Lives Of Six Are Saved By Neighbor Who Wakened Them In Burning House



Rockland firemen seek out hot spots in a fire which badly damaged a 150-year old two family house on Hall Street in Rockland, Thursday. Flames broke through the roof where the fireman is seen with a hose. Fire is believed to have started in this rear shed as the result of a cigarette tossed in rubbish. Two women and four children were saved when a neighbor awoke them by pounding on the door.

Persistent pounding on a door by a neighbor is credited with saving the lives of two women and four children who were asleep in a duplex house on Hall Street in Rockland, Thursday morning, as fire filled the kitchen and shed of the four-room apartment. Wilson Langan was about to smash in a door by the time he was able to waken Mrs. Katherine Simmons and Mrs. Winifred West and their four children. They escaped in their night clothing.

Fire Chief Wesley Knight said the fire, which caused an estimated \$1,700 damage to the

150-year-old house, was started by a cigarette tossed in rubbish in the back shed of the Cape Cod type house.

A next-door neighbor, Mrs. Carol Blastow noticed smoke coming out around a skylight on the rear of the house and ran across the street to alert Langan. While she called the fire department, Langan pounded on the front door.

Fire damage was confined to the half of the house occupied by the women, each of whom had two small children. The other side, occupied by Mrs. Lempi Erickson and her son Edward suffered smoke and

water damage. They were not at home at the time the fire broke out about 8:30 a. m.

Fire ate its way up from the kitchen to the rear bedroom and out the roof at the rear edge. It worked into the walls and it took firemen sometime to ferret out each hot spot and completely kill the spread.

The house was the birthplace of the last century actress Gertrude Elliott. It was moved some years ago to make way for the railroad station. In 1937 the Women's Educational Club erected a bronze plaque on the house.

Rockland Debaters Win One Debate At San Diego To Set Record For New England Schools

The Rockland High School debating team, competing in the National Forensic League championships at San Diego, Calif., defeated the Ohio champions from Dayton in the first round of the national debates this week.

Two successive losses were experienced in debates against the championship Texas team from Dallas and a composite team made up of the best of debaters from Central California schools. In winning their opening debate they established a record for New England schools. It was four years before the debaters from Laconia, N. H., were able to win a debate in national competition.

They were scheduled to go in other competitions this week which included, oral interpretation, original oratory and dramatic interpretation. Meanwhile, Mrs. George Trafton, the team's coach, has been serving as a judge for the debates and other features of the competition which brought teams from 39 points in the United States to San Diego.

Making the trip as team members were David Gregory, Wayne Johnson, William Beale, and Donald Gregory. They emerged in winter and spring

high school competition as champions of the Bates and University of New Hampshire debates, defeating at New Hampshire the noted Laconia, N. H. team to win the New England title.

While Mrs. Trafton, Johnson and Beale are making their way to Rockland, Donald and David Gregory will fly to Washington, D. C. Saturday, where Donald will represent the State of Maine in the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce patriotic essay competition, "My True Security."

David will be included in the activities of the state winners except competition. Arrangements for David to accompany his twin brother were made by their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Gregory, with the cooperation of the National Jaycee committee.

At Washington, Donald will compete with winners from 49 other states for valuable college scholarships. The Rockland High School honor graduate wrote to Vice President Nixon for an interview. Donald plans to attend Duke University to study to become an attorney. Vice President Nixon is an alumnus of Duke and was a practicing attorney before becoming a political figure.

SOME 170 4-H CLUB MEMBERS JOIN IN BROILER RAISING CONTEST OF BELFAST FESTIVAL

ORONO—Some 170 Maine 4-H Club members will compete for prizes and honors as champion broiler growers at the Maine Broiler Festival in Belfast on July 8 and 9.

These 4-H boys and girls are raising a total of 8,500 broiler chicks to 10 weeks of age. The birds are scheduled to be

dressed at the Hillcrest Poultry Company processing plant in Lewiston and at the Penobscot Poultry Company in Belfast. The dressed birds will be judged and the top 20 entries will be on public exhibit as a feature of the Maine Broiler Festival.

