REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Honorable School Committee, Board of Selectmen,
and Citizens of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, Maine.
Ladies and Gentlemen:—

It gives me unusual pleasure to present this, my second annual report of schools. The general interest in schools on the part of parents and friends has been wholesome and salutary, both for the community and for the schools themselves. There has been apparent throughout this year a spirit of serious effort on the part of the teaching staff. The task of educating the young has many perplexing angles, a few of them most difficult, but, for the most part, this year has been one of steady progress and by co-ordination and co-operation our burdens have been insuperable. In a few outstanding accomplishments we have undoubtedly made an enviable advance. I should like to bring to your attention a few of those aspects, of your schools, that merit reflection and, if properly appraised, your commendation and support.

The reseating of the High School as carried out last year, has, I think, justified the hope of its proponents. I refer to the changing of the Senior High School from the upper to the lower floor under the management of the principal. The assigning of the seventh and eighth grades to a home room on the upper floor of the building had tended to greatly simplify the problems of discipline and the co-ordination of work. The ninth grade has been given the remaining room down stairs under the guidance of a home room teacher. These arrangements while helpful, would have been inadequate except for the relief afforded by the fitting up of a new room for science classes on the western side of the basement of the elementary building. This room had to be provided, in order to care for the large number of pupils taking this course, and to relieve the pressure at the High School building. In making this room available the floor, walls, lighting, and heating were considerable items in the change. This will temporarily care for the increasing needs of the High School. The Domestic Science department is very inadequately housed and rather meagrely equipped. This cannot be immediately remedied.

Repairs of School Property

The High School building was thoroughly overhauled and cleaned in a very business like way during the summer. Indeed the surprise persists on the part of those visiting the school, at the wholesome changes which a comparably small outlay wrought in the old building. The happiness at this change and the sanitary improvement are most noteworthy. The lighting was so poor in this building and such a handicap to many pupils, that it became a conviction on the part of the superintending school committee, this danger to impairment of pupil vision should be remedied. After considerable planning and with small outlay, the lighting effect was greatly improved. Citizens who have seen the above changes, have most heartedly approved of the work done.

Last year at the Christmas season a new oil burner was installed at the High School building. This heating arrangement has proved of value and has, thus far, rendered satisfaction. One of the next repair items to receive attention should be the rebuilding of the chimney. The chimney has acted, thus far, better with oil than with the use of coal. There is, however, a reasonable doubt as to its safety. I should certainly recommend that a new chimney be built before some serious consequences follow on this neglect.

The Elementary School heating plant has had some attention this past year in the matter of minor repairs. Some extension of heating surface in one of the rooms was provided. In cold weather this saves much pushing of the furnace and makes for economy of operation. The changing of certain light circuits were made at this building in the interest of safety and were of trifling importance as compared with the added assurance offered by the change.

New Teachers

There were two teachers added to the High School teaching staff in the persons of Miss Esther A. Baker and Miss Leona F. Priest. These teachers came to the teaching staff with splendid references. They have made excellent progress in their respective fields. We are happy to report that they have enjoyed their work and have taken their places in a most gratifying way. Miss Baker has taken, aside from her classroom work, certain phases of library assistance to the pupils. Miss Priest, possessing athletic ability, has given some attention to this phase of the school needs for the girls, as Mr. West has given time to the athletic needs for the boys.

Retardation

The study of retardation and promotion in the schools is, judged from the returns thus far furnished, in a healthy state. The schools are not over geared for the pupils. There are indeed certain grades where we need to place more emphasis. This we have started to do. The weakest spot in the

work now needing our support and help is in greater care and study being given to grades leaving the elementary school and trying to adjust themselves to the demands of the High School. The provision of a new teacher for this group is a step in the right direction. This teacher help will, in time, do very much to insure success to those who find adjustment difficult. The cramped quarters of the High School must of necessity make the lot of this group more acute than it would be if they had a building to themselves, or as they would be, if the Senior High School was housed on a different lot. Until this can be attained the remedial way is by internal arrangement of program with teacher help.

