD medications worldwide.

The solution to this concerning phenomenon is simple: Take away the electronics and encourage kids to play outside. Research has shown how important it is for our children to spend time outside. In a study led by Dr. Pooja Tandon of Seattle Child's Research Institute, researchers found that spending time outdoors is an integral part of many areas of development in children including motor, vision, social/emotional and cognitive development as well as a natural way for kids to obtain healthy Vitamin D levels and maintain a healthy body weight (http://www.dpfc.net/Blog/post/2012/05/24/The-Importanceof Outdoor-Play.aspx). Also, exposure to the outdoors and nature helps kids develop and learn about their senses because all five are used, whereas using electronics indoors only requires the use of two, sight and hearing, which can hinder the child's development (http://www.earlychildhoodnews.com/earlychildhood/article_view.aspx?ArticleID=275). Without play in nature, kids will not have as much opportunity to learn how to interact cooperatively with other children and be creative by using their imagination to make up new games to play. Lastly, if we want to ensure that our natural world is in goods hands for the future, our children need to spend enough time outside to build a relationship with nature. Wells and Leikes (2006) found that children need to participate in "wild nature activities" before the age of 11 in order to establish a connection to, and interest in, caring for the environment. Therefore, everything comes full circle. If we are exposed to nature at a young age as a fun, adventurous place to play and explore, then as adults there will be more people who have a natural desire to take care of the environment that gave them so many good experiences and memories as a child. 5

Tadpole Patrol – Making Summertime Education Fun!

This summer kicks off the ninth year of the Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed's Tadpole Patrol program. Tadpole Patrol is one of the Friends most successful educational programs with over 1300 children having attended one of the sessions held on several lakes throughout the Cobbossee Watershed.

The Tadpole Patrol program offers three different levels of lake exploration. Level 1 is the original Tadpole Patrol geared for children entering grades 2, 3, and 4. At this level, children will experience lake ecology, observe wildlife in and around the lake, and learn the basics of water testing with professional equipment! The second level is TP II- Lake Science Investigators! (LSI) and is for children entering grades 4, 5, and 6. Level 2 activities are more science based with children performing water quality tests and recording the data in their own LSI journal as well as recording their wildlife observations seen using binoculars and our underwater camera. Level 2 participants also learn about the threat of invasive aquatic plants and how to identify native and non-native plant species. TP3 - Jr. Lake Monitors is the third level offered for youth entering grades 6 and up. Level 3 is the most advanced session, where participants will be trained in proper water quality testing techniques and will compare their collected data with



data recorded by the scientists at Cobbossee Watershed District.

All Tadpole Patrol programs take place aboard the Friend's 22' pontoon boat, The OTTER II. This "floating classroom" enables participants to have a unique, interactive, and, most importantly, FUN experience that teaches them about the importance of watershed protection and water quality. 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

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Summertime in the Belgrades

Conservation Too -

o start with I need to admit that I'm a big fan L of numbers and enjoy doing arithmetic and math calculations. Since my last article most of us experienced a severe weather event also known as a "deluge of rain". We have talked about stormwater runoff before, but what does that mean other than the ditch next to our driveway may have a lot of water in it and the pond or lake level may rise a bit. What impact does our own behavior have on that? Isn't that just nature doing what nature does?

Like many things in our life if we anticipate an event and make informed decisions, we can often affect the impact or outcome. In the case of a rain storm, we can design our landscape and manage our property in a manner so that the impact on water quality is moderated. Designers and engineers as well as municipal officials, road managers and the Maine DEP refer to this as "stormwater control".

Let's start with some numbers: We measure rainfall in inches of rain. Given that most of us measure liquids in gallons or liters, it's hard to translate how much an inch of rain really is. You may also use the term CFM (Cubic Feet per Minute). ... but let's stick to rainfall.

If you have a parking area or a building roof that is near the shoreline, all the rain falling on that surface is diverted to the lowest point and then leaves that surface into a runoff area. How much water gets focused to that area? If you

and wildlife habitat along Meadow Brook. In addition, it provides for public access, and hiking and snowmobile trails.

The easement was purchased with funds contributed from the Land for Maine's Future (LMF) Program and KLT; and with support from KLT members, the Maine Department of Agriculture, Meadow Brook Farm Project Manager, Jerry Bley; and the Fields Pond and Cricket Foundations. KLT's Lands Committee Chair Bob Mohlar noted the Graf's vision:

KLT and the people of Fayette and surrounding area are grateful to have neighbors like the Grafs who have worked patiently and graciously with us to conserve this remarkable area as working farmland and forest for current and



have a 25' x 40' building or parking area, you have 1,000 square feet of area that the rain doesn't soak into. A square foot is 144 square inches. One inch of rain on that surface translates into 144,000 cubic inches (83 ft3) or about 625 gallons of water. Now consider your property. How much impervious surface do you have? An impervious surface doesn't soak up the rain but carries it off to another location. If you have a home, garage, storage shed, deck, driveway and parking area, you may have as much as 10,000 square feet of impervious area. For every inch of rain that falls on those surfaces, your property needs to deal with an additional 6-7,000 gallons of water in addition to the rain that has already fallen on the property.