There will be a \$25 prize and a championship cup awarded to the top ranking entry. Cash prizes and ribbons will also be awarded the best 20 entries. The basis of scoring will be the weight of the birds, the feed efficiency, the degree of fleshing, and the dressed bird quality.

Last year's winner was Fred Whitney, of Gray, with an average live bird weight (both cockerels and pullets) of 54 pounds and a dressed bird score of 85 1/2 points.

Sponsors of the 4-H Broiler Contest are the Maine Broiler Festival Committee, and the following Maine hatcheries who donated the chicks: Arbor Acres Hatchery, Skowhegan; Clements Hatchery, Winterport; Constable's Hatchery, Unity; C. M. T. Hatchery, Winslow; Edgecomb's Hatchery, Steep Falls; Nichols Hatchery, Brunswick; Pinecrest Hatchery, Waterville, and White's Hatchery, Skowhegan.

Official judges will be Prof. J. R. Smyth, head of the Poultry Department, University of Maine, and Carl Watts and Merritt Caldwell of the Maine Department of Agriculture.

Rockland Corps Named To Represent Maine At VFW Convention In Detroit

The Port O' Rockland Drum and Bugle Corps will represent the State of Maine at the National Veterans of Foreign Wars annual convention at Detroit, Mich., Aug. 21 through 24. It was announced Friday by Department Commander Leo Trahan of Winslow and corps manager Ralph T. Clark, Jr.

The local corps was selected because of its two previous national convention records and the excellent record of the corps' eight years in competition. Port O' Rockland has won the Staet VFW drum corps championship six times. At Los Angeles, last year the corps placed ninth and the color guard placed fifth in national competition.

Plans are being formulated to finance a seven-day trip to Detroit for the 42 members of the corps and color guard plus five

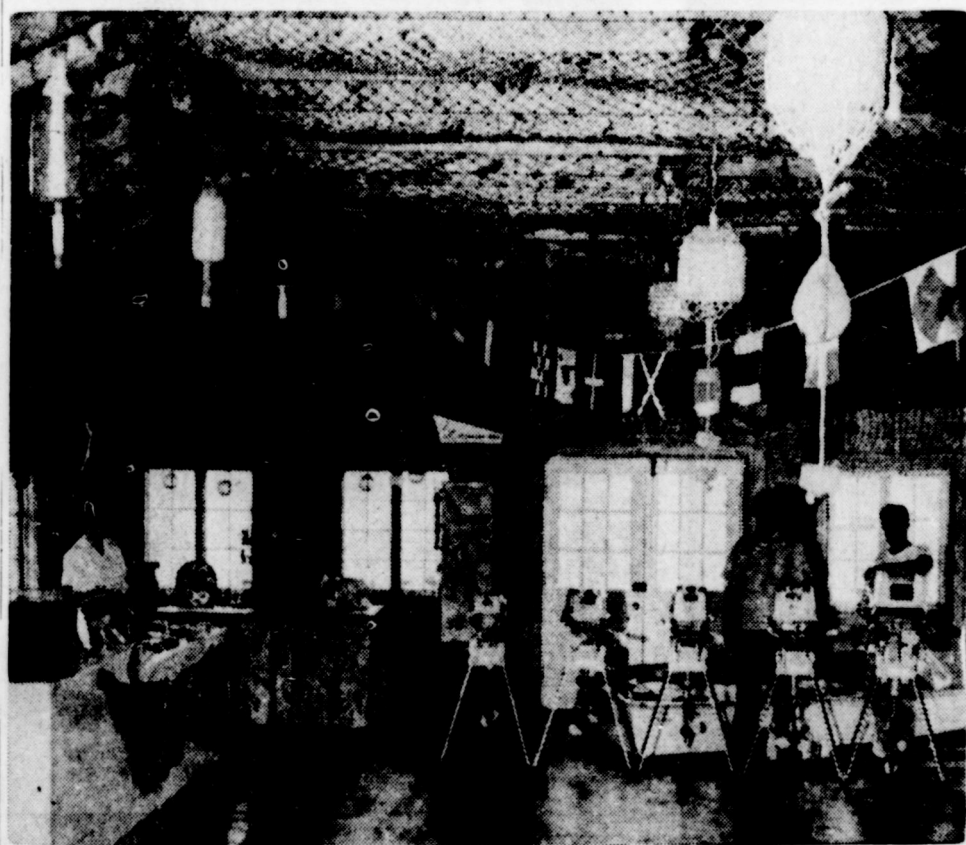
chaperones. Clark said the trip will cost \$5,200. It will be a start-from-scratch proposition because the corps' treasury was depleted by the trip to Los Angeles last year.

