Farm family members will be on hand to answer questions, discuss farming techniques and share their way of life. There may be special events such as riding a horse or milking a cow.

Open Farm Day is a day to appreciate the dedication and hard work of those who provide the food, the fiber, and the open spaces that are so admired throughout this beautiful state. On Sunday, July 22 it's time to take time visit a Maine farm.

Some of the Open Farms that are an easy day trip in central Maine are listed below. Visit one and linger or visit several and learn about a vari-





ety of locations and lifestyles:

Belgrade: Winterberry Farm, Route 27 - a 40-acre farm built in 1870 on Great Pond, oxen-powered and organic. Large gardens with vegetables, flowers, tomato growing house, two hi-tunnels for allseason growing; 150-year-old barn has horses, sheep, cows, chickens; farm stand sells veggies and pies; wool spinning and knitting display, bee demo. 9 am-5 pm.

- Augusta: Spinakees Fiber Farm, 1180 Tasker Road sheep, goats, rabbits, silky chickens; demonstrations on spinning, knitting, felting, dyeing, crocheting; kits for sale; photos with animal of choice \$5.10 am-3 pm.
- Mount Vernon: Dream on a Stream Alpaca Ranch, 443 Bartlett Road hands-on experience why they chose alpaca and how their fiber is processed. 10 am-3 pm.
- Mount Vernon: Echo Ridge Cheese, 2080 North Road, Cow



Legacies

The Curtain Rises on a Newly Renovated Opera House

Pilmgoers at this year's Maine International Film Festival may notice a number of changes large and small to the Waterville Opera House. The storied theater is winding down a year-and-a-half-long renovation and expansion.

Completed in 1902, the Waterville Opera House has hosted countless countless concerts and stage plays, but by the start of its second century, this grand old theater was showing its age. Indeed, until the start of the current renovation, the only significant upgrade had been the replacement of the seats on the main floor more than a quarter century ago.

Thus, in 2009, Opera House began a \$4.9 million fundraising campaign. Thanks in large part to a \$2.3 million matching grant from the Harold Alfond Foundation, the organization had raised enough money by the spring of 2011 to start the work. This led to a yearlong closure of the hall, which ended triumphantly with its gala reopening on the last Friday in April.

The changes most visible to theatergoers are in the lobby and in the balcony. The lobby has been expanded and refurbished, with new restrooms and a concession stand.

In the balcony, the century-old seats have all been replaced. The new seats are more comfortable and are level, so that patrons in the side balconies will no longer feel themselves sliding toward the

In addition, the balcony aisles and the staircases leading from the side balconies down to the front of the house have been widened, allowing balcony patrons to leave the theater more quickly and more safely.

Another important change will benefit the actors. The three levels of dressing rooms on either side of the stage have been torn down. No longer will actors have to climb rickety wooden stairs to get to small, dingy, waterless changing spaces! New dressing rooms with toilets and showers have been built in a second-story addition on the north side of the building. The rooms are of varying sizes to meet the needs of different casts.

Four other changes will expand the range and number of events the Opera House can offer:

- The theater now has its own digital projector and a motorized screen that is mounted above the stage and can be raised and lowered on command. No longer will MIFF need to rent equipment especially for the festival, and the Opera House will be able to host special film screenings at other times of year. By fall, the venue expects to have a satellite dish as well, so that it can receive live high-definition broadcasts, such as of operas and plays from world-renowned companies.
- Thanks to a new set construction shop in a ground-level annex below and to the left of the dressing-room addition, sets will no longer have to built on stage, opening the stage to other uses until just before a major production.
- The addition of a freight elevator means that set pieces, instruments, and other large equipment will no longer have to be hauled up the stairs. Having the freight elevator and the set construction shop will enable the Opera House to host more frequent and more varied events by touring artists.
 - By October, the theater will have a portable

thrust stage that will extend over the orchestra pit. Designed so that it can be easily put up, taken down, and put away, this extension will allow the stage to hold an orchestra of fifty players — ten more than it can easily hold now — as well as permitting chamber groups to sit farther out, so that their sound will project better.

Although the renovations are almost done, the Opera House still needs to raise \$600,000. For a donation of \$250 or more, you can "buy" a seat and have your name or that of a loved inscribed on a nameplate. If you would like to what your dollars are buying, including the parts of theater that the public normally does not see, you can tour the theater and its backstage during the Taste of Greater Waterville on Wednesday, August 1, at noon or 4:00 p.m.