I hope in the coming year with your help, to lay stress on reading in the grades, with greater emphasis being placed on easy supplementary reading. Vastly more can be accomplished than we think if supplementary material can be furnished. I trust this may be borne in mind and made possible in setting the appropriations as recommended by the committee.

Old Orchard Beach a Part of School Union No. 7

The supervisory arrangement of school administration with Union No. 7 has had a year's trial since the mention of the union was made in the last report. A few changes, mostly of clerical nature, were made by school authorities on the entrance into the Union. Those changes, have for the most part, become actual working regulations by approval and use of the Superintending School Committee. These may be discussed in serial order for sake of clarity.

First: The voucher system has been adopted and has worked out most satisfactorily. No bill can or does originate except on order of the chairman of the superintending school board or by the superintendent by vote of committee. Any deviation from this course is now unthought of and makes for centralization of responsibility and immediate check up.

Second: The duplicate bill system has in its merit, I think, all that was claimed for it in sponsoring its adoption and makes for unquestioned accuracy. This system makes for good bookkeeping and good stewardship, by eliminating guess work where money is concerned. Every bill carries the date on which it was passed by the board and has at least the signature of two of the board members, which is necessary to make it a valid school bill. Thus the check up of a bill ordered on a triplicate order blank is far more accurate than by the former method.

Supplies have been requisitioned from the store room and checked up by two elementary teachers and the principal of the high school. They have and except to account for all requisitions needed for their respective buildings. Thus economical consumption of supplies is gauged to the real needs of the work to be done.

The participation of the teachers of the Old Orchard Beach schools in the teachers' meetings of the Union has been with a fine spirit of anticipation and enjoyment. They have in every instance had one or more of the members of your School Board in attendance. These meetings have been of a highly professional nature having for their object the direction and council covering the work of the next month, with a written bulletin covering the major efforts to be consummated within that period. This is a clearing house for instruction necessary for a well co-ordinated type of progress. Not a few of these meetings have had state officials or experts present who have contributed to the general discussions in a most helpful and instructive way. The Old Orchard Beach teachers have been greatly enjoyed by the teachers of the Union who have extended to them a cordial welcome to their meetings and deliberations.

Let me take this privilege of thanking the teaching staff, the citizens, the selectmen and especially the members of the superintending school committee for the opportunity which this year has offered me in serving your childhood.

To the Superintendent and Superintending School Committee:

The year, 1932, has been one of continued progress for the Old Orchard Junior-Senior High School. Every phase of our activity has felt the upward trend. Classroom teaching and accomplishment has improved. The student interest and morale is increasing steadily, as is shown by the varied school activities and the good support of them in spite of poor financial conditions. Much help has been given the whole program by the renovation of the classrooms themselves. No longer are they a drag upon the mental and physical condition of the pupils.

I want to emphasize, further, the improvement in additional equipment and new textbooks. The first advance has been seen this past year in new laboratory facilities and apparatus. Some tools and utensils have also been added to those for the Manual Training and Home Economics Departments. In regard to books, I can state that at no time in the past three years have we been more adequately supplied than at present. The majority of the new texts have been furnished for the English, Mathematics, and Science Departments and have come this year. With two or three minor exceptions all books have been changed for later editions or entirely new ones within the last two or three years.

Those of us who are in touch with the situation, daily, realize the value of such additions in the regular classroom procedure. It gives new confidence to the instruction and

The school has been further strengthened this year by the addition of another instructor. Not only has it been possible to offer a more complete curriculum but also it has helped to take care of the increased attendance. The enrollment for this year has been larger than in the past. The total number of students enrolled throughout the Fall Term of 1932-33 has been 115. We transferred to other schools in this and other states eight pupils, making our present number 107. The latter number exceeds by seven the highest total figures for the past two years. The average enrollment for the same period was 92. The average daily attendance for this year alone has been 102. Our pupil load per teacher is now about $15\frac{1}{2}$ as compared with a median of 16 for the same size schools throughout eastern and northern United States.

