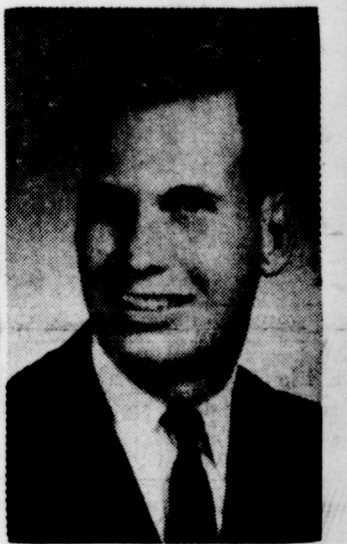

Maine Safety Conference At Samoset 15-16

AUGUSTA — The 33rd annual Maine State Safety Conference will be held at the Samoset Hotel, Rockland, Sept. 15 and 16, it has been announced by Marion E. Martin, Commissioner of the Department of Labor and Industry, and chairman of the conference. More than 500 delegates are expected to attend.

The conference will cover all aspects of safety with prominent speakers and panelists leading conference and group discussions on the latest developments in safety in logging, shipbuilding, pulp and paper, textiles, utilities, shoe and leather, food processing, woodworking, petroleum, home and off the job, highway, rehabilitation, and industrial nursing.

Governor John H. Reed will address the delegates at a luncheon on Sept. 15. When announcing the dates of the conference, Miss Martin said that considerable emphasis would be placed on off-the-job safety. The need for such emphasis, she said, is indicated by the experience of one large Maine manufacturer. In a single year this company had 33 on-the-job lost-time accidents to employees. In the same year there were 684 off-the-job accidents requiring hospitalization to employees and members of their families—all injured under the company's sickness and hospitalization policy. Miss Martin said that an employee who is injured off-the-job is as big a loss to his employer and his family as an employee who is injured while working.

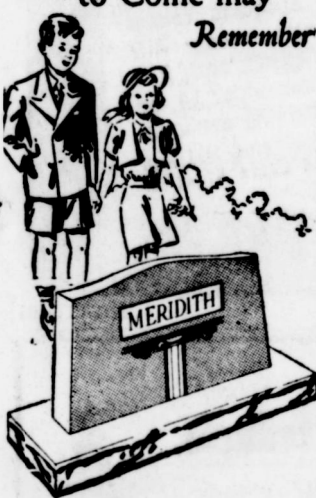

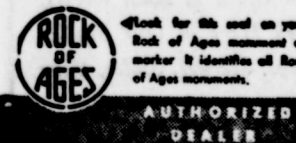

At the age of nine years, Mr. Walsh started to build his Great Cathedrals, gluing matchsticks together. He built eight models using 6,000,000 matchsticks and 700 tubes of glue, each about four feet high, which have been exhibited around the country.

Mr. Walsh had resided in Miami for the past eight years, previously living in Rockland. He was a member of the Miami Showmen's Association.

Maine Motorists Pay 57 Million In State, U. S. Tax

AUGUSTA — Maine motorists paid \$57,776,000 in state and federal gasoline and other automotive levies last year, it was disclosed today.

Leroy T. Snowdon, executive secretary of the Maine Petroleum Association, said the biggest bite was placed on the motorist in the form of gasoline tax. Maine took in \$22,672,000 from this source in 1959 and Uncle Sam realized \$9,692,000.

The rest of the revenue came from a variety of levies, including registration fees, taxes on new cars, parts and accessories, imposts on lubricating oil and other sales and excise taxes. Maine imposes a seven-cent-a-gallon tax on gasoline and the U. S. government has a four-cent levy.

Nationally, the state and federal governments took in more than \$9.5 billion last year from special taxes imposed on the motorist, Snowdon noted. Some \$1.6 billion of the federal tax revenue alone was directed to non-highway spending, he said. "The already staggering size of the motorist's tax burden makes it imperative that gasoline taxes go no higher", Snowdon declared. "The fourth cent of the current federal levy is slated to expire next June 30 and it is essential that it do so. The motorist is hit hard enough already."

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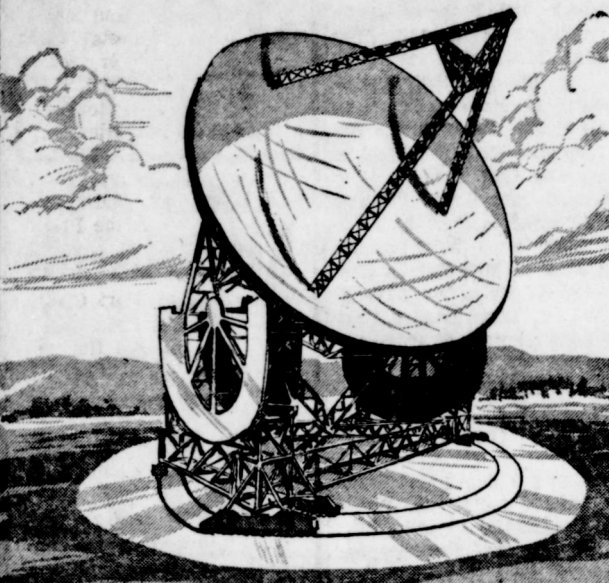

THE DRIVER'S SEAT



Contrary to what most of us have heard, alcohol is not a physical stimulant. It's a sedative and a depressant. It slows down the operation of the heart, blood vessels and nerves.

Then why do some people become loud and boisterous after a few drinks? Physicians say that moderate amounts of alcohol release tensions and make us feel less inhibited. So, our spirits may soar a little while our body processes slow down. We feel better, but our hearing, vision, reasoning, reflexes and sensations are dulled.

