

Pet World — Hot Dog!



As summer rolls in, and the temperature rises, it feels wonderful to get outside! Most dog owners love to spend their outdoor time with their pets. However, it is very important to know about the risks– especially the risk of "heat stroke."

Heat stroke occurs more commonly in the lower temperatures of June than in the higher temperatures of August. This is due to the fact that a key factor in heat stroke is the body's inability to accommodate to the higher temperatures. Accommodation is a body process that takes approximately 7 to 14 days to occur, where a dog's body can become more accustomed to high temperatures, and more able to handle heat stress. It makes sense, then, that the body is not as prepared for high temperatures in June as it is in August.

Heat stroke, or hyperthermia, is a condition that occurs when a dog or cat's temperature rises above 108 degrees. While this may seem very high, it can occur very quickly, and the outside temperature does not have to be more than 60 degrees.

The most common cause of heat stroke is a dog being left in a car on a summer day. Even when a car is parked in the shade, with the windows cracked, the inside temperature of the car can rise up to 20 degrees fahrenheit in just 10 minutes. For that reason, it is not recommended that a dog be left alone in a car for more than 10 minutes unsupervised. It may be tempting to leave your dog in the car for a "quick trip" into the grocery store, but unexpected waiting times and conversations often make even quick trips too long. People often try to leave a car running with the air conditioner on for this reason. However, an idling car's air conditioner will not always keep the car's temperature below damaging levels in the heat due to recirculation of the inside air.

Another common reason for heat stroke is over-exertion. If your dog is unaccustomed to long hikes, or you are unable to carry extra water for him or her, it might be best to leave him or her home in a climate-controlled environment. This is especially true if your dog has other risk factors for heat stroke, such as being overweight or having a pushed-in nose (like Boston Terriers, Pugs, and ShihTzus do), or having any systemic illness (like Diabetes, Cushing's disease, or heart disease).

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
Legacies ₁

Toseph Cummings Chase was born in Kents Hill on May 5, 1878, in the house his family called "Jollity Manse". He was born on a Sunday - appropriate for the son, grandson and nephew of devout Methodist ministers. His parents, both Kents Hill School alumni, were Rev. A. Fitzroy and Louise (Allen) Chase. Rev. Chase was a brilliant scholar and known as a strong leader, adept orator and strict disciplinarian. He, and his wife of two years, moved to Readfield in 1871 where Rev. Chase served as head of the mathematics and literature departments at Kents Hill School, and where all six of their children were born. In 1883 the family moved to Bucksport where Rev. Chase taught in another seminary, but their fondness for Kents Hill School never waned so they returned in 1897 when Rev. Chase became headmaster.

There were many ministers and educators in the Chase / Allen family. Joseph's maternal grandfather was Rev. Stephen Allen who authored the 1,130 page History of Methodism in Maine in 1886. He was also a headmaster at Kents Hill School in the 1840s, and after that a trustee during one of Kents Hill School's most challenging financial times, as was his brother Rev. Charles Allen. Later they were both instrumental in establishing the University of Maine. Stephen Allen had a gift for fundraising and did so for both institutions – in fact it is said that he was the predominant force in raising the monies to build the University of Maine. He was offered its first presidency but declined





Joseph Cummings Chase 1878-1965 was a Kents Hill native and world famous portrait painter.

and recommended his brother Dr. Charles Allen, who remained at the helm for the first twelve years.

Four of A. Fitzroy and Louise Chase's children sur-

vived to adulthood – Joseph, Crystal, Louise and John. Three remained in Readfield as faculty members at Kents Hill School. John founded Chases Camps on

Torsey Pond in 1898 – said to be the first boy's summer camp established in Maine. Joseph's artistic talent surfaced as a child though, and it soon became apparent that he was destined to take a much different course than his siblings.

As a boy Joseph began to frequent town meetings and church suppers where he sketched leading citizens. His reputation as an artist spread and before he was eighteen the Lewiston Sun asked him to sketch for their newspaper. His life's course was set. He went to New York City in 1898 to study at Pratt Institute and then he studied portrait painting at the Academie Julien in Paris, France. Upon his return to New York City his artwork gained such notoriety he caught the

attention of dignitaries in Washington D.C. When WWI broke out Chase was commissioned to paint portraits of President Wilson, his cabinet and officers at the Pentagon.