After MIFF, the rejuvenated venue will host a number of exciting events in the next few months. On July 27 and 28, the Bossov Ballet Theater will present Cinderella, and on August 11, the folk-rock band Cowboy Junkies will play. From July 30 to August 18, there will be three week-long theater camps for children entering grades 1-8.

On September 12, singer-songwriter Mary Chapin Carpenter will perform, and ten days later, the Colby Faculty Jazz Ensemble and guest artists will present a free tribute to Herbie Hancock. In October, the perennially popular Inland Hospital Fall Pops Concert will return, and just two days after the November election, the singing satirists The Capitol Steps will entertain. Also in November, the theater will present two musicals: Jekyll & Hyde and Scrooge!



Film Festival's Closing Days Have Much to Offer

Although the Maine International Film Festival is winding down, there's still plenty to experience at Railroad Square Cinema and the Waterville Opera House. The festival's closing days will bring the visit of the third of this year's three special guests, an assortment of Maine films, and other special events.

While most of MIFF's special guests have been actors or directors, Jim Stark is a producer. A producer guides a film through all phases of production, securing the rights to the story, obtaining financing, and hiring the director and other key crew members. MIFF's website describes Jim Stark as "one of the bedrock producers of TRULY independent cinema for the past several decades."

During the festival's final four days, four Jim Stark films will be screened: *Mystery Train* (1989), which relates three intertwined tales of foreign tourists in a seedy, Memphis motel; *Cold Fever* (1995), in which a young Japanese man travels to Iceland in honor of his parents who drowned in river there years earlier; *In the Soup* (1992), where a down-and-out screenwriter falls in with an unscrupulous producer; and Stark's newest film, *The Pier* (2011), in which an Irish curmudgeon claims to be dying to lure his son back from America to collect the old man's debts. Check the festival's website, *www.miff.org*, for complete descriptions and screening times and locations.

Those who want to enjoy the "Maine" in the Maine International Film Festival will have ample opportunity on Saturday, July 21. The day begins at 12:30 at the Waterville Opera House with the Maine

Student Film & Video Festival. This contest is open to Mainers 19 and under in three age divisions: Grades K–6, Grades 7–8, and Grades 9–12. Aspiring filmmakers may submit shorts in any genre to be judged on "originality, content, style, and technique." The makers of top films in each age division will receive awards, and a grand prize winner will get a \$2,500 scholarship to study filmmaking. Those who prefer the work of older Mainers can watch a collection of Maine shorts at 3:30 at Railroad Square Cinema. These latter shorts will repeat Sunday at 3:30 at the Opera House.

Also screening at Railroad Square on Saturday are three Maine-made feature films, all of which have their world premieres at this year's MIFF. At 3:00, one can see *Dreamcatcher*, a "fantasy on the art of dreaming as seen through the lens of contemporary dance" choreographed by Colby College's Tina Wentzel and John Ervin. At 6:30, there's *Hardwater*, a documentary on ice fishing that follows a septuagenarian Central Mainer on his quest for landlocked salmon. Finally, at 9:30, comes

Nor'easter, a drama filmed and taking place on Vinalhaven that centers on a young priest who is visited by a mother who wants to hold a funeral for a son who has been missing for five years. When word of the funeral becomes public, the boy suddenly reappears, seemingly unharmed, but refusing to talk about his absence.

There are two other noteworthy events take place in the festival's final weekend. At 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, "alternative-country" singer-songwriter Jim White will make his Maine debut after a showing of Searching for the Wrong Eyed Jesus, the 2003 documentary in which he stars and which introduces the viewer to some of the grittier places and people of America's South. Finally, on Sunday at 7:00, comes MIFF's gala finale, which will include a screening of Chicken with Plums, a mostly live-action adaptation of a graphic novel by Iranian expatriate Marjane Satrapi, who previously gave us the animated, autobiographical, and Oscar-nominated Persepolis. Set in Tehran in 1958, the present film is a darkly comic tale of a moody musician, who, when his beloved violin is damaged in an argument with his wife, takes to his bed to contemplate his past and envision his children's futures.

Both of these events take place at the Waterville Opera House. Admission costs \$15 for the Jim White concert and \$12 for the closing ceremony. Except for the student video festival, which is free, admission to the other screenings mentioned in this article is \$9. 





Old Hallowell Day 2012, Saturday, July 21, is also the celebration of Hallowell's 250th anniversary this year, and like many special celebrations the festivities begin the day before. On Friday, July 20, there will be an opening ceremony and raising of the 250th Anniversary flag in front of Hallowell City Hall at 11:30 am. Water Street's many boutiques, shops, galleries and historic sites will be open and welcoming. At 4:30 pm a typical "Heavenly Bean Supper" at the Old South Church will be held until 6:30 pm.