This might sound good to the fellow who relaxes with a moderate nightcap before going to bed. But when he drinks a few "for the road," he's asking for trouble. Because when he tries to drive with alcohol in his blood, its sedative and depressant effect can kill him.

A recent American Medical Association report emphasizes that only two shots of 100 proof whiskey, or two 12 ounce bottles of 3.2 per cent beer, inject enough alcohol into the system to create a danger while driving. Judgment, observation, tolerance to glare and reaction time are all substantially cut by just that little alcohol.

And, whether you think you can hold your liquor or not, one fact remains constant — the body's fundamental response to alcohol never changes. Your body becomes depressed, your responses slow down, your vision is cut substantially even though you may feel exhilarated.

The worst effect of alcohol, that of limiting vision, is most evident at night, when most social drinking is done. Two normal cocktails reduce vision as much as wearing dark sunglasses at night!

So, when it comes to mixing alcohol and gasoline, there is only one rule that can safely be followed: Don't! The fact that on occasion you have had a few drinks and then driven safely home doesn't mean you can hold your liquor. It doesn't mean that you're an exceptionally good driver. It just means you were lucky. How long do you believe your luck will hold out?

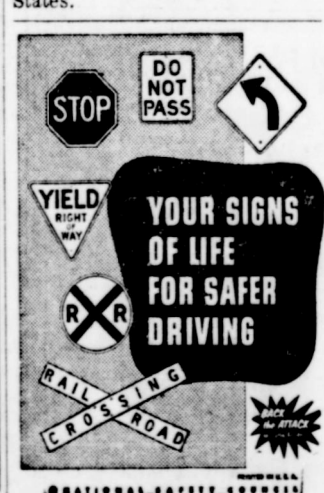

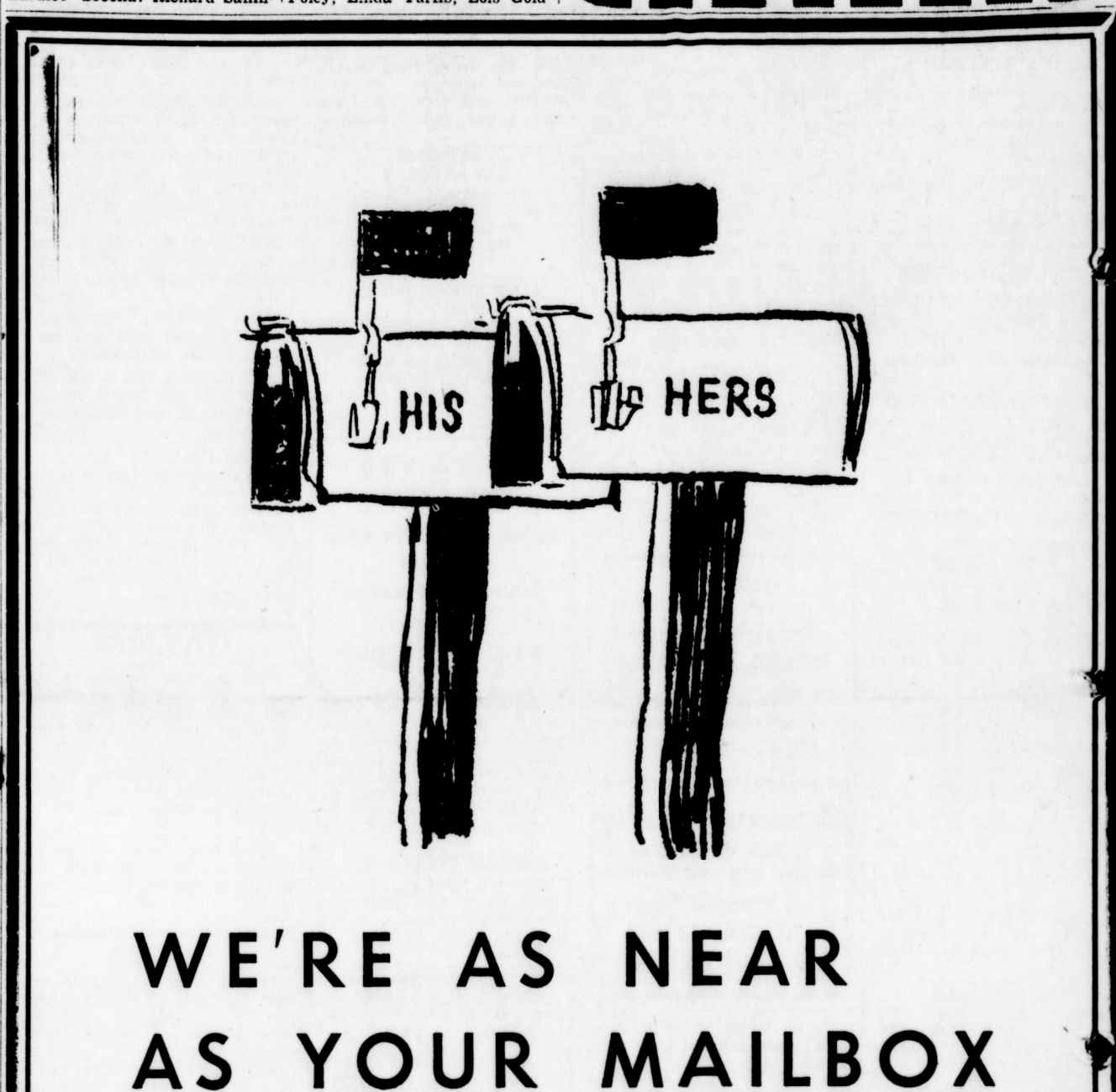
