## WARRANT

---

*To S. J. Williams, a Constable in the Town of Orrington,*

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Orrington, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town, on Monday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following:

- Art. 1. To elect a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To elect a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To act on the report of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Assessors, and Overseers of the Poor.
- Art. 4. To act on the report of the Health Officer and Board of Health.
- Art. 5. To act on the report of the Superintendent of Schools and School Board.
- Art. 6. To fix the compensation of the following town officers for the ensuing year: Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Road Commissioner, Sealer of Weights and Measures, Health Officer, and any others that may be deemed necessary.



Art. 7. To elect all necessary town officers for the ensuing year, including a Collector of Taxes.

Art. 8. To see what sums of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the following purposes: For the Support of Elementary Schools, for Support of Secondary Schools, Repair of School Property and Insurance, Support of Poor, Mothers' Aid, Repairs of Roads and Bridges, Pay of Snow Bills, Purchase of Snow Fence, Patrol Maintenance, Pay of Town Officers, Pay of South Orrington Schoolhouse Notes and Interest due for 1933, Miscellaneous Expenses, and any other town charges that may be deemed necessary.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for Memorial Purposes.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to establish one or more Junior High Schools to include the first year of Secondary School.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$636.00 for the Maintenance of improved sections of Third Class Roads, in accordance with the provisions of Sections 43 to 47, inclusive, of Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, as amended by Chapter 151, Public Laws, 1931.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

Art. 13. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of



the ways, highways, and bridges, under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 22, Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

Art. 14. To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid Account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid roads built within the past five years, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, P. L. 1931.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State Aid Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to grant and raise for the use of the Bangor Public Library for one year.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise for the services of the County Nurse.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to contract with the City of Brewer for all secondary school privileges for the Orrington students attending secondary schools, or take any action thereon.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to grant and raise the sum of Fifty Dollars for making a plan of Pine Hill Cemetery and doing some work on the new driveway, or take any action thereon.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to pay to L. B. Blake the sum of Fifteen Dollars, that



amount being the difference between the salary of the Health Officer voted at the Town meeting on March 14, 1932, and the salary he was employed for.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will authorize the Assessors and Tax Collector to offer a discount for prompt payment of taxes or take any action thereon.

Art. 22. By request, to see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Street Lights for one year.

Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept from Mrs. Herbert Wood the sum of Fifty Dollars, to be known as the Herbert Wood Trust Fund, the interest to be used for the care of the family lot at Pine Hill Cemetery in South Orrington.

Art. 24. By petition of H. G. Leavitt, and several others, to see if the Town will vote to grant and raise a sum of money to provide a bonus for the resident physician of the town, to insure a permanent physician, said physician to take care of the town poor and any town work without extra pay from the town.

Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to lease, or contract to furnish the inhabitants of the village of South Orrington with water service, for domestic uses, and at a price agreed upon, from the pumping equipment now located in the basement of the Blanch K. Blake Schoolhouse at South Orrington, or act in any way in relation thereto.

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to permit private individuals, residents of the village of South Orrington, to lay a water main beginning at the Blanche K. Blake Schoolhouse, on the so-called Swett's Pond road, in a westerly



direction to the main highway and from thence in a northerly direction to the residence of Mildred H. Stevenson, at South Orrington, or act in any way in relation thereto.

Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$200.00 to co-operate with the State in the control of White Pine Blister Rust. The State will add fifty per cent to all town funds raised besides furnishing a man for supervision and advance scouting. All funds to be spent for control work, using local labor as much as possible.

Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to instruct its Treasurer, subject to the approval of the Selectmen, to loan the credit of the town, if necessary to defray town charges, for an amount or amounts not to exceed in the aggregate the sum of \$15,000.00, and to make, execute and deliver negotiable notes of the town therefore, or take any other action thereon.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$100.00 to repair the road from the railroad crossing, near the station at South Orrington, to a point where the Special Resolve road has been built. This vote not to take effect if the town receives from the State the sum asked for in House Paper No. 242, or take any action thereon.

Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to abate certain taxes committed to C. P. Thompson, Collector for 1924, said taxes amounting to the sum of \$53.80.

Art. 31. To act on any other question that may legally come before said meeting.



The Selectmen will be in session at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting, for the purpose of revising the list of voters.

## REPORT OF BUDGET COMMITTEE

---

FEBRUARY 17, 1933

---

*To the Citizens of the Town of Orrington:*

We, the members of your Budget Committee, in offering for your approval the following articles, wish it understood that as a Committee, we do not condemn the efficiency or ability of our town officials or employees. We do feel, however, that under the present economic conditions, that great care should be exerted in the fixing of salaries of town officials and employees, and appropriations as follows, viz:

Art. 6. First Selectman, \$300.00; Second Selectman, \$200.00; Third Selectman, \$150.00; Collector of Taxes, \$225.00; Town Treasurer, \$250.00; Road Commissioner, \$3.00 per day; Sealer of Weights and Measures, \$10.00.

Art. 7. No action taken.

Art. 8. Voted to make a 15% reduction on Elementary Schools appropriation.

