At 12 noon the Annual Boat Parade takes place on the Belgrade Stream. Spectators are invited to view this unique display of decorated boats, canoes, kayaks and sometimes even an amphibious car from lawns along the waterway.

In the afternoon, the focus turns toward the land parade which is held at 4 pm on Main Street. Everyone is welcome to enter with floats, bikes, old cars, and on foot.

There'll be live music until dusk when a spectacular display of fireworks is held over Long Pond.

4th of July celebrations are scheduled in other towns, too, Augusta, Winslow, Winthrop, Farmington, and in the smaller villages.

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O'er The Ramparts They Waved



The United States flag with its fifty stars for fifty states is a major symbol L of the celebrations of the 4th of July, but it didn't always have the number fifty. Looked at through the history of conflicts and wars the United States has fought the stars take on a new meaning.

Thirteen stars, of various configurations, and stripes were flown during the Revolutionary War (1775) when there were thirteen colonies in the soonto-be independent United States of America.

Fifteen stars and stripes were flown during the War of 1812 when there were fifteen states in the United States, but it became apparent that there wasn't room to keep adding stripes to the flag so the official number reverted to thirteen.

Twenty-seven stars were on the flag that was carried into the Mexican War in the mid-1800s.

Thirty-one stars decorated the flag at the beginning of the Civil War; three were added by the war's end, 1865.

Forty-five stars were on the flag at San Juan Hill where Teddy Roosevelt and the Rough Riders fought during the Spanish-American War in the late 1800s.

Forty-eight stars flew over World War I, World War II and the Korean conflict.

Fifty stars flew during Vietnam and Desert Storm (1991) and are in Afghanistan today.

In addition to the national stars and stripes that went into every conflict, each service has had its own flags.

The conflicts themselves have also inspired commemorative flags.

In 1971, the Prisoner of War Flag originated to recognize prisoners and those missing in action in Vietnam. It soon became a symbol for and continues to represent all POWs and MIAs from any war.

Two excellent and educational displays of historic flags are maintained in Augusta, at the Maine State House Hall of Flags and at the Maine State Museum. 🦘



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
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Legacies

Recently, two Waterville area residents spent five days in Kotlas, Russia to help celebrate the city's 95th anniversary. Since 1990, Kotlas has been sister city to Waterville and the surrounding towns, and the two visitors, Martha Patterson and Mark Fisher, are members of the executive committee of the Kotlas - Waterville Area Sister City Connection, the nonprofit organization that promulgates and maintains the sister city relationship on this end.

Patterson, a Waterville resident and medical technologist at MaineGeneral Medical Center, is currently the committee's co-chairwoman. Fisher, an Oakland town councilor and professional foster parent, has hosted many high-school exchange students from the former Soviet Union, and expects to host a young man from Kotlas for the 2012-2013 school year. For both Patterson and Fisher, it was their first trip to Russia and to Kotlas.

Kotlas, a city of around 60,000 souls, is situated 500 miles northeast of Moscow at 61° N, the same latitude as Juneau, Alaska. The city lies at the confluence of two broad, navigable rivers, the Northern Dvina and the Vychegda, which are comparable to the Mississippi and the Missouri. The city has a river port, a shipyard on the scale of Bath Iron Works, a rail junction, an airport, and an "electromechanical factory," which produces precision parts for aircraft and industrial equipment.

Kotlas was incorporated in 1917, the year of the Bolshevik Revolution. Every five years, the city holds a big anniversary celebration and invites the Kotlas Connection to send representatives. This year, the city held its festivities on June 12, Russia Day, which is Russia's Independence Day.

The two intrepid travelers left Waterville on Monday, June 4, arriving in Moscow the following morning. They spent that day touring the city and then took an overnight train to St. Petersburg for two more days of sightseeing before embarking on the daylong rail journey to Kotlas.

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Local Pair Joins Kotlas Anniversary Celebration

Shortly after arriving in Kotlas, they were conducted to a meeting of the Waterville Committee, the sister city organization in Kotlas. The meeting was held at public school, where a woman in folk dress greeted them in the traditional Russian manner with bread and salt and school children sang. They were then taken to a local restaurant for the first of many feasts, with toasting and speeches.

The big day itself began with a meeting with the mayor of Kotlas, where Fisher and Patterson presented him a painting of Waterville's Two Cent Bridge by Milton Christianson, a watercolor impressionist from Wellington, Me. The painting was an official gift from the City of Waterville.

They then attended a reception with representatives from Tarnov, Poland, Kotlas's other sister city. After the reception came a military band concert, an hour-long parade with an estimated 3,000 marchers, an outdoor fair with many booths, and a mayoral ball. The day ended with an amazing pyrotechnical display over the river. Some of the fireworks were shot from a boat, pating in the anniversary festivities, the sojourners visited a brick factory, a lumber mill, a kindergarten, and a squeaky clean rehabilitation center. They also made excursions to nearby towns, where they toured centuries-old Russian Orthodox churches; met Grandfather Frost, the Russian analog to Santa Claus, in his "official" home; visited an island to which Stalin had been exiled before the Bolshevik Revolution; and toured a technical college, which has a pulp and paper technologies program and which hopes to establish a partnership with Kennebec Valley Community College.

