Do Go Near the Water!



ack a picnic, bring a book, collect the children and give yourself a getaway – a getaway to one of those nearby lakes that shimmer and sparkle from just about every route and road in the area.

If you're visiting: discover! If you live nearby: explore! And, if you're already a lake resident: how about a look around. Got your map? There are many ways to go near the water in the Belgrades...and beyond.

Take a day for a drive! Driving around the Belgrades (construction work excepting) is a treat – a scenic feast of hills, fields, villages and waterways. With or without stops a drive through the region means memorable, savorful views. Some of the best waterview drives are: the Mount Vernon Road past Castle Island (Long Pond) to the Village of Mount Vernon; Route 41 north of Mount Vernon to Vienna and south of Mount Vernon to the Eagle Lake, Routes 8 and 137 to Smithfield (North Pond); Route 27 through



Belgrade Lakes (between Long Pond and the Great Pond Channel); Route 11 between Belgrade and Oakland (Lake Messalonskee), and the Watson Pond Road to Blueberry Hill.

The most popular drive in the area (or so it always looks) is through the village of Belgrade Lakes on Route 27. No need to mention going slowly; it happens anyway – a pace that allows for admiring the water that surrounds the community.

The drive through Castle Island (yes, you drive right through that landmark) offers unique views of both Lower and Upper Long Pond and of life in a genuine fishing camp. For the guests' sake and to fully enjoy looking up and down the lake, do observe the 15 mph speed limit.


Continuing on to Mount Vernon on Lake Minnehonk and driving north to Vienna or south to West Mount Vernon, the drive is truly lake-side/campside on some stretches.

Driving to and through Smithfield also pro-










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vides a unique close-up of cap life on the lakes, especially on the lengthy and usually delightfully breezy shoreline sections of Routes 137 and the North Pond Shore road.

Although most of the roads in the Belgrades provide ample lake scenes, the best drive-to view is Blueberry Hill, accessed from the Watson Pond Road off Route 27 in Rome. There's ample parking space to linger and look down on Long Pond, Great Pond, and that narrow strip of land in between, the Village of Belgrade Lakes.

A drive's ok, but it's also great to stop and play, so...

If you're wishing you were fishing! Wish no more. Shore fishing is possible from several sites in the Belgrade area – near Castle Island on Long

Pond, Peninsula Park at the dam in Belgrade Lakes, the Messalonskee Lake fish net near the Messalonskee dam, and on the Belgrade Stream from the Wing's Mills dam in Mount Vernon, the bridge over Route 135, and the bridge over Route 27 and, except where posted or traveled by dangerously fast traffic many of the other bridges in the area. For fishing further out, boat and canoe rentals (and a few fishing tips) are available at Great Pond Marina, Whisperwood Cottages on Salmon Lake, Castle Island Camps, Belgrade Canoe & Kayak and through other boat and lodging businesses.

Want to float your own boat? There are public

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boat landings on all the lakes: on East Pond off the East Pond Road near Route 137 (a shallow water launch!); on North Pond off the North Shore road near Route 137 going toward mercer; on McGrath Pond at the Pleasant Point Recreation Area on McGrath Pond Road near Route 137 (a carry-in canoe/kayak site); on Salmon Lake at Spaulding Point off Route 8; on lower Long Pond off the Mount Vernon Road; on Great Pond on Sahagian Road off Route 27; and on Lake Messalonskee near the Town Park in Oakland and off Route 23/Pond Road in Sidney.

Most landings will have a Courtesy Boat Inspector who checks all parts of the boat, trailer and motor searching for and removing any and all aquatic (and other) plants. If no one is on duty, please do your own inspection – to prevent the introduction of invasive aquatic plants into our lakes.

One bonus about the area's public boat landings – they offer the opportunity for non-anglers to get a closer look at the lakes.

Plan a picnic! or more... Ah for a lazy lakeside lunch – bring your own, buy one to go, or supplement your picnic basket at one of the small town general stores. Picnics are possible where there's a safe and not posted turnout, but why not just enjoy a nice table in a park, put there for guests like you? Hayden Park on Route 27 on the Belgrade Stream, Peninsula Park and the park in back of Day's Store in Belgrade Lakes both on Long Pond, the town park on Belgrade Street on Lake Messalonskee in Oakland are just samples of places with picnic tables. Now about that "more": many of the area's restaurants and eateries are lakeside or riverside!!

Get in for a swim! There's nothing like a cool dip on a hot day. Swimming, of course, takes place off many a bridge and inviting boat ramp, at public parks, and at the town beaches, but for the public at large Sunset Camps on North Pond in Smithfield has a beach open daily to the public, for a small fee.

