## Proposal Made To Civil War Memorial Association For The Purchase Of GAR Hall And Lot

Trustees of the Civil War Memorial Association received an offer Thursday evening of \$35,000 for the GAR Hall and the lot which is bounded by Limerock, Union and School Streets. Making the offer in behalf of undisclosed principals was real estate broker James Cousens.

Coupled with the cash offer was an additional one in which the purchasers would dismantle and re-erect the Soldiers and Sailors' Monument as directed by the Association on another lot of the Association's choice. Also, a new building which would be erected on the GAR lot would bear a bronze plaque which would mark the site as that of the original GAR Hall. These projects would be carried out by the purchasers in addition to the \$35,000, according to Cousens' statement to the

trustees. Also, legal costs of title search, court clearance of deeds and filing would be borne by the purchasers, Cousens noted.

Also revealed was the information that the Copper Kettle, owned by Mrs. Patricia Huntley, which abuts the GAR lot and building is on the real estate market. Sale of the Copper Kettle is contingent upon the prospective purchasers being able to also acquire the GAR Hall. The dual purchase, if carried out, would give the buyers a lot which would extend from Post Office Square to Union Street and from Limerock Street to School Street.

Assistance in the purchase and establishing of a new GAR Hall was offered by Cousens on behalf of those he represents. His suggestion was that the Association explore the possi-

bilities of the Richard Leavitt home at 104 Limerock Street, which is on the market at \$18,000. The house was formerly owned by Frederic Bird and before that by Grover C. Hopkins who rebuilt it when he bought it from the Burpee family some 20 years ago. The lot is about 130 feet on Limerock Street and extends back between 350 and 400 feet, according to Cousens.

A suggestion offered for consideration by the real estate broker was that the Association acquire the Leavitt property and remodel it to suit their needs. The remainder of the \$35,000 received from the sale of the GAR Hall, which he estimated at \$10,000, could be placed in an irrevocable trust in a local bank. Interest from the fund would care for the maintenance of the hall and assure the Civil War bodies and their successors of a fully maintained hall permanently.

Association members speaking at the meeting noted that the present GAR Hall needs extensive repairs and that funds are not available for the work.

The Hall is the home of several GAR bodies, including Ruth Mayhew Tent, Daughters of Union Veterans, Edwin Libby

## JUSTICE WILLIAMS METES OUT JAIL TERM, SUSPENDED SENTENCE ON INFORMATIONS

Two persons pleaded to information Thursday before Superior Court Justice Leonard F. Williams of Auburn and were given sentences, and an inmate of the Maine State Prison pleaded his case for a lighter sentence.

Frederick S. Bunker, 34, of Norwalk, Conn., pleaded guilty to uttering forged documents—two checks totaling some \$133, and to issuing a check with insufficient funds to cover it. He had been in Knox County jail since being arraigned last Friday. Judge Williams sentenced him to four months in the county jail. He also faces bad check charges in Connecticut authorities have been informed.

Harold Emery, 20, of Rockland had pleaded guilty to grand larceny in Rockland Municipal Court May 18 and in the theft of a car on May 15 and also breaking into several cars on that date. He was sentenced to two years in the men's Reformatory at South Windham, which was suspended and he was placed on probation for two years.

Charles A. Terry, the State Prison inmate, argued that his sentence of one and a half years to three was excessive. He said it should have been not more than six months in jail for the offense, which was assault and battery. Judge Williams took the case under advisement.

