For the last twenty years I have noted the manner
of conducting the affairs of the office, and I am confirmed
in the opinion the best interests of the tribe require
an agent who is not concerned in trade -

My personal knowledge of Mr. Richardson leads me
to say that he would labor to elevate the tribe by
his personal effort - The agricultural products of
the tribe require the personal attention of their agt
and Mr. Richardson not being in trade can and
would if appointed give his personal attention to those
matters pertaining to the good of the tribe - Hoping you
