FROM THE NATIONAL GAZETTE. A new book of Travels in America, has been recently usued a London; which rivals the volumes of our old friends Weld, Ashe, Fearon, &c. It is entitled 'A Visit to North America and the English Settlements in Illinois, with a winter res-English Settlements in Illinois, with a winter residence in Philadelphia; solely to ascertain the actual prospects of the Emigrating Agriculturist, Mechanic, and Commercial Speculator—by Adlard Welby, Esquire, of South Radceby, Lincolnshire this Esquire has said enough, should be believed, to settle ultimately the point of the truth or falsehood of Godwin's notable doctrino, that we are the recruise of our numbers, chiefly to entire or tatschool of Godwin's notable doctrine, that we owe the increase of our numbers chiefly to eai-gration. No same European would venture among us, after having read Mr. Welby's book. He discovered that, in Philadelphia, hving was very dear, comfort very uncommon, and good manners still more rare. Throughout his journey, he found, in the taverus, 'a system of importmence, rudeness, rascality, and fifth rendered worm untally had. rascality, and fifth, rendered more autolerable by an antipathy to the English, in the brutal manifestation of which most of the Colonel, Doctor, and Squire keepers of these taverns, were pleased to indulge. The shooting case reminds us of a travellers story which we heard at a dinner-table abroad. A gentleman and Esquire of strict veracity, like Mr. Welby, related, in order to show how common was the calamity of the coup de soleil or stroke of the sin, in the Island of Java, that sitting once in the house of an opulent merchant of Batavia, drinking a cool glass of Madeira, after dinner, with the merchant's wife in the room, the lady was, in the twinking of an eye, reduced to a heap of ashes, by coup de soleil, when the husband observed to his guest, 'don't be a armed-we are accostommed to this, then rang the bell with great composure, and on the appearance of the servant cooly said-Boy sweep your unstress out, and brine, an clean

#### EASTPORT: SATURDAY, JUNE 1, 1822.

Boston, May 27 .- The latest accounts from England were received at this port yesterday by the British ship Simpson, Capt Simpson, who left London April 19th, and the Downs on the 28thbut he brought no papers. By Capt. Gardiner who has arrived at Salem from Liverpool, a single paper of the 20th of April has been received-but we have not been able to ascertain its mitents with any precision. It is understood to contain various reports as to the expected war between Russia and Furkey, but nothing conclusive. Capt. Simpson states his impression, from what he read in the last papers, that the prospect of peace appeared more favourable.

Custom House Law .- The National Intelligencer, contains the law on the subject of the comobjects. By this law a number of the collection districts are altered, aboli hed; the office of surveyor in Augusta, and six other ports in Maine, and 16 ports in other States, are abolished; eight ports of delivery discontinued; and the salaries herotofore allowed to the Collectors of Barustable, Nantucket, Marblebead, New-Bedford, and two other ports, are also discontinued. The per centiage allowance to Collectors in various districts is lessened; those to the Collector of Boston to onefifth of one per cent; and to that of New-York one sixth. The salaries of various officers are changed, and in most instances lessened. The emoluments of the Collectors of Boston, New-York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Charleston, Savannah, and New-Orleans, are fixed at \$4000 a year. [According to the Blue Book,' bus Collectors in Boston and New-Orleans have heretyfore received \$5000 each, and the other Collectors from \$1504 to 4234 each. By this regulation the salaries of these officers are each reduced \$500 per ann. Russia and Turkey .-- The National Gazette has the following remarks concerning the late foreign

War between Russia and Turkey would, at length, seem to be inevitable, and is so pronounced by the London editors. The reply of the Ottoman Porte, which we have copied as it has been published in the British and German Journals, and which may be supposed to be entirely authentic, leaves no alternative to Russia, but violence, according to the tenor of her ultimatum heretofore inserted in this gazette. It is said that the Turkish Divan unanimously decided to reject the proposals of Russia. Among these, it is added, was a demand, made subsequently to the delivery of the ultsmatum, that the Porte should indemnity Russia for the expenses caused by the great armaments which she had been compelled to make, in consequence of the insurection of the Greeks, and the sanguinary scenes at Constantinople.

We can with difficulty believe, that the Turkish government would have adopted a tone of firmbess and even defiance, like that of its note, had it not received some encouragement from the powers who ostensibly acted as inediators. Nor can we persuade ourselves that France and England will co-operate with Russia in the demolition of Ottoman empire in Europe; or that they will be able to maintain a neutral attitude for any length of time. The entire destruction of the Turkish voke is, we think, an object to pursuit of which, all the friends of civilization and humanity should wish sweeess, even to the Russians. A great increase of the Russian power would be the certain consequence; but another consequence would be the final substitution of European civilzation for Furkish barbarism, throughout some of the fairest regions of the globe. As for the balance of power in Europe, that has disappeared. Russia already preponderates immensly.
