
It's those outings, too, from small to spectacular, that make lasting memories, memories that reach across the miles, that smooth the separations, and that make livable the other seasons.

Cobbossee Corner -

The Lakes of Maine from a CBI Perspective



The summer is beginning to wind down, but the L lakes of Maine are still busy with boaters out on the water, whether it's to fish, cruise or pull their kids behind on tubes. They are also busy with the Courtesy Boat Inspectors (CBIs) on duty every weekend to fight the battle against invasive plants. The CBIs come from all different agencies around the state including the Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed, which patrols this area's watershed, spanning from Torsey Pond to Cobbossee Stream. Ten of the busiest boat launches of the Cobbossee Watershed have CBIs inspecting the area in an effort to keep the lakes of Maine clear of invasive plants, which can choke off all other species in the lakes they infest and are very hard to remove. CBIs are the first line of defense in the fight, offering a free inspecting service to each boater before and after they go into our lakes. Along with inspecting the boats, they are teaching and reminding boaters of how to inspect their boats when a CBI is not on patrol.

As part of the 20+ person team of CBIs from the Friends, I spend many weekends on the lake watching and inspecting boats. I am surprised and

> impressed everyday by the number of boaters who are cooperative and encouraging to the cause, often offering the information I need before I start my first sentence. They often share with me that they've already washed or checked their boat on their own and am pleased to hear that most take the advice that we give to heart. I am always asked questions about the program and thanked for the service we provide to keep the lake clean. Out of the four years that I have been working as a CBI, I have only been refused an inspection once. I am usually greeted with smiles and hellos of boaters happy to learn and do more to protect their lakes for years to come; they are the greatest and most important ally to keeping our lakes clean.

> The Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed CBI patrol program has been established for 10 years and has inspected a total of nearly 60,000 boats; 8,700 in 2012 alone. With the help of programs such as these, the spreading of invasive plant infestations has drastically decreased. With infestations in only four water bodies in the district and 48 in the State of Maine as a whole, the Maine Milfoiler Program is doing its part to keep the 6,000 Maine lakes and streams clean and enjoyable for all Mainers. The Friends CBI program is funded by a combination of sources, including donations by local lake associations, surrounding towns, Friend's member donations and grant funding from the Maine Department of Environmental Protection via sales of the Maine Milfoil Sticker. The program is also funded by several area business sponsors, including: Knowlton Hewins & Roberts Funeral Homes, Smart Eyecare Center, and Kristie Rowell Insurance Services. > Often people say "there's no good news in the papers these days." Such a collection of short vignettes that I have recounted refutes that state-





the word camp brings up images of opening their old log place in spring. "The bathtubs and sinks were often full of spiders and daddy longlegs, as well as bureau drawers with acorns and mouse poop from winter residents. There were always docks to fix, brush to cut, boats to launch and motors to start. The magic part was the future it promised; a summer of fun, fishing, and for the kids, freedom to explore and rekindle wonderful connections with friends."

Joan Witkin, summer resident from New York, lists the ingredients of her magical images of camp. She says, "of course there's the more obvious magical parts , the lake, the loons, beautiful trees and shoreline just to name a few." An added extra for Joan and her husband Bill are feelings generated from the fact they are the current owners and caretakers of a 120-year-old log camp with outbuildings on a island. As the fourth owners, Joan and Bill feel a reverence for the property and for previous owners, as well as a responsibility to maintain the originality of the buildings, land and the continuity of purpose. Last but not least says Joan, "the bonding that has taken place here during our 30 year tenure, both with local people as well as friends and family, has created an irreplaceable common denominator."

In summing up the definition of "camp," in no short order, it seems the word means an array of many different things to many different people. We've heard definitions and ideas including: a desirable place to go that is away from home, usually away from normal work and hectic schedules. A place to kick back a bit, squander time without a schedule, a place to reconnect with old friends and meet some new ones. A place to rejuvenate the mind and body. A place to watch nature carry on itself and feel a part of it. A place to carry out favorite activities. All in all, it seems the word "camp" is surely not just a building, and the word "place" is by far the most commonly used. Maybe the Romans had it right. WHATSA CAMP TO YOU?

C aying goodbye to both "Summertime in the Delgrades" and guiding/living here for 20 years is very difficult, but change is good for a human and this is going to be a huge change! While I'm looking forward to exploring the Bar Harbor/Acadia National Park area with my family and experiencing all its beauty, leaving such a wonderful place as the Belgrades is not easy. How do you say goodbye to your home? There's so much to cherish here: the people, the lakes, the fishing, the hunting, the hiking ... it's a dreamland ... its home. Personally I'll miss the people most. When you do what I do, you make lifelong friends; people you care about even if you only see them once or twice a year. Guides find themselves looking forward to seeing their "sports" when they visit for vacation, and I'm going to miss all my friends very, very much.

Rather than being sad and melancholy, I'd rather say goodbye with a smile on my face and keep the memories that will forever be burned into my mental CD. The best part has been watching youngsters grow up from year to year and seeing them go from "duffer" fishermen to

expert casters and fish catching machines! So many examples but one that really sticks into my mind is Andrew Volkers who comes up and stays at Whisperwood Lodge with his dad Russ. These guys are icons at Whisperwood and I'm privileged to be their friend. The first time Andrew and I fished together he was only 13 and just learning modern fishing methods. Now he's a grown man and outfishes just about everyone with precision casting and a knack for catching the big one. Fishing is in his blood and it's been a joy watching him develop into an expert! We got to fish this past week for largemouth and some northern pike. The bite was really good, and he actually caught big largemouth, smallmouth, northern pike and pickerel all in the same day.