How much is 6-7,000 gallons? That would be the water in a 4 foot tall above-ground pool that is 20 feet in diameter. My numbers may be only

future generations.

It Rained Hard. So What!

estimates and an inch of rain may fall over an extended period of time. But, you get the picture. And there are some areas around here that reported nearly 8 inches of rain recently. Consider how much water that is flowing off a large parking lot. It has damaging effects. See the extreme example of a field cleared just before the last storm.

Here is the opportunity to use some of those BMP's (Best Management Practices) by focusing on how to manage your yard and property. A good buffer planting, if well established, does a good job of intercepting water runoff and filtering it before it gets to the lake. Control the water runoff from your buildings or driveway and parking by diverting that water into the woods or otherwise filter it so it doesn't concentrate and transport soil, chemicals, or other toxics into the water. Make sure roadways and parking areas are designed and maintained to divert water into either filter ponds or a vegetative area where the water is filtered before it gets to the lake. Check the road surface, ditches and culverts to see that they are not simply channeling soil particles and other pollutants into the lake.

Remember, there is a lot to do in order to protect water quality.




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




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Preheat oven to 500 degrees. Lightly grease rimmed cookie sheet with olive oil or butter. Cook bacon until crisp; drain and crumble.





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




Summertime in the Belgrades



- Fishing -



The title of this week's article sums it up com-. pletely. Yes, there are such things as beautiful bugs and they are showing up all over the Belgrades right now. Let's face it, Mainers know their bugs; we live in their world. But this past week the talk of the town is not black flies or mosquitoes – we all know about them. It's the mayfly and they are viewed by many anglers as the Madonna of all bugs. There are 162 different kinds of mayflies in the State and bug aficionados study them with intense interest. If you don't know what they look like, just look at the screens on your camp or the siding on your house. Chances are you'll find a few stuck there! Fly fishermen who take their sport seriously pay close attention to the mayfly hatch simply because these bugs bring the biggest fish to the surface and make them easier to catch. Now is certainly the time to hit the lakes and ponds in the area and cast mayfly imitation flies for rising brown and brook trout. There are a wide variety of trout ponds in the area and any of these waters can produce excellent dry fly fishing, especially on a calm evening. One additional bonus to the mayfly hatch is that legions of white perch feed heavily on bugs. The perch can usually be found by searching shorelines in the late afternoon. Anglers might want to start searching the shores where the breeze was blowing into during the day. Often times the breeze will blow the bugs into the trees and then when the wind calms down the bugs will re-emerge over the water and draw the fish up.

The Kennebec River from Waterville south to Gardiner has anglers jumping for joy right now because striped bass and shad are running hard up the river. The stripers are chasing alewives and blue back herring. The bait runs anywhere from 6 - 14 inches long and lures like Sluggos and Fin-S Fish work really well. The bass also take top water lures and flies, too. Fly fishermen have been focusing on the Augusta stretch just north of the boat launch and in Winslow by Fort

Halifax Park. The Shad fishing is still hit or miss in some stretches but anglers are catching this "poor man's tarpon" in Waterville and near Fort Halifax. Shad Darts and silver steamer flies imitating bait fish have been sealing the deal on the shad. If you've never caught a shad on a fly rod, you are in for a real treat! The Kennebec has specific rules and regulations including single hook restrictions and no live bait rules, so anglers are encouraged to check the rule book before they fish. There's excellent access in Waterville, Sidney, Augusta and Hallowell, along with a variety of great shoreline fishing spots.

This week's fishing report is really tricky because of the all windy weather anglers had to endure over the past five days. The good news is that at the time of writing, the wind has started to let up and the fishing has improved. There's lots of discussion about how high pressure systems and "bluebird sky days" affect the fishing and personally I haven't decided one way or the other. Many years ago I fished with a professional bass fishermen who taught me that when the wind picks up we should throw spinner baits and

A quick update on the loons. It looks like the nests survived the high water levels and we've seen a whole bunch of baby loons riding along their parents backs. This is such good news for all of us loon lovers! Hopefully we will have a great loon count next month!

Always check with your own physician before starting a fitness routine, and look to set realistic weight loss goals.



gricultural producers are reminded that requests for 2013 assistance through Athe Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) administered by the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) are due by July 2, 2012.

The general EQIP program offers technical and financial assistance to agricultural producers, including woodland owners, to implement conservation practices such as: grassed waterways and diversion ditches, cover crops, conservation crop rotation and tillage, and mulching.


EQIP funds are available to assist producers in addressing such concerns as soil and water quality, grazing land conservation, animal waste management, forest stand improvement, and irrigation water management. Any producer engaged in livestock, crop, or forest production on eligible land may apply for EQIP. Eligible land includes cropland, pastureland and private non-industrial forestland.

For lands with an irrigation history, EQIP offers technical and financial assistance to growers for irrigation-related practices such as irrigation sprinkler systems and irrigation storage reservoirs.

NRCS accepts applications on a continuous basis. However, only applications which are received by Julty 2, 2012 will be considered for general EQIP funding in fiscal year 2013. Applications received after this date will be considered for funding in 2014.

Producers interested in the EQIP Program should visit the 107 Park St, Farmington USDA Service Center to complete an application and begin the conservation planning process. For additional program information visit the Maine NRCS website at www.me.nrcs.usda.gov.
