MIFF Brings the World To Waterville

inephiles rejoice! Friday the 13th is your lucky day! That's when the fifteenth annual Maine International Film Festival begins. Since 1998, the festival has been bringing films and filmmakers from around the world to

Waterville for ten glorious days in July. Besides film screenings, MIFF typically includes Q&A sessions and receptions with the filmmakers, a concert or two, and other special events.

This year's MIFF features over 60 feature films and more than two dozen shorts. The feature films are a mixture of Hollywood classics and new films from Maine and the far reaches of the world, including eight world premieres. All screenings will take place at Railroad Square Cinema and the newly renovated and reopened, 810-seat Waterville Opera House.

One of the world premieres is the festival's opening film, VacationLand, which will be shown Friday, July 13, at 6:30 in the Opera House, with a repeat showing the next day at 3:30 at

Railroad Square. As the film's title implies, it was made and is set in the Pine Tree State. MIFF's website describes the film thus: "Journeying to the mountains of western Maine for a high summer

guest at this year's festival. Born in 1939, Black has appeared in more than 150 films in a career spanning more than a half century. She was nominated for an Oscar and won the Golden Globe for Best Supporting Actress for Five Easy Pieces (1970) and was nominated for the Golden Globe for Best Actress in a Drama for The Day of the Locust (1975). Both of these films will be shown at MIFF, along with her Come Back to the Five and Dime, Jimmy

Dean, Jimmy Dean (1982) and Maria My Love (2011).

MIFF's second special guest will be film editor Thelma Schoonmaker, who is this year's Mid-Life Achievement Award winner. Each year, MIFF honors a veteran filmmaker. In choosing its honorees, MIFF considers not just those who appear in front of the camera, but also those who work behind the camera or off the set entirely. Past honorees include actors Malcolm McDowell (2011), John Turturro (2008), Ed Harris (2004), and Sissy Spacek (2001); directors Arthur Penn (2010), Jonathan Demme (2002), and Terrence Malick (2000); and screenwriter Jay Cocks (2010); but Schoonmaker is the first film editor to receive this award.

A film editor is a vital, but

unheralded member of any filmmaking team. Wikipedia describes film editing as the "art, technique, and practice of assembling shots into a

coherent whole . . . [but] the job of an editor isn't simply to mechanically put pieces of a film together, cut off film slates, or edit dialogue scenes. A film editor must creatively work with the layers of images, story, dialogue, music, pacing, as well as the actors' performances to effectively 're-imagine' and even rewrite the film to craft a cohesive whole."

For her efforts, Thelma Schoonmaker has been nominated for seven Oscars for film editing and has won thrice. All but one of her Oscar nominations were for films directed by Martin Scorsese; she has edited every Scorsese film since Raging Bull in 1980. She will receive the MIFF award on Tuesday, July 17, at 6:30 p.m. at the Opera House, after which Scorsese's gangster drama Goodfellas (1990) will be shown. On Wednesday, at 3:30, filmgoers will be able to see another Schoonmaker/Scorsese film, Kundun, a 1997 biographical epic on the Dalai Lama.

Besides the new films and those associated with its special guests, MIFF likes to include several overlooked classics in its lineup. Thanks to support from the Film Foundation, a nonprofit organization founded by Martin Scorsese to fund the restoration of old movies, this year's selection of "rediscoveries" will be better than ever. Offerings include The Big Sky, a 1952 Howard Hawks western; The Chase, a 1946 film noir based on a Cornell Woolrich pulp novel; The Breaking Point, a 1950 adaptation of Ernest Hemingway's To Have and Have Not; and Punishment Park, a 1971 documentary-style feature in which the federal government

can confine hippies, Vietnam War draft dodgers, and anyone else it deems "a risk to internal security" to a southwestern desert, where they are hunted down by soldiers and police as a training exercise. The Film Foundation supplied prints for all but the last of these films.