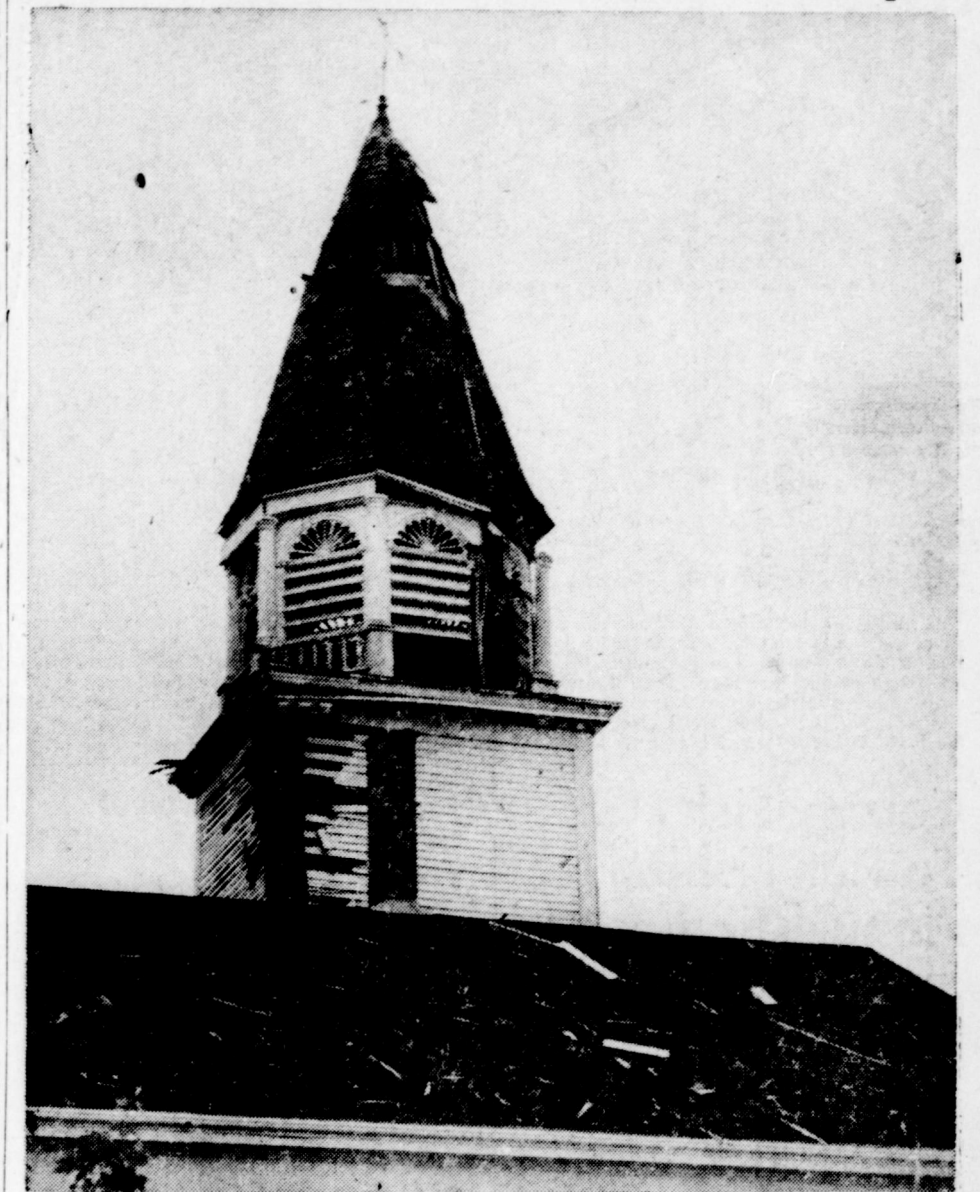

## Electrical Storm Causes Damage Over Wide Area Of Knox County



Pieces of wood were scattered over the roof and across the lawn of the Tenants Harbor Baptist Church, early Thursday morning, when a powerful lightning bolt struck the steeple of the church. Clapboards on the bell tower were ripped loose and one timber was cracked inside. The louvers on two sides of the bell chamber were blown off and holes were ripped in the spire. A small blaze was discovered in the tower but it was quickly quelled.

TENANTS HARBOR—A powerful blast from a lightning bolt literally set the Town of Tenants Harbor on its ear early Thursday morning. Struck was the Baptist Church which suffered extensive damage to the bell tower and wiring. The interior of the church was damaged by falling plaster in several spots. The St. George High School graduation, Friday night, had to be moved to the Wiley's Corner Baptist Church because of the lack of lights at the Tenants Harbor church.

Also hit was the Merriam cottage at Lucia Beach in Owls Head, two cows on a farm in Union and numerous power lines around the county.

At Tenants Harbor, Pastor Harold Haskell said he was certain at Camden, has been employed to teach English and social studies in Rockland High School.

the nearby parsonage had been hit when the blast awoke him about 3 o'clock Thursday morning. He checked the parsonage thoroughly and then went to the church where he was joined by firemen. They found a small blaze in the bell tower.

The bolt apparently hit the top of the spire, badly damaging it, then its force followed the power lines to an amplifier down into the church. Whenever the lightning encountered a junction box in the wall, it blew away the plaster. The bolt spent itself destroying a power meter on the front of the church on the opposite corner from the spire.

Members of the senior class at St. George High School turned out bright and early Thursday morning to clean up the mess.

Within a few hours the church had been cleaned. Plans to move the graduation were made after it was found it would be impossible to have lights in the church by Friday night. The auditorium is the largest in the community.

Lack of power made it necessary to cancel the regular Sunday evening service at the church for this week. Other services will be held at the usual hours.

At Owls Head, Professor and Mrs. Donald Merriam of Phillips Exeter Academy were shaken when lightning struck their cottage smashing a six foot hole in a wall. No one was injured.

At Union, Stephen Kirkpatrick discovered Thursday morning that two cows in his herd had been killed by lightning while standing under a group of trees.

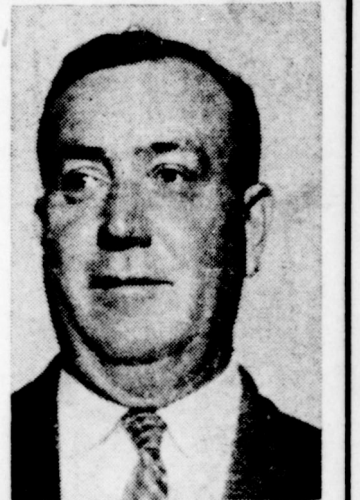

# \$30,000 Water Company Project Completed With Opening Of Main



A \$30,000 project by the Camden-Rockland Water Company was completed, Thursday afternoon, when a valve was turned near Katahdin Avenue opening a new 12-inch water main. Foreman Earl Simmons and company engineer Alan McAlary turn the valve as superintendent Robert Varney looks on. The new main provides a third transmission line for the northern part of Rockland and could be the starting point for several different possible expansions in the future. The main extends 1,800 feet from the Old County Road reservoir. The company's crew laid 800 feet and George Hall laid the rest. It is the largest new main to be laid in the system since 1929.