Saturday's calendar of events starts at 6 am with a 5K Road Race and ends after dark with fireworks. In between the schedule is packed with activities and events, food, fun and fundraisers, sales and markets, arts and crafts everywhere, competitions, a large parade, and music throughout the day. The parade down Water Street will start at 10 am. The live bands begin at 11 am.





Gallery and view the current show. Even if it may be closed you can peek in the windows and spot a fascinating piece of art.

Having done that, seeing the trails and waterfalls in the nearby Vaughan Woods could get you away from traffic. The wooded area with many amazing trails and plants surely will awaken your appreciation of the natural beauty of the area - both in Hallowell and in Maine. Walk as long as you like because you are not far from civilization and almost certainly you will meet strangers who will stop and chat because, as you probably know, Hallowell is alive with interesting people.

One of the "stops" I strongly suggest is a visit to Hubbard Free Library. I say this because I had a fascinating experience one day, years ago, when I was loitering along Water Street. A well-loaded travel bus pulled up along the street where I was standing. The door opened and a collection of laughing ladies exited. Being a curious individual, of course, I asked them if they were here to visit.

"Oh no," a lady responded, "We have been to a quilting 'bee' in Bangor and are on the way home. We have heard a lot about this city so we asked the driver if we might stop to look around – actually all of them seemed to be a bit tired of 'sitting!" she chuckled.

That quilting statement caught me.

"Have you ever seen a wood quilt?" I asked.

"Heavens, no - who would make a quilt of wood?"

"A group of men, both carpenters and artisans, meet regularly to show their creations and talk about their work. They are a great gang of men. Recently one of the members passed away and, to honor this man, each created a wood square with a unique design on it. The twelve pieces were mounted and it hangs on the north side of our Hubbard Library wall. The library is on the corner of the next street. Turn around and you can see it! I'll take your group there if you would like to see it!"

That did it. The ladies returning from the Bangor area, as I recall, went home to tell other "quilters" about the art work at Hubbard Library—as well as Hallowell's other characteristics.

Hallowell is not a lot different than other small Maine places. The same qualities of friendliness and helpfulness remains in our small communities and these gems are as easily passed along to strangers as a wave to the guy who stops his car to allow you to walk across the street. I hope these simple acts of hospitality never fade into electronic

William's bittersweet semi-autobiographical account of his coming of age in 1930's St. Louis is told from the perspective of his literary surrogate, Tom Wingfield, who serves as both narrator and the lens through which we experience the Wingfield's plight. His dilemma forms the central conflict of the play as he faces the agonizing choice between responsibility for his family and living his own life. Williams, having "a poet's weakness for symbols," fills the play with imagery: the glass menagerie, in its fragility and delicate beauty, is a symbol for Laura; the fire escape is most closely linked to Tom and to the theme of escape; even the theme of memory is important. For Amanda, memory is her anchor, her escape into a kinder, gentler time. For Tom, the older Tom who narrates the events of the play, memory is the thing that cannot be escaped.

TAM's Associate Artistic Director and veteran company member Bill Van Horn takes on the role of director for this classic American drama. A fixture at TAM since 2001, Bill also frequently acts, directs, and writes for Pennsylvania's acclaimed Walnut Street Theater. "What elevates *The Glass Menagerie* from mere confessional to great art," Van Horn states, "is the probing honesty, deep understanding, and loving tenderness with which Williams creates and caresses these four characters as they reach for happiness." *The Glass Menagerie* features Dustin Tucker as Tom, Janis Stevens as Amanda, Ambien Mitchell as Laura, and Camden Brown as Jim. Set design by Dan Bilodeau, costumes by Jonna Klaiber, sound by Rew Tippen, and lights by Lynne Chase.

Written in 1943, *The Glass Menagerie* was William's second play to be produced and the first of a series of successes, including Pulitzer Prize and New York Drama Critics' Award winners *A Streetcar Named Desire* (1947) and *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof* (1955). Williams is acknowledged today as one of the most accomplished playwrights in the history of English speaking theatre.

Conservation Too -

n the past years the focus on protecting our ■ lakes, ponds and streams from invasive aquatic plants has remained consistent. As most people recognize, and articles in this newspaper attest, efforts to control the spread of invasive milfoil and other waterborn plants need to also be persistent.

