

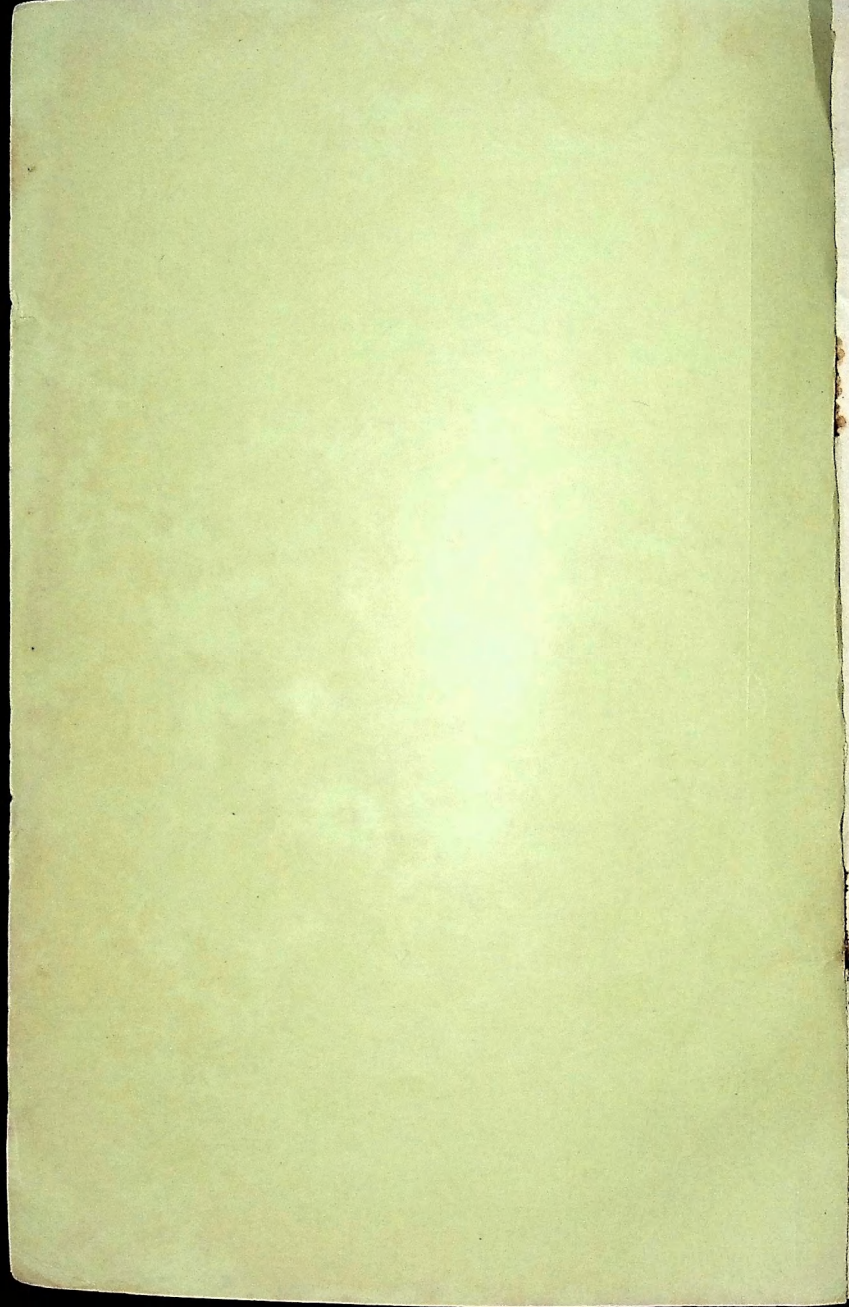

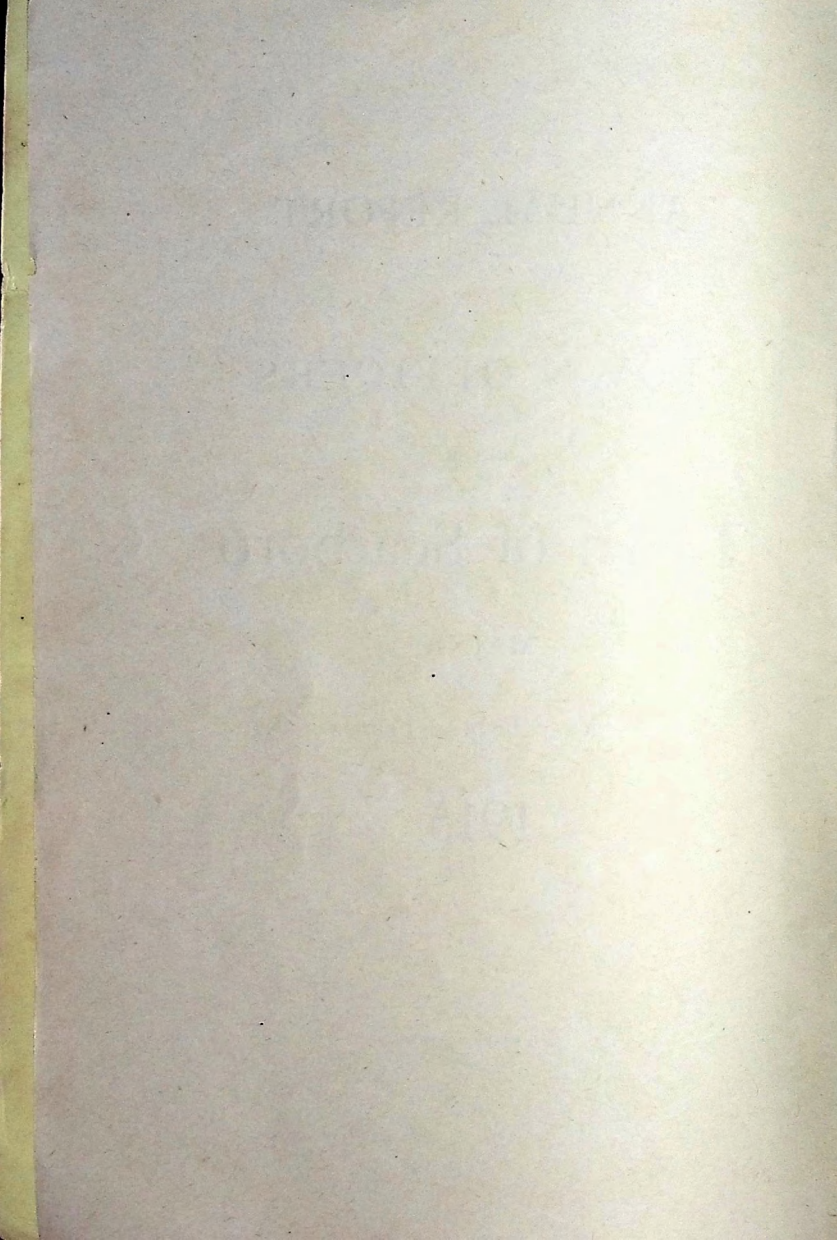

## School Report

---

### TO THE CITIZENS OF SCARBORO:

At your last town meeting, you showed your interest in the schools by granting to us an appropriation adequate to continue the progressive movement started during the previous year. At this time, permit an explanation of a few educational principles which have constantly influenced us in all our work during the past year.

Our general aim this year has been to deal with the pupils as individuals rather than as members of a certain grade. In other words, we have paid especial attention to the facilities of accomplishment of each pupil rather than to his classification by years or grades.

### COMMON SCHOOLS

In furtherance of the above aim, and according to recommendations made last year, we have been able to separate the pupils in two of our schools into grammar and primary departments. This makes three of our schools in which this is possible at the present time. By so doing, we are able to place our teachers so as to take advantage of each teacher's adaptability for teaching either the very young or older pupils. As we stated last year, there is not one teacher in a hundred capable of handling both groups to the best advantage.

In the primary department it has thus been possible to adopt the most satisfactory method of combining the

amount of play necessary for interest and health with an amount of work increasing as the pupil is fitted for it.

In the grammar department, the teacher has been able to devote her entire energy to the particular needs of grammar school work, unhindered by the many details which arise from the care of small children.

In all the common schools, emphasis has been placed upon the importance of learning carefully the fundamentals as the only secure basis for any future work.

### HIGH SCHOOL

In the high school, the advancement for the year has been entirely satisfactory. As in the other schools, our aim has been to assist the individual,—even though in some cases he may not be fully prepared for the advanced work. Owing to our small number, our equipment, and the amount of attention to each pupil, we believe that our boys and girls can be given more thorough intensive training than in some of the larger neighboring schools with their more extensive courses. Our advancement during the year has been such as to attract favorable attention even outside of our town.

