# Bringing Back the One-on-One

Information Booth on Route 27 in Belgrade Depot earlier this summer. First, old bookshelves and racks were placed by the roadside and offered "free." Then the front of the log cabin was cleaned and cleared, grass cut, flags hung. Cars were frequently parked in the driveway. Finally, a port-a-potty appeared.

The Information Booth on Route 27 in Belgrade Depot, once a vital link between the Belgrades and the passersby was back in business by volunteers, was a unique success story until its sponsoring organization, Belgrade Lakes Region, Inc., was merged with the Belgrade Lakes Region Business Group a decade ago and the Information Booth shut down.

Twenty years ago, Belgrade Lakes Region, Inc. operated the Information Booth from June through October, printed and mailed out 15,000 brochures promoting the region in addition to personally distributing a significant quantity, acted as a reservation service and maintained a

In 1994, for example, six countries and eighteen states were represented among the two hundred plus visitors. A lot of people were traveling within state, the season stated slowly but picked up in July, fewer Canadians stopped than in previous years (due to the high rate of exchange), and more people asked for October lodging. Volunteers staffed the Information Booth for a total of 160 hours and assessed the maintenance and upkeep needs. Most of the services and supplies were donated by local businesses.









– the business of meeting and greeting visitors from all over the world, answering questions and giving directions. As close to a Chamber of Commerce as the Belgrades ever came, this rustic log building at the south end of town, run mostly "vacancy" board at the booth to enable lodgers and lodgings to get together. It also kept detailed records on who stopped at the booth, where from, and why and what trends and patterns each summer followed. During the summer of 1997, twenty-four volunteers logged 322 hours staffing the center throughout the week while one paid employee worked Saturdays all summer, upping the open

hours to 399. Approximately 800 people from around the world stopped for information and reservations. According to the visitor book they hailed from 30+ states, four Canadian provinces and such far-flung corners of the world as Bankok, Thailand, Sidney, Australia and Mali, West Africa, as well as France, Wales, Germany and England and two groups from Belgrade, Yugoslavia.

A couple of years later 12 volunteers and one employee put in 539 hours, 1,452 guests signed in from 31 states and D.C. and 9 countries and the busiest week was July 25-31. Belgrade Lakes Region, Inc., it was observed at the time, was an important force behind the tourism, visitor and vacationer traffic that so enhances the entire Belgrades' economy. Twenty-five lodging facilities – cottages, fishing camps, bed and breakfasts on all the seven lakes of the chain participated in the reservation service, and the organization belonged to both the Kennebec Valley Tourism Council and the Maine Publicity Bureau, some years sharing a booth with the former at the Eastern States Exposition where it distributed 2,000 brochures.

Steeped in history and tradition, Belgrade Lakes Region, Inc. traced its roots to the early 1900s; the Information Center was established in 1955. Originally part of the Kennebec Fish and Game Association, the organization distributed brochures and provided information for the area's tourists. The Information Booth served





uniquely for reservations.

Strange changes are happening at the Information Booth on Route 27 in Belgrade Depot, but they aren't so strange after all. The Information Booth is back in business, open initially on Saturdays, to provide that vital link





between the Belgrades and the passersby of meeting and greeting, supplying information, answering questions, and representing that good old-fashioned one-on-one that enhances the entire region.



# Pet World

It is strange how some pets will fight, literally Ltooth and nail, to avoid taking a medication, while others will go to great lengths to steal and ingest an entire bottle of a medication not intended for them. Unfortunately the latter situation can be much more dangerous than the former.

Many pet owners understand that human medications are often dangerous and sometimes deadly in their pets. However in some situations owners may actually elect to give their dog or cat human medication which can also have dire effects. For instance, some people don't appreciate the damage that Tylenol can do to their dog, or especially to a cat (tylenol can cause fatal anemia in pets). Similarly, aspirin can be taken by cats in only very small amounts. Many NSAIDs used by people, such as ibuprofen, can cause ulcers or in some cases kidney failure in pets. When it comes to medications, pets often metabolize medications differently than people.

There are many substances that are frequently given to or stolen by pets that can be dangerous and in extreme cases fatal. Certain things are well known toxins, such as rat bait, antifreeze and pesticides, but there are many household substances than may seem innocent, yet hold significant danger for our pets.