With so many movies packed into a mere ten days, it's probably not possible for even the most ardent cinephile to see them all, but anyone who wants to try can buy a nontransferable pass for \$200 that will admit him (or her) to all public festival events. If one has less time, money, or stamina, one can get a punchcard for \$85 that is good for ten

admissions, up to two per screening, to any festival event, including the Opening and Closing Ceremonies, the Centerpiece Gala, and Mid-Life Achievement Award Presentation. Most individual screenings cost \$9 per person; admission to the special events listed in the previous sentence costs \$3 more.

One can buy full and partial festival passes and individual tickets either online, at www.miff.org, or at the door. The website also includes dates, times, locations, and descriptions for all festival screenings.

What Options Do We Have To Control This Invasive Threat?

ong before any milfoil mitigation work began in Great Pond this spring, the BLA Milfoil Task Force reviewed and studied the available control options for invasive aquatic plants.

MANUAL REMOVAL -- This as follows; was our first line of attack against the invasive milfoil in Great Meadow Stream and Great Pond. It involves waders and divers using their hands and hand tools to remove the entire milfoil plant including the roots. This is a very labor-intensive process but is the most selective and causes the least amount of damage to native plant communities. It is the most appropriate method for situations where sporadic clumps of invasive plants are intermingled with native plants, which is the case for most of the Great Meadow Stream and North Bay infestation.

DIVER ASSISTED SUCTION HARVESTER --Commonly called DASH boats, this form of manual removal makes use of Venturi pumps and hoses to transport plants to the surface after divers manually remove them from the sediment. It can accelerate the manual removal process where the invasive milfoil is growing in dense clumps. New England Milfoil is using its DASH boat to great advantage in North Bay and Great Meadow Stream right now.

BENTHIC BARRIERS - These are geotextile or heavy plastic sheets that are weighed down and placed on the bottom over clumps of the invasive milfoil to block sunlight and apply pressure to kill the plants. They are left in place for 6 to 8 weeks and then moved to allow the native plants to recolonize the area. Approximately 3,500 square feet of benthic barriers are in place in Great Meadow Stream and North Bay.

MECHANICAL HARVESTING -- This is a method used when a lake is lost to invasive plants. A milfoil harvester is an expensive specialized watercraft with underwater cutter bars that essentially mows paths through heavily infested areas to open lanes so boats can get out Herbicides can, in fact, be used under certain specific conditions in Maine. Their use is tightly controlled by the Maine Department of milfoil is much more widely distributed. All Environmental Protection.

The official DEP policy states, "DEP will use manual removal, bottom barriers, diver-operated suction and mechanical harvesting as the first options of choice. Aquatic herbicides will only be used for rapid response when none of the commonly accepted techniques will work, and when there is a strong likelihood that an infestation can be eradicated or controlled from spreading through its application."

At the end of 2009, the DEP authorized the use of the herbicide 2-4D in the outlet cove of Salmon Lake to control Eurasian milfoil. This decision was made after two years of hand pulling efforts with divers failed to halt the spread, the threat of infestation was deemed high and circumstances indicated a high probability of success. That chemical application appears to have worked. The outlet cove was surveyed in late June of this year and no milfoil was found.

Salmon Lake infestation. In Great Meadow Stream we are faced with variable milfoil, not Eurasian, the stream flow is much greater and the these conditions make it less amenable to chemical treatment.

The Great Meadow Stream/North Bay infestation does not currently meet the conditions for herbicide treatment under the DEP policy. To date, DEP has not authorized the use of chemicals for treatment of variable milfoil. While the current mandate is to use other methods, herbicides could be considered by the DEP in the future if our present options fail to control the infestation.

BIOLOGICAL CONTROL – Milfoil weevils keep native milfoils in check but don't have much of an appetite for the invasive species. Research is underway to train the weevils to add the invasive milfoils to their diet. While this work represents a promising avenue for potential long-term control, it is not considered a viable short-term option.

Our ultimate measure of success is preventing Unfortunately the conditions in Great the infestation from spreading to other parts of Meadow Stream are quite different than the Great and Long Pond. We are currently imple-

From 1590 to 1950: Two Gentlemen of Verona

The theater at Monmouth's summer repertory season continues with L the opening of William Shakespeare's Two Gentlemen of Verona on Friday, July 13 at 7:30 p.m. Love and Friendship are at odds in this youthful comedy about jealousy and the fickle nature of love.