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### EDITORIAL

#### THE VOTERS HAVE A CHOICE THIS TIME

The state primary election Monday presents a most unusual, but very healthy, situation. The Republican Party has contests for several of the nominations with the result that voters will have their choice of qualified candidates for the November balloting.

The county attorney berth which has gone begging for several elections past with the result that men have had to be practically drafted now has three candidates. They are, in the order in which they appear on the ballot, Galen P. LaGassy of Rockland, Clifford R. O'Rourke of Camden and Peter P. Sulides of Rockland.

The present judge of probate, Charles T. Smalley of Rockland, is opposed for the Party nomination for the post by A. Alan Grossman of Rockland.

A third contest for nomination is that for register of probate in which Thomas C. Aylward of Camden, the incumbent, is opposed by Harold M. Quinn of Thomaston, recently elected chairman of the Republican County Committee.

In the class towns of Washington, Rockport, Union and Warren, George B. Finley and Clarence J. Turfitt are both seeking nomination as representative to Legislature under the GOP banner. Both are Washington residents.

Two are seeking nomination as representative to Congress from the Second Maine District. Stanley Tupper of Boothbay Harbor and Roy U. Sinclair of Pittsfield have conducted rather a tepid campaign, both preferring to go along on a quiet path rather than pointing out the shortcomings, if any, of his opponent.

This is the first time in a long while that Republicans have had so many choices in nominations in the Primaries. They should take full advantage of it next Monday.

While the Democrats have no contests for nominations come Monday, they will be presenting candidates in November who may be better than usual in the vote getting field. There could be some lively contests before the political flurry is settled in Maine's first November election for county and state officials. Registered Democrats would do well to turn out and give their candidates a token vote which would serve to encourage them in the coming campaign.

213.3 TAXI CAB MARKINGS. Every taxicab thus licensed shall have the name of the licensee, the word "Taxi" and the City license number plainly painted on the main panel of each rear door of, or other conspicuous place on every taxicab operated by him, in letters not less than two inches in height.

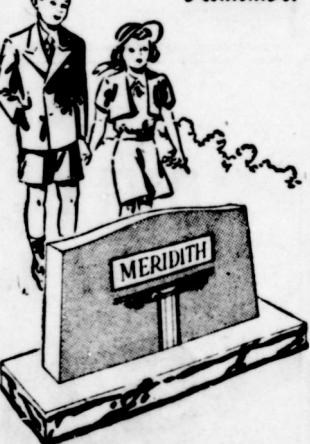

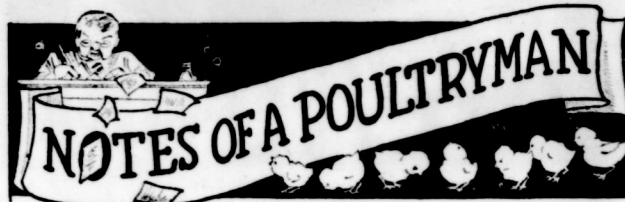

I was told this week by a man who makes a study of egg market conditions that he was of the opinion that the basic reason for the extremely low egg prices was that Boston was out of line with New York and Chicago. On April 29 we were eight cents over New York. This margin held until the break May 24—which was longer than we had any right to expect. Generally Boston is 2-3 cents over New York.

It was also stated that there appear to be more eggs around than the crop figures would indicate. The commercial egg movement for the week ended May 28 showed receipts from farmers to handlers four per cent above a year ago.

The activity of egg breakers is unquestionably a factor. After the price rise came March 10, breaking activities declined. They picked up again the last week in April after the price break in New York and Chicago. On the basis of present rate of breaking it looks like any surplus will be cleaned up quickly.

This gentleman quoted above predicts that there will be a price rise soon and a good price from from late June on. The 25¢ cut

in hatch this year will be showing up soon.

While many of us believe that egg prices should have been better this spring, some of the information stated above indicates that it certainly takes a long time to clear the decks after a year and a half of misery like we have just been through. There is still a great big question in the minds of a great many egg producers as to what will happen after this summer and fall. Most of us are not too optimistic about the future.

I have come to the conclusion that the day of the independent egg producer in New England is drawing to a close unless someone comes up with a very bright idea on how to keep egg prices at a profitable level. During the whole 18 months millions of words have been spoken and written without anyone coming close to a bulls-eye.

The next step seems to be in the direction of contract layers and then large corporate ventures with corporation owned farms and hired labor. It is not beyond the realm of possibility that the egg business may make a complete circle over a period of years, and a new group of independents emerge. 'Twas ever thus.