Visit a village! You've driven through, and picnicked by, and lounged around, and fished from – now it's time to stop and shop, browse, explore, and stroll in the area's towns, villages, and cities (a great Maine misnomer) in the lakes regions or along the streams and rivers. Add your own ideas and outlets for how to spend the day. But do go near the water!

Vienna Historical Society Mounts Exhibit on Working Women

The Vienna Historical Society has assembled an exhibit paying tribute to the working women of Vienna and Mount Vernon during 1900s to 1950s" pays tribute the many facets of our grandmothers, mothers, sisters and aunts

"women's work" in small town Maine.

Working women, an obviously redundant phrase, ran the gamut of types of work, and the historical society tries to cover that range of teachers, telephone operwriters, dressmakers, ators, clerks, innkeepers, musicians, and so much more. Recognizing that many women did not work full time jobs outside the home, but that they nevertheless supplemented the family income through other means, as well as contributed to the good of the community, we also include farm women in the display.

"Women at Work in Vienna and Mount Vernon 1900s to 1950s" will run every Saturday from 11:00 am to 1:00 pm, July 13 through the end of October at the historical society building on Highway 41 in Vienna Village. Over a hundred women are represented in this presentation with a photo and description of their

Families have loved the Belgrade Lakes and returned for generations. One octogenarian proudly speaks of first coming to Great Pond as a 3-month old baby. Sons and daughters, grandkids, and now great grandkids follow year after year making memories in cottages on the waterfront, in boats in the lakes, and on trails in the woods and mountains.

A strong sense of place sparks memories of loons, hemlocks, roast duckling at the Village Inn, Day's store...and lots of other favorite places. Children recall games of croquet on the great lawns, badminton nets spread across the grass, and a game of Frisbee at dusk on sod-covered recreation areas at the camps.

Recent science now tells us, however, that with increased development on our shorefronts, grass is no longer an asset or the status symbol it once was beginning in the 1920's and the era of The Great Gatsby. In fact, grass has been shown to be unfriendly to lake water quality and habitat.

Lawns act as waterproof mats that speed phosphorus and nitrogen in the run-off from rain and the torrential, climate-changing storms we now experience. Pesticides and herbicides that are used to rid lawns of those pesky dandelions, clover, and crabgrass find their way into the air, soil, and water.

A carbon footprint is left by the impervious lawn and the garden equipment that emits toxic exhaust and greenhouse gases. The lawnmower, the leaf blower and the electric hedge clippers drown out the loon calls and chirpings of the birds. Author and environmental activist, Michael Pollan, notes, "We have begun to recognize that we are poisoning

ourselves with our lawns."

LakeSmart screenings have raised awareness of the unfriendliness of lawns on our lakes. The program does not advocate getting rid of lawns entirely. It does, however, promote the idea of limiting lawn areas for recreation, grilling, and other sunny enjoyment activities. Lawns stay greener by raising the level of the mower blade and by leaving the clippings to fertilize the soil. A deep buffer of 5-levels of vegetation at the shorefront (canopy trees, small trees, shrubs, groundcover, and duff) has shown to prevent unwanted nutrients from entering the lakes.

A strategically-placed rain garden, a clump of blueberry bushes, or other native shrubs, and a natural meandering walkway used to break up the lawn can filter out poisons from run-off. Natural landscaping has been shown to enhance a property's real estate value and contribute to cleaner lake water.

Our love affair with lawns is out of fashion now. The hours we spent as kids in suburbia mowing grass for our dads and digging dandelions for our moms is no longer as important as it once was. A second look is being taken at the 40 billion-dollar-a-year lawn care industry by folks who care about the environment (see article"Blades of Glory" online in: theweek.com).

What better place than on our lakeshores to encourage and promote the pristine, natural forests down to the water with a small space to relax and play on a patch of grass. Want to know more? 

A Symphony for One Voice in TAM's Year of Magical Thinking

ounding out Theater at Monmouth's 2013 sum-Mer fare is Joan Didion's The Year of Magical Thinking, opening Friday, July 26 at 7:30 p.m. In this adaptation of her best-selling memoir of the same name, Didion presents a life-affirming approach to the grief experienced after the death of a loved one. Told with eloquent language, humor, and the searing candor Didion is known for, this one-woman tour de force paints an insightful portrait of a lifetime of love and a moment of loss.