Members of the corps and corpsmen have pledged \$710 to kickoff the fund campaign. A tag day in Rockland is planned for next weekend. Clark explained that usually two tag days are held in the spring but because of the generosity of local people in supporting the Los Angeles trip no tag day was planned until announcement was made of the representation at Detroit.

Each VFW Post in the State will be asked to give funds.

Detroit is the largest out-of-state shipping point for Maine potatoes so the corps will promote not only Rockland and the Maine Seafoods Festival but Maine's giant potato industry.

MERGER OF THOMASTON NATIONAL BANK AND PORTLAND NATIONAL BANK OFFICIAL FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Final approval of the merger of the First National Bank of Portland with the Thomaston National Bank and the First National Bank of Bath has been received from the Comptroller of the Currency, according to a joint announcement released Friday afternoon by Hubert H. Hauck, president of the Portland bank, Richard O. Elliot, president of the Thomaston National Bank, and Donald G. Small, First National Bank of Bath president. The consolidations were effective with the close of business Friday.

The approval received Friday is among the first issued by the Comptroller under the new federal Bank Merger Act which President Eisenhower signed into law on May 14. Under the new statute, proposed mergers must be passed upon by the Department of Justice, the Federal Reserve Bank and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation before the Comptroller of the Currency can issue final approval.

Mr. Elliot will continue to direct the Thomaston office and has been elected a senior vice

president of the First National Bank of Portland. Harold F. Dana, who has been cashier of the Thomaston National Bank, has been elected vice president of the merged bank. No changes in personnel or operating policies are contemplated, the announcement said.

First National Bank of Portland, which is Maine's largest national bank, will now have resources approximating \$80,000,000. Earlier this year, the bank merged with the first National Bank of Rockland and acquired the banking business of the Bath Trust Company.

Lobstermen Elect Dyer For Sixth Year

The Maine Lobstermen's Association is at the crossroads.

President Leslie Dyer, Thursday, asserted at the annual meeting of the group in Rockland. He pointed out that more members are needed to support the organization in its various functions to serve the lobstermen of Maine. The group asked the president and officers to look into what they called discriminatory pricing of fish cuttings.

The organization went along with a \$2,000 salary cut for the president and giving up a costly office to be able to stay in the black.

Dyer said redfish processors were selling the fish carcasses to lobstermen at \$30 a ton but selling the very same material to fish meal plants at \$10 a ton.

He said a meeting was to be scheduled with lobster dealers to sit down and talk over the situation with the fish processors.

Dyer called for "doubling the membership" by each one going out and convincing one other lobsterman of the importance of the MLA to the entire lobster industry.

"Our organization is not dead. It's not going out of existence. We've worked hard, we are not going to sit back and let it die, but we've got to have help. Each individual can do more in his area than I can. Let's leave here determined to rebuild MLA."

Dyer was re-elected president. Also re-elected were Farrell Lendestey, Beal's Island, first vice president; Rodney Cushing, Chebeague, second vice president; Warren Fernald, Islesford, Hancock counselor; Closson Alley, Jr., Beal's Island, Washington counselor; Vernon C. Bryant, Round Pond, Lincoln-Sagadahoc counselor; Everett Watts, Tenants Harbor, Knox counselor; Justin Foss, Cape Porpoise, York counselor.

Miss Constance Malloy of Rockland was named to the new secretary-treasurer position in Dyer's office.

Speakers from Chebeague

Island explained efforts to get a bridge from the mainland.