NOTE: In addition to the required courses each student must select two from the elective list. Courses marked with numerals are offered alternately with the course of their respective number. In each of the above courses the student recites five times a week. The entire school is given a music lesson once a week. School activities:—School paper, drama, base ball and basket ball.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

Recognizing the great importance of an early mastery of the mechanical principles of writing, I most earnestly recommend the Palmer Method of Business Writing, as one fitted in every way to meet the needs of our teachers and pupils. Although the progress of the pupil will not be as rapid as in the simple copying method, in the end the pupil learns to write in the free and easy way, essential to a good penman. Although the Palmer Company furnish complete instructions to teachers, I believe the importance of this branch of education demands the services of an expert writing teacher.

Realizing the advantages that are derived from the professional teaching of singing in Dunstan and Oak Hill schools, I hope some way will be found, whereby this great privilege can be extended to every scholar in town. It is of the utmost importance that our young people learn

correctly the underlying principles of vocal culture, at the earliest possible moment.

In agreement with your school Committee, I recommend the following appropriation for the ensuing year:

For support of common schools	\$1,000
For support of high school	1,300
For supplies and repairs (all schools)	1,200
For books (all schools)	350
For ins., apparatus, appliances and power	200

At this time, I consider it fitting, to especially thank the members of the School committee for their loyal support, cooperation and careful consideration of the many problems brought to their attention during the past year.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation to citizens and each one of our fifteen teachers, for the hearty and cordial support which has been given me, in my efforts to be of service to the schools of Scarborough.