It bears mentioning a few of these things, hopefully to prevent unintentional injury to a beloved friend. Chocolate, especially dark chocolate, can be toxic for pets. The toxic ingredient, theobromine, can have a dose related effect on an animal. It can result in stomach upset, neurologic disease (stag-

gering, shaking, seizing) and in very high doses, can be fatal. For instance, a small poodle ingesting a square of dark baking chocolate may be more seriously affected than a 100 pound lab who eats a single milk chocolate candy bar.

It is always best to consult with your veterinarian, the animal emergency clinic, or poison control before trying to induce vomiting but in many cases having the pet expel what they have eaten is indicated. A home remedy to effect this is to give the animal hydrogen peroxide by mouth. It isn't pleasant but it is an effective means of inducing vomiting. Some substances should not be vomited and some pets shouldn't be made to vomit, so it is best to check first.

Xylitol, a sweetener used in many sugar free gum products and in diabetic foods, can also cause serious harm by causing low blood sugar and liver damage. Raw onions and garlic, even onion and garlic powders eaten by a pet can lead to serious hemolytic anemia and should not be fed to pets.

Some types of grapes and raisins have been shown to cause kidney failure in dogs when eaten in quantity. The basis for kidney failure following consumption of grapes or raisins is unclear, but this is being studied closely in the veterinary community.

Macadamia nuts can be dangerous to dogs. Clinical signs commonly reported in dogs ingesting macadamia nuts include weakness, depression, vomiting, incoordination, and tremors. At this time, the toxic principle is not known, nor is the reason for dog sensitivity to this nut. Other nuts, eaten whole or poorly chewed, can also cause stomach

upset and even intestinal obstruction in dogs and

If a dog ingests a piece of bread dough that is uncooked and in the process of rising, it can be fatal. The animal's body heat will cause the dough to rise in the stomach. The dough can become many times larger as it expands in the stomach. Alcohol is produced during the rising process. Signs seen with bread dough ingestion include severe abdominal pain, bloating, vomiting, lack of coordination, and depression. Surgical intervention may be required with these cases.

It should go without saying that an animal should never be allowed to have alcoholic beverages of any kind or street drugs. A pet's small size and sensitivity to these substances can lead to serious poisoning.

Clearly no one would plan to intentionally hurt their pet but inadvertent poisoning of our fur friends can happen when we don't understand the dangers. Your animal may become poisoned in spite of your best efforts to prevent it. You should keep telephone numbers for your veterinarian, a local emergency veterinary service, and the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center (1-888-4 ANI-HELP) in a convenient location. If you suspect that your pet has ingested something poisonous, seek medical attention immediately.



# Conservation-

The divers are in the water, survey work is ongo- I ing and plant identification training is underway. It's all part of implementing another very aggressive action plan this year in our battle with invasive variable milfoil on Great Pond.

And the news from the front is good. We are gaining on this very real threat to our lakes and community.

As of July 23, 14,655 gallons of milfoil had been removed from Great Meadow Stream and North Bay. That compares to about 22,000 at the same time last year.

The decrease is due to there being less milfoil in the lake, not from a scaled back effort. We actually have the same numbers of divers pulling this year as we did last year. We just started with a smaller infestation this year. That was the result of so much milfoil being removed in 2012 and the more normal spring weather this spring, which helped keep the milfoil in check a bit longer.

The STOP MIFOIL team has also surveyed all the at-risk shoreline on Great Pond and is currently at work on Long Pond. Only one new small patch has been found and it was quickly removed.

Other team members are implementing the new Adopt A Shoreline program, which invites road associations and camp owners to regularly check their shoreline for outbreaks of invasive milfoil. To date 63 individuals in 8 associations have received milfoil identification training with 3 more scheduled. If you are interested in joining their ranks, please contact Milfoil Program Director Toni Pied at 207 215-2685.

The STOP MILFOIL Capital Campaign fund also continues to grow. To date, \$85,000 has been con-

tributed in 2013. Our goal is \$150,000 and it is a very important number because we have a \$150,000 matching gift grant. That means if we raise \$150,000 the fund will match it with \$150,000 for a total contribution this year of \$300,000. If you can possibly help us reach this goal your gift will be greatly appreciated.

