## Union Fair The Biggest, Best Yet In Every Way

UNION—Mrs. George Cole of Newcastle was crowned as champion blueberry pie baker Friday night at Union Fair. She defeated 15 other contestants in winning the prizes offered—a \$100 check from the Fair Association and a trophy from the King Reid Shows. She was crowned with a chef's cap and blueberry blue robe by Maine's Commissioner of Agriculture E. L. Newdick.

Runners up to the champion were Mrs. A. Carmen Clark of Union and Mrs. La E. Porter of Brewer. All three were presented corsages on the stage by flower girls Alison Hawes, Kim Newbert and Gloria Savage, all of Union.

The first annual Blueberry Festival, held in conjunction with Union Fair, was termed by officials as very successful and will probably become a regular feature in years to come.

Governor John H. Reed spent nearly all of Friday afternoon at the Fair and was one of some 2,400 visitors who received a free blueberry pie. He attended the races and pulling contests. He awarded the prize for the fastest blueberry pie eater, Willard (Skipper) Pease of Rockland who won out over nine other contestants on the stage in front of the grandstand. Thomas Hardy of Hope was the second place finisher.

Fair Treasurer Elmer Savage of Union said Sunday that figures on attendance and money taken in would not be complete for several days but he believed the best attendance in several years was indicated. Daily attendance figures were much greater than for corresponding days a year ago, he said.

Parimutual betting surpassed last year's total by some \$27,400. Savage said, the total this year being \$152,211. He also said the Saturday night auto thrill show played to standing room only as every seat in the grandstand was disposed of early.

The winner of the midget automobile given away in conjunction with the Saturday morning children's show was Sharon Gibson, 9, of Union.

## COASTAL AREA SKIPPERS AND YACHTS PROMINENT IN RETIRED SKIPPERS' RACE AT CASTINE

CASTINE—Captain Fred Haskell of Rockland placed fourth in the ninth annual Maine Retired Skipper's race Saturday over a 12 mile course in Penobscot Bay. The 74 year old skipper sailed the Maine Maritime Academy sloop "Clio".

The race was won by Captain Mace Eaton, 68, of Castine, who nipped the sloops captained by Captain Henry Morey of Deer Isle and Captain Leroy Greenlaw of Stonington at the finish line by a narrow margin. Both the latter craft finished in a dead heat for second place.

Other owners or skippers figuring in the race from this area were: Franklin W. Creighton of Camden, owner of the sloop "Captain Jim" which finished fifth; Colonel A. T. Green of Rockport, owner of the sixth place finisher "Lady Joan"; and Captain Freeman S. Young, 87, and the oldest in the race, who finished eighth in the

sloop "What Cheer" owned by Edward Coffin of Owls Head. Captain Vernon Haskell of Castine, brother of Fred Haskell skippered the yawl "Tocata" to a seventh place finish. Ideal weather brought out dozens of craft to view the annual event. Veteran sailors called the event one of the best of the series and declared they never had seen a closer finish.

## Phone Rates Up In Warren As PUC Grants Increase

WARREN — Charles Trone, president of the Warren Telephone Company, announced Monday that the Public Utilities Commission has handed down a decision in the Company's request for increased rates.

The PUC denied any increase in the party line rate on lines having from three to 12 subscribers.

The two party line rate will increase from \$4 to \$4.75 per month. Single party line charges will jump from the current \$4.50 to \$6.

Business phones on village lines will pay \$6 per month on two party lines and \$7 on single party lines. Rural business lines are to be \$4.75.

The new rates are effective at once.

## Fire Destroyed Hendricks Farm Monday

A strong South wind drove the flames, which started at the front of the house, left, quickly through the main structure. Loss was estimated at \$10,000, partially covered by insurance. Both the South Thomaston and Thomaston departments battled the flames and laid nearly 3,000 feet of hose.

**SOUTH THOMASTON** — Fire of undetermined origin totally destroyed the main house and part of the ell of the farm stand of Burton Hendricks on the St. George Road Monday afternoon. Thomaston Fire Chief Edwin Anderson, whose department joined that of South Thomaston's in fighting the flames, estimated the damage at "about \$10,000". It was partially covered by insurance.

## Dry Cleaning Plant Gutted By Fire



Rockland firemen break through the rear door of People's Laundry dry cleaning plant behind House-Sherman's, Inc., on Main Street Friday night. Their quick work prevented the fire from spreading to adjacent buildings.

The dry cleaning plant of People's Laundry on Limerock Street was destroyed by fire which was discovered about 6:20 p. m. Friday. Until fire underwriters can appraise the loss, no estimate can be made.