"I was at the table making a salad," Didion recalled. "John was talking about either World War I or the Scotch he was drinking when he suddenly slumped over." She thought he was making a joke about being dead-tired after their difficult day, but he was having a fatal heart attack. Didion's script is poetic in its bluntness, its seeming detachment, and its unavoidable truth as she reflects on the year following the deaths of her husband, writer John Gregory Dunne, and their daughter, Quintana Dunne Michael. Filled with often surprising insights and sharp, often self-deprecating, humor, it is the story of Didion's search for clues, for relief, and above all for the chance to accept the changing flow

"In the wrong hands this play could easily slip into a TV news program—that of watching an eyewitness report of a terrible accident," says Dawn McAndrews, TAM's producing artistic director and director on Magical. "Didion's words, in the capable hands of Janis Stevens, become not a simple accounting but a symphony, a communion of actor and audience sharing an unimaginable revelation."

Having performed the role to rave reviews at Montpelier's Lost Nation Theater and Sacramento's California Stage, TAM favorite Janis Stevens returns for her twelfth season to portray Joan Didion in this emotional journey to acceptance. Previous TAM roles include Amanda in The Glass Menagerie, Paulina in The Winter's Tale, Merteuil in Les Liaisons Dangereuses, and Amanda in Private Lives. 
offer to buy the trio but she would have none of that.

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

ost every Sunday we had to go up to the farm. My Mom's folks, Henry and Blanche Parlin, lived and farmed on Route 27. It was 8 miles north of the Lakes, just back from Route 2, where the turkey farm is now. Usually Dad couldn't go as he tended the boat rentals himself on Sundays. Old man Lee Law needed a day off to go fishing.

Mother drove the old Buick with me and at least one other kid. Being pulled out of the swimming hole or from catching red fins along the stream shore seemed like punishment. The farm was hot and smelly with flies buzzing around the animals. Our whining was replaced with mischievous thoughts when mother pulled the Buick up the long farm driveway and threw the dynaflow transmission up into park. That was the first car we had that wasn't stick shift.

Grampa usually appeared from the barn or woodshed, probably dreading our visit, knowing from past experience that we'd cause a ruckus. He knew that we liked to torment the animals and usually had cow flap (dung piles) fights. Other misdemeanors, like sliding down manure pile, were commonplace. Grampa's one strict order was DO NOT go up in the haylofts - something about packing it down, heat, mildew, fire. The minute he left the barn to go visit Mom and Grammy in the kitchen, we'd head up to the loft to romp in the hay. Every now and then we'd hit a hard spot in the hay. Turns out they were Kruger Ale bottles. I later learned that Grammy was a teetotaler. Grampa winged his empties up into the loft so she wouldn't find them. We found his stash of full Krugers in the milk cooler behind the big silver cans.

It wasn't long before Gramps was back to check on us. We'd hear his footsteps as he came through the long woodshed between the house and barn. He'd wander and yell for us as we lay super still up in the loft. I'm sure we didn't fool him at all, but he'd give up and go back in. Then it was time to raid Gram's henhouse. The chickens would go spastic as we'd disturb

them and take the eggs, only to throw them at the cows, either in the field grazing or tied in their stalls.

After aggravating all the animals, it was time for chewing tobacco. Gramps had a stash of "Day's Work" on the windowsill in the grain room. It was small rectangular "plugs" about the size of a brownie, individually wrapped in paper. We'd bet on who could keep a mouthful in the longest. Inevitably, one kid would gag and we'd spit up all over the place. In later teenage years, an old-timer Carroll Gordon, alias Cabbage from New Sharon, told me that you had to be quite old to chew Day's Work. His words were: "I'm 66 and I'm not old enough yet." This from a man who chewed Red Top or Copenhagen snuff most waking hours. Cabbage was a relative of the Day family and worked at Day's Marina in the 60s. He was one of our folk heroes, right up there with Lee Law, Red Buzzell and others.

Some Sundays were special and we went up early to prepare and eat "dinnah." This meant

Gram sent Gramps out to cull out a chicken that she called by name, which no longer laid eggs enough to suit her. God forbid that he got the wrong one. We kids were sent to help (watch) as he killed the chicken and "dressed it out." It took place in the cow barn and was a gory detail. I think we kids learned right there that chickens didn't come from Shaw's Market without some previous preparation. When it was done we proudly followed Gramps back into the kitchen with carcass in hand, ready for the boiling pot that Gram and Mother had going. Of course, it was 95 degrees in the kitchen some days, as the big old Glenwood had to be fired up to cook the chicken. The farm had wood heat only, and minimum electricity. Water came by using the hand pump on the sideboard by the soapstone sink.

