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## Foreword

This is a comprehensive, monumental bibliography of Maine, invaluable to researchers, historians, genealogists and students. It includes all books, pamphlets, and magazine articles by Maine authors up to 1891. ## Introduction

By State Senator Frank Wood

That you are now reading this introduction to Joseph Williamson's *A Bibliography of the State of Maine* is due in large part to the efforts of one person—Francis M. O'Brien.

Francis O'Brien is Maine's foremost antiquarian bookman. He was honored in 1972 with the prestigious Maine State Award. The citation read in part:

... We gather to bestow honor upon some private contributor, someone who has worked in quiet ways, sharing his special knowledge and erudition with those who come seeking to his door.

We present one such man to you tonight. There are few states in the nation which possess a past as rich as Maine's. And there are few regions in which the people have a greater awareness of its heritage. It is obvious that no one person alone is responsible, but one would have to seek far to find a man with more devotion, understanding and appreciation of Maine's literature and history.

Traditionally, the antiquarian bookman has served the cultural life of his time without expectation of high rewards or honors; his is a labor of love. He must first of all be a scholar. Secondly, he must be a free giver of his time and knowledge. This man has given unstintingly of both. His knowledge of the bibliography of Maine literature and history is unmatched; he is a foremost authority on rare and little known Maine volumes. He has played a major role in preserving valuable Maine books and manuscripts and has been instrumental in building many of the best public and private Maine collections in the state."

Francis, who has been in the book business for over fifty years, is always willing to share his unlimited knowledge with anyone interested in books. Like Maine's painters, writers and poets, he is a part of Maine's cultural heritage.

Being in the same business, if on a more modest scale, it is my custom to stop at his "book-overflowing" house on High Street in Portland. I use the pretext of looking over his stock, when it is really his knowledge that I'm after. It was on one such visit two summers ago that Francis first raised the idea of a reprint of Williamson's *A Bibliography of the State of Maine*, originally published in Portland in 1896. Francis, after pointing out the thoroughness and usefulness of Williamson's work and the difficulty of obtaining a copy at a reasonable price, suggested that the state should not only reprint this monumental work, but should undertake a complete update covering the time of its original publication to the present. Knowing that I served in the Senate and that Christopher Livesay, a book collector in the best sense, served in the House of Representatives, Francis realized that the suggestion would not fall on deaf ears.

During the second session of the 111th Legislature, Representative Livesay and I sponsored: "AN ACT to Republish Williamson's Bibliography of Maine." Although



the second session is reserved for emergency legislation and the state was facing the usual financial difficulties, we were able to overcome all obstacles and see the bill signed into law.

That we succeeded speaks more of the Maine Legislature, than of the abilities of the sponsors. The 184 persons who make up the legislature come from different age groups, economic backgrounds, geographic areas, and all shades of the political spectrum. They converge on Augusta to do great political battle, but usually end up behaving more like members of a large family. Throughout the pomp and circumstance, the endless debate, and the countless hours of work with little personal financial reward, the legislators try to serve the best interests of the Maine citizenry.

I believe that in our 165 years of statehood, we have been well served. Although legislators can get caught up in rhetoric and parliamentary procedure, they can on occasion pass legislation simply because it in some way speaks to our common Maine heritage. Williamson's *Bibliography* was just such an opportunity, and the legislature responded.

A few comments on Maine bibliographies in general and the importance of Williamson in particular are in order, but before making them I would like to thank publicly the many people who, along with Francis, assisted in this legislation:

J. Gary Nichols, Mary Lou Cobb, and Donald Wismer of the Maine State Library for their advice and testimony, and for assuring that once the legislation was passed a reprint of true quality would ensue;

Harland Eastman, a fellow bookman and president of the Maine Antiquarian Booksellers Association, for his testimony and ongoing support;

Senator Mary Najarian and Representative Nancy Masterton for shepherding the bill through the often dangerous waters of the Appropriations Committee;

Representative Christopher Livesay for his classic speech on behalf of the bill during House debate and for his wise counsel through the long legislative process;

My wife and daughter for letting me play in the legislative fields for the past eight years;

Finally, all who lobbied, drafted, and/or voted on this bill. I extend to all of you on behalf of all Maine citizens, a heartfelt "Thank You!"



