Damage From Electrical Storm In Area Exceeds \$250,000

Fire In West Rockport Blueberry Growers Ass'n Freezer Most Serious

WEST ROCKPORT — Crackling lightning danced through Knox County, Tuesday night, selecting West Rockport as its key victim of destruction. Although other sections were hit, damage at West Rockport village was estimated to run in excess of a quarter of a million dollars. One tremendous bolt apparently touched the home of Henry Kontio, the trailer home of Mrs. Kathleen Hunt, the Maine Blueberry Growers plant, and Central Maine Power Company transmission poles, all within a 500 yard radius of West Rockport four corners.

Other lightning damage was reported in Rockland, Warren and Waldoboro.

Loss was estimated, Wednesday, at roughly \$250,000 in the blaze that virtually destroyed the Maine Blueberry Growers Association freezing plant on the old Simonton Corner Road, just a short distance from the four corners. Firemen from Rockport, Rockland, Camden and Thomaston were able to prevent the spread of flames to the for-

mer Mt. Pleasant Grange Hall only 10 feet from the structure destroyed.

The bolt apparently set fire to the roof of the main freezing plant near a ventilator. The flames ate their way into the heart of the building and firemen were prevented from entering the building by intense heat. Stacks of blueberry boxes and cans made it nearly impossible to get water on the fire itself in the early stages. The flames ate into attached buildings which contained freezing equipment and firemen were fearful of an explosion of ammonia gas. This never developed.

David Brown, manager of the plant, said the fire certainly put a crimp in operations but did not put the Association out of business by any means. Blueberries will be raked and sent to a commercial freezing plant for processing.

Brown termed the fire a temporary interruption of their operation. He had praise for the fire fighters and the cooperation of departments in confining

the fire to the main building.

Only rain prevented the flying embers from igniting the roof of a barn some distance from the fire but in a direct path of the smoke and debris. The barn was on the property of Robert Oxtun.

Several light fixtures and a number of bulbs were blown out in the Kontio home on Route 17 just a short distance from the Blueberry plant. No fire resulted there.

Crews from Central Maine Power Company found that the powerful blast had completely demolished an air brake switch and set two poles afire near a substation south of the four corners. When the switch was blown apart, a line carrying 33,000 volts and the power of the blast burned off guy wires.

Power service was interrupted only a short time as the company cut in different circuits to serve Camden and Rockport areas, according to district manager Donald Kilgour.

Soon after the blast, the village of West Rockport was covered with a pall of smoke and mist giving the entire area an eerie cast.

Mrs. Kathleen Hunt said a blue ball of fire entered a trailer she occupies with her brother and her parents. It did no damage and she felt the fact the

Demonstration of Sardine Catching Process To Be Festival Water Attraction

The public will be treated to a demonstration of herring catching in the 1960 Maine Seafoods Festival to be held in Rockland Aug. 5-7. The exhibition will be presented through the cooperation and planning of the Maine Sardine Council.

This added spectacle will be the largest water attraction the festival has ever had said John H. Billington, president of the festival, Wednesday. Eight to ten sardine carriers will participate in the demonstration which will take place in Rockland harbor. A good vantage point will be the public landing, hub of festival activities.

A plane is scheduled to fly low over the harbor at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon pretending to spot a school of fish, officially starting the proceedings. A public speaking system will then take over the affair describing

the entrance of the carriers into the harbor.

A step by step account will be given as one of the carriers bedraped with bunting will detach itself from the others to go to the site where the fish were spotted. It will lay down a curtain of bubbles to drive the fish into a tight pocket.

A pump boat will then move in as a leader to the carriers and suck the fish up dumping them into the holds of the carriers.

The entire event will be simulated, according to Billington, as herring are not actually expected to be in the area.

The event should be completed before 2 o'clock at which time visitors will be allowed to board several of the carriers for rides around the harbor.

This is a unique demonstration, according to the president's statement.

