I am a

volunteer by your request. Serving in  
the third Regiment of V. M. M. Co. B. of  
Augusta, and knowing that there  
has been Petitions signed and sent  
to you for a furlough or discharge

I wish to inform you that if any  
has been sent from this Company  
it is a forgery. or else got up very  
secretly by some homesick booby.

There is a few in every company who  
are continually harping and thinking  
about home, which creates a disagreeable  
feeling among whole Companies  
if those selfish ones could be got  
rid of we should have more Peace  
We have found things rather disagreeable

Sometimes but have not actually suffered any yet. our defeat at Bull's Run was disastorous to our discipline and we had some inconveniences thereby. but now we are pleasantly located, and begin to be ourselves again. Many men in the regiment got the Idea into their heads that the Government could not hold us longer than three mos. out of the State of Maine. hence arose those petitions referred to.

Col. Howard read <sup>us</sup> a letter which he received from you, it appeared to upset their going home logic and I have not heard so much about it since. I for one came out here to help protect our glorious Union and am willing to fight, suffer or even die if need be for the same object. I have many endearments at home to call my attention. but if I should send a petition to my Gov. for a recall when my help was most needed

here, I should not dare hold up my head after I arrived in Maine.

We are bound to crush out Rebellion establish the flag of our country over each State, and return to you, bearing the same flag which you saw us wave when we left Augusta. Soiled and Battle worn it may be but not dishonored! and this sentiment I believe to be cherished in the Augusta Companies if not in all.

Pardon me for addressing you but I could not bear to think that our Company Should be misrepresented.

I have often been at your beautiful home in Orono Me. and am your