Ronald Green, Sea and Shore Fisheries Commissioner, said an educational program for newly licensed lobstermen to "bring them in line with lobstering practices and traditions of regular lobstermen to help stop an increase in trap molesting" was among his department's plans.

Molesting has increased in the past few years, he said, blaming it largely on the greater number of traps being fished and the

greater number of "new" lobster licenses.

Methods of reducing mortality in fresh caught or impounded lobsters were constantly being sought by the research department he said, and he invited the membership to the Boothbay Harbor laboratories to learn first hand of work being done to assist the whole industry.

He said that a quarter million promotional items had been sent out to boost the nation's taste for lobster.

National Democratic Keynote Speaker To Address Annual Dinner At Samoset Saturday

Senator Frank Church of Idaho, designated as keynote speaker of the National Democratic Convention in California, next month, will address Maine Democrats at the annual Jefferson-Jackson Day dinner, Saturday night, at the Samoset Hotel. Between 400 and 500 Maine Democrats are expected to attend.

The affair will, in effect, be a preview of the national convention.

Senator Church has achieved an outstanding record and is one of the youngest, 36, ever to be chosen for the honor of keynoting the national convention.

Major Democratic candidates, Congressman Frank Coffin, Miss Lucia Cormier, and Dr. John Donovan as well as Senator Edmund Muskie will attend the dinner which will be partly a campaign kickoff and partly a fund raising affair.

WALDOBORO — The Thomaston Clippers nipped the Waldoboro Townies 5-4 in a disputed Twilight League game Thursday night to jump into a tie for second place with the losers.

Waldoboro Manager Bill Freeman announced that he was finishing the game under protest when in the seventh inning Thomaston scored what proved to be the winning run. Freeman claimed that Buster Kennedy stepped over the plate in driving out the game winning hit as Dana Verge tried to intentionally walk him. He was supported in his claim by base umpire Art Kinney, but was overruled by plate umpire Earl Barter who saw nothing wrong in the incident.

Kennedy's disputed single scored Bob Tweedie who had singled and advanced to second on an out. Tweedie had previously distinguished himself by blasting what some observers called the longest homer ever hit in the Waldoboro park over the distant centerfield fence. He also became the winning pitcher as he came on in the fifth to squelch a Waldoboro rally and hold the home team scoreless the rest of the way.

Tweedie and George Alex had two hits apiece for Thomaston and Bobby Howe collected two for Waldoboro.

Social Security Office To Be Open Mondays

A representative from the Social Security Administration District Office in Augusta will be at the Rockland Post Office Building, second floor, every Monday during the month of July from 10:00-12:30 and 1:30-2:30 p. m. except July 4. He will be there on Tuesday, July 5.

Residents of Rockland and near-by towns who wish to file claims for federal Old-Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance or obtain information should call upon this representative if they cannot go to the district office in Augusta.

Every person who has worked in employment covered by the Social Security Act should learn about his rights upon reaching age 65, or age 62 for women. Upon the death of a person who has worked in covered employment, a member of the family should make prompt inquiry about survivors insurance benefits. Persons severely disabled should inquire about the disability freeze and benefits program.

ROCKLAND AREA'S FIRST MARINA HAS GRAND OPENING AT PUBLIC LANDING

Fills Need In Coastal Area Vacation Boating Facilities

Modern facilities for the boating sportsman will open Saturday, with a grand opening celebration at the Public Landing in Rockland. Long a dream of John Ross and Horatio Knight, the Maine Deck Marina will offer facilities to fill every need of the yachtsman, small boat operator, and weekend outboard enthusiast. The marina, the only one of its kind and the only one between Boothbay and Bar Harbor, will fill a gap in Rockland's vacation facilities that has driven summer business to other harbors.

The pair purchased the wharf and buildings formerly known as Cap'n Henry's Lobster Wharf and the Lobster Wharf from A. Alan Grossman. They have renovated the buildings, installed new timbers in the wharf and supports for the main building, set out one float, with plans for two more, and have started to install a ramp for the launching of boats from trailers. The business will provide docking space for power boats and small boats alike. It will be the only place on the Rockland waterfront to which boats

can easily go for gasoline and water. A float will be installed in the shelter of the dock for dinghies and rowboats.