CAMDEN—Mrs. Mae Murray, operator of nursing homes in Camden and Rockport for 18 years, announced, this week, she has purchased the former Camden Community Hospital and plans to open it as a nursing home on July 21. The Mountain Street facility will accommodate 34 nursing home patients.

When ready for occupancy, the new home will meet all State standards, many of which Mrs. Murray had a part in setting as the organizer and past

president of the Maine Association of Nursing Homes. She also is a director of the American Nursing Home Association.

The building is being completely renovated and adapted for nursing home use. It will be known as the Mae Murray Nursing Home. She also will continue to operate her home off upper Chestnut Street, fronting on the Lily Pond.

Mrs. Murray, a registered nurse, specializes in geriatric care, and convalescence. She will supervise both homes.

DIMINISHING RETURN WITH A VENGEANCE

Gasoline taxes, which now average one-third of the cost to motorists for regular grade fuel, may be approaching the point of diminishing return. Charles E. Webber, president of the National Gasoline Association of America, said that at the 39th convention of the trade association in Houston, Texas.

The American motorist has become gasoline price conscious to a degree greater than ever before because of increased prices caused by heavier fuel taxes. From 1949 through 1959 there were 62 separate state tax increases, plus a rise of from 1.5 cents to 4 cents per gallon in the Federal tax. This amounted to a jump of 40 per cent. In contrast, the actual price of gasoline at the pump rose only 4.5 per cent, making the rate of gasoline tax increase nine times that of the gasoline itself. So it is taxes that cause the seemingly high price of the product — but the petroleum industry is generally given the blame.

The growth of the compact, economy car this year is accounting for 25 per cent of the domestic automobile industry's production, and it is forecast that there will be two million small, economy foreign cars in this country by the end of 1960. Rebellion against tax-included high gas prices is a major reason for this trend. As a consequence, Mr. Webber emphasized, it is conceivable that that total of taxable gallons may drop so far that taxes may have to be raised again to cover the deficit. That would be an example of "diminishing return" with a vengeance.

MORE THAN NEWS

As source of information on current matters of all kinds, you can't beat the newspapers.

For instance, the student newspaper at the University of Kansas polled political science students to learn what they considered the most valuable source of information about this year's possible presidential candidates. From the results, a "popularity index" was made.

On this index, newspapers racked up a score of 327, magazines 260, and television 150 — well under half the newspaper figure. Radio scored a scant 107 and books 49.

Newspapers provide much more than news. They are a major force for popular education and understanding.

SERVICES TO BE HELD AT OLD GERMAN CHURCH, WALDOBORO ON MID-SUMMER SUNDAYS

WALDOBORO — Three Lutheran Church services will again be held this summer at Waldoboro. Although Lutherans are the largest single group of Protestants, numbering some seventy millions in the world there are very few Lutheran churches in Maine. Among the thousands of Lutherans who come into Vacationland each summer, many would enjoy the liturgy, hymns, and preaching familiar to them. The Old German Church in Waldoboro on Route 32 will be open for worship July 24, 31 and August 7 at 3 p. m.

This church is believed to be as old as any in Maine. Following a schism in the congregation it was built in 1772 by a group of Reformed Lutherans on the eastern bank of the Medomak river. In the winter of 1794-1795 it was moved on the ice to its present location.

For more than two decades its pulpit was colorfully served by a series of charlatans. The first regularly ordained minister was

the Rev. Frederick Augustus Rodolphus Benedictus Ritz of the University of Halle.

Following his untimely death, the Rev. Johannes Wilhelm Starman was installed in 1819 as the last minister of the church. An able, devoted and sincere pastor, nevertheless his ministry was one of slow decline in the history of the church. This was due to the fact that the older Germans successfully insisted that the word should be preached only in the German language. There hasn't been a congregation with a pastor here for about one hundred years.

The preacher on the last two Sundays in July will be the Rev. Peter J. Dennis, Th.B., senior minister of St. Peter's Lutheran Church in Bethlehem, Pa. The preacher on the first Sunday in August will be the Rev. Robert E. Horne, STM, minister of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Norristown, Pa.