## **HOW YOU CAN HELP**

- 1. Learn to identify variable milfoil and be on the look out for it when you are on or near the water. Everyone needs to be vigilant to keep the milfoil from spreading and taking over our lakes.
- 2. Check your boats, trailers, kayaks, anchors, fishing lures and duck decoys and hunting blinds to make sure you are not unknowingly carrying milfoil into our lakes. It only takes a small plant can and will beat invasive milfoil. fragment to start a whole new infestation.



- 3. Sign up for Adopt A Shoreline. You can enjoy our lakes and help protect them at the same time.

seriously wonder. In a few decades will there **⊥**no longer be a U.S. Postal Service? I dare say there are about 25-30 "appeal" letters the dear postman has to tote to my mailbox each day. Each is opened – merely to assure that unused postal stamps are not included on what the sender hopes will be donations enclosed! Now and then a personal letter makes me happy the postman still comes!

In addition to the mayhem of quests for funding hundreds of good cases there is the presence of all the technological devices that have truly taken over the world of communications this day. The up side of this item is that the young people of today are as familiar with that way of contact as I was back in the 1930s to "turn on the radio." If we lose mail service I will have to resort to smoke signals!

I'm off the target again. I did not mean to speak unkindly about the way the world runs today but rather all the wonderful organizations I have learned about because of their folders arriving in my mailbox. Many such groups have so inspired me that I have answered their call for help and thus have increased my letters of appeal - but before I get into that saga again let me tell you about just a couple that have greatly inspired me with the benefits they provide.

The Chewonki Camp just a bit south of Wiscasset has been here in Maine since 1915. Nearly 100 years and thousands of young people throughout those years have lived a simple, wellfed and lots of fun life along the shore, under the trees and perhaps slept in tents and have truly seen the beauty and gifts that nature has provided.

At the outset this kind of life was seen fit only for boys. Wisdom arrived, perhaps a dozen years ago, when the need was felt that young girls should share those same important aspects of life. A location was found at Fourth Debsconeag Lake near Mount Katahdin and a girls' camp was established. In January 2011 it was awarded an American Camp Association's accreditation.

# —The Luckiest Boy—

Bean hole suppers are nothing new in Belgrade, or in many other towns in Maine for that matter. If you stay home and have beans and hot dogs for supper, you generally wouldn't think of that as a gourmet meal. So, why is it that bean hole suppers are called "special"?

Let's start with tradition. Bean hole suppers have Maine written all over them. We may not have been the first to practice cooking beans this way, but we have hung to it pretty well. The Maine logging camps had bean hole beans going almost constantly for 2 centuries. So there, beat that. In the working lumber camps, the beans were a way to feed lots of hungry men for a long winter, as the beans stored well in dry tins, and they were cheap and plentiful in the summers. Now in our time, bean hole suppers at community gatherings and fund raisers give us a taste of the past in more ways than one.

Belgrade got its start about 1960 when Lyle Strickland, a Belgrade native, went to a bean hole supper in a small town near Winthrop. Lyle returned and came to an ad hoc meeting of the fledging Belgrade Chamber of Commerce. He shared his excitement about the possibilities of starting the bean hole bean tradition as the centerpiece of fund raisers to support the new (under construction then) Belgrade Recreation Center. The early Chamber of Commerce membership included Uncle Al and Aunt Lydia Johnson, Clayton Grant, Bud and Marylyn Young, Ken Bartlett and many others, all of whom agreed to give it a shot and try to put on a bean hole supper. Finding enough black cast iron pots as well as digging and lining a fire pit were first on the list. Pots were acquired hither and skither, one at a time. The back parking lot of the building-in-progress recreation center was the natural choice for the fire pit to be dug. Many volunteers came forth to help dig and line the inside of the pit with large rocks; the rocks primary purpose was to hold the heat after a fire was burned out, though it also kept the pit sides from caving in.