Their days were very long indeed as the visit fell during the White Nights. In June, Kotlas days are nineteen hours long, punctuated by five hours of twilight. The duo was able to get only a few hours of sleep each night, but Patterson said that she was so happy to be there that the lack of sleep did not matter.

The voyagers arrived back in Waterville in the wee hours of Saturday, June 16, tired, but happy, with many memories to share and eager to



A Delicate Plant That Causes Big Problems

This column is devoted to telling the milfoil story; **I** what it is, what problems it can cause, what's being done to stop it and what you can do to help.

Non-native milfoil is an invasive plant that has the potential to greatly diminish the recreational value of our lakes, alter the balance of the eco system in our watershed and adversely impact our entire community. It's a serious threat to everything we cherish and want to protect and preserve about this area.

Last fall, variable milfoil was found growing in North Bay in Great Pond. The good news is that it is confined to a relatively small part of the lake and an aggressive action plan is underway to remove it and keep it from spreading.

WHY IS INVASIVE MILFOIL SUCH A THREAT?

A single stem of non-native milfoil doesn't appear to be much of a threat. In fact, the plant's fine, delicate, feather-like appearance makes it very attractive in the water. That's clearly why it was such a popular fish tank plant and sold in pet stores for so many years in this country.

The problem is that when invasive milfoil gets loose there's not one stem but thousands and thousands growing in the lake and no natural enemies to stop it. When that happens, words can't begin to describe how this feathery plant can totally transform a lake from a recreational gem into a weed-infested nightmare.

The mat of milfoil that grows on the water's surface can be so thick and dense that you cannot swim in it or even get a boat through it. It makes kayaking and canoeing very difficult, and fishing a trying and tedious undertaking. Milfoil will also quickly wrap around a prop and can be ingested into an engine water intake port resulting in failures and expensive repairs.

It's abundantly clear that milfoil can greatly reduce the visual appeal and recreational value of our lakes. But the threat of milfoil reaches way beyond the water. It hurts our entire community.

A lake fouled with milfoil will be much less attractive to prospective property buyers, renters, vacationers, boaters and even fishermen. Area businesses will suffer, lakeshore property values will decline and the tax burden, now heavily born by lakeshore owners, will shift more to non-lakeshore properties.

This tax shift is not a hypothetical situation. Lakeshore property values decreased 15-20% on Lake Arrowhead in Limerick, Maine, after that lake became infested with milfoil.

watercraft have a combine head that cuts the milfoil below the surface, a conveyor system that moves the cut milfoil onto the harvester and a hydraulic lift that offloads it onto the shore. Then fight its milfoil battle at a cost of \$500,000 a year. the milfoil is hauled away in dump trucks.

Please understand that these harvesters don't kill the milfoil. They simply open up lanes so boats can get out to the deeper water where the milfoil doesn't grow. The milfoil quickly grows back in the cut areas making the harvesting not only expensive but a never-ending operation.

The City of Minneapolis, Minnesota, uses two harvesters to help manage milfoil on 5 of the 14 lakes that lie within the city limits. To start with, the harvesters cost between \$90,000 and \$200,000. On top of that, the city spends \$100,000 a year for the actual harvesting. But here's the catch. All five of their lakes on which milfoil is harvested total only 1085 acres and they actually harvest just 125 acres for "recreational access only."

By comparison, Great Pond is 8,533 acres. Long Pond is 2,557 acres. That's a total of 11,090 acres. So our potential problems and costs are many times what the City of Minneapolis is facing.

To give you some idea of what's involved in battling milfoil on a large lake system, look at Chautauqua Lake in western New York, which is just over 13,000 acres. Highly valued, just like



isheries Restoration, Dam Removal, and L'Economics on the Penobscot River" is the topic of a presentation at the Maine Lakes Resource Center in Belgrade Lakes on Wednesday, June 27 at 7 pm.

Charlie Baeder, Executive Director of the Belgrade Regional Conservation Alliance and recently with the Penobscot Trust, will discuss the science and practice of dam removal to restore the sea-run fisheries of the Penobscot River. The dam removal project got underway June 11, 2012 when Secretary of Interior, Ken Salazar, was present to launch the Great Works Dam removal.

The project is a \$60 million collaborative undertaking and represents best efforts to balance environmental and economic interests. Two

our lakes, Chautauqua employs 8 milfoil harvesters, 5 transit barges, 3 shoreline conveyors, 4 dump trucks and a summer staff of 40 workers to

According to their website, this armada of equipment removed 55 dump truck loads of milfoil in just 5 days of harvesting late last summer!

The expense to battle milfoil can quickly become overwhelming. That's why an aggressive plan is being implemented in Great Pond to keep it from spreading. We've got to contain the milfoil now before it fills our lakes and empties our wallets.