That's what the Belgrades offer to anglers, a smorgasbord of fish and a chance at a trophy around every turn. We caught some fish on live bait and some on spinner baits and swim baits, too. Russ caught a big largemouth on a 6 inch Senko rigged Texas Style. During the heat of the summer, larger baits seem to work better for big fish. The largemouth don't want to expend energy unless there's a meal worth eating – you know the old saying ... big bait = big fish.

A few years ago my friend and fellow Belgrader Dr. George Spann was retiring as President of Thomas College (my alma mater). George and I are friends and can talk candidly about any topic. 

- Conservation Too -

The past couple of years have seen an increase in terrestrial invasives. And some of my recent LakeSmart Evaluations have provided plenty of evidence.

While we continue to focus much of our attention on controlling aquatic invasives, there is a lot more land cover than water cover out there. Only 17% of the Belgrades Watershed is water covered. And of that water, less than 5,500 acres will support milfoil growth [water depths of under 15 ft]. Only 11% of the Cobbossee Watershed is water covered. And of that, less than 4,700 acres will support milfoil growth. These are rough estimates but make the point that the land base is far larger than the "milfoil threatened" area.

Point being that there is a great deal more land that is being invaded than water.

What are the culprits? Well...many of the plants read like a world atlas i.e. Japanese Barberry, Oriental Bittersweeat, Norway Maple, Canadian Thistle and Russian Olive are just a few. This year seems to have far more Multi Flora Rose, Japanese Knotweed [bamboo] and Russian/Autumn Olive. Your back yards are feeling the pressure of these invasive plants. Naturally, there is a long list of other invasive plants [check out

http://www.maine.gov/doc/nrimc/mnap/features/inva sives.htm for both a list and pictures]. The Natural Areas Program also has a good website at www.maine.gov/doc/nrimc/mnap/features/invsheets.htm . If you have the chance, stop at a Cooperative Extension office and pick up some of their handouts.

In most cases, trying to control their spread is difficult. First you need to recognize that there is a problem. That occasional plant out back with interesting foliage and a pretty flower might become a thick bank of vegetation if you leave it. Take a look along the edge of the woods on your property and note the occasional spring clusters of white flowers which indicate Multi Flora Rose.

Next year that small patch of white flowers will be joined by additional mounds of nasty thorn covered plants. Removal is much more difficult. Before long that area can become a breeding ground of fruit and seeds which get spread to neighboring properties.

Our natural landscape is part of what Maine is all about. Its future depends on the choices we make. When buying plants or moving them from place to place, consider whether the plants are likely to escape. Plants advertised as fast growing, prolific, and soil tolerant are often the ones that become invasive. Note the popularity and the spread of the Euonymus alata ["Burning Bush"]. Maine just won't be Maine if the plants dominating our landscape are all from away. As Harry Potter's professor, Mad Eye Moody, would say, 'constant vigilance'.

• Replace invasive plants in your garden with non-invasive alternatives.

• DO NOT attack the problem with indiscriminant herbicides. They may have a place in the battle but they are not a magic bullet. Be careful with their use.

Remember, there is a lot to do in order to protect water quality.


Who was Anna Held?

Anna was a star of light musicals and comedy. She claimed to have been born in Paris. Researchers believe she was probably born in Warsaw. In any case, she loved France. Anna was also the first wife of Florenz Ziegfeld and a founder of what became known as the Ziegfeld Follies. Anna first met Ziegfeld in Paris, and for both of them it was love at first sight. At that point, Anna had just begun a career on the stage; Ziegfeld was still an unknown. But romance and finance followed when Ziegfeld convinced Anna to come to America to star on the New York stage. Anna's English was almost non-existent, and she seems to have learned her first roles tentatively trying out English vocabulary and pronunciation. Anna was a beauty. She was around five feet tall with an hour glass figure; her Parisian charm enchanted New York audiences.

How did Anna and Florenz Ziegfield discover Belgrade? A possible answer is the Belgrade Hotel. At the turn of the century, the Belgrade was new and drew tourists from "away." Anna was friends with Diamond Jim Brady who, in turn, was friends with Lillian Nordica, a famous turn of the century opera star from Farmington, Maine. Perhaps Madame Nordica recommended the Belgrade, and the cottage which one sees was one of the Belgrade's out buildings. But the cottage could have been far from the Belgrade; it looks like many of the turn of the century cabins around the


lakes, most of which have disappeared.

Anna often arrived in Belgrade by train from New York City. And she may have come in her own luxurious railroad car. A train left for Belgrade Lakes from NYC early in the morning and took less than ten hours to reach Belgrade Depot in the late afternoon. A horse drawn carriage or automobile would then take Anna to her Belgrade Lakes destination. Anna Held's arrivals by train were tracked by the local Maine newspapers, and well-wishers and paparazzi were often present to witness her arrivals and departures. speed, a drive—o century. Anna may have had a car in Belgrade Lakes. One photo on Google Images shows her in a car with what looks like a lake in the background. The slope of the ground may indicate she was in front of the Belgrade where Mrs. Gee's Village Peddler and Charles Pierce

Bookseller now stand. Anna loved cars, she loved speed, and it seems that she learned quickly how to drive—quite a feat in the long dresses at the turn of the century.

In 1918, near the end of the war, Anna became the victim of an incurable bone cancer. By this time, she and Florenz were divorced. Florenz Ziegfeld was married to Billie Burke--the good witch in "The Wizard of Oz." But Florenz knelt at Anna's sick bed as they talked for hours. Sadly, Anna died a few months before the armistice which ended the war. Although Anna Held was one of the greatest stars of her time, she has mostly been forgotten. The post card labeled Anna Held Cottage reminds us that she once enjoyed summers in Belgrade Lakes. Perhaps there is a reader of this column who remembers where Anna Held's cottage once stood?





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