That we do not omit the physical side of school life is attested by the fact that we foster calisthenics, volley ball, basketball, baseball, and tennis for both boys and girls. The interest in such activities is aroused in the seventh grade and continued through the senior of high school. In the winter months the stress is placed upon basketball with which we have had a good success. The girls' team, especially, has won two district championships in the last two years, entered a state tournament by invitation, and is now on its way towards winning a third championship. Most interesting to us are the comments received from outside coaches, players, and entire strangers on the good sportsmanship and clean play of our boys and girls. Those qualities are lasting and are valuable goals in character training.

Along that phase of educational activity I will state that a positive advance has been made. Not only is good sportsmanship and clean living urged for those participating in athletics but also for the entire student body. The opening ten minutes of the school session each day in the three home rooms are used for definite character training. Short talks, stories, or poems are given or read with that purpose in mind. That such things are interesting and profitable is shown by the improved student attitude and through the frequent discussions aroused by them.

Pupil guidance is another side of the secondary school program that we have begun to promote the past year. By individual conferences with Seniors especially and even of underclassmen, some of the students have been guided on what they are to do after graduation. The study of Rugg's

Social Science Series has also given valuable help to the 7th, 8th, and 9th grades in this matter. Outside speakers have been obtained for school assemblies who have likewise made good contributions. A definite plan for outlining and explaining the different occupations and vocations is planned and will be increasingly used in the near future. In so far as it is possible it is the aim of this school to develop in the pupil the capacity and ability to become an upright, useful citizen.

Another valuable trait that we have and still are encouraging in the students is the ability to speak in public. In the past this has been promoted through local and district speaking contests and through the medium of school plays. Such methods have been increasingly followed this year. Including a local contest made possible through the generosity of the Superintendent and School Committee, representatives from the school entered four different contests. In all our entrants did excellent work. Since September, 1932, there has also been class work which combines a review of English with practical suggestions and work in both speaking and debating. Such a class should provide an excellent starting point for the improvement of written and oral English.

Scholastic achievement has not been lacking the past year. In quantity of work done there has been a decided improvement in all classes. Nor is quality slighted as is attested by frequent drills, notebooks, workbooks, scrapbooks and the like. The examination marks and grades, while not as good as the instructors would like, show some advance upon previous years. The rank for the honor roll has been raised from 80 to 85, yet there is only one less name on it than for last year.

I cannot close my report without a few words of appreciation for the faculty. The progress made this year has been due in large measure to their loyal and unstinted efforts. They have been untiring in their attempts to make Old Orchard Junior-Senior High School a large and important factor in the training of your boys and girls. The record of what they have done in 1932 is finished but they still carry on in the hope of further achievement. It has been a privilege and a pleasure for me to work with such a splendid group of teachers.

Finally, I wish to thank you, Mr. Hull and Members of the School Board, for your whole hearted co-operation, interest, and generosity. You, as agents of the Town of Old Orchard Beach have supported, adequately, carefully, and intelligently, the schools of the town. You have furnished the means whereby this school, faculty and students alike, has made its creditable record.

REPORT OF THE

HOME ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT

I am pleased to submit the following report of the Home Economics Department of the Junior-Senior High School.

Our program is quite similar to that of last year. We were pleased, however, to broaden our home-making course to include the sixth grade. They will make their cooking uniforms this year so that they may start right in with foods work in the fall, doing away with the necessity of having the sewing machines and stoves in our small quarters at the same time.

The work of the seventh and eighth grades follows the outline suggested by the State, while the Freshman Course also includes work with the school lunch. It is with considerable pride that the girls accept this new responsibility. They plan the menus, carefully keeping the cost down so that it will be within reach of a larger number, personally purchase the supplies and prepare and serve the hot dish, keeping account of all money received and spent. This project is carried on under the auspices of the Parent-Teacher Association.

The course of the advance group alternates, so that the girls are enjoying the Red Cross Nursing Course this year under the able supervision of Mrs. Foss, our own Red Cross nurse. Instead of borrowing a doll this enterprising class determined to buy one. This they did with the help of some good friends and their own hard work.

The exhibition of this department last June was a little different from usual due to the Washington Bicentennial. Besides the regular program and exhibit a special display of articles of earlier days was arranged by the girls.

The total enrollment of this department is forty-nine.

In closing, I wish to thank all those who by their kindly help and interest have helped to make this our Home-Making Course a success.