# Chapter IX – The Magic of Bean Hole Suppers

The first fire, set off about noon of the previous day of serving the first Belgrade beans, went off about as planned. The wood was "hardwood slabs" including oak, maple, ash and beech, as prescribed, the best for making coals. Softwood such as pine, hemlock and spruce were no-no's, as they burned up to ash. Most lumber mills, including Hammond's, still had slabs in big bundles before the days of chipping any waste. For folks from away who don't know what slabs are, they are the rounded part of a tree that is sliced off first by the saw mill in order to "square-up" the tree for cutting into boards. Getting the cast iron pots onto the coals, now filled with beans, water and "special flavorings" was no easy task. Oh, incidentally, Al and Lydia Johnson were the keepers of the FLAVORING SECRETS for about the next 25 years, when the torch was passed to Dave and Kris Viens. Uncle Al was often accused of dribbling tobacco juice into the brew.

Moving on: Two men on opposite sides of the long narrow pit held a long pipe and slowly lowered each pot into just the right spot on the bed of coals, the spot having been prepared like a bird's nest by using long shovels or so-called spoons. This nest making business was a very hot task and usually men were sprayed constantly with the water hose. On occasion even the fire truck hose got used. In the early years, only 6 or 8 pots were used, but as more and more people came to the suppers more pots were acquired and the pit was made longer. Currently there are 13 pots used and 120 pounds dry weight of beans cooked, half pea bean and half yellow eye.

The beans cook overnight and are dug up around 6 a.m.. Water is usually added and the decision is made to either reset the pot for more cooking or leave it up to stay warm until serving time at 5 p.m.. As the years have passed, the volunteers have changed and much knowledge has been passed down. The fire department does a great job now. Many goof-ups happened during the early years and here's just a few of them.

Goof-up #1: We started the fire too early and ran short of wood. We called Skip Hammond and he showed up with the GMC pulp truck loaded with 3 cords of hardwood slabs. Skip hollered "Where do you want it?" Uncle Karl Johnson said "On the fire." So it was, it all went on at once, made an inferno for hours and we couldn't put the beans on the coals until midnight.

Goof-up #2: One year, just after lowering the last pot and covering them all with a topping of hot coals, we got a deluge of rain. A real heavy whambanger hit us first, and then it settled in and rained all night. We scurried and got some old tin sheets from Donnie Hammond at midnight, but it was a day late and dollar short. The coals got doused down real deep and the next morning at the 6 a.m. dig-up time, we sadly found that no beans were cooked at all. Chairman Karl said, "No problem, put them all in the back of my pickup." We did so and went door to door in Belgrade and Rome, asking to use people's smaller pots and ovens. Everyone said, "Sure, c'mon in." By the time we had them all in ovens it was noon. We re-collected at 3 to 4 p.m. and took the now-cooked beans back to the recreation center pit. While John and Ellen Gawler were a-twangin'-anda-wailin' away, keeping people very happy, we smuggled the beans back into the big black pots and walked them down to hang on the serving tri-pods, just at 5 p.m. No one knew the difference and fun was had by all. That's no baloney!

Goof-up #3: Each year a "bean hole chairperson" was elected (even under protest). A summer resident named Pat Murphy agreed to do the job, after all, he ran a business in Virginia and was a good organizer. Well, the day prior to the supper several of us had agreed to meet Pat at the fire pit around noon. We knocked off a bit early and went to the pit to look things over, lay out the tools needed, etc. At 12 o'clock sharp Pat rolled in with his big old Mercedes S 430. We all knew Pat and Carol well so anything

jimmied a cord from the water pump circuit and began blowing on the coals with the dryer. It worked great, an electric bellows of sorts. Of course, it's now 7 a.m. and Bill takes the hair dryer home and quietly puts it back on Marie's vanity. After her shower Marie started to dry her hair. She was instantly sprayed with ashes that had been sucked into the intake of the dryer. Bill was in the dog house for a couple of weeks.





Buttermilk Hill as a Working Farm



nown for its music festivals and flowers and veggies, its site as a youth camp campground in the 1900s and as a beacon in the 1800s – a lantern light in the dark to give travelers between Gardiner and Farmington their bearings, Buttermilk Hill (sometimes called "top of the world") is now a major working farm.

# **Belgrade Town News** 1905 - 1914



n illustrated program titled Belgrade Town ANews, 1905-1914, will be presented by author and historian Linda Snow McLoon at the Maine Lakes Resource Center in Belgrade Lakes on Wednesday, August 14, beginning at 7:30 pm.