All the offerings received are used to repair and restore this historical building.

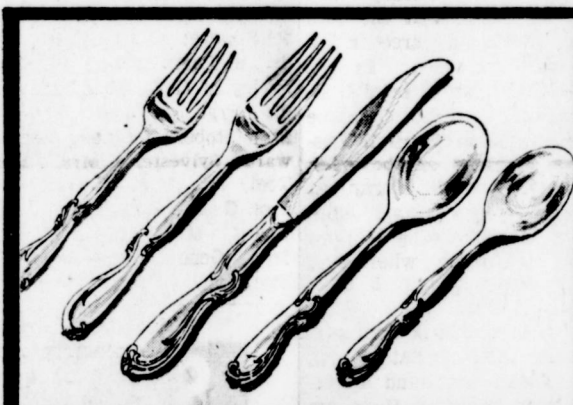

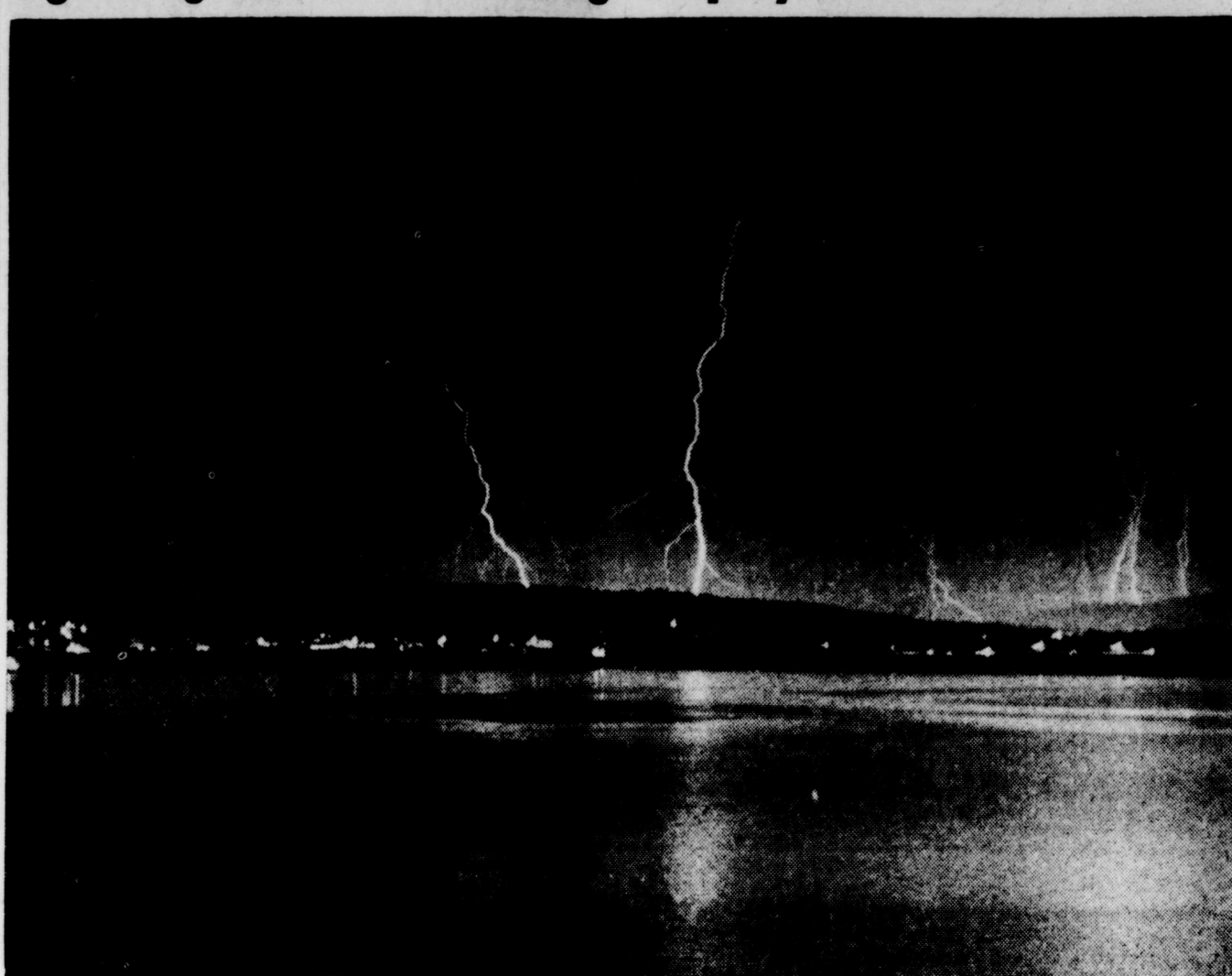

A bolt of lightning was blamed for a fire which levelled an unoccupied house and barn on Route 1 just over the Waldoboro town line from Warren opposite Walt's diner.

The owner of the property, Mrs. Charles Bowers is believed to be staying with relatives in Waldoboro. The Waldoboro and Warren firemen came out but the fierce blaze was too far advanced to stop.

Power Company Damage
In Rockland, the Central Maine Power Company reported an oil switch outside the Park Street station was damaged when struck by another bolt.

Power in Rockland was interrupted only momentarily as other switches were cut in. A distribution transformer near the Warren Elementary School was knocked out. This served residents in its immediate area.

In Waldoboro, a power substation was damaged and it caused service to be cut off in Waldoboro and parts of Warren for five to six hours.

The storm was a most unusual one in that it moved very slowly over the area. Belfast reported rain and lightning as early as 2 o'clock in the afternoon. In Camden, rumblings could be heard all afternoon.

The destructive strike in West Rockport came about 7:30. The storm continued into the late evening but apparently passed by St. George and Friendship areas hit by earlier storms.

Rainfall
The storm was not without any benefit. In Rockland, it brought 0.46 inches of rain which equalled the entire rainfall for the month up to that time. In a brief but heavy rainfall early Wednesday evening, another 0.36 inches fell. The last previous rain was on July 7 with one tenth of an inch falling, and prior to that 0.32 inches fell on July 4. The normal rainfall for Rockland during July is 3.4 inches, according to weather observer Oliver Holmes.