Set in the sock-hopping 1950's, Two Gents follows the escapades of best friends Proteus and Valentine who find themselves without restraints or rules at the Duke's Court in Milan. Back home Proteus pledged his love to Julia but he forgets his vow when he meets the Duke's daughter Sylvia, who is secretly engaged to Valentine. With a bit of treachery, some boys behaving badly, a band of silly outlaws, two clowns, and one loveable dog Two Gentlemen of Verona pokes fun at friendship, falling in love and, ultimately, forgiveness.

Shakespeare's earliest comedy contains many of the themes of his later comic works: lovers overcoming obstacles as they race for the altar, lightning changes in affection, a young woman in disguise forced to woo another on behalf of the man she loves, fools who are wiser than their masters, a forest where all seem to live more freely and honestly than at court, and a happy ending with the promise of marriage. 





Conservation Too – Central Maine Youth Conservation Corps (YCC)

number of watershed Corganizations in the area employ and run youth conservation work groups during the summer months. Typically, these groups can assist with projects aimed at protecting and improving the water quality of our lakes, ponds and streams. Installation of simple Best Management Practices (BMPs) like rip rap on eroding shorelines, infiltration trenches along drip edges, buffer plantings, rain gardens and infiltration steps are jobs the various YCC groups often tackle.

Each group is a bit differ-

ent from each other but all of them can and do provide labor to get projects done. The Belgrade area YCC is affiliated with the BRCA and boasts two crews led by Field Supervisor, Clark Freeman who is leading the corps for the second straight year. The Belgrade YCC is very busy and already has a nearly full schedule for this summer. However, if you think you might have a project, it is well worth it to call Clark and schedule a site visit. Each group keeps an ongoing site list of potential projects and prioritizes work from these lists. Even if a site doesn't end up warranting YCC work, a site visit can provide



information and ideas about how to address your concern.

The Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed has fielded YCC crews since 2003 beginning with AmeriCorps volunteers and now has a crew comprised entirely of students from local schools. Jay Lindsey, a teacher and coach at Winthrop High School, leads the group and makes site visits to line up projects. Another Friends program is the Lake-Smart Start! program. Jay will visit your lakefront property to evaluate the flow of water moving across the land and assess impacts this might be having on the lake water quality. A

summary of issues and suggested solutions are given to the property owner post-evaluation, along with resources and information on how to protect your lake or pond from polluted stormwater runoff.

The China Region Lakes Alliance (CRLA) YCC groups have been working in the greater China Lake watershed (Webber, Mile, China, Three Three Cornered) for many years. This year, a small group is available to complete projects and provide assistance to landowners.

Each of the lakes the YCC groups work on has benefitted greatly from this effort. As our water quality continues to

improve, alot of credit should be given to the current crews and all of the YCC alumni who have committed their summers to this important effort.

menting a very aggressive plan to remove as many plants as possible from Great Meadow Stream and North Bay in Great Pond. This action will greatly reduce the probability of spreading the infestation. When this work is completed we will then be able to refocus our efforts on intensive surveys and removal of any plants that regrow.

GREAT POND MILFOIL ACTION PLAN **UPDATE**

Using their DASH boat, New England Milfoil removed 2,370 gallons of milfoil this week. The BRCA milfoil crew hand pulled 430 gallons. So far this summer, approximately 10,518 gallons of milfoil have been removed from Great Meadow Stream and North Bay. That compares to a total of 3,200 gallons that was removed in 2010 and 2011 combined.

The STOP MILFOIL Capital Campaign has received \$152,710 from 192 individual donors. More is need to complete our work. Please contribute.

Mayflower Hill Is Alive With the Sound of Music!

For four melodious weeks in July and early August, the halls of Colby College will echo with the sounds of pianos and violins, woodwinds and brass, sopranos and baritones as the Atlantic Music Festival returns to Mayflower Hill in Waterville. Running from July 9 to August 5, this fourth annual festival will offer area music lovers to nearly thirty free concerts and presentations.