## Warrant for Town Meeting, 1915

---

*To William G. Sherman, a Constable in the Town of Scarborough, in the County of Cumberland,* GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Scarborough, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House, in said Town, on the first (1st) day of March, A. D. 1915, at ten (10) o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
2. To choose a Clerk, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Collector, Treasurer, one member of the School Board, Fire Ward, and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
3. To see if the town will accept and adopt the reports of the several town officers.
4. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, schoolhouse repairs and supplies, text books, school appliances, the poor, repair of roads and bridges, for spraying trees, rental of hydrants at Pine Point, and to defray all other town charges.



5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Free High School for the ensuing year.

6. To see if the town will vote the sum of twenty-two hundred thirty-five and 12-100 dollars (\$2,235.12) to reimburse the treasury for the following accounts overdrawn 1914: Subduing fires, eleven hundred ninety-four and 49-100 dollars (\$1,194.49); lights at Pine Point, one hundred eighty-six and 85-100 dollars (\$186.85); State Highway, one hundred forty-three and 46-100 dollars (\$133.46); Browntail Moth Account, one hundred ninety-six and 42-100 dollars (\$196.42); Breaking Roads, three hundred forty-six and 81-100 dollars (\$346.81); Officers' Salaries, one hundred sixty-seven and 9-100 dollars (\$167.09).

7. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no", on the question of appropriating and raising the money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as provided in Section 20, Chapter 130, Public Laws of 1913.

8. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$864.00 for the improvement of the section of State aid road designated as No. 2, as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 130, Public Laws of 1913.

9. To see whether the town will vote to raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of State and State aid highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Sections 9 and 18 of Chapter 130, of the Public Laws of 1913.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the repair of Black Point road.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purpose of oiling the road from Prout's Neck to the Boston & Maine R. R. Western Division.

12. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint one or three Road Commissioners for the ensuing year.

13. To see if the town will vote a sum of money to straighten and repair the highway leading from Buxton line toward Dunstan, near Mrs. Sarah Meserve's gravel pit. By request.

14. To see if the town will vote a sum of money to be expended on the road leading from North Scarboro to the Westbrook line. By request.

15. To see if the town will vote a sum of money for repair of road leading from corner of Pleasant Hill road toward South Portland line, known as the Bog road. By request.

16. To see if the town will vote a sum of money for repair of highway leading from Black Point road near Shaw's store to the foot of Leonard's Hill, so called. By request.

17. To see if the the town will vote a sum of money to be expended on the Portland road at North Scarboro. between the residence of A. G. Reed and the Red Brook bridge on said road. By request.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appro-

prorate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for road work at Higgins Beach.

19. To see if the town will vote a sum of money to purchase and remove a knoll near George Pooler's residence on the Gorham road. By request.

20. To see if the town will accept the road as laid out by the Selectmen at Pine Point and raise money for the same.

21. To see if the town will accept as town ways the following proposed streets as shown on a certain plan of Higgins Beach, so called, in the Town of Scarboro, recorded in the Cumberland County Registry of Deeds, Plan Book 12, page 81, viz: Greenwood Avenue, Bay View Avenue, Houghton Street, Pearl Street, Ashton Street, so called on said recorded plan, and approved by the Selectmen.

22. To see if the town will vote a sum of money for repairs on the old highway leading to the land of Hans Peter Nelson.

23. To see if the town will vote to build a fireproof vault and selectmen's room at the Town Hall and raise a sum of money for same. By request.

24. To see what compensation the town will vote for labor on highway.

25. To see if the town will vote to install twelve electric street lights at Blue Point Village, so called, in said Scarboro, between the house of C. S. Leavitt and the Western Division of the Boston & Maine Railroad, and raise money for the same. On petition of L. C. Leavitt and nineteen others.



26. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred and fifty dollars (\$550.00) for electric lights on Black Point Road.

27. To see if the town will vote a sum of money for electric street lights at Pine Point.

31. To see if the town will grant the High School and the Scarboro Athletic Association the use of the Town Hall for the ensuing year.

32. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for decorating soldiers' graves and memorial purposes.

33. To see if the town will accept the various sums of money paid it for perpetual care and maintenance of Dunstan Cemetery, namely: The sum of one hundred dollars, bequeathed said town under the last will and testament of Daniel L. Snow, late of Biddeford, Me., deceased. Also the sum of two hundred dollars paid said town by Miss Almira Collins. Also the sum of one hundred dollars from Taylor S. Dodge.

34. To see if the town will accept the bequest of

Sarah H. Larrabee, late of Scarboro, of the sum of two hundred dollars to be properly invested and the income therefrom to be expended in the preservation and care of two lots in the burying ground at Black Point Cemetery, namely, the Alvin B. Larrabee lot and the Dr. Seth L. Larrabee lot.

35. To see if the town will vote to authorize the municipal officers to hire money if the same becomes necessary.

36. To see what compensation the town will vote its Collector for his services for the ensuing year.

37. To see what compensation the town will vote its Treasurer for the ensuing year. }

38. To see if the town will vote a sum of money for breaking roads.

39. To see if the town will vote a sum of money to repair Town Farm buildings.
