
Want theater? The Gaslight Theater in Hallowell and the Theater at Monmouth both have performances during Whatever.


Want trails? A Trail-O-Thon, Half Marathon and 5K on the Kennebec River Rail Trail are scheduled for June 22 in Augusta.

ocal classical music lovers are in a for a rare Itreat when a nationally broadcast radio program featuring talented teen and tween musicians comes to Sidney. From the Top will tape a program at the New England Music Camp on Friday, June 20, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m., and this taping is open to the public.

Based in Boston and hosted by classical concert pianist Christopher O'Riley, the show is heard by an estimated 70,000 listeners on over 240 public radio stations coast to coast. In Maine, it is broadcast Mondays at 8:00 p.m on the Maine Public Broadcasting Network, locally on WMEW, 91.3 FM in Waterville.

From the Top debuted in the year 2000. To date, it has recorded some 290 radio broadcasts before live audiences in more than 140 U.S. cities and towns and two foreign ones, featuring more than 3,000 young artists from across the United States and beyond, who audition to appear. Although the June performance will be the program's first visit to Sidney, it will not be its first time in Maine: its most recent taping in the Pine Tree State was on Leap Day 2012 at Bowdoin College in Brunswick.

The site of the Sidney show, the New England Music Camp is nestled along a half-mile of the eastern shore of Messalonkee Lake, a.ka. Snow Pond. Founded by Paul and Nina Wiggin in 1937, the camp is now operated by the Wiggins' grandson John Wiggin and his wife Kim.

Since its beginnings, the camp has been a rustic summer retreat for young students of classical music, as well as for their instructors. The camp's



Pet World

Tt is interesting how dogs seem to mimic us in contrast for a dog to see than a red one. Lso many ways, and yet what they see may be significantly different from what we see. When a dog chases a toy, or catches a treat, or lunges to take something from our hand, it may be visually challenging for them. To understand how a dog processes the world with their eyes, we have to consider the color spectrum they see, the acuity or fine detail they possess, their field of view, their perception of movement, and their depth perception.

It has generally been believed that dogs have an inability to process colors and see only shades of grey. More recent research has proved that they do see in color, but with a more limited spectrum of colors. Dogs see color primarily in the blue-violet spectrum and the yellow spectrum, but not too much in between (which is processed in shades of grey). They are similar to people who have red/green color blindness. Instead of having three types of color receptors (called cones) in their retinas, they only have two types. They also have fewer cones overall than people do, which makes colors less saturated for them.

For a dog, a red ball on a green background may be indistinguishable. They do however possess much finer distinction of shades of grey than we do. Blues are probably the most intense color they see. It is interesting that dog toy manufactures cater to people when they make toys in bright reds and oranges; a toy that is blue with white or yellow stripes may provide much better

Eye of the Beholder

A dog's ability to process fine detail, especially up close, is very limited compared to the average person's. Where good vision for a person is 20/20, most dogs would test at about 20/75. Even within the species, certain individuals and breeds have less acuity. They see their world as slightly fuzzy and blurred. They would never be given a driver's license without the stipulation that they wear glasses! Fine detail is not as important to them when it comes to survival and living, however.

One advantage that dogs have over us is that they do see better in dim light. They have the ability to reflect light inside their eyes and process it repeatedly due to the presence of the reflective tapetum in their retina; it is the tapetum that gives their eyes that green glow when light is shone in their eyes. Dogs also have more of the retinal light receptors, called rods, that process images in low light.

Generally, most dogs see things at a distance more clearly than things that are closer to them. They are especially good at noticing movement in the distance, allowing them to see prey and go after it, a legacy of their wild ancestors. Using their superior nightvision, they see movement in dim light better than we do. They also tend to ignore stationary objects.


The position of the eyes in the head also changes the amount of peripheral vision they possess, while limiting the range of binocular vision in the center of their field of view. This

affects their depth perception and makes it more challenging for them to see things right in front of them. Dogs with longer noses like Collies and Greyhounds have difficulty focusing on something literally under their noses. Handing a dog a treat can result in them grabbing at your hand. Largely this is because they cannot gauge how close you are just by looking.

While it is a little sad to think that dogs see our world as more muted, grey and fuzzy than we do, we have to keep in mind that they more than make up for their vision limitations with other senses, like hearing and smell. They smell the world in Technicolor and Imax 3d. They possess seventy times the cells that process scent in their noses than we do. I am always amazed how my dogs know when their boy is coming home minutes before he drives in the yard. They hear his car coming half a mile away, and can discern the exact sound of his car from all the others driving by.

As dogs age, many develop an aging change in their lenses that gives their eyes a slightly blue tinge behind the iris. It is known as lenticular sclerosis, and can lead to further loss of detail that they can see. While often mistaken for cataract (which is more serious), lenticular sclerosis is not a pathology. An old ophthalmologist's joke is," Well, he won't be able to read the paper anymore, but he probably never did".-





water. Although there is a vast museum and visiting center for the existing bottling plant, the State of Maine Building might be the aim of this short trip. Back in 1892, an international exposition was opened in Chicago to celebrate the 400th anniversary of the discovery of America. Charles Summer Frost, a Lewiston architect, was chosen to design the State of Maine building. Once the celebration was ended, it was decided to donate the structure to portray the granite, slate and artistic abilities of native Mainers to the city. Land in Lewiston, however, was limited and the offer was rejected. Hiram Ricker and his sons stepped up to the plate, paid \$30,000 for the building and \$5,000 to have it dismantled and shipped back to Maine. A 16car train was hired and each part of the building was hand loaded. Once back in Maine it was reassembled and situated in an oak grove on the Ricker property near where the Grand Hotel of Poland Spring was once located. Today it is open throughout the summer months for visits.

