ANNUAL REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF OLD ORCHARD:

The Board of Health submit the following report for
the year ending Jan. 31, 1916:

A Clean-up campaign, which was conducted successfully in the Spring of 1914, was repeated last Spring, the week of April 19th having been devoted to the work which is so necessary when large accumulations of rubbish have collected during the Autumn and Winter. The Allen team was employed six days on that job, then one day the middle of May, and started the regular Summer schedule June 21st, which was continued through Sept. 11th, the whole time being 75 days, during which 200 loads of rubbish and 33 loads (about 500 barrels) of garbage were removed. The one-horse cart was started at Ocean Park July 5th and stopped work Sept. 6th, 53 days in all, and collected 86 loads of garbage and 57 loads of rubbish. The Milliken team began collecting garbage July 19th and continued until Sept. 8th, with the following record: 12 days in July, 25 loads, 319 barrels; 26 days in August, 55 loads, 886 barrels; 4 days in September, 8 loads, 104 barrels. Totals, 42 days, 88 loads, 1,309 barrels; average $31\frac{1}{2}$ barrels per day.

The teams should have been started earlier in the season and continued longer in September; but we did not have an appropriation sufficiently large to accomplish the desired results. The fact that the Summer business was below the normal, with a much smaller number of visitors than had been confidently expected, and by exercising

rigid economy, we have been able to get along with only a small overdraft, and even this we tried hard to avoid. The sanitary conditions here have been improving each succeeding year, the construction of additional sewerage systems being of great importance in this respect. The healthfulness of Old Orchard has been maintained at the high standard that has prevailed for many years, thereby enhancing the good repute of this town. There have been only a very few cases of contagious diseases.

The demands upon this department are multiplying each year, as Old Orchard is developing, and the amount of garbage and rubbish to be disposed of is increasing rapidly. Hence, more liberal appropriations must be made in order properly to meet these requirements. The taxpayers in towns and cities generally, and health resorts particularly, are realizing more fully in the present age that they must be fair and generous in providing for adequate sanitation.

Last March we asked for \$1,600, but were denied our request, some of the voters evidently not understanding the situation. Instead, the appropriation was for \$1,200, which was manifestly insufficient last year; and with the present outlook for the year 1916, we ask the voters, in fairness, to grant an appropriation of \$1,600 at least, which was considered only a reasonable amount a year ago.

Numerous complaints relative to nuisances have been investigated, and all such have been abated, so far as possible. We appreciate and value greatly all the assistance that has been rendered us in any way.

SCHOOL REPORT

TO THE CITIZENS OF OLD ORCHARD:

I hereby submit my second annual report of the schools of Old Orchard. I am pleased to report that the progress in all of the schools during the year has been steady and satisfactory. The aim this year has been, not so much to inaugurate new methods or ideas, but more to increase the attention to essentials and by intensive work to strengthen the system which has previously been instituted.

The principal change during the year has been the extension of our instruction in music. This branch of study now is given in all of the grades, as well as in the High School.

In the High School, no changes have been made in the curriculum during the past year. The teachers in the school, through the greater knowledge of conditions and needs gained by their continued service, have been able to gain most satisfactory results in the intensity and efficiency of the work accomplished.

RECOMMENDATIONS

As is well known, there is a most commendable movement toward the construction of a new building which will provide accommodations for our entire school system. This movement is one of far-reaching results and importance to the town and as such has the hearty support of the school authorities.

However, feeling that a movement so important as this will take considerable time for its completion, I wish to call to your attention one great need of the schools of your Town which must be met immediately. I refer to our Primary School.

The present Primary School building is inadequate for our present needs. Not only is it too small for the accommodation of all the pupils who wish to attend during the year, but its sanitary condition should be remedied. Thus, unless the proposed new building can be erected speedily, I would strongly recommend the complete renovation of the old Primary School building with the addition of one or more rooms.