Not to diminish this effort, but.....

I want to save and focus some of our energy for other invasives, particularly terrestrial invasives. While we seem consumed in our efforts to control aquatic invasives, we need to point out that there is a lot more land cover than water cover, even here in Kennebec County. In fact, the Belgrade Watershed, both the water and the land, is approximately 96,345 acres. Of that only 16,853 is water covered [17%]. And of that water, less than 5,500 acres will support milfoil growth [water depths of over 15 ft do not often support milfoil]. In the Cobbossee Watershed, water and land is approximately 127,858 acres. Of that only 14,260 is water covered [11%]. And of that, less than 4,700 acres will support milfoil growth. These are rough estimates but make the point that the land base is far larger than the "milfoil threatened" area.

Point being that there is a great deal more land that is being invaded than water.

What are the culprits? Well... this year seems

to have a substantial increase in my yard of Multi Flora Rose, Japanese Knotweed [bamboo] and Japanese Barberry. Speaking to others, I've discovered that their back yards are also feeling the pressure of these invasive plants. Naturally, there is a long list of other invasive plants [check out http://www.maine.gov/doc/nrimc/mnap/features/invasives.htm for both a list and pictures]. I've only mentioned a few here.

In most cases, trying to control their spread is not much easier than the methods used for aquatic plants. First you need to recognize that there is a problem. That occasional plant out back which has some interesting foliage and a pretty flower might become a thick bank of vegetation as you leave it be for the next couple years. Take a look along abandoned fields and note the occasional clusters of white flowers which indicate Multi Flora Rose. Next year that small patch of white flowers will be joined by additional mounds throughout the field. They are likely to be joined by some Autumn or Russian Olive, or perhaps some invasive Honeysuckle. Before long that abandoned field has become a breeding ground of fruit and seeds which get spread to neighboring properties. As Harry Potter's professor, Mad Eye Moody, would say, 'constant vigilance'.

Our natural landscape is part of what Maine is all about. Its future depends on the choices we make. When buying plants or moving them from place to place consider whether the plants are likely to escape. Plants advertised as fast growing, prolific, and tolerant of many growing conditions are often the ones that become invasive. Maine just won't be Maine if the plants dominating our landscape are all from away.

- Ask your local garden supplier to include more native species.
- Replace invasive plants in your garden with non-invasive alternatives.
- DO NOT attack the problem with indiscriminant herbicides. They may have a place in the battle but they are not a magic bullet. Be careful with their use.

Remember, there is a lot to do in order to protect water quality.

Remediation For Phosphorus-Loading


Maine Apple Expert to Speak in Belgrade Lakes

Tohn Bunker is known as the "Johnny Appleseed" of Maine. A published author, with a passion for rare varieties, John has become the Northeast authority on identifying historic apples from hidden fields and forgotten farmsteads. He will be speaking at the new Maine Lakes Resource Center in Belgrade Lakes on Thursday, July 26 at 7:00 pm. His subject will be the history of apples in Belgrade.

A hundred years ago, Belgrade was one of Maine's largest apple producers. Family farms were known as much for their types of apples as they were for their family name. Many of these old varities have stood the test of time, often more hearty or disease resistant than their tender modern counterparts. Each apple had its own special quality, such as being a good keeper or possessing complex delicious flavors. made the best pies or the best cider or fritters or even "bird's nest pudding."

Having spent many fond years at Camp Merryweather on Horse Point and as a camper and counselor at Pine Island Camp, John has returned to Belgrade many times in his hunt for rare varieties. His co-worker from Fedco Trees, long time Belgrade resident Laura Childs, has been working closely with him in his quest to find, identify and chronicle the oldest apples in the area. With the help of enthusiasts all over town, they have made with some very exciting discoveries.

Laura and John and others have grafted several of the most rare Belgrade apples onto young rootstock. They plan to create a Belgrade Historical Orchard in the coming years. They will also include these varieties in the Maine



Organic Farmers and Gardeners Orchard in Unity, Maine. And they hope to work together with others to re-establish these rare apples in Belgrade yards and farms.

Recipe of the Week from Sue Gawler's Collection

Summer Berry-Cream Tart

Crust: use a 9" tart pan with a removable bottom (preferable), or a 9" pie pan which you've greased (works, too)

- 11/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 7 tablespoons cold unsalted butter, cut into 1/2-inch cubes
- 1 large egg

Pulse all in a food processor just until mixture is coarse crumbs. Press evenly onto bottom and sides of pie or tart pan. Freeze for an hour or so. Put frozen shell into a 425-degree oven for 5 minutes then turn heat down to 375 for 15 minutes. Once it is out of the oven, brush hot shell with some beaten egg white to prevent sogginess. Cool thoroughly before filling.

