

Headquarters 8th Brigade

August 18th 1861

To the Hon. Israel Washburn
Governor of Maine

Sir

I have received your

letter with regard to enlistments in the 8th Regiment
and have ascertained the number of men wanting to
fill up each company as shewn in the accompanying
list. I have also received the communication of

Colonel Wildes with regard to Captain Savage - I

recommended his immediate discharge to Head
Quarters, but have not yet received a reply.

^{Co F} from Governor with regard to him. Can the Governor
withdraw his Commission for the following reasons.

1. That his company needs a Captain with it.
Lieut Stearns is an excellent officer, but he
was born officed with lameness and he does not
think it right to do the duty of Captain through
the Campaign & receive only the pay & emoluments
of a Lieutenant.
2. If Capt Savage is still sick what guarantee
has his Company or the Government that he
will ever resume his duties. If he was in the
Army for life a furlough of several months would
not be minded in time of peace, but in time of war every
man is needed & in his place.
3. His conduct with regard to bounties does not seem to be
strictly honorable. At any rate he has withdrawn
from three poor boys a bounty they were entitled
to & only at last paid John Santish his on solicitation.
4. When with the Company he was as I leave, utterly
inefficient. I would respectfully recommend, at least,
that the Governor ask his discharge of the War
Department that his place may be filled.

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I also send you a list of deserters with their places of residence.

We have been neglected by the Government with regard to supplies. Every thing is now reported to be in Washington ready for us, but I assure you, I have been soundly abused for the delay of a month, in providing shirts & clothes - but my dear Sir I have made every possible exertion to hasten the supply. I read your appropriate letter to the signs of a request for discharge. That with the sending of the men from the 2^d Regt. to Portugal I think has had a wonderful effect upon our troops. The 3^d Regt. has a great number sick. Exposure, change of Climate & diseases previously contracted are among the causes. I visited each kitchen tent this morning and found with but one exception that the food was good. We shall see brighter days before long.

I wish to defend myself against some charges that the present state of our men have necessarily evolved.

First with regard to "Bull Run". I did not move my Brigade 7 miles at double quick. The double quick appertained to the rear of the column and was occasioned by opening out & straggling. The 4th Regt. lead & they do not complain of double quick.

When we did move at double quick the order was imperative to me to do so. Even then I saw it could not be done & stopped it before we had moved a half mile.

Second with regard to supplies the fault if there is one lies with the contractors not with the officers in the field.

Third. Again the other day wagons were sent to Gen^l Kearny & myself were ordered to move the same day. Gen^l

~~Early~~ first. He used the wagons for two days & they came to me at 1 P.M. of the second day, also orders by telegraph to move at once. The 3^d Regiment & the 5th had a bad time but if the men had been in good spirits they would not have minded such night march of 3 miles, but as it was the night & the long processions waiting created a good deal of feeling. I have to shoulder these things, but I do not mind it provided the idea does not obtain with you that I am inefficient or careless. You doubtless know that the honor & welfare of our troops is nearest my heart; and that, I am jealous for the reputation of my beloved State. I hear today that Major Primer does not wish the position of Brigadier General of Volunteers and am now hoping that I may be appointed to that honorable position. I have just reorganized my Staff for the 8th Brigade, and for the sake of the officers chose on it & to prevent the feeling that I have been degraded for some fault I hope I may have the position. Mr Bent ^{will} returned to the Regiment in the capacity of Captain of Comp. 15th.

I am glad to see that you are remonstrative for Governor and am sorry to hear that secession sentiments are uttered in Maine. I had a sergeant reduced to ranks for uttering just such thoughts as those reported of one branch of the Dem. Convention at Augusta. The more I think of the conduct of our troops at Bull Run, the more am I convinced of their real efficiency. They stood fire as well as regulars till the word for retiring was given - With a battery ^{of the enemy} on either flank & nearby & a sharp encounter of musketry from the front, it is wonderful that we stayed where we did.

so long. I think the 2nd Maine deserves all the praise
it has gotten for good conduct. (I mean from
responsible sources). but our portion of Maine
men deserve equal credit. Our March ^{was twice}
traversed as long & rapid. I say this because some
are disheartened because they are not noticed,