A year later General Pershing cabled the US War Department to request they send an artist to Europe. He wanted to accompany the WWI historical writings with depictions of officers and soldiers. Chase was the ideal choice since his reputation for capturing personalities on canvas in record time had become well known. So, for five months Chase traveled with the Army of Occupation in France and Germany. He was assigned five cars and drivers – four were wrecked and two drivers killed. When sitting for Chase a

General asked "Are you painting any of the boys?" Chase explained that the Treasury Department wanted him to paint four 'hero boys' for their war bond posters. The General immediately assigned Chase a driver and they set off to where Sgt. Alvin York was located twenty miles away. As the young "hero boy" sat for Chase he humbly shared the story of how he managed to single-handedly kill twenty-eight German soldiers and capture one-hundred thirty two more. Chase became inspired and gained tremendous respect for the young soldiers. He could not stop with four "hero boy" sketches but amassed one-hundred fifty. In 1920 Chase authored Soldiers All: Portraits and Sketches of the Men of the A.E.F. In the introduc-

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

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
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

Nostalgic Memories of the **Veterans Center at Togus**

In 1966 the Centennial Planning Committee at Lthe Veterans Center at Togus had arranged a year-long series of events that incorporated all aspects of activities to honor those who had served in the armed forces of our country. Looking at the calendar today I see that 48 years has elapsed since that year, yet it seems important to realize how many people have served and how much every U.S. citizen owes them.

I lived on the grounds of that facility from 1959-1974 and during those years I met and learned a great deal about the facility and the people who served the needs of many. The stories I gleaned from the patients who were able to walk around and enjoy the scenery and work in the greenhouse near the entrance to the early cemetery taught me a great deal about coping with unpleasant accidents one may encounter in

One such story was from an aging Vet who made his life fruitful by planting early bulbs. I chatted with him as he pushed himself up from his knees to talk to me one day.

"How are you today, Robby?": I asked.

"Not bad. Gotta get these bulbs into the ground if we expect them to be ready for the alter during the summer," was his response. There was no doubt he saw his volunteer task as a duty as much as a way to celebrate life and nature.

I often spotted a very lame man walking through the tree-lined road toward the entrance to the grounds. It had been suggested that from time to time the dear fellow may have stashed a bottle of...guess what...behind a tree and the walk not only provided exercise but a 'boost' as well. True or not, worse things might have taken place. His remark that day has stayed with me.

"Nothing takes the place of getting out and seeing what nature has to give us - completely free. All we have to do is look around and see it."

That philosophy would be hard to best.

Several families lived on the center and in many ways it became a small, compact community. The Irish family was there because Pete Irish was in charge of the greenhouse and grounds. The Irish children and mine became friends and we shared a lot of times together.

It was because of the children of a new doctor that my sons met black people for the first time. I was extremely pleased there was never any comment about 'color' as they jostled about in play. We were all sad when a new assignment took them to other parts of the country. I have always felt fortunate that I also met many local black families because of our neighbors.

Many doctors, nurses and administrators became friends and from them I carry many warm memories. A rather sporadic bridge club was formed and certainly went a long way toward enhancing the life of a full-time mother who was more or less house bound far from the city. Friends made during those fun evenings with the cards have lasted ever since.

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Perhaps the story of the land where the VA sits today is a story worth repeating. Horace Beals, a Rockland granite dealer, bought the 1,900-acre tract of land and assumed he would become wealthy with the 134-room hotel he built. A racetrack, bowling alley, a bathhouse and other recreational facilities didn't help, because after a mere three seasons the undertaking closed. He was killed during the Civil War after which his property was sold to the federal government. The beginning of a national asylum for the disabled was underway. It was completed in 1869 and since that time it remains dedicated to the care and welfare of soldiers.

An important figure in all aspects of the Veterans' Home was Rev. Leonard LeClaire. He grew up in Lewiston and had served as a Chaplain in the Pacific during WWII. He was a jovial man, completely dedicated to his faith, and a quiet promoter of all of the facility meant to be. He made friends as easily as he stretched out his

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




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
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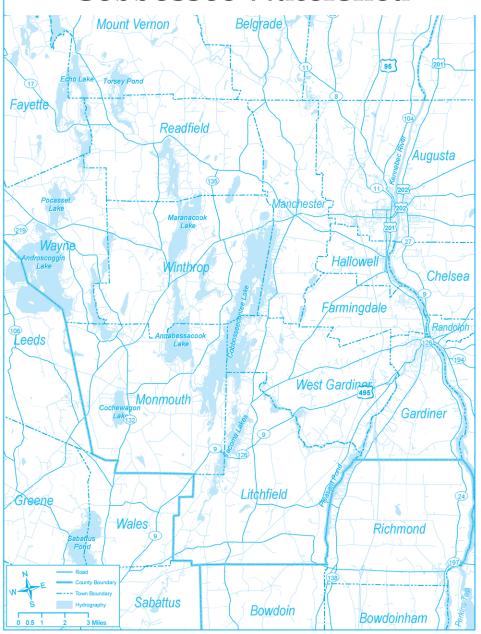
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Conservation Too -