One only has to visit the Maine Author Collection at the Maine State Library to sense the tremendous number of native-born and adopted writers our state has produced. On the shelves one finds the well-known writers—Abbott, Jewett, Wiggin, Sarton, Longfellow, Robinson, Roberts—intermingled with the lesser known or local lights. One finds all shades of quality and genres, from the children's books of Robert McCloskey to the geodesic domes of R. Buckminster Fuller, from the romantic novels of our first woman writer, Sarah Barrell Keating Wood, to the scientific call to arms of Rachel Carson's *Silent Spring* (Boston, 1962), from the poetic musings of Edna St. Vincent Millay to the downeast humor of Artemus Ward. Although all are different, all have a common bond of geography.

Kenneth Roberts in *Trending into Maine* (Boston, 1938) suggests that the salt air has caused this large number of writers. Whatever the reason, we can be justly proud of our literary heritage. We can also be proud that we have had over the years a number of dedicated bibliographers, who have spent their lives ferreting out the works of Maine. Although the Williamson *Bibliography* is the most significant Maine bibliography, it is only one of many such works that have been published over the years.

Without exception, all of these works are well written, and each offers the researcher and casual reader a tool of importance. Taken as a whole, these bibliographies, even excluding Williamson's, offer a resource that few states could match. And when Williamson's work is added to the account, Maine has no rival in local bibliographic resources.

Although the following listing is not complete, it does highlight some of the more important Maine bibliographies.

The first is by William Willis, entitled "A Descriptive Catalogue of Books and Pamphlets relating to the History and Statistics of Maine, or Portions of it," found in *Norton's Literary Letter* (New York) in 1859. Willis, a Portland lawyer, spent many years in pursuit of Maine history. The fruits of this pursuit can be found in the numerous articles, and in his *History of Portland* (Portland, 1865). The Willis bibliography recorded 215 items, giving an early indication of the depth of Maine material. In many respects this pioneering work served as a model for Williamson.

Several writers have focused on particular aspects of our past. Local histories, for example, have been well covered by these specialists.

The most important work in local history is Drew B. Hall's "Reference List on Maine Local History" (New York State Library, *Bibliographic Bulletin* no. 28, June, 1901). Hall, a Maine native, completed this work as a graduation requirement in library science at New York University. Other local history bibliographies include:

It is interesting to note that A.J. Huston was a Portland bookdealer who held the same position of respect and authority in the early part of this century that F.M. O'Brien holds today. Maine certainly has been well served by its bookmen.

Other specialized Maine bibliographies include:

Although Maine was a rock-ribbed Republican state, several of F.D.R.'s New Deal programs made lasting contributions to our bibliographic resources. The Works Progress Administration, besides publishing an excellent guide to our state, published much more topical works such as its *Directory of Churches and Religious Organizations in Maine* (Portland, 1940). The most important New Deal work, *A Reference List of Manuscripts Relating to the History of Maine* (Orono, 1938), was published by the University of Maine with funds from the Federal Emergency Relief Administration. Elizabeth Ring directed twenty-six researchers in this effort, and they combed all areas of the state, locating many manuscripts that had previously been unknown. It is unfortunate that this work has never been updated, but it can still serve as a starting point for much worthwhile research. Elizabeth Ring later went on to distinguish herself in the field of Maine history.



In recent years the Maine Historical Society has published a number of worthwhile bibliographies under their Maine History Bibliographical Guide Series program. Works in this series include:

Also, Edwin A. Churchill and James S. Leamon. "Maine in the Revolution, A Reader's Guide." *Maine Historical Society Quarterly* 15 no. 4A (Spring, 1976).

All of these guides are well-written, and should be on the bookshelf of anyone interested in Maine history.

The most recent bibliographic undertaking is *Maine: A Bibliography of its History* (Boston, 1977). This work is Volume 2 in a series of state bibliographies prepared by the Committee for a New England Bibliography. The Committee is working on bibliographies for each New England state, and a general volume for the region. The Maine volume is edited by John Haskell, Jr., and contains 5,355 entries. This work is very worthwhile, and again, I recommend that anyone interested in Maine history should own a copy. It is amusing, though, that in this age of super-technology, this work has failed to identify some common local material. On the other hand, if completeness were possible, then bibliographers would soon go out of business.

