here's a new boat on Messalonskee Lake and new excitement about the management of variable leaf milfoil, the invasive aquatic plant that has been a challenge to the lake for over a dozen years.

Known as a DASH – Diver-Assisted Suction Harvesting – boat, the 20-foot pontoon is outfitted with a special platform, suction tubes, and holding bins for removing large volumes (truck-

loads) of milfoil from the lake. Sponsored in part by Hamlin's Marine, who helped supply the pontoon boat for the platform, the harvester was built and installed by Friends of Messalonskee Lake members at a quarter of the price of purchasing one.

To staff the boat, the Friends of Messalonskee Lake set up a display booth complete with banners, computer slide show, dash boat hardware,

home made cookies and assorted candy treats at the Unity College Intern Fair in the spring, and besides being a popular visiting site for students and other potential employers, the Friends signed up three interns, a certified diver and boat captain who is a Registered Maine Guide.

The Interns, along with Friends of Messalonskee volunteers will work on milfoil

mapping and removal, plant identification education, and courtesy boat inspections at the Sidney and Oakland boat ramps and harvesting from the Oakland Boat Landing to Belgrade.

The way a DASH boat works is that the diver descends, scoops out the milfoil, and places it into the suction device, which takes plants and water up onto the boat and deposits everything into onion bags. The bags allow water to pass through, but the plants and all fragments remain. The bags are emptied into trucks and the plants hauled to compost areas.

Variable leaf milfoil was found in Messalonskee Lake in the late 1990s but may have been there for some time before that. Among its many negatives are an ability to live in water up to 30 feet deep, crowding out naturally-occurring plant life, spreading rapidly, being difficult to manage, and affecting recreational use and property values of a lake.

On the positive side, the Friends of Messalonskee Lake were pro-active in getting the Route 27 boat landing – a major source of milfoil leaving the lake on boats – closed, has maintained an on-going education process to members and the public via meetings, mailings and displays at public events, and has followed programs of hand pulling and placing benthic barriers.

In building the DASH boat, representatives of the Friends of Messalonskee Lake inspected other boats, attended seminars and studied equipment options. They also had hands-on experience through renting the Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed DASH boat last summer.


Although the DASH building project is an evolving one, and some changes are expected, with the boat on the water and trucks hauling away loads of plants, Messalonskee Lake is entering an exciting new era in milfoil control and management.

Conception control of the seems to be an increase in ter-Restrial invasives. The Maine Natural Areas Program and the new Dept. of Ag, Conservation & Forestry thinks we still have a chance to manage their spread here in Central Maine.

In the Belgrades only 17% of the Belgrades Watershed is water covered and less than 5,500 acres will support Milfoil growth. However 80% of the watershed is relatively dry land and supports the growth of terrestrial invasives. Point being that there is a great deal more land that is being invaded than water.

What are the culprits? Well...many of the plants read like a world atlas i.e. Japanese Barberry, Oriental Bittersweeat, Norway Maple, Canadian Thistle and Russian Olive are just a few. This year seems to have far more Multi Flora Rose, Japanese Knotweed [bamboo] and Russian/Autumn Olive. Your back yards are feeling the pressure of these invasive plants. Naturally, there is a long list of other invasive plants [check out http://www.maine.gov/doc/ nrimc/mnap/features/invasives.htm for both a list and pictures]. The Natural Areas Program also has a good website at www.maine.gov/doc/ nrimc/mnap/features/invsheets.htm. If you have the chance, stop at a Cooperative Extension office and pick up some of their handouts.

In most cases, trying to control their spread is difficult. First you need to recognize that there is a problem. That occasional plant out back with

interesting foliage and a pretty flower might become a thick bank of vegetation if you leave it. Take a look along the edge of the woods on your property and note the occasional spring clusters of white flowers which indicate Multi Flora Rose. Next year that small patch of white flowers will be joined by additional mounds of nasty thorn covered plants. Removal is much more difficult. Before long that area can become a breeding ground of fruit and seeds which get spread to neighboring properties.