The Patient Gardener

Given the season, I'd like to take this opportunity to address some of you gardeners out there. In my opinion most gardeners exhibit seriously unhealthy "control issues". After all, most of us fuss over what grows where or what is not allowed to grow. We tend to impose our vision on the vegetative landscape. In fact we often demand that the vegetation in our yard must live or die based on our judgment. Pity the poor plant that breaks one of our rules. We use various tools often fossil fuel powered, pesticides, bio-engineering etc. in our quest for control the landscape. Still we remain unsatisfied

We are impatient. This spring and summer, as one plant blooms and another remains dormant we demand immediate gratification. Those annuals at the greenhouse look great so we plant them early and then wonder why they don't thrive in early spring's cool soil temperatures. A tree that hasn't leafed out is assumed to be dead. Often it is just a plant whose natural cycle means it comes out of dormancy later in the season. But if we are in our yard, we WANT TO SEE flowers! And we want to see them NOW!

I have some beautiful trees and shrubs that may not fully leafout and bloom until mid June or later. BE PATIENT!

We need to lighten up. Plants have their own seasons and they were developed to meet their own needs and the needs of the various other plants and animals that rely on them. Most were not designed to meet our decorating desires. Unfortunately, more and more of our plants are being designed to meet our landscaping needs. Many of the plants available for our purchase have been "designed" for us. Be damned what the birds, bees and other parts of the natural world may need. In fact; we have learned that some plants are being designed in a manner that actually may damage other plants and animals that share the environment. It would seem some of the vegetation is being engineered to be "more human" all the time.

As for me, I enjoy the fact that early in the season the Cornelian Cherry, Redbud tree, daffodils and crocus start early. Later is the season my interest turns to the lilac, White Oak and the Elm trees begin to focus my attention. Even later the Gingko and Purple Beech trees along with the Hawthorne will be my favorites. And finally the Seven Son and Catalpa will show off their attributes. Recently I've begun to focus on trying to maintain a full season of scent. Some of the early flowers have some glorious fragrance. This past year I've managed to mix a number of different Peony in order to maintain a lengthy period with marvelous fragrance.

The real lesson is to let the plant life follow its own schedule. If you are so impatient to get rid of plants that grow on a schedule other than yours you may never have the opportunity to witness the glorious flowers of a Northern Catalpa or the fascinating globe-like flowers of a Button Bush. After all, those look like they are dead until well into June.

Focus on the things you actually can control and let your yard establish its own life. Try to become a witness to its progress rather than a master of its activity.

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
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

The Guide Ghosts of Great Pond Part 1

It was one of those odd weather phenomena. The stars were extra bright over the lake at twilight, but a front quietly slipped in and set a heavy dense fog right on top of Great Pond in Belgrade. You couldn't see the bow of your boat, let alone where you were headed.

I had gone out to Hoyt's Island on Great Pond earlier in the evening around 7, prior to the foggy conditions settling in. My little 15 foot Chris Craft had carried my date and me across the water to visit my friend and co-worker Hunt Dowse. Hunt's family owned the south end of Hoyt's for a couple of decades, prior to the current owners, Bill and Joan Witkin. We both worked at Day's Marina back in the village, along with another common friend Ralph Pope. We were the mechanics and Ralph did everything but that. Hunt's parents had gone to Boston for a couple of days, so we boys had schemed earlier in the day to have a rendezvous there, do some swimming at the beach and then stoke up a fire in the big rock fireplace. The deal was due to end at 10:30 or so as the girls had 11 p.m. curfews back at their village homes.

While swimming, we couldn't help notice the heavy fog that began to surround us. At first it was funny, then became eerie as we couldn't see each other 20 feet away, getting less as the minutes went by. We abandoned swimming and quickly scrambled back to the lodge living room. After boisterous stories by all three of us as to what just happened, we built up a nice fire and burned some of the dry hemlock that Hunt's father Leonard had been painfully splitting with a sledge and wedges.

At 10:40 someone said we'd better head across the lake lest we be in deep doggy doo-doo with the girls' parents. After the first attempt to even get down the path to the boathouse, we realized this

was a problem. With no phone at Camp Mandalay we couldn't call the girls' parents. After some incorrect decision making we voted to head across the lake in the soupy fog. While getting into the two boats, mostly by brail, we made a pact to idle slowly, keep our steering tillers straight and stay together. We then guessed the heading for the entrance to the stream and took off. Within the first 15 minutes we were separated and I never saw Ralph and his date until the next day when at work. It seemed like an hour when I became aware that land was no more than 10 feet in front of us, just a massive something, without defined features. Instantly the shift went into neutral and we drifted forward enough to gently THUMP a huge bolder, then began seeing the black forest behind it. The decision was made to turn right and slowly follow the shoreline, moving no more than 1 or 2 miles per hour. After a nerve wracking slow ride with my eyes playing games on me, a dock appeared on our bow. I'll be damned if it wasn't the same dock we had left from on Hoyt's Island, jutting out in front of the camp's three boathouses. This was both bewildering and comforting — at least we knew where we were. I later learned that power boats tend to go in circles due to "prop walk" if the tillers are held perfectly straight. At that point, we decided to hold onto the dock and take our chances that the fog would soon lift. After hitting the kill switch the old Chris Craft's Gray Marine four-banger went quiet, with a couple of last gasps: Thaw-haw, thaw-