It was a Friday night, or at least early evening, in August 1964. Something seemed astir in Belgrade Lakes. Teenage kids were milling around the store and marina, the boat and foot traffic had increased a notch or two from most other week days. *Of course*—it was dance night at the old recreation center up near where the fire station is now.

The good parents of Belgrade had built the place back in the late 1950's after the hotel burned. The loss of the hotel had left a void and several business and social minded folks thought a new start and focus was needed. The Chamber of Commerce was formed and then a building was planned and built by volunteers. It was built with cedar half-logs that were tongue and grooved and a yellow pine floor to withstand the wear and tear of large groups of people and various other uses. Among the uses was a place for the youth of town, both year- round and seasonal, to come together and dance. The oldsters had their dances on Saturday nights, and also Bingo was played every Wednesday night. The C of C building became generally known as the Rec Center. The Bean Hole suppers were held there for about 40 seasons until the new Center For All Seasons was built. The beans are still cooked in the same pits at the old location, although the Rec Center was flattened by snow load a few years ago and later burned up by the fire department.

As the clock proceeded toward 7 p.m., dance opening time, kids began the trek up Main Street. Groups usually from two to ten young folks formed as they wandered up towards the dance hall. The music was usually being played on the older record players—you know the 45's with the "fat center hole," though once or twice a summer we got to have a live band. Once we had a group named the Moon Dawgs and thought we were hot stuff. By the time the kids were almost to the Dairy Bar, warm- up music could be heard wafting through the woods. Songs like " Devil or Angel" by The Clovers or "The Great Pretender" by the Platters were apt to be blaring out of the building. As kids came in through the old double-hinged screened doors, the magic was apparent to most. A quick scan was always necessary to check out who had shown up-and was the



one you hoped for there? As you might expect, the boys migrated toward one side of the long hall and the girls on the other. It sometimes took a lot of courage to walk across that floor and ask someone to dance, especially if you were the only one taking the walk. Some nights it took a couple of good fast songs like "I Get Around" by the Beach Boys and "Let's Twist Again" by Chubby Checker to get things rolling. Before you knew it 10 p.m. was getting near, and if you hadn't danced with the one you really wanted to, the pressure was on. As last dance was called by the volunteer who was spinning the records, it was do-or-die time. "See the pyramids along the nile," opening words from The Dupree's version of "You Belong To Me," came blaring out of the old speaker and maybe you got to hug that special one for the last dance-and you didn't let go until the lights came on!

Some of the girls actually cried at the last dance of the season, especially when the song "See You in September" was played. THE END

The Colby College Museum of Art in Waterville is currently presenting "Lois Dodd: Cultivating Vision," an exhibition that brings together nearly fifty drawings, watercolors, and prints, spanning four decades, given by the artist to the museum in 2010. These works on paper are paired with a selection of early paintings from the 1950s and 1960s and shed light on drawing as both an ancillary and an autonomous part of her artistic practice.

Growing up in the Tri-State area, Dodd was influenced both by her studies at Cooper Union in

New York City and by her summers spent on Penobscot Bay on Maine's Mid-coast. The themes she represents are often specific to her location, such as Maine landscapes peppered with old farmhouses, gardens, and verdant fields, or glimpses of buildings and cityscapes through windows.

Plant Buffers for Birds



"Plant for the birds," is the message from Sharon Turner, certified master gardener, consultant, educator and designer. Emphasizing that the main goal of buffers is to keep the run-off out of the lake, Turner teaches about and grows buffers that bring beauty to the lakefront home – and nourish the birds. Such buffers are plants that attract soft belly insects, which the young of the bird population is able to capture and digest. Although the list of perennials, shrubs, vines, trees and herbs that are especially good for birds is long, for starters and simplicity Turner suggests elderberries and dogwood.

– Take It Outside –

ast week I mentioned the diversity of outdoor activities available in our region. The Belgrade Lakes have been attracting summertime visitors for well over a century. Before the invention of the automobile, visitors came by train and were met at The Depot and transported by buckboard to the old Belgrade Hotel on Long Pond, behind where the Sunset Grille is today. In the morning, the local guides would pick up their "sports" and spend the day rowing or paddling them around catching the native trout, often cooking one for lunch on one of the islands. Other guests golfed, swam, rowed, or hiked in the area. Stop in to the Maine Lakes Resource Center (MLRC) on Main Street and you can see exhibits of many old photographs of these early days.

The Belgrade Lakes still teem with fish, especially smallmouth bass that are descendants of the fish stocked by the Belgrade Lakes Association (BLA) when they first met in 1908. All the lakes have both smallmouth and largemouth bass, with smallies dominating in the deep rocky lakes like Long Pond and proportionately more largemouth in the shallower lakes like East Pond, North Pond and Salmon Lake. As I write this, the males are exploring the shallows looking for nest sites while the big females are hanging in 20-25 feet of water feeding on crayfish and landlocked alewives waiting for their mates to come get them when the nests are built. By the first week of June, with water temperatures above 60° F, many fish will be in the shallows where there are sandy or gravel bottoms. Anything that looks like a crayfish (tube jigs, senkos, etc) or small baitfish (big streamer flies, crank



baits, etc) will draw a strike.

After spending the morning fishing, I often go hiking on one of the BRCA's trails. Last week, I hiked the new trail on The Mountain on a beautiful spring day and found all kinds of spring wildflowers emerging.

Another favorite fishing destination for me is McIntire Pond in the Kennebec Highlands, a fly fishing only (FFO) trophy brook trout pond that is perma-