My second recommendation is for the institution of a Primary-Kindergarten department. The value of careful training in the first years of the child's school life is recognized by all who are familiar with school problems. For careful work in these first years, the conditions must be most favorable. At present the conditions are not fitted for the best work. The first and second grades are crowded which is always the greatest hindrance to the best work with small children. The additional rooms, which would be provided if my first recommendations were carried out, would give accommodation for the additional department which I recommend. It should also be noted that the value gained by the institution of the Kindergarten-Primary department would be available to all children of the town, instead of to only a small number, as is the case where the school facilities are more scattered.

Concretely the recommendation is this. Let an additional teacher be employed to care for the smaller children. Her work with the smallest would take only half a day, for the educators of the country agree that is as long

as good work with the little ones could be expected. This teacher's additional duties would include general supervision of the younger children and it is also likely that a teacher could be found who could give special training in drawing in all the Common Schools.

In the recommendations as to appropriation given below, we would call your attention to these facts: the increase recommended for the common schools is to meet the salary of the extra teacher recommended for the kindergarten-primary grade.

Aside from the amounts needed for the execution of the recommendations given above, the appropriations recommended, *i. e.* the appropriations for the routine work of the schools, is as follows:

For support of Common Schools	\$800 00
For support of High School	850 00
For Books	300 00
For repairs and supplies of all schools	400 00
For conveyance of High School pupils	50 00

In closing, I wish to call your attention to the extent to which the life of the community and the work in the schools are connected. The various activities recently inaugurated by the Boy Scouts and the Young Men's Christian Association have shown their benefits to a considerable extent in the school and the town. It is only by the community co-operation and assistance—both of which have been of such value during the past year—that we can keep our schools to the high point of efficiency which we all desire.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF OLD ORCHARD:

We herewith present, as is customary, a report of the several items of receipts and disbursements for the fiscal year.

Your Selectmen and officers have tried to do the work coming under their supervision for the best interest of all; we may not have satisfied everyone, that probably would not be possibly or practical, but have done what in our judgment seemed best.

At a special Town Meeting you voted unanimously for the purchase of a Fire Truck, and raised the sum of \$5,500. for that purpose; after consulting different makes a Robinson Chemical Fire Truck was purchased for the sum given us. You also voted to build two lines of sewers, and a sufficient sum, with what Sewer Assessments were to be collected, was raised for that purpose. We deemed it advisable to ask for bids on this work; and as a result the contract was let to Carmine, Ventrisco & Co. of Portland, who performed the work in a satisfactory manner; they were hindered greatly by the weather conditions, as was all other work during the last season. We also thought it advisable to call for bids for our sidewalk work and as a result, we awarded the contract to J. H. McAffe of Portland, who was the lowest bidder, being three cents under any outside bidder and ten cents under the lowest local bidder, and twenty cents under any former contract. We were somewhat timid about letting the contract at such a low

figure, but on investigation of the bidder, we felt we could close the contract with him; the result speaks for itself; we obtained 1,000 yards or more walk for our money than ever before.

As per a vote taken at a special Town Meeting we issued bonds to the amount of \$20,000, to take care of the Fire Truck, Sewers and a Floating debt.

The Lighting contract with the York County Power company expires this year, and a new contract will be presented for your consideration at the coming Town meeting. Many additional lights are being called for but it would seem that we are now expending too large an amount for lighting purposes for a town the size of ours; we should economize in this matter.

Many new projects are being exploited. Many think we should install an incinerator plant; others feel that a Public Comfort Station is most demanded; while still others are of the opinion that the greatest need is for new school accommodations, and there are still other demands.

In closing, we would call your attention to our Tax Rate which has been too high for the past few years; we should so plan our expenditures, that our rate of taxation should not be over \$20.00 per thousand; we should not try to do too much in one year, there are other years coming; let us plan accordingly

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, MARCH 6, 1916

To Howard N. Robinson, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard, in the County of York: GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Old Orchard, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town, on Monday, the 6th day of March, A. D. 1916, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

2nd. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.

4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to pay of town officers.