Voted to raise \$266.94 for Repairs and Insurance.

Voted to raise \$4,620.00 for High School.

Voted to raised \$2,000.00 for Support of Poor.

Voted to raise \$500.00 Mothers' Aid (subject to change)

Voted to raise \$1,500.00 for Roads and Bridges.

Voted to raise \$800.00 for Snow Bills.

Voted not to purchase snow fence.

Voted to raise \$525.00 for Patrol Maintenance.



Voted to raise for pay of town officials the same as last year.

Voted to raise \$2,510.34 for South Orrington School Note and Interest.

Voted to pay Miscellaneous Expenses from Excise Tax receipts.

Art. 9. Voted to raise \$10.00 for Memorial purposes.

Art. 10. Voted favorably to be accepted.

Art. 11. Voted to raise \$636.00 for Third Class Roads.

Art. 12. Voted "Yes."

Art. 13. Voted to raise \$533.00.

Art. 14. Voted to dismiss article.

Art. 15. Voted "Yes."

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

*To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of  
Orrington:*

I herewith submit my annual report of your schools for the year ending February, 1933.

Some of the most important statistics are listed in order that you may better understand the cost of maintenance as found in the financial report.

The cost per pupil including teachers, janitors, fuel, conveyance, electricity, books and supplies is \$36.05 compared with \$40 last year and an average in the State of \$44.63. The increase in the cost of education is not due to the elementary schools but rather to the increase in number of students attending secondary schools. This is the tendency everywhere due to the lack of employment. In Orrington the number has increased from 51 in 1930 to 71 the present year or over a 71% increase. This alone has increased the cost of \$1500.



We are faced with a difficult problem for we realize that reductions in all governmental expenses are absolutely necessary. Taxes cannot exceed the ability of the citizens to pay them. With our present school system the only means of making reductions is in the elementary schools. This year the salaries of the teachers were reduced 10% besides the shortening of the school year, which will make a salary reduction equivalent to 16%. The cost of fuel, conveyance, and supplies was also reduced. A much further reduction will inevitably lower the standard, which must not be lowered for here the foundation is laid for citizenship and all education of higher levels. The citizens of Orrington have always shown a desire to maintain good schools and have been very thoughtful in appropriating sufficient funds. I feel sure that no drastic cuts will be made at this time. United effort on the part of officials, teachers and citizens is needed in order that the boys and girls may receive the education justly due them.

Means of reducing the cost of high school tuition should be adopted, if further reductions in the cost of schools are to be made. At the last annual meeting, also at one previous meeting, the voters were asked to authorize the Superintending School Committee to make a contract with the City of Brewer for the schooling of all the high school students. A saving of approximately \$500 a year would be made eventually, at the same time the boys and girls of Orrington would have the advantages of a good high school. This arrangement might work a hardship on a few, who have the opportunity to work their board or live with a relative in another town. This would be equally true if the town maintained its own high school. An article is to be inserted in the warrant so you will have the opportunity to act on it again this year.

The junior high school organization seems to be another solution for our problem. This type of organization is work-



ing very successfully in Bucksport and in many other towns and cities in Maine and many of the other states. The 6-3-3 plan or six years of elementary, three of junior high and three of senior high school is probably the best for our needs. Under this plan the Orrington students would be fitted to enter the second year of any high school. A substantial saving to the town could be made. More details regarding the cost, advantages and disadvantages will be explained at the annual meeting. I feel that this is a progressive move and should be adopted.

Before the opening of school in September, it was found that the number of children at East Orrington was too many for one teacher. The Committee voted to employ an assistant. At present there are 49 registered, which is a small number for two teachers, but too many for one with eight grades. The cost of this extra teacher absorbed most of the saving made by the reduction of salaries.

There was only one change in the teaching staff. Miss Hildred Simpson succeeded Miss Mildred Ryder at Goodale's Corner. I feel that your attention should be called to the personal interest your teachers have in each individual child, the special attention given the slow groups, the careful check made on those entering high school for the purpose of determining the subjects needing more drill or work. The same interest is manifest in all the details of the school management. Each building is free from marks or defacement of any kind. It is difficult to estimate the value of such training to the children as well as the financial saving to the town.

In closing I wish to thank the teachers, town officials and citizens for their co-operation during the year.

This town has been visited and service rendered, Jan. 5th, Feb. 23, 24, 25 26th and 29th, May 14th, 21 and 27th, July 11th and 12, July 26th and Aug. 5th.

Corrections done since last school inspection: Eyes, fourteen; teeth corrected, sixteen; throat corrected, two. This does not include corrections done for the school children at North Orrington in May, when an effort was made to secure 100% dental corrections for that school.

We appreciate the kindness of Mrs. Keen of Brewer for loaning the use of her dental room and her assistance at the clinics. We are also grateful to Doctors King and Sewell for their work. And to Dr. Charles King for the dental service rendered one family of this town.

Several social problems have been brought to the attention of the nurse. These have been taken care of.

An all day clinic for babies and pre-school children was held in connection with the "Maine Baby Saving Society." About thirty-eight children were examined by Doctors Weymouth and Mansfield.