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MANAGER'S REPORT FOR JUNE SHOWS CASH BALANCE IN CITY COFFERS; DROP IN WELFARE

The June report of Rockland City Manager Charles A. Haynes shows a total of 51 arrests, 22 accidents and 34 fire alarms. There was a reduction in welfare beneficiaries and a cash balance of \$23,813.73 was reported for the period. A program for the University of Maine interns has been set up to supplement their academic studies in city management.

The full report is as follows:

Tax Collection Department
The report of the tax collector for June shows \$1,048.73 collected on 1960 taxes in advance, \$40,650.87 collected on 1960 current taxes, \$1,412.30 collected on prior years' taxes, \$782.65 in abatements and write-offs, and \$385.22 allowed in discounts on 1960 taxes.

The 1960 commitment amounted to \$911,513.40 and \$1,673.59 was collected on 1960 taxes prior to June 1. Supplemental taxes amounted to \$740.30. The balance of uncollected taxes on June 30 was \$877,101.46. Other collections amounted to \$2,687.61 for excise tax, and \$38.59 in interest, fees, costs, etc.

City Treasurer

The report of the city treasurer shows the cash balance on June 1 to be \$11,836.71. During the month, \$45,838.10 was received from the Tax Collector, \$1,153.14 on tax liens, \$1,553.86 from parking meters, \$344.50 in parking fines, etc., \$199.90 in Community Building receipts, \$1,566.80 in licenses, permits, fees, etc., and \$3,571.98 in other receipts. During the month, warrants were paid out amounting to \$42,251.26. The cash balance on June 30 was \$23,813.73.