5th. To see what sums of money the town will raise: 1st, for common schools; 2nd, for free high school; 3rd, for free text books; 4th, for making and repairing highways and bridges; 5th, for the support of poor; 6th, for the pay of town officers; 7th, maintaining street lights and electric lights; 8th, for contingent expenses; 9th for sanitary expenses; 10th, for town interest; 11th, for repairing schoolhouses; 12th, for the public library; 13th, for heating, lighting and care of town property.

6th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commission, abatements and discounts.

7th. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the collector for collecting taxes for all moneys actually collected.

8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection, and what discount, if any, shall be allowed on both town and special taxes, if paid within a given date, and what rate of interest, if any, will be charged thereon, thereafter.

9th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes and not exceed the same.

10th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.

11th. To see if the town will authorize the Assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

12th. To see what amount of money, if any, the town will raise to be applied on the town debt.

13th. To see what action the town will take and what sums of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain fire department; to maintain town team; for hydrant rental; for interest on debt incurred in fire department, sewers and loans, all within the limits set out in Section IV, of the act of incorporation of the town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

14th. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in Sec. 20 of Chap. 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

15th. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$732.00 for the improvement of the section of

State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

16th. To see if the town will vote to designate and set apart a definite sum of money from the regular appropriations for highways and bridges and also the appropriation for sidewalks, for the purpose of maintaining and constructing highways and sidewalks in that part of Old Orchard known as Ocean Park, and what sum it will so set apart for each purpose.

17th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the municipal officers in regard to the expenditure of the \$3,000 appropriated by the State for the town of Old Orchard.

18th. To see if the town will vote to construct cement sidewalks on the following streets and avenues as called for by petitions: On the southerly side of Portland Road from the residence of Mrs. Katie Snow to the residence of Chas. A. Leavitt; on easterly side of Highland Ave. from 2nd street to 1st street; on the westerly side of Ocean Avenue from Central Ave. to Somerset Ave.; on the northeast side of York street; on the easterly side of Old Orchard St. from Alkazar Hotel to Seavey street; on Hillside Ave. from Ocean Ave. to Sea View Ave.; on easterly side of Hillcrest Ave. from Longwood Ave. to crest of hill; on northeasterly side of Staples St. from Grand Ave. to land of B. & M. R. R.; on northeasterly side of Fern Avenue from First St. to Second St.; on southwesterly side of Old Orchard Ave. from First St. to Second St.; on easterly side of Brown St.; on the easterly side of Ocean Avenue from Grand Ave. to land of B. & M. R. R.; on westerly side of Sea View Ave. from Central Ave. to Hillside Ave.;

on the southerly side of Saco Ave. from Washington Ave. to Pleasant St.; on northwest side of Fifteenth Street from Evergreen Ave. to Union Ave.; on northwesterly side of Second St. from Old Orchard Ave. to Union Ave.; on the northeast side of Union Ave from land of B. & M. R. R. to portion of walk now constructed; on southeast side of Grand Ave. in front of Forest Pier Hotel, from walk on easterly side of Old Orchard Street to end of walk already constructed; on Grand Ave. from Temple Ave. to Oceana Avenue.

19th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum of money sufficient to pay for the services of a school physician as required by Chapter 73 of the Public Laws of 1909.

20th. To see what sum the town will vote to appropriate for the purpose of cleaning beach during the summer season.

21st. To see on what streets or portions of streets the town will vote to lay dust during summer months, the cost thereof to be assessed against the property thereon, as now provided by law.

22nd. To see if the town will vote that no cement sidewalks shall be constructed on any street or avenue where there is now a cement walk on one side of said street or avenue.

23rd. To see if the town will vote to provide extra lighting on the sea wall during the summer months, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

24th. To see if the town will vote to establish a fire alarm box at corner of Portland Road and Walnut Avenue, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

25th. To see what action the town will take in regard to extra lighting of streets during the summer months and how much it will appropriate therefor.