Maine has also had a number of people who, although not strictly bibliographers, have nonetheless spent countless hours preserving Maine's heritage for future generations. These dedicated individuals deserve mention, and sincere thanks.

Dorothy Healy of Westbrook College (some would suggest that she *is* Westbrook College) deserves mention for her work with Westbrook's Maine Women Writers Collection. Dorothy worked to make this a first class research facility in the days before women studies became fashionable.

James Vickery has already been mentioned in connection with his bibliographic work, but deserves to be singled out again for his donation to the University of Maine of his extensive collection of Maine material. The Vickery collection, numbering over 3,000 items, is a boon to researchers. That it is housed in a Maine public institution is especially important to Mainers, who have seen much of their heritage leave the state.

Earle Shettleworth, Jr., has been interested in Maine history since early childhood. Although best-known for his historic preservation work, Earle has been in the forefront of every effort within the past twenty years to preserve and enhance all aspects of Maine's past.

Finally, special mention should be made of the Sabbathday Lake Shaker Community. Maine is indeed fortunate to have this important cultural site within its

boundaries. Brother Theodore Johnson, Director of the Shaker Library, who over the years has sought to preserve the rich Shaker heritage, deserves our acknowledgment.



Maine is fortunate indeed to have a group of bibliographers, institutions, and individuals who care deeply about the state's heritage, and who are willing to give of their time to preserve it. Any state would be proud to boast of such rich resources. As I stated earlier, the bibliographic works mentioned above are of the first order; however, they pale almost to insignificance before the work you hold in your hand, Joseph Williamson's two volume *A Bibliography of the State of Maine*, with its eleven thousand entries.

The sheer size of Williamson's work would qualify it for honors; but its thoroughness and all-encompassing scope distinguishes it from other works and puts it in a class by itself. Williamson stated in the preface his overall purpose: "With certain exceptions, its purpose is to give free title to every book, pamphlet, and reputable magazine article at any time printed in or having reference to Maine, and also all of which the authors were, at the time of writing or publishing, residents within the state." The task Williamson set for himself was immense, and he succeeded.

One method booksellers use in judging a bibliography is to find out what works are *not* in it. To add "Not in Williamson's," for example, means an automatic increase in the price of an item. Yet booksellers have little opportunity to use this phrase for the period covered. It is a work that can be used with certainty. The picture that it paints of Nineteenth Century Maine is complete, in that every subject, every writer, and every town is covered thoroughly and in an easily useable form. The real joy in seeing the book reprinted is the knowledge that a new generation of Mainers will spend many enjoyable hours making new discoveries about our state.

In writing the work, Williamson consulted the major institutional collections within the state. He also made extensive use of the collection of J.G. Elder, a Lewiston cabinet maker who had made a lifetime avocation out of collecting Maine material. The many unique items found in Williamson are due in large part to his use of Elder's collection. In the 1950s, that same collection came into the possession of Francis M. O'Brien, and by Francis's own account, he thereby became an authority on Maine history.

Williamson described his work as a "labor of love." After reviewing his life, it seems that the phrase well describes his professional and historical pursuits.

Joseph Williamson was born in Belfast on October 5, 1828, the son of Joseph and Caroline (Cross) Williamson. His family on the father's side traces its roots to the Plymouth Colony, and includes uncle William Williamson who wrote the monumental two-volume *History of the State of Maine* (Hallowell, 1839). His mother's side traces back to Newburyport and contains patriots who fought in the Revolutionary War.

Joseph spent his youth in Belfast where he attended the local academy. After graduating, he travelled to Brunswick to attend Bowdoin College, graduating in 1849.

In his professional life, Joseph followed the example of his father and went into the law. He was admitted to the Maine bar in 1852 and practiced in the family firm until his death in 1902.

In his profession he was hardworking and thorough. These traits can easily be confirmed by reading the *Maine Reports* of the period. It was a time when specialization was unknown to the legal profession, and so Joseph was involved in all aspects of law. He was appointed Judge of Police Court by Governor Crosby in 1853. He also served as Belfast's City Solicitor for a number of years.

Williamson's avocation was history. Since childhood he had had a love for history, especially local history. In fact, in his youth he wrote *A History of the City of Belfast* (Portland, 1877), which covers every aspect of Belfast life from its first settlement to 1875. In later years a companion volume was published, bringing coverage to 1900.