The silence of the next few minutes was mind boggling, then, semi-familiar sounds came out of the fog and nearly jumped us out of our skins. It was a motor sound, chuga-chuga-chuga, lightly laboring and getting louder by the second. Not expecting to hear or see any other crafts that eerie night made me wonder if this was a nightmare. However, within a few short seconds the noise was upon us and the plumb bow of an old guide boat could be seen. As she passed by in all her glory, nearly scraping the Chris Craft, we got a 2 second look at her lap strake hull with fine varnish decks and gunnels, complete with brass and bronze fittings. Her oars were properly mounted on the rails, her chairs forward and aft ready for the next sport. But what totally blew us away was—yes, a skeletal looking old man trailing long white wispy hair from under his campaign hat, corn cob pipe ablowin' sparks, sitting amidships with his frail hand on the small spoke side wheel. Before one could begin to fathom the scene, the fog engulfed the stern as the craft and it's driver had slid out of sight and the chuga-chuga-chuga petered out quickly. At that same moment the smells of felt and wool, varnish, turpentine, motor oil and yes, white perch came wafting in the back draft. There may have been just a small wiff of Narry Gansett as well, just to top it off. Within minutes, a breeze began to rattle the Chris's bow pennant and our visibility improved somewhat. Not five minutes later, the stars shown brightly and the lights of L.L. Bean's place on the mainland gave us a heading to go home. We fired up the Grey Marine and put her up on plane, anxious to minimize the number of hours that we were past curfew. Without a doubt, we had just seen one of The Guide Ghosts of Great Pond. tion Col. C.W. Weeks, Chief of the Historical Branch of the War Department, wrote "More than any American artist has, he succeeded in preserving the likenesses of the foremost officers and men of the A.E.F." Later, Chase went on to paint military figures from World War II and Korea, as well.

Throughout his life Chase used his talent in various ways - as an illustrator for magazines and book publishers, a teacher of art and design in colleges, an author and lecturer. Above all, Chase became world renowned for his portraiture. By 1928 he estimated he had already painted or sketched about 6,000 portraits. His work continued for nearly forty more years. He painted portraits of actors, military giants, academics, politicians, sports figures and six American presidents. He taught art to students such as Eleanor Roosevelt; he authored nine books; and his and raised.

work appeared in several national magazines. A few of the prominent people Chase painted were Albert Einstein, Theodore Roosevelt, Will Rogers, Charles Lindbergh, James Cagney and Generals Dwight D. Eisenhower, George Patton and Douglass McArthur. More than one-hundred of his formal works are in the Smithsonian National Portrait Gallery collection.

The Chases owned two homes at Kents Hill. "Jollity Manse", where Joseph Cummings Chase and his siblings were born, became property of Kents Hill School in 1959. Chase Hall, which Rev. A. Fitzroy Chase built next door, has been owned by the school since 1918. Joseph Cummings Chase was married twice and had no children. He died in 1965 in Milwaukee, WI and is buried with his parents and two wives near Bryant Pond, Oxford County, Maine where his father was born and raised.

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

hanks to the efforts of the volunteers and staff of $oldsymbol{1}$ the Belgrade Regional Conservation Alliance, the Belgrade Lakes Region has thousands of acres of accessible public lands with tremendous four season recreational opportunities. Last winter I adopted a new philosophy of "carpe skiem" in which you try to ski every day the weather and snow are reasonable. I logged many miles of back country skiing, mostly in the Kennebec Highlands, which is well over 6000 acres, has over 20 miles of trails and half a dozen remote ponds, including Kidder, Boody, McIntire, Beaver, and Round Ponds, as well as several smaller unnamed ones. These ponds are popular destinations for ice fishermen who want to get off the beaten path. They are even more off the beaten path during the summer when you have to hike in to most of them. But they can be an awesome destination for a The Kennebec Highlands short camping trip. Management Plan is eventually going to include a remote camp site in the vicinity of Kidder Pond. In the mean time, the rules allow for "casual overnight camping" in the Kennebec Highlands. You are not allowed to kindle any fires so make sure you bring a cook stove

Last week, Mel Croft (with dog, Jasper), Gordon Woods, and I set up camp next to one of these ponds and had an awesome time. We were serenaded by owls and coyotes throughout the night and met by a deer drinking at the pond's edge at sunrise. We even caught some fish