Records Department

The report of the city clerk shows that one regular and one special meeting of the City Council was held during the month of June. Publications numbered six, four being ordinance notices, one a legal notice, and one an election notice. Thirty-one city licenses and permits were issued for \$202. Two hundred thirty state licenses were issued for \$548.05 to the state and \$96 to the city. There were 70 recordings of vital statistics, one hundred eighty-two miscellaneous recordings, and forty copies of vital statistical records issued.

The department conducted preparations for the June 3rd Special City Election and the June Pri-

mary State Election. Absentee votes were processed. An instruction meeting with election workers was held in preparation to using the new voting machines. Returns were received for record. The sum of \$1036 was deposited with the city treasurer from the Department.

Police Department

The monthly report of the police chief shows a total of 51 arrests during June consisting of one for burglary, one for other assault, one for forgery and counterfeiting, one under embezzlement and fraud, one for sex offense, eighteen for drunkenness, four for driving while intoxicated, nineteen for motor vehicle violations and five for other offenses. Forty-six convictions were obtained from the fifty-one arrests.

There were 22 motor vehicle accidents during June with two cases of bodily injury. Twenty-six doors were found unlocked at night and there were 136 investigations.

During June, there were 250 meter violations and 44 other types of violations making a total of two hundred ninety-four parking violations.

Building Inspection

The building inspector reports for June that a total of six permits were issued for an estimated value of \$39,755. One permit was for a one-family dwelling, three for repairs to dwellings, one for a sign, and one for a church.

Fire Department

The fire chief reports that during the month of June there were 34 alarms classified as follows: Six in buildings, one in brush or grass, one in rubbish near building, one in rubbish in vacant lot, one miscellaneous fire outdoors, one in a vehicle in the street, plus thirteen rescue or emergency calls, eight drills, and two out-of-city calls. Estimated fire loss for June was \$1,690.

Welfare Department

The welfare director reports for June that the case load consisted of 29 families with 87 persons. The case load decreased during June to 22 families with 50 persons. Nine families with 37 persons were receiving full relief and 13 persons were receiving supplemental relief. Sixty-eight families with 204 children were receiving Aid to Dependent Children.

Library Department

The librarian reports for June a total circulation of 7,231 volumes. Two hundred reference questions were answered. One hundred eighty-eight borrowers were added and 67 were withdrawn making a total borrower list of 3,812. Fifty volumes were added to the book stock in June and 22 were withdrawn, leaving a total book stock on June 30 of 25,604 volumes.

Public Works Department

The report of the Public Works superintendent shows 93½ man hours expended on sewer maintenance; 356 hours on storm drains and culverts; 234 hours, street cleaning; 75, waste removal; 240, city dump; 59, mixing 86 yards of tar patch; 342, tar patching streets; 740½, tarring streets; 669½ on general highway maintenance; 276 on equipment maintenance; 216, mowing and raking; 358, municipal landing; 18 at airport; 211 on building maintenance and repair;

Assisted in the locating and construction of a sewer on Woodland Avenue, so called, worked on sewer, storm drain, and zoning maps, worked on a study of parking problems in the city, and assisted the Public Works Department in their annual tarring program.