Williamson was also a regular contributor to the various publications of the Maine Historical Society, with over seventy published items covering a wide variety of subjects.

I list a few titles here to give the reader an idea of the depth and breadth of his work:

Even with an extensive law practice and his interest in history, Williamson still found time to participate in community affairs. He was an officer of the Belfast Public Library. He was a member and president for many years of the Waldo Bar Association. In keeping with his interest in history, he actively participated in the Maine Historical Society, New England Historic Genealogical Society, Sons of the American Revolution, American Antiquarian Society, and numerous other societies. In many of these organizations, Williamson assumed leadership positions.

He received no financial compensation for any of his historical writings. His reward was the work itself, the friends it brought him, and the knowledge that he was preserving Maine's heritage for future generations.

Joseph Williamson died on December 4, 1902 in his native Town of Belfast.

It should be pointed out that only part of Francis O'Brien's wish has come true. The *Bibliography* is reprinted, but work toward the larger goal has not yet begun. It is my hope that this reprinting will lead researchers to take on the task of bringing Maine bibliography into the Twenty-first Century. If this does not happen. . . Christopher Livesay and I may have to come out of political retirement.

## PREFACE

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THIS work has been compiled under the auspices of the Maine Historical Society. With certain exceptions, its purpose is to give the full title of every book, pamphlet, and reputable magazine article at any time printed in or having reference to Maine, and also all of which the authors were, at the time of writing or publishing, residents within the state.

The exceptions are chiefly public, municipal and legal reports, and pamphlets which relate to organizations not of an historical, literary, charitable or religious character. Although many of the best literary productions of the State are to be found only in its newspapers, no attempt to enumerate these has been made with the exception of such as have been preserved in other form.

The plan also excludes the writings of native authors, printed or published after they have ceased to be residents, unless these have some special relation to Maine.

In all cases possible, titles have been copied from the original works; those in catalogues being adopted only as a last resort.

Cross references to general and local histories, encyclopædias, and biographical dictionaries have been usually omitted.

The task of the compiler has been greatly lessened by kind aid received from his friends in all parts of the country. The bountiful assistance of Mr. Hubbard W. Bryant, librarian of the Maine Historical Society, of Professors George T. Little and Edward W. Hall,



librarians respectively of Bowdoin College and Colby University, has largely contributed to the completeness of the work. Special acknowledgement is due to Mr. John Ward Dean and to Samuel Abbott Green, M. D., both of Boston, for numerous kind offices and encouraging words. He is under great obligation to Mr. J. G. Elder, of Lewiston, not only for free access to his unequaled collection of Maine books and pamphlets, but also for transcripts of numerous titles which otherwise would have escaped notice; to Mr. E. Freeman Duren, of Bangor, for a list of works compiled during his long career as a publisher; and to Mr. Calvin W. Lewis, of Boston, who has been indefatigable in securing a large array of authorities concerning "Lovewell's Fight."

Although the book may lack some of the characteristics of a technical bibliography, the compiler trusts that it will meet with favorable acceptance. It has been with him a labor of love.

The address was really written in the heart and happiness of what I thought a real inspiration: but all the warmth was extinguished in that lake of iced water." “In the autumn of this year (1785), Mr. Sam. Vaughan persuaded him to go to a new settlement on Kennebec River, called Hallowell, in the Province of Maine, where Mr. Vaughan had a large tract of land and much interest in settling the township. This was in the midst of the woods, with a few acres cleared round each farm, as usual in all their new places, which by degrees, are changed from solitary woods to a fruitful land. At this time the wolves were near neighbors, and sometimes at night would come prowling about the place, making a dismal noise with their hideous barking, and as the doors were without locks, and my father slept on the ground floor, he used to fasten his door by putting his knife over the latch to prevent a visit from these wild beasts. In this remote place he found a very respectable society, many of them genteel people. Here he preached a Thanksgiving sermon which was afterwards printed at Boston. It was a custom in New England to preach one every year after harvest. He would have had no objection to settling with these people but it would not have been eligible for his sons. John’s profession was not wanted in the woods, where good hunters and husbandmen were more needed. He therefore, after spending the winter there, returned to us in the spring; and he narrowly escaped being lost in the Bay of Fundy, to which the sailors, for its frequent and dreadful tempests, have given the name of the Devil’s Cauldron.”