GREAT POND MILFOIL ACTION PLAN UPDATE

The BRCA milfoil crew put down 13 benthic barriers and pulled 110 gallons of milfoil last week. The Survey Crew worked primarily in North Bay. No new infestations were found. New England Milfoil will resume their work this week.

The STOP MILFOIL Capital Campaign has received \$151,380 from 184 individual donors. A MILFOIL PUBLIC MEETING is planned for Tuesday, June 26th, 6:00 PM at the Maine Lakes Resource Center in Belgrade Lakes. Dam Removal on the **Penobscot Benefits Fisheries** and Economics

dams will be improved to restore access to over 1,000 miles of habitat, all while maintaining hydroelectric power. Dam owners, the Penobscot Indian Nation, fisheries agencies, municipalities and nongovernmental organizations are all signatories to this landmark agreement to restore the fisheries of Maine's largest river.

The Penobscot River drains an area of 8,570 square miles, spans seven counties, and is Maine's larges river system. Annual runs of 40,000 to 75,000 Atlantic salmon were possible prior to the 1800s but the production potential for the river, prior to the dam removal, had declined to an estimated 4,000 to 11,000 adult fish due to habitat alteration and loss.

WHAT DOES IT COST TO MANAGE MILFOIL?

The expense to control invasive milfoil can be as onerous as the mess this plant can cause in our lakes. It is estimated that well over \$100 million is spent every year in this country in an attempt to manage nuisance populations of milfoil.

In many parts of the U.S. the only way that milfoil infested lakes can be made usable is by employing milfoil harvesters. These barge type

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Pet World — Where Does it Hurt?

Summertime in the Belgrades

I remember once having a kind nurse ask me during a hospital stay how much pain I was in. On a scale of 1 to 10, how much does it hurt? So many times since I have regretted that none of my patients could ever give me a direct answer to this question. I have seen and hopefully helped many animals who I know were in pain, but I've never been exactly sure how much they hurt or how much what I was doing was helping. I have, and continue to, rely on an educated set of clues to help me assess this. I also project my own perceptions and experience of pain. I remember how hard it was to put weight on a broken leg or pass a kidney stone. Still, it is often an assumption, or at best an educated guess, about how much an animal hurts.

For people, the International Association for the Study of Pain (IASP) defines pain as " the unpleasant sensory and/or emotional experience associated with actual or potential tissue damage". It might be a little tricky, but I think we can apply this to animals. Do they have our emotions (I believe they have many but not all of them)? Do they anticipate pain in advance from prior experience (I'm pretty sure they remember)? For the most part pain for them is like pain for us. There is no doubt that they often can't communicate clearly how much it bothers them, but they try. Dogs usually seek out their people for comfort and help; cats on the other hand tend to hide and reject attention. Both species vocalize at some point when they are in overt pain. Even within a species, this kind of vocalizing - whining, crying, growling or hissing - varies a great deal among individuals. One thing I know for certain is that the vast majority of animals are more stoic than the majority of people. I always give my patients the benefit of the doubt if I think they may be in pain.


Pain is unpleasant and even though it can warn of imminent danger, often it is unnecessary for an animal to suffer from it. Sadly it has been only in the last century that society at large has recognized that animals are sentient


beings whose behavior in the face of painful situations registers the perception of discomfort as we know it. It is not hard to understand the pain an animal experiences when suffering trauma, such as being hit by a car or having a face full of porcupine quills. It is sometimes harder to assess and understand the pain an animal has from osteoarthritis, bladder stones, torn ligaments or developmental joint disease such as hip dysplasia.

Animals are not usually vocal complainers when they have these sort of diseases; we have to look carefully at their behavior to figure out how much they hurt. Even a young dog who is reluctant to jump in the car may have severe hip pain. He doesn't appear "lame" because both hips hurt about the same. When a Frisbee appears he seems to literally forget he hurts, at least until later. His pain is as real as the elderly Daschund who can't get on the couch any more because she has slowly developed increasing pain and muscle loss from disk disease in her back. Maybe the emotional trauma to our four legged friends is about what they can no longer do. If going upstairs with you in the evening is now too painful, that's got to hurt in more ways than one.

The good news here is that veterinarians as a profession have raised our awareness substantially even in the last 25 years. In 2003 the International Veterinary Academy for Pain Management (IVAPM) was founded by some of the brightest minds in the profession to explore and understand animals' pain. They are delving into the recognition, alleviation and the prevention of pain with an ever growing determination. More effective short and long term pain medications have become approved for animals. We have grown to understand how to use these tools to manage even long term pain safely with careful monitoring, such as bloodwork. Alternative methods of relief such as orthopedic manipulation are becoming more widely available. As always, it's usually an animal's family who notices changes in his behavior. It's always a rewarding thing for me to be able to help isolate the pain and offer relief, especially when it allows your friend to go back to doing what he loves.