To the Superintendent and Superintending School Committee:

It is with pleasure that I submit this report of the Industrial Department for I feel that worth while progress has been made in this course during the past year.

A new subject, mechanical drawing, has been introduced. This is a popular course with the students as it is very interesting. Thus the boys learn the basic principles of drawing a plan for the article they are to make. At present wood-working drawings and sheet metal developing are being studied.

I have stressed tool processes and methods of construction with the grade students. Their projects include puzzles of all kinds, toys such as dancing men and baseball games, household articles of this type, coat hangers, whisk broom holders, and glove boxes.

The Freshmen are building racing yachts, using as far as possible the lines of the famous International Racing Yachts. Early in June we hope to take these boats to a nearby lake and to hold the "First Annual Yacht Club Races of Old Orchard Beach High School."

In the latter part of the preceding school year the boys of the upper classes refinished every desk top in the main room. This required much time and effort but furnished a practical lesson in staining and refinishing. During the entire school year the boys have made many new articles, such as a library table, rhythm sticks for an orchestra, and a filing cabinet, that various teachers have requested. The High School boys have done practically all of the minor repairs for both school buildings, including the placing of new sash cords, the repair of locks and reenforcing the boys stairway to make it safer. All of the projects have given the students valuable experience of a most useful kind and have, incidentally, saved the town a large amount of money.

Last June, the Home Economics Department and the Industrial Department co-operated in sponsoring an exhibition. This proved very satisfactory as an opportunity was offered each interested parent to become acquainted with the teacher, the department itself, and its products.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Superintendent and Superintending School Committee for the strong co-operation that my department has received at all times in getting necessary tools and new equipment.

Old Orchard Beach:

I hereby submit a report of the School Music Department for the past year:

It is quite impossible to present an annual resume of school activities without more or less repetition as the outlines of each year's work are very similar.

The elementary grades are making very satisfactory progress. The Music Hour series of text books introduced last year in grades 5 and 6 have proven excellent in every respect, and we are very desirous of having them in the remaining grades when finances permit. This book in the 6th grade, introducing exercises in tone blending preparatory to

three part singing, its correlation of music with art, literature and musical biographies, etc., is very well balanced. The entire 6th grade are performing quite difficult three part songs with special attention being given to accuracy of pitch and pure tone quality.

At the close of the fall term the grade pupils presented a program of Christmas songs, carols, recitations and short dramatizations at the town hall. This affair was attended by a large number of parents and friends, reflected much credit upon both pupils and teachers.

Music in the Junior High School is making good progress this year. There are some very promising voices in this group and Miss Priest, new to the faculty this year, is conducting class work when time permits, during the week; also accompanying during their regular lesson.

They are at this date studying "Lovely Appear" from the oratorio of "The Redemption" by Gounod, "Lullaby" by Brahms and other standard selections in two and three part forms.

The Senior High School has some excellent voices this year and we are attempting some four part songs, it being the first time we have had any tenor voices for several years.

Mr. Dolloff continues his enthusiastic support in accompany chorus and orchestra, also with his piano solos contributing much to the music appreciation lessons.

We regret the lack of some type of phonograph or radio set which would enable us to carry out a regular program of this work.

In the Music Clubs we are getting some background of music history and biography from the study course prescribed by the Federation of Music Clubs of the State.

I feel that every music student in the town is receiving not alone the practical benefits therefrom, but reacts to the real thrill and joy of self expression through this medium, for as a great educator says "Music is not learned, but *lived*!"

More music in the home is urged on every side, and is it not true that in these fast approaching "shorter working days" that music will be one of the best solutions to the problem of utilizing this extra leisure in a satisfactory way? A good musician, vocal or instrumental, is ever a welcome addition to the church or social life of any community.

May I herein express my very sincere appreciation to Mr. Hamlen and other members of the high school faculty, also to all the grade teachers, who have so cheerfully co-operated to make this school year successful in the Music Department.

I am indeed grateful to our Superintendent, Mr. Hull, and

the Board of Education, who have with unfailing courtesy and practical support furthered the work in this department at all times.

SCHOOL NURSING

Herewith is submitted the report of school nursing.

Routine inspection of toilets, buildings and water facilities has been carried on as in previous years.