Filling:

- 15-oz tub plain goat cheese
- 4 oz Neufchatel cheese (or cream cheese) at
- 1/3-1/2 cup Greek yogurt (depends on consistency you like)
- 3 Tbs local honey
- 1 tsp or so lavender flowers whizzed in a blender to a powder (optional)

Beat all together until smooth. These two steps can be done ahead of time, just refrigerate.

3 cups perfect berries: raspberries are the original and are totally fabulous, but this tart can be made with strawberries, black raspberries, or blueberries as well.

Slightly warm another 2 Tbs of honey and drizzle over the berries. (Never warm honey in the microwave - set it in a pan of hot water instead.) refrigerate until serving time. Be transported.

n Friday, July 27, the Center For All Seasons on Rte. 27 in Belgrade Lakes will ring with the sounds of fiddles and banjos, as The Sandy River Ramblers, one of Maine's premier Bluegrass acts, hosts Banjo Dan and the Mid-nite Plowboys, a widely respected and well-loved Vermont band now celebrating its fortieth year.

Among its many accomplishments since its beginnings in 1972, the Plowboys were the first American Bluegrass band to tour the Soviet Union (1988), and have toured extensively in Western Europe, Canada, and the United States. Twelve critically acclaimed albums include the band's latest, "Fire In The Sugarhouse," which Bluegrass Unlimited Magazine has called," a superb collection."

The Plowboys consist of Banjoist Dan Lindner, a stellar picker, and an award-winning songwriter, whose originals, many of which have a Northeast theme, spice up the Plowboys' repertoire; (Dan's brother) Mandolinist, songwriter, and vocalist Willy Lindner; Guitarist "Big Al" Davis, also a fine vocalist, songwriter, and emcee; Fiddler Phil Bloch, an inventive soloist; and Bassist Jon Henry Drake, featured on high lead and harmony vocals. Simons and fiery Fiddler Jay Smith add fiery solos that are creative, but solidly in "the tradition."

The Ramblers performance will feature many songs from the new CD, "Cry Of The Loon And Other Original Songs About Maine," a collection of "Lobsterman," a tragic lost at-sea story, is given a songs by Stan Keach. While many of the songs are solidly Bluegrass, a few are not.

"We shaped these songs according to what the The Sandy River Ramblers has been entertaining song needs," says Keach, a nationally-known Maine audiences since 1983. Stan and Liz Keach Bluegrass songwriter who's written songs for some (Guitar and Bass), from Rome, and Banjoist Bud of the biggest names in Bluegrass. "Some of the Godsoe, from Madrid, have been Ramblers since songs - "Up On Little Round Top" for instance, the band's inception. Virtuoso Mandolinist Dan which is about the 20th of Maine at the Battle of Gettysburg, and "The Brady Gang," which is about a gangster who was gunned down by the FBI in Bangor in 1937 - are straight-ahead, up tempo fiddle-and-banjo driven Bluegrass more folky treatment, because that seemed to be what the story needed."

Some of the Maine songs, particularly the comedy numbers, like "Boots From L LBean," which has been aired on Maine Public Radio, and "Slow Down (You'll Hit A Moose)" are driven by a beat that falls somewhere between Do-wop and Acoustic Rockabilly. "It's all about what will make the song tell its story," says Keach.

Keach and Simons also play with The Maranacook String Band, a group of mostly teenagers, whose debut CD, "Bear In The Barn," has been widely praised for its highly polished stirring vocals. It's possible that one or two youthful performers from the String Band may show up as surprise guests at this Concert.

It's very difficult to describe exactly how awesome this past week was, but I'll give it a try. First, the fishing was off the hook! Second, the weather amazingly cooperative and lastly (but most importantly) I got to fish with some of my best summertime friends! What more can an angler ask for?