Fire Chief Wesley Knight said Monday that he attributed the fire to a careless smoker. The plant had been closed for over an hour when it was discovered to be aflame.

Francis Richardson, who operates the plant for Raymond

Perry, owner of People's Laundry, said Monday that a considerable number of suits, coats, dresses and other clothing in the plant for cleaning were destroyed.

The two story wooden structure is joined to the laundry by a bridge. The cleaning plant is on the second floor and garages and storage space occupies the ground floor which is reached through an alley beside the Masonic Temple from Main Street.

An unusually smokey fire, it

sent clouds of thick smoke skyward to blanket the business section for a few moments. The cleaning plant was gutted with several costly machines being destroyed. Damage to articles stored on the ground floor, and one delivery truck, was confined largely to smoke and water.

Woodwork was charred badly in one section where the washer which uses a safety type cleaning fluid is located. The unit went through the fire without explosion or fire from the fluid.



## Livingston Smithy Being Razed

**SOUTH END LANDMARK BEING TORN DOWN** — The C. W. Livingston Blacksmith Shop at South Main Street is in the process of being torn down by owner Maurice Duncan, operator of Duncan's Market. The space will be used as a parking lot in connection with the store for the time being, Duncan said, with the possibility that a larger store may be constructed later. The building has been in the Duncan family since the turn of the century, and during all that time was occupied by the late Charles Livingston and his father before him. It was used as a carriage shop in the 1880's and 90's with a dance hall on the second floor, according to older residents of the area.

## IT MAY WORK TWO WAYS

Over in Halliwell a superintendent of schools has threatened to sue the city for pay he claims is due him on a contract with the school board which runs until 1962. He was recently notified that his services were no longer needed as the community entered an administrative school district. The outcome will be interesting to many in school administration through school board service as they face another problem. Teachers have broken contracts at will for many years. Sometimes just by a word of parting as they hurried to take on a new and more lucrative position. In Rockland, only a couple of years ago, a teacher in a responsible high school position just didn't bother to let authorities know he was departing. The superintendent found out by chance in a conversation with a superintendent from another state who had hired him. The result was that the position he had been contracted for went unfilled for a year. Should the Halliwell superintendent win his case against the city which hired him, there may be some hope that communities who are plagued by broken contracts may have a chance to recover from the teacher who departs while a contract is in force.

arrived the front of the house was a mass of flames and a stiff south wind drove the fire through the main house in a matter of minutes. Nearly 3,000 feet of hose was laid to a pond some distance from the structure after two wells and two tank trucks had been used early in the fight. An auxiliary pumper part way to the pond enabled the water to be pumped to the fire.

A passerby, Mrs. Charlotte Moran of Thomaston, noticed a fire in the front room, an enclosed porch, of the house and notified a neighbor of the Hendricks. Mrs. Alfred Harjula who notified the South Thomaston department. At about the same time an unidentified person called the Thomaston department.

Hendricks, who had purchased the house two years ago, said that a recently installed freezer was on the wall against the front porch and "might" have been the cause of the fire. Mrs. Hendricks had left the house at 10 o'clock in the morning and no one was at home at the time of the fire.

lectual students headed by F. Blair Reeves, assistant professor of architecture and fine arts, University of Florida, have completed their studies of the Lincoln, Knox and Waldo Counties and will display their achievements at the museum.

A feature of the exhibition will be drawings of the lighthouse on Saddleback Ledge which Reeves says contains some highly significant historical value. The material is used by students of architecture, practicing architects and persons interested in historical continuity in discovering significant pieces of American architecture which have either a local or national importance.

There will be many drawings and photographs of local housing on display. Reeves, who is a native Texan, chose Maine this year to broaden his own scope as an architectural draftsman. His team includes drawing specialists Russell V. Kuene, senior at the University of Chicago; Robert H. Swiley, senior at the University of Florida; and photographer James M. Replogle, a graduate of Ohio State University.

As required by Section 23 of Chapter 15-A of the Revised Statutes, we submit herewith a Condensed Summary of the forthcoming complete report of the fiscal operations of the State of Maine for the year ended June 30, 1960 and its financial condition as of that date.

This report shows that Current Expenditures of the Operating Funds exceeded their Current Revenues by \$161,922 and the General Fund Surplus was \$3,801,476 at June 30, 1960. The Bonded Debt was increased by \$12,885,000.

For conciseness, the cents have been omitted in the accompanying schedules and in consequence the detail does not add to the totals, in all cases.

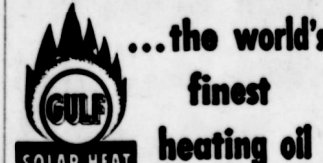