Our natural landscape is part of what Maine is all about. Its future depends on the choices we make. When buying plants or moving them from place to place, consider whether the plants are likely to escape. Plants advertised as fast growing, prolific, and soil tolerant are often the ones that become invasive. Note the popularity and the spread of the Euonymus alata ["Burning Bush"]. Maine just won't be Maine if the plants dominating our landscape are all from away. As Harry Potter's professor, Mad Eye Moody, would say, 'constant vigilance'.

• Replace invasive plants in your garden with non-invasive alternatives.

• DO NOT attack the problem with indiscriminant herbicides. They may have a place in the battle but they are not a magic bullet. Be careful with their use.

Remember, there is a lot to do in order to protect water quality.

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





-Katy's Column -

Small Town – Real Quality!

Any will not agree but I am of the belief that kids who grew up in a small Maine village during the hard days of the Depression learned a whole lot about what life and living is all about!

There was a "sameness" about their community that more often than not eliminated differences that are so pronounced today. To be sure people had opinions – and often pretty strong ones about the lady down the dirt road who carried on about her chosen church; the old farmer that would never allow a kid to slide near the pasture in winter or cross to the small pond in summer; the feisty lady at the general store who cautioned "Wipe your feet before you come in here!" or her mate at the back of the store pumping molasses for a customer who would greet you with "Hey kids – get that tin cup and taste this here new molasses. It's great!"

In spite of how a young person felt they were treated, parents often told them: "Never mind what Aunt Susie said, you know and I know if we were in trouble she would be right here to help." And that's about the way it was.

In spite of the fact I grew up in a town (Millinocket) that was being swamped out of the Maine woods, the same climate of indifference and caring existed. People from a half dozen cultures invaded the area because there was work of all kinds – something for which every newcomer had a talent but the diversity of cultures certainly provided a fertile ground for learning and adapting.

Then there were the summers my family came south to Whitefield to visit an aunt who had migrated from Prince Edward Island, as did my grandparents. On that small acreage in rural Lincoln County, the people and their habits provided me a greater education in diversity and acceptance than a year of college. Those lessons surface every now and then when I read a book about rural living, lessons that I suspect are still teaching the kids during this era.

No individual outside the Tobin family remains more firmly imprinted in my memory than Tom Fox. Mr. Fox was the local mail deliveryman. We kids stood beside the barn door many mornings, waiting for his horse-drawn wagon to come up over the small rise. We all raced to be first to greet him as he pulled to the side of the mailbox. We loved chatting with him about truly nothing important - the weather, news about a sick cow or if it was going to rain! He tolerated everyone and when he sensed one of us was out of sorts, darned if he didn't have a funny story to leave with us, a story that always salved our apparent hostility. Tom Fox was a small man with a white beard and a broad smile. He lived just a stone's throw from St. Denis Church and was always there to open the door or put you in touch with the local Priest. As seldom as I met him I knew, almost

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instinctively, that he was a special man. I feel the same way today – more than 75 years later.

In that day children made their own games but only after their daily assigned chores were finished. You might think that as a visitor I did not have chores. Wrong! Perhaps it was never voiced but I knew what my cousins were expected to do. Even if we three girls squabbled over who would "wash" and who would dry" the dishes, they got done.


I am saying we squabbled – and we truly did – but either mother or Aunt Libby firmly settled that dispute. The NO was one that carried a firm message in that era.

What has happened to it recently?


—The Luckiest Boy—

s we all know, it takes a considerable amount of sea- \mathbf{I} sonal helpers to satisfy the needs of vacationers. No matter where we go or have been there are usually helpers, assistants and aids of one sort or another to help serve us what we need, while away from home in a different environment. Because tourists have been coming to this area for over a century, actually since the advent of trains, cars and planes, their presence has offered seasonal employment for many residents of all ages. One of the jobs available for youthful ages that stands out as unique is that of Cabin Boy. Being a cabin boy here in Belgrade at a set of rental camps required hard work from dawn until dark as well as a good attitude. Cabin boys are not extinct though their numbers are few compared to several decades ago before many sets of rental cottages were liquidated. Let us now go back to the mid 1950s and see what duties a cabin boy had. We are fortunate enough to have cousin Ernie Johnson to give his first hand account. Ernie was employed as cabin boy during the summers of 1954,1955 and 1956 during his college years. He lived in his own quarters, a small cabin, and here's what he has to say:

As a local Belgrade boy, just graduated from high school and heading for college in the fall, I was offered and I accepted the summer job of cabin boy at Woodland Camps on Long Point on Great Pond. This was in June of 1954 and I subsequently returned to work this job for the two following summers, as well. Woodland Camps, like most sets of rental camps at the time, operated on the American plan and consisted of rustic rental cabins, a main lodge with the kitchen and central dining room, several cabins which housed staff and other outbuildings which supported the operation. The job of cabin boy, like those of the waitresses and housekeeping staff (cabin girls), paid a small wage plus room and board, while the primary income was derived from tips from renters.

The primary duties of the cabin boy at Woodland Camps were to deliver firewood and ice to the cabins, to assist renters with their luggage upon arrival and departure and to be available to renters to make their stay as pleasurable as possible. Other duties of the position included the daily preparation of the fishing boats for use, the making available of fishing bait, the cleaning of fish for renters wishing to have them cooked for meals, the disposal of the day's trash and garbage and the carrying out of some building and grounds mainte-

nance.

On most days, my work day started immediately after breakfast (about 7:15 AM) with preparation of the fishing boats and motors for use by the renters. After that task was completed, I took my trusty old wooden wheelbarrow and either delivered firewood and kindling from the woodsheds or ice from the icehouse to the rental cabins. Preparing the ice for delivery was a bit of a job, in itself, in that it required digging the large blocks from the insulating sawdust in the icehouse, dragging them to a platform where I cleaned them with a water hose and then cut them into smaller blocks to fit the wooden iceboxes on each cabin's porch. The wood delivery required only the stacking of the wood on the wheelbarrow and delivering it to the wood box in each cabin. Following completion of the wood or ice deliveries, it was fish-cleaning time and then time for lunch.

Summertime in the Belgrades

After lunch I handled the garbage and trash disposal duties and worked on my grounds maintenance assignments. Usually I was able to fit in an hour or so break in the mid-afternoon to relax and enjoy life on the lake – to swim, to go for a walk or run or to socialize with other camp staff and teenage and young adult renters. On most days, my workday ended about 5:30 PM after completing the afternoon fish cleaning. Occasionally, when I was needed to man the counter in the lodge after dinner, my workday did not end until early evening.

Saturday was usually my busiest day of the week, in that it was the day that departing renters left and new renters arrived and I needed to fit the toting of luggage between cars and cabins into my schedule.

In closure of this little account of my summers on Great Pond as a cabin boy, I must say that those summers were some of the most pleasurable periods of my young life. Although I was working, it felt more like I was on a paid vacation. I received three very good meals per day, had my own little cabin to live in and had a comfortable bed to sleep in. The "salary" was small but the tips from renters were substantial and the combination of the two essentially paid for three years of my college education.



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



- Take It Outside -

Thave continued to stress the importance of getting Loutside as part of a healthy lifestyle. This area has tremendous opportunities for fishermen, hikers, canoeists, kayakers, cyclists, and others. This week Dick Greenan and I put his canoe into the Belgrade Stream just below Wings Mill Dam and floated about 9 miles down to Messalonskee Lake, where we had previously positioned a vehicle. This is an extremely beautiful, lightly developed stretch of stream that is teeming with wildlife, birds, and fish. It makes an excellent fishing trip or simply a beautiful paddling experience. Unfortunately it is also teeming with invasive variable milfoil that serves as a constant reminder of the importance of keeping this weed from spreading to our nearby lakes. In nearly seven hours on the stream, we saw exactly one other boat, a fishing boat that motored past us while we were on shore having lunch.

While we didn't see many people, we did see a mother snapping turtle laying eggs and a belted kingfisher snatch a fish from the stream right where Dick was about to cast. We also saw loons, muskrats, beavers, great blue herons, and many other birds and turtles. And we caught some nice fish.

I encourage everyone to get out on one of the nearby hiking trails, or kayak or canoe a stream or lake. Scenic trips include Lost Pond or "The Jungle" in Long Pond, The Serpentine between East Pond and North Pond or the bog to the north of the North Pond boat launch. And try to take a kid along.