Anyone who was here in the Belgrades since the 4th of July realized how horrifically hot the temperatures were and oddly enough we didn't get any evening thunderstorms to cool us off. But the fishing was really excellent for the most part and you didn't have to get up early or fish late to enjoy top-notch angling. It was a wild week of exceptions! As you can see by the photos, some really big pike were caught this week. The interesting (and quite baffling) impression these fish left on me was that they were caught in completely different areas using completely different fishing methods. For example, the giant pike that Ed Ludwig is holding was caught on Long Pond in deep water while trolling for salmon. The picture of Hayden and Jim Savage is of a giant pike they caught in 3 feet of water at high-noon on a 95-degree day! Go figure eh'? I guess you never know when or where these big brutes will show up! One thing is for certain though; the majority of the larger smallmouth bass have moved to deep water and are staying there. We haven't seen too many big smallies come off shallow shorelines in a couple of weeks,

but we did catch some nice bass on tubes in about 15-feet of water this week. Black tube jigs seemed to work the best. It was interesting to note that black was the primary color last week. Usually when it's bright and sunny out, lighter colors work best. You know the old adage: light when it's light and dark when it's dark. That didn't really work well this past week. We were throwing watermelon and black with red flake tubes and worms and the black ones out fished the lighter colors significantly! I hope everyone gets out this week and enjoys the great fishing and wonderful summer weather – good luck! GET THE LEAD OUT!

I was visiting the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife the other day and saw a pamphlet titled "Get the Lead Out – Protect Our Water Birds." So I picked up a copy and read though it. I knew that the no-lead restrictions were created in an effort to save loons, but was hoping to learn a bit more about the topic. Basically the gist of the information was that loons and lead don't mix and that every year loons and other water birds die of lead poisoning because they eat small lead sinkers. What I did not know is that lead poisoning is the number 1

killer of adult loons in Maine. That was shocking to me because I always figured either boat traffic or predation by eagles, snapping turtles, etc would kill more loons. A quick story: last year while fishing on Snow Pond we came upon a loon acting strangely. It was flopping around and doing some kind of odd dance on top of the water. I looked through my binoculars to see what was up and came to the conclusion that the loon was tangled up in fishing line. It definitely was having a problem with its left foot. Well, when we got closer we realized that a small snapping turtle was latched on and wouldn't let go. It was actually kind of funny to see the loon try and throw that turtle off her foot. Eventually the turtle let go and all was well again, but I bet that hurt! So back to the pamphlet – it appears that once a loon gets lead poisoning it is certain death. Anglers can help by not using those old lead split shots in your tackle box and start using the new tin or steel choices that are on the market. They may not sink quite as fast, but if it saves just one loon, it's worth it!

United Way of Mid-Maine to Host "Dog 'Daze' of Summer" Community Event






3:00 p.m.) where travelers can relax and enjoy an ice cream at Tubby's.

n Wednesday, August 8, the Mid-Maine Global Forum will culminate another year of bringing expert speakers on Global Topics to central Maine with its annual dinner and a Keynote Address by Dr. Edwin M. Truman, Fellow, Institute Peterson International Economics.



Dr. Truman

Dr. Truman's presentation will focus on "Will the Euro Survive? A Perspective on the European Sovereign Debt Crisis."

Over the past two years, the European debt crises have been the single greatest drag on economic

recovery not only in Europe but also in the United States and the rest of the world. In his remarks, Truman will trace the origins of their

crises against the background of sixty years of Market Committee. European economic integration, the resulting incomplete economic and monetary union in international groups working on economic and Europe, and the birth of the euro 13 years ago.

The causes of the specific euro-area country crises are many, but collectively they pose an existential threat to the euro and to the future of the European integration project.

Will the project move forward and, if so, in what form? Or will Europe break apart and with what consequences for the global economy and financial system? What are the social implications for people in Europe and the United States? Dr. Truman hopes to clarify the issues and assess prospects for the future.

In addition to his position as senior fellow at Peterson Institute for International Economics since 2001, Dr. Truman has served as assistant secretary of the U.S. Treasury for International Affairs from December 1998 to January 2001 and returned there as counselor to the secretary March to May 2009. He directed the Division of International Finance of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System from 1977 to 1998. From 1983 to 1998, he was one of three economists on the staff to the Federal Open 6:15 pm.

Dr. Truman has been a member of numerous financial issues, and has been a visiting economics lecturer at Amherst College and a visiting economics professor at Williams College. He has published on international monetary economics, international debt problems, economics development, and European economic integration. He is the author, coauthor, or editor of "Sovereign Wealth Funds: Threat of Salvation?" (2010), "Reforming the IMF for the 21st Century" (2006), "A Strategy for AIF Reform" (2006), "Chasing Dirty Money: The Fight Against Money Laundering" (2004), and "Inflation Targeting in the World Economy" (2003).

Dr. Truman earned a BA from Amherst College, 1963, and a Ph.D in economics from Yale University, 1976.