Each year, the festival brings the best young musicians from the United States and beyond to study, practice, and perform. This year's festival will have around 40 faculty, 50-60 fellows, and about 120 tuition-paying students. The majority of the students and fellows are in their mid-20's and most are still pursuing undergraduate or doctoral degrees in music. About 65% will come from the United States; the rest from over 20 other lands, with Asian countries being well represented.

The students polish their technique through master classes, private lessons, and public performances. The festival offers programs in composition, conducting, opera, piano, and strings, as well as a catchall program for brass, woodwinds, percussion, and harp. This year, the composition program will be particularly strong, as it will have 60 participants, up from 20 in previous years.

Starting with an opera concert on Thursday, July 12, there will performances almost every night during the festival up until the final orchestral concert on Saturday, August 4. In addition, there will be some weekend afternoon performances, including composers' concerts on Saturdays at 3:00, where listeners will get to hear new works by students and faculty in AMF's composition program.

On three Saturday evenings, the AMF orchestra will perform. Last year's conductor, Jonathan Schiffman, will return for the opening concert on July 14. This performance will feature cellist Jonah Kim in Shostakovich's Cello Concerto No. 1 and Brahms's Serenade No. 1. The other two AMF Orchestra Concerts, on July 28 and August 4, will be conducted by Benjamin Scharwtz and Kenneth Kiesler, respectively, and will also feature special soloists. During the week, there will be chamber music concerts on Wednesdays and Fridays and opera concerts on Thursdays. In the latter performances, which will take place in Strider Theater, members of the AMF Opera Workshop will present art songs, opera scenes and arias, and other vocal selections.

On the last three Thursdays of the festival, night owls can enjoy "salon" concerts after the operatic offerings. With concerts starting at 9:00 p.m., this intimate performances are inspired by the parlor gatherings of the social and intellectual elite in centuries past. The AMF website describes these concerts as "a veritable grab bag of musical surprises from a variety of chamber and solo favorites, provoking a meaningful exchange: of ideas and emotions; from artist to artist, as well as from artist to audience."

Finally, festival organizers are pleased to present two performance mini-series. The first series has three presentations early in the festival's second week by three young composers — Mari Kimura, Bruce Brubaker, and Peter Gregson — who are pushing the boundaries of classical music. The second series comprises four piano concerts by piano teachers from leading conservatories, including Jerome Lowenthal of the Juilliard School and Gabriel Chodos of the New England Conservatory, as well as by AMF pianists. These concerts will be held Saturday – Tuesday, July 21 – 24, with the Sunday concert at 3:00 and the others at 7:00.

Admission to all AMF events is free, but donations are strongly encouraged. This year, all donations received at concerts will go to UNICEF's Achieving Zero Campaign, which strives to reduce childhood deaths from disease, malnutrition, war, and other preventable causes in over 150 countries.

Except for the opera concerts, all performances will take place in Lorimer Chapel, and, except where oth-

Farmers' Market Main-course Salad

1 pound baby new potatoes, halved or quartered 1 pound green beans (or green and yellow), trimmed 1/2 lb. mixed salad greens 1/3 cup fresh basil leaves 1 pt. cherry tomatoes 1/2 cup black olives (such as Nicoise) 6 oz plain or herb goat cheese, or any cheese you like

Vinaigrette

2 tablespoons red wine vinegar 1 shallot or garlic clove, minced 1 teapoon chopped fresh thyme 1/4 tsp salt 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard 5 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil S&P

Steam potatoes until just tender, about 10 minutes. Transfer to plate; cool. Steam green beans until crisp-tender, about 5 minutes. Rinse under cold water; drain. Pat dry. Mix the first 5 vinaigrette ingredients and then whisk the olive oil in slowly. Taste, add S&P as needed.





Fishing -

Long Pond Brown Trout are Biting!