For visitors who do not have boats, the Main Deck will offer boats for rent, charter boats, boats for fishing parties and sightseeing tours.

In addition to marine supplies, ice and accessories, the facility will have gasoline, diesel oil, lube oil and grease. Moorings will be available as well as shore tie for electricity.

Shower facilities and a laundry also will be offered at the Main Deck.

At the grand opening, refreshments will be served from 10 a. m. to 10 p. m.

Aside from the marine aspect of the marina, lobsters will be available to take to picnic tables on the end of the pier where patrons may eat while they view the activities of Rockland harbor. Inside the main building, one corner has been set up with many gift articles. Mrs. Ross and Mrs. Knight have set up an attractive

display of gifts in the Pirates Treasure Chest Gift Corner.

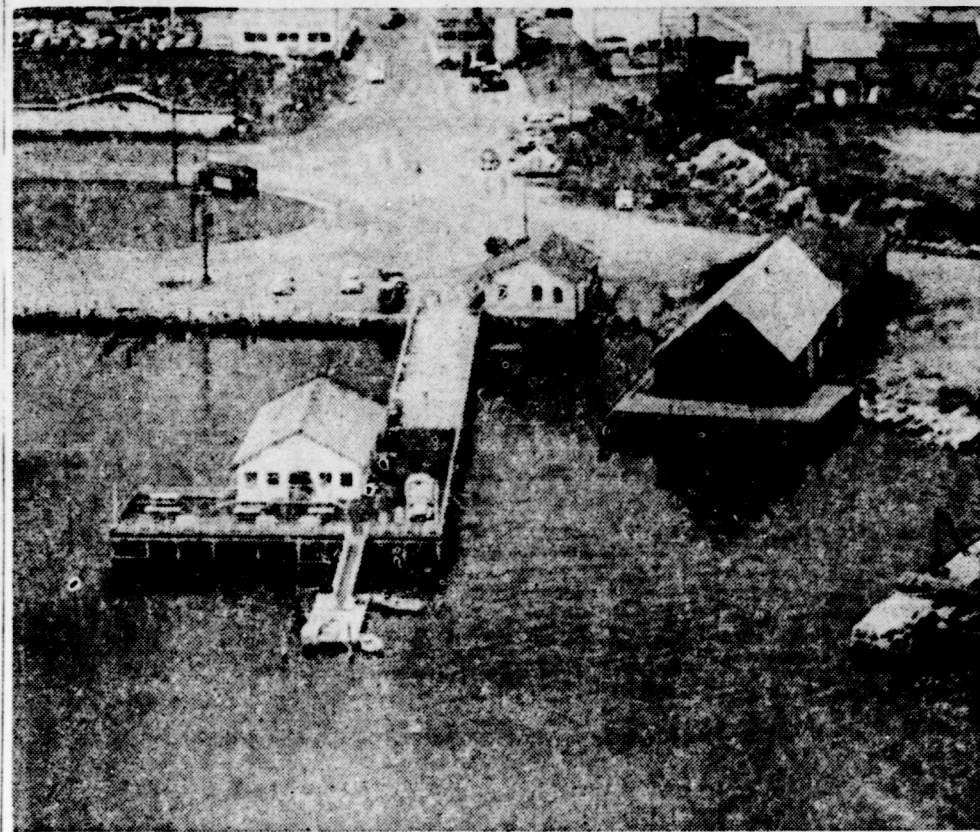
Along with supplies and accessories, the Maine Deck is the distributor for Evinrude outboard motors, Penbo boats of Rockport and Howard fiberglass boats.

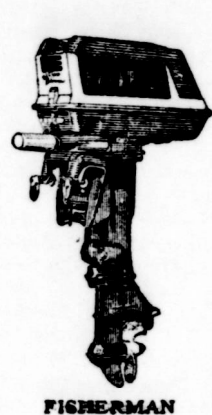