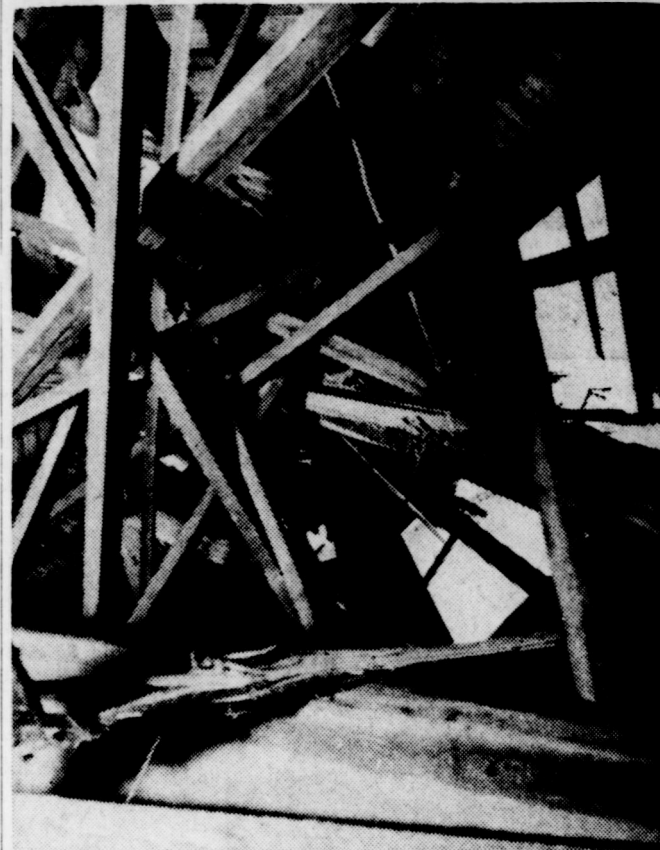

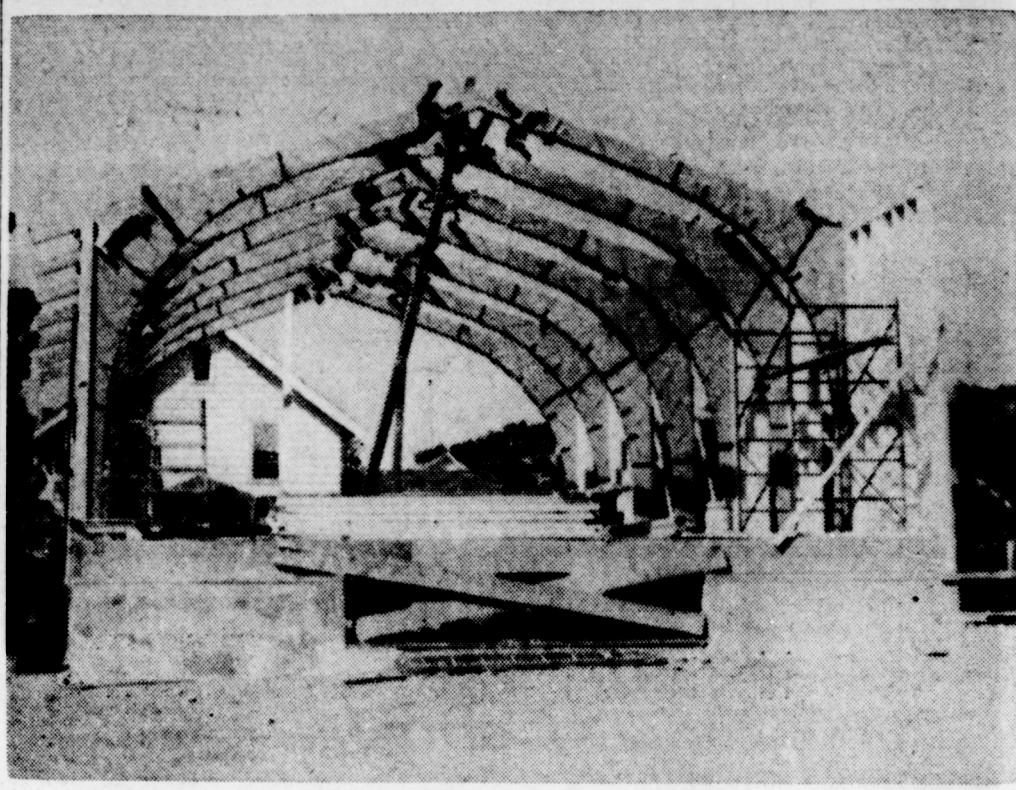