26th. To see if the town will vote to locate the following electric lights, either permanently or for the summer season, as petitioned for by various persons, viz: On Highland Avenue between Washington Ave. and Third Street; southeast side of Idlewild Ave.; on Brown Street; two additional permanent lights and eleven summer lights at Ocean Park; at the corner of Fort Hill Ave. and Longwood Ave.; corner of Grove Ave. and Saco Road; corner of Francis St. and Imperial St.; on Pine Street; corner of Central Park Ave. and Saco Road; additional light on the sea wall in the easterly section; on Portland Road at or near the old kite track; re-locate light on Ocean Avenue between Central Avenue and Somerset Avenue; on Ocean Ave. between Bluff Avenue and North St.; that summer lights now located on Church St., Fifteenth St. and at two entrances to Camp Ground be extended to run four months; two lights on East Grand Avenue at Surfside; on southeasterly side of Grand Ave. at westerly corner of lot of Estate of Wesley G. Smith; on Summit Street.

27th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Cedar Avenue from portion already completed to First St. and how much it will appropriate therefor.

28th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen that any contracts involving the expenditure of \$500 or more shall be let out to the lowest responsible bidder.

29th. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Building Inspector in conformity with Section 25, Chapter 40 of the Public Laws of 1915.

30th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Tunis Ave. from Sea Side Ave. to Surf St., and Surf Street from Tunis Ave. to Tioga Ave., and how much it will appropriate therefor.

31st. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Imperial St. and how much it will appropriate therefor.

32nd. To see if the town will vote to construct a cement sidewalk on the southerly side of Saco Ave. from Fort Hill Ave. to Carleton Ave.

33rd. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Ocean Ave. from Central Ave. to Somerset Ave., and how much it will appropriate therefor.

34th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel First Street from point to where now completed to Union Avenue, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

35th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Ocean Avenue from First St. to Bluff Ave. and how much it will appropriate therefor.

36th. To see if the town will vote to gravel Flint St., and how much it will appropriate therefor.

37th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Pine Street, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

38th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Sea View Avenue from Central Ave. to Hillside Ave., and how much it will appropriate therefor.

39th. To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer on Hillcrest Avenue, commencing at end of sewer now thereon; thence southeasterly on Hillcrest Ave. to Central Park; thence southeasterly on Central Park Ave. to First St.; thence southwesterly on First St. to Atlantic Avenue sewer, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

40th. To see if town will vote to raise retaining wall in front of cottage of Mrs. Florence I. Kernon on Atlantic Avenue one foot, to prevent rain water drainage from flooding property, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

41st. To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer on Cedar Ave. from Third Street to First Street and how much it will appropriate therefor.

42nd. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Seaside Ave. to Hampton Ave., and Hampton Ave. from Seaside Ave. to Surf Street, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

43rd. To see if the town will vote to establish a hydrant on southeast side of East Grand Avenue, 150 feet southwesterly from Sea View Ave., and how much it will appropriate therefor.

44th. To see if the town will vote to secure location, construct and maintain a public toilet, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

45th. To see if the town will vote to raise a committee to confer with the proper authorities to have trains of the Boston & Maine Railroad stop clear of Old Orchard street during July and August.

46th. To see if the town will vote to have only emergency work done on our main highways from June 1st to September 1st, and that 50 per cent of the highway appropriation shall be reserved and expended after Sept. 1st.

47th. To see if the town will vote to celebrate and observe Old Home Week, commencing on the second Sunday of August, 1916, and if so, to raise a committee of arrangements, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

48th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Francis Street, and how much it will appropriate therefor.

49th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Third Street from Atlantic Avenue to Union Avenue, and appropriate not to exceed \$250 therefor.

50th. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500. for the continuation of improvements of Cascade road.

51st. To see if the town will vote to construct a catch

basin on Pine avenue. Cost of same to be taken from regular appropriation for sewers and drains.

52d. To see if the town will vote to contract for a sidewalk on the Southwesterly side of School Street, beginning at the Saco Road and extending in a Northwesterly direction about 300 feet, and what sum of money they will appropriate therefor.

53d. To see if the town will vote to sell the chemical fire truck recently purchased at an expense of \$5,500.00, and what offer it will authorize the Selectmen to accept for the same.

To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall for the purpose of revising and correcting the voting list, on the morning of election from 8 to 10 o'clock.