Inspection of pupils in classrooms and follow up visits to homes has been daily during the epidemic periods of the year.

231 pupils were weighed, measured and given annual inspection by the nurse.

291 were examined by the school physician, Dr. L. E. Willard. The following defects and corrections were recorded:

190 pupils were examined by the school dentist, Dr. A. W. Foss.

55 pupils were eligible for Honor Roll on first examination. The average cavities per child were 4 plus showing a decrease of 1 cavity per child over the previous year.

148 were given dental prophylaxis or cleaning, 3 extractions were done in the school building.

The Local Branch American Red Cross have provided the materials for dental repair and co-operating with Dr. Foss who is contributing his time it has been possible to organize a Dental Repair Clinic for the school children. Four sessions have been held:

31 pupils were vaccinated by Dr. L. E. Willard under the annual immunization program of the Board of Health. Daily dressings at school or home were done as necessary.

15 classes in home nursing have been held in co-operation with Domestic Arts Department (Mrs. Aitkin in charge). Students are taught bed making, bathing and care of the sick, care and feeding of infants and pre-school, administration of medicine and treatments such as are recommended by physicians.

Talks on Personal Hygiene have been given to some of the upper grades.

Milk and hot lunches have been served as in the previous years. Lunches prepared in the Domestic Arts Department financed by the P. T. A. Shoes, rubbers and underclothing has been provided in many cases by this association.

I herewith submit my report of the Police Department for the year ending December 31st for your consideration.

It is a pleasure to report that our department was main-

tained, the past year, within its appropriation and having an unexpended balance of \$136.54.

During the past year we adopted a Patrol Route System, a daily officers report, a daily time and record sheet, a filing system of complaints and records of arrests, fingerprinting, a schedule of patrol and traffic duty which regulates the yearly expenditures of the department and a school-boy patrol. These additions have proven efficient and have placed the department on a working basis similar to the uniform standards of large cities.

Courtesy has been our by-word and many favorable commendations were received from tourists.

A police school was organized last spring where weekly instructions were given relative to the duties of a police officer, regulation traffic instructions and criminal law.

I wish to thank the Selectmen for their fine co-operation and the men of the department for their loyalty and faithfulness.

In Memoriam

THOMAS L. CLEAVES

Died on Tuesday, September 27, 1932, at his home on Portland Avenue, aged seventy-six years. He was born in Saco, the son of John Cleaves, proprietor of the Saco House, where he was employed with his father as clerk. He attended the Saco grade schools and Saco High School.

While a resident of Saco he married Bina S. Cleaves who, with Mrs. Helen C. O'Rourke and Mrs. Marion C. Clifford, their daughters, survive him.

He was the owner of several valuable pieces of real estate, and established a wide reputation as a restaurateur and genial host. In 1927 he retired from active business, operating his bowling alley only.

He was a life long democrat, and retained his interest in local and national politics until his death, having been chairman of the Town Committee and was a delegate to National Democratic Convention in 1928. He held the office of Selectman, Assessor and Overseer of the Poor in 1928, 1929 and 1930.

The death of Mr. Cleaves is a great loss to the town in many ways, his charitable bequests quietly and unobtrusively distributed, his deep interest in the welfare of the town, his human sympathies and his keen sense of humor, have left a memorial in the hearts of his fellowmen which will not soon be forgotten.

Town Warrant

To Irving C. Lyon, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard Beach, in the County of York:

Greeting:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Old Orchard Beach qualified to vote in said town, on Monday, the 6th day of March, A. D. 1933 at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2nd. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- 3rd. To hear and act upon the reports of the town officers and all special and standing committees.
- 4th. To see what action the town will take in relation to the pay of town officers.
- 5th. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise. 1st, common schools. 2nd, for free high school. 3rd, for free text books. 4th, for repairing schoolhouses. 5th, for school supplies. 6th, for transportation of High School pupils. 7th, schoolhouse maintenance. 8th, for Manual Training. 9th, for school physician, as required by law. 10th, for Domestic Arts. 11th, nursing service. 12th, for making and repairing highways and bridges. 13th, for support of poor. 14th, for the pay of town officers. 15th, for maintaining street lights. 16th, for contingent expenses. 17th, for sanitary expenses. 18th, for town interest on bonds. 19th, for interest on notes for money hired in anticipation of taxes. 20th, for the public library and building fund. 21st, for heating, lighting, and care of town property. 22nd, for moth nests. 23rd, for State aid road patrol. 24th, public toilet. 25th, for advertising. 26th, for payment of serial bonds. 27th, for Tarvia. 28th, for maintenance of third class highways. 29th, cleaning streets and beach.
- 6th. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commission and abatements.
- 7th. To see if the town will vote to pay the premium on Surety Bonds for Tax Collector and Treasurer.
- 8th. To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the collector for collection and what rate of interest, if any, will be charged thereon, thereafter.
- 9th. To see if the town will vote pursuant to Section

83 of Chapter 5 of the Revised Statutes 1930 to authorize the issuance and negotiation by the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, of notes of the town, in anticipation of taxes, to the amount which shall not exceed in the aggregate outstanding at any one time \$100,000, for temporary loans to be paid during the current year in which they are made out of money raised during such current year by taxes.

10th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes to pay those, if any, which fall due the present year.

11th. To see if the town will authorize the assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

12th. To see what action the town will take and what sum of money, if any, the town will raise to maintain one or more regular patrolmen.

13th. To see what action the town will take and what sums of money the town will raise to maintain a police force; to construct and maintain sidewalks; to construct and maintain sewers and drains; to maintain a fire department; to maintain town team and driver; for hydrant rental; for liquidating Serial Bonds; for interest on debt incurred in the fire department, sewers and loans, all within the limits set out in Section IV, of the act of incorporation of the Town of Old Orchard, to be a separate tax, to be assessed and collected as provided in said act.

14th. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 28 of the Public Laws of 1930.

15th. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,466.00 for the improvement of the section of the State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 28 of the Public Laws of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 22, Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

16th. To see what streets or parts of streets the town will vote to lay dust during the summer months, what the sum of money they will appropriate for the same.

17th. To see what action the town will take in regard to permitting peddling or the taking of pictures by transient photographers, or any other business or use of automobiles,

motorcycles, aeroplanes and other fast moving vehicles on Surf Street during the so-called Beach Season.

18th. To see if the town will vote and to provide seats for the Beach, and other places about town for the use of our summer guests, using any money necessary therefor from the contingent fund.

19th. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to employ special officers as life guards from July 1st to Labor Day, and what sum they will appropriate therefor.

20th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

21st. To see if the Town will vote to accept Old Salt Road, so called, as laid out by the Selectmen.

22nd. To see if the town will vote to raise money to provide for the services of a public health nurse, or take any action thereon, and what sum they will so raise.

23rd. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation, in whole or in part, the property of the Home for Aged People Association for the year 1933.

24th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to pay from any monies in the contingent fund, the sum of \$50.00 to the C. Fayette Staples Post, American Legion, for the care and decoration of soldiers' graves.

25th. To see if the town will vote to have the tax collector maintain his office in the Town Building from the first day of July to the first day of October, 1933.

26th. To see if the town will vote to purchase snow plow used during winter on lease, and if they so vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars therefor.

27th. To see if the town will vote to reimburse Florence O. McNeill for overpayment on taxes to the amount of \$34.00 for the year 1931.

28th. To see if the town will vote to reimburse Rev. J. J. Mullen for taxes paid on lot #64 on School Street for a term of years caused by error in the records, amounting to \$57.50.

29th. To see if the town will vote to reimburse George H. Bernard for taxes paid by error 1929-30-31-32, amounting to \$48.00.

30th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$250.00 to fight the White Pine Blister Rust. The State will add fifty per cent to the amount raised and local labor will be used.

31st. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Assessors to recind any amounts appropriated by the town for State Aid Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.

32nd. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, P. L., 1931.

SIDEWALKS

33rd. To see if the town will vote to construct sidewalks on the following streets or avenues as petitioned for by various persons: construct walk on West Grand Avenue, from Colby Avenue to Winona Avenue; on westerly side of Flint Street from East Grand Avenue, a distance of 90 feet. Repair walk on 4th St. Ocean Park, repair walk on Temple Avenue, repair walk on easterly side of Barton Street construct sidewalk on Grove Avenue, construct walk on easterly side of Flint Street.