The highlight of this week's article has to be the picture of Nathan Kallin holding a beautiful brown trout caught in Long Pond on June 21st with his Grandpa Pete as his guide. Now that Pete has retired from our beloved Belgrade Region Conservation Alliance, I have a feeling he's going to be involved in a lot of fish stories for many, many years to come! Pete explained that because of the high water levels the dam in the Village has been running wide open for a few weeks and some of the browns from Great Pond have been washed down into Long. Pete has caught a few nice trout recently but Nathan's fish is simply awesome! Every season a few lucky anglers catch some beautiful browns in the spillway and out in the lake. Imagine if DIF&W actually stocked brown trout in Long Pond. I think it would be an amazing brown trout fishery because they certainly seem to do quite well in there. Pete also told me that the salmon fishing has been pretty good too and while he was trolling for salmon he hooked into some pretty good smallmouth. The bass are certainly moving into deeper water now, so trolling, drop shotting or jigging is the best way to catch them.

deeper water and suspend. This is why people remark that pike lose their teeth in the summertime. Of course that's just folklore and not a fact, but it makes for a great excuse if you get skunked! Personally I have plenty of bite marks in my hands to prove the pike still have teeth in their mouth. So if you want to catch these toothy critters, your best bet is to start early in the morning or fish right at dusk. Some of the pike will slide back up on weedy flats to feed on shiners and perch etc. Last week I got to spend some time with Ed Ludwig who has a place over on Long Pond. We did some pike and bass fishing and during our trip he told me about a nice pike he caught on Long Pond while trolling a Jerry's Smelt streamer fly for salmon. Trolling is certainly a great option when you want to cover a lot of water to find suspended summer pike. While there is no doubt the pike eat salmon and trout, it seems from observation over the years that they feed primarily on bait fish and perch. Two seasons ago I was ice fishing with my friend Bill Swan who is also a Maine Master Guide and once lived here on Long Pond. We had a great day and managed to catch a pretty good sized pike on the

reef just north of Green Island. When I got that pike out of the hole and onto the ice, the fish barfed up a pile of small pin alewives. Bill and I processed that fish and had him for lunch and in the process we counted 78 alewives that were in his stomach and on the ice. It really is amazing when you think about the amount of forage in our lakes and how it sustains such a diverse fish population. But that fish proved to me that northern pike are gluttons and feed heavily on whatever baitfish are within striking range. It also proved that you don't have to use giant baits and lures to catch big pike. You simply have to use a lure that resembles whatever the pike are feeding on at the time. For example a traditional Rapala Countdown minnow has probably caught more pike that just about anything out there. It's a great lure because it sinks one foot per second after you cast it. So the angler can put that lure right in the strike zone and keep it there for a longer period of time. Nowadays they have so many different colors on the market, but I still rely on traditional black and silver and blue and silver but the "hot mustard" is slowly becoming my favorite color of them all.

A quick story: last week while guiding a group of fishermen in 90-degree heat, I decided to put on sun block. Usually I'll put the block on early in the morning or wait until we are all set and fishing because I don't want to get the scent on the fishing lures. Well, this time I forgot and put the block on while we were in the boat. The block made my hands wicked slippery and you can guess what happened next. My client caught a nice smallmouth bass and while I was taking the hook out, the bass slipped and the hook went right through my hand just above my thumb – in one side and out the other. It's the first time in all my years that I had to ask someone to rip a hook out of my hand. I don't think he was happy about it, but there was nothing we could do at that point. So I thank Tom Fallon for stepping up and using my pliers to remove that hook. It was sore for a couple of days but all's well that ends well! Be safe and good luck this week.

Ear Infections

Summer is the best time for swimming in the lake. But dogs, like people, suffer from some water-induced summer maladies. The most common issues that we see with water-loving pooches are ear infections.

When we are sensitive to the mood and behavior of our four legged friends, it is often apparent when they are feeling pain. Once the cause of the pain has been identified and the risk of reducing it assessed, giving them relief is an important next step. For traumatic injuries, often relief is needed in varying degrees for a relatively short period of time. Chronic pain may require a longer term solution.