By late afternoon, mother had cleaned us up from the cow manure battles. She put old towels on the back seat of the old Buick and headed back to the lake! Yeah.






Trying to Beat the Heat

Sisters Allie and Berry had a lot of fun catching these beautiful largemouth bass on East Pond.

s everyone in the Northeast has realized, Ait's been hot! Really, really hot! That's terrific for the jet skiers and swimmers and I'm sure the kids on summer vacation are lovin' it, but how does this affect the fishing? Water temperatures on the surface of our lakes here in Belgrade rose from 74° to 82° during the course of the week. But the fish are still there and persistent anglers are finding good catches despite the weather.

We spent most of the week chasing largemouth bass around the Belgrades. The week was extra special because I got to fish with a local legend. Dale Doucette has been guiding the Belgrade Lakes for about 100 years now and has a ton of knowledge. We've been friends for many years but seldom have a chance to fish together. I cherished this opportunity to learn from Dale, especially when it comes to live bait fishing (which is not my specialty). We fished a variety of lakes including live bait, specifically shiners. We fished jumbo Salmon, McGrath, East, North and Snow. Unfortunately we couldn't fish Long and Great Ponds on the last day due to severe thunderstorms. We even went out to China Lake and Lovejoy Pond on two different afternoons. The largemouth in shallow water during this heat overall bite was much the same on all the lakes. We found bass early in the morning and again in the evenings but during the heat of the day it was very difficult fishing. That's to be expected I guess. It's really hard to complain about the heat though because we all know what looms around the corner - snow and lots of it. I was listening to my favorite sports radio show in the morning while pulling my boat over to Salmon Lake and the announcer on the show said something that will stick with me forever. He said, " at least you can't shovel humidity." that made me laugh and put everything into perspective.

The best overall bite this past week was on

shiners under a float between three and 5 feet down and targeted primarily broadleaf cabbage beds but also focused on rock piles and drop offs. It was surprising to find such big wave. But they were there! The larger smallmouth bass were out in deeper water, but we really didn't target them very often. guides and bait shop owners also have some crayfish traps out now and hopefully the bait shops will be selling crayfish soon. They are a dynamite bait this time of year when the smallmouth bass get deeper. The bass love them, and I'm looking forward to some great fishing in the next few weeks. Good luck!



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

Barriers You Need to Know Where They are to Fix Them

ver the past few years the Kennebec District has been involved with a number of groups as they work to identify and fix road crossing barriers. To be clear; I'm talking about water crossings at roadways which hamper, inhibit or actually block any wildlife from traveling upstream. Usually these barriers are culverts either too small or so steep that the water flow is prohibitively fast. The most obvious barriers are "hung culverts" or culverts whose elevated outlet is perched above the pool or stream into which it empties. Imagine yourself a fish or eel trying to move upstream to areas you need to reach. It isn't a good view! They look like barriers to me.

As of this year road crossings have been surveyed from the mouth of the Kennebec River all the way to Skowhegan in order to identify road crossings which should be improved for aquatic habitat. Most of the interest is for fish passage but there are many more critters using these water pathways. Most of the focus has been along the immediate Kennebec River. That means that some of the upstream areas of the China, Cobbossee and Belgrade watersheds have not been surveyed.

This year the Kennebec District is working with the CRLA [China Regional Lakes Alliance] to continue a simplified survey into the upper



ThreeCorner Pond watersheds. While this survey is not as intense as the other surveys, it will folcrossing surveys.

So... what are we likely to find and how will the information be used? Sometimes the road crossing is a bridge. A bridge allows a more gradual water flow and the stream bed beneath the bridge is closer to a "natural" channel and stream bed. Usually we find a culvert. Frequently they are so small and/or steep that wildlife is unable to travel up them. Or they may be so damaged that most critters, and certainly fish, can't travel

through them. Or the classic - a culvert where the water runs out the lower end, drops a couple feet and scours out a large hole beneath the outlet. This is the classic "hung culvert". Many culverts also generate large amounts of erosion during spring runoff and heavy rain events. We will be able to prioritize which of these problem sites could improve water quality if they were fixed. It is expected that this information will help landowners, watershed organizations, and/or public works departments set priorities for how they

reaches of the China, Webber, ThreeMile and spend their money and plan for their future road maintenance.

It's all about helping people make more low the criteria being used for these other stream informed decisions. We anticipate that the long range result is that barriers will be removed or minimized and the entire watershed will become more healthy. And a healthier watershed means healthier water quality.

> Remember... the objective is improved water quality and native plants and animals can be a big part of that.

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