TARVIA

34th. To see if the town will vote to add York and Traynor Streets to the list of streets to which Tarvia shall be applied; also Sea View Avenue, from Hillside to North Street; Forest Avenue from Union Avenue to Sea View Avenue; Eleventh Street; Wesley Avenue; from Eleventh Street to 15th Street.

HIGHWAYS

35th. To see if the town will vote to grade and gravel Sea View Avenue from Hillside Avenue to North Street; grade and gravel Eleventh Street; grade and gravel Wesley Avenue from 11th Street to 15th Street; grade and gravel Milliken Road; grade and gravel York Street and Traynor Street. Grade and gravel Smith Wheel Road. grade and gravel Morrison Street, grade and gravel Grove Avenue to Norway Avenue.

SEWERS, ETC.

36th. To see if the town will vote to extend sewer on Sea View Avenue from present terminal northerly to Somerset Avenue; to construct a catch basin on Atlantic Avenue at or near the residence of David Treanor; to construct a sewer on Maine Avenue or a portion thereof; construct a sewer on lower part of Ocean Avenue.

37th. To see if the town will vote that all amusements shall close not later than twelve o'clock daylight saving time, if such time is in use, except the nights preceding July 4th and Labor Day.

38th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire the money for the transaction of business and payment of bills in January and February, for which there is now no provision.

39th. To see if the town will vote to construct a bulkhead sidewalk 18 feet or more wide along Surf Street of concrete.

a. Providing the town so votes, if the town will vote to assess abutters one third of the cost of such sidewalk.

1. Providing the town so votes, to instruct the assessors to assess such abutters costs in equal installments over a period of four years.

b. Providing the town so votes, to instruct the Selectmen to employ only citizens of the Town of Old Orchard Beach in the construction of same and to further instruct them that such construction may only be carried on from October 1st of each year until May 15th succeeding, as weather and tide conditions permit.

1. To further instruct the Selectmen to employ no man more than five days per week per eight hour day and at a rate not to exceed three dollars per day, except construction supervisor.

c. Providing the town so votes, to instruct the Selectmen to employ at reasonable cost an engineer to draw plans and specifications for this project. Such plans to be adopted at a special Town Meeting of the Citizens, and when adopted to be standard for such continued construction from year to year.

d. Providing the town so votes to amend the Town By-Laws as follows:

Any person, firm or corporation owning property abutting upon the Surf Street sidewalk, using or renting such property for any other purpose or business except a residence or hotel shall be assessed in a special assessment at the annual rate of five dollars per front foot for such property so used.

e. To see what amount the town will appropriate for construction in the year 1933-1934.

f. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to begin such work at the foot of Old Orchard Street and to extend such work or construction equally in a northerly and southerly direction.

40th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to lay out a public way, highway or street, two hundred feet wide, from a point upon Surf Street at or near the former Wesley G. Smith property and the junction of the extended former branch Eastern Railroad and thence westerly by north along this former right of way to limit of the Town of Old Orchard Beach. This highway or street to be

continued by the co-operation of, if and when secured, of the City of Saco and the State of Maine to its junction with the State Highway Number 1.

41st. To see if the town will vote to approve the list of Jurors as presented by the Selectmen.

42nd. To see if the Town will vote to change location of lights on Portland Avenue to former position.

43rd. To see if the Town will vote to accept Morrison Street as laid out by the Selectmen.

44th. To see what action the Town will vote to take to control and limit the use of loud speakers, so called, used so extensively for advertising purposes during the summer months.

45th. To see what action the Town will vote to take if any in regard to the recent offer made by the Saco City Government for a settlement of the line between the City of Saco and the Town of Old Orchard Beach, the amount stated being \$11,500.

The polls will be open at 9 o'clock A. M. and will remain open until 1 o'clock P. M.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall Thursday, Friday and Saturday afternoons, from 2 to 5 o'clock P. M. March 2-3-4, for the purpose of correcting the voting list.