These ear infections are caused when water (any water, even clean water) enters the ear canal and stays there. Floppy-eared dogs are especially prone to ear infections because when their ears flop over their ear canals, a moist warm environment is produced. Next, yeast begins to grow in this environment. Once the yeast colonize the ear, making a distinct odor, and irritating the skin cells, bacteria move in and the ears become very painful. The bacteria and yeast create a disgusting, soupy

mess and in just a couple of days ears can become horribly infected. Once this happens, your veterinarian will look at the bacteria and yeast under a slide to determine which antibiotic will work the best for your dog's infection and instruct you on how to clean the ears and medicate them properly.

The best way to keep your dog's ears healthy is to be proactive in preventing these infections. If your dog is going to be wet for any reason (bath, swimming, out in a hard rain), his ears should be cleaned as soon as possible. A specifically designed veterinary ear cleaner should be used. These cleaners are gentle on sensitive skin and contain drying agents so that no liquid is left behind in the ear. If your dog is prone to ear infections, his ears should be cleaned weekly in the summertime even if he isn't being adventurous, as routine maintenance.



Peoples Book Shop host a Grand Reopening, with Bluegrass music, food, and more traffic than usual.

Being off the track, as it is, The Peoples Book Shop has not been as busy as it might be if it was in a more populated area, or was just on a busier thoroughfare. It is where it is because that's where Dan Hamilton and his wife Deb live; they've been there for almost 30 years, raised 3 daughters – Kassandra, Shannon, and Josie, all of whom attended Mt. Vernon Elementary and Maranacook Community School – and have been active members of the community.

Dan, having a long history of civic responsibility, have contributed books to the Migrant Work Group of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Augusta, and these were well appreciated by the laborers. They also helped distribute free books in the Augusta area as part of World Book Night, an ambitious campaign to give away a half million specially printed books across America. Volunteers personally give out the books to non-readers and light readers. Dan passed out thirty free copies of the Hunger Games, with the hope that the book would be read and passed on to other non-readers.

"At first, we built a room of [our] barn into a small bookstore. It was either that or take a lot of books to the dump," says Dan. "We called it "The Peoples Book Shop" because we wanted it to be an active part of the Mount Vernon community. We've been struggling to keep it going, advertising in the local community weekly papers, but we still didn't get very much business. Not enough people knew it was there."

Still optimistic, Hamilton recently added a second

room to the Book Shop – a comfy little room, well-lit by windows, with room to sit and read, or enjoy a cup of coffee. To celebrate the new reading room, the The People's Book Shop is hosting a Grand Reopening on Saturday, July 21.

People who come in the door comment on the smell of Maine pine, and also on the older books that line the walls of the new Reading Room; many people pick out a particular old book and say things like, "I remember this from when I was just a little girl!" The homeyness of the Reading Room is accented with freshly cut flowers and teak furniture.

"We have books hand picked from fairs and library sales all over New England. Our prices are very reasonable, and we're always willing to barter," says Dan. "We're hoping to have Reading Groups meet here, as well as story times for children, poetry readings, and other literary and educational programs. We've been actively seeking visual artists who specialize in miniatures, too, to hang on our walls."

The shop, which has about 5,000 titles, mostly in very good to excellent condition, covers many genres: Fiction and Non-fiction; History; Science and Technology; Horror; Science Fiction; Sociology; Native American; Spirituality; War; Women's; Weird and Unusual; Gardening; Food; Classics; Short Stories; Death and Dying; Music; Health and Mental Health; Biography; Art and Photography; Activism; Entertainment (TV and Film); Mysteries; Maine Information; Maine Fiction; GLBT; among others. There are a number of antique and rare books and large print books.

The Grand Reopening of The Peoples Book Shop,

scheduled for Saturday, July 21 -Noon to 5:30 PM will present several celebratory features. The Maranacook String Band, a youthful Bluegrass band directed by Stan Keach of Rome, will sing and play from Noon to 1:00. The String Band, which started two years ago as a Gifted/Talented Music Project at Maranacook Community High School, has developed into a well-travelled professional band, with some highly prestigious Concert venues on its resume; these include The Kingfield POPS Festival; Slates Restaurant's Monday Night Concert Series; the Skye Theater (New England Celtic Arts); and many others.
