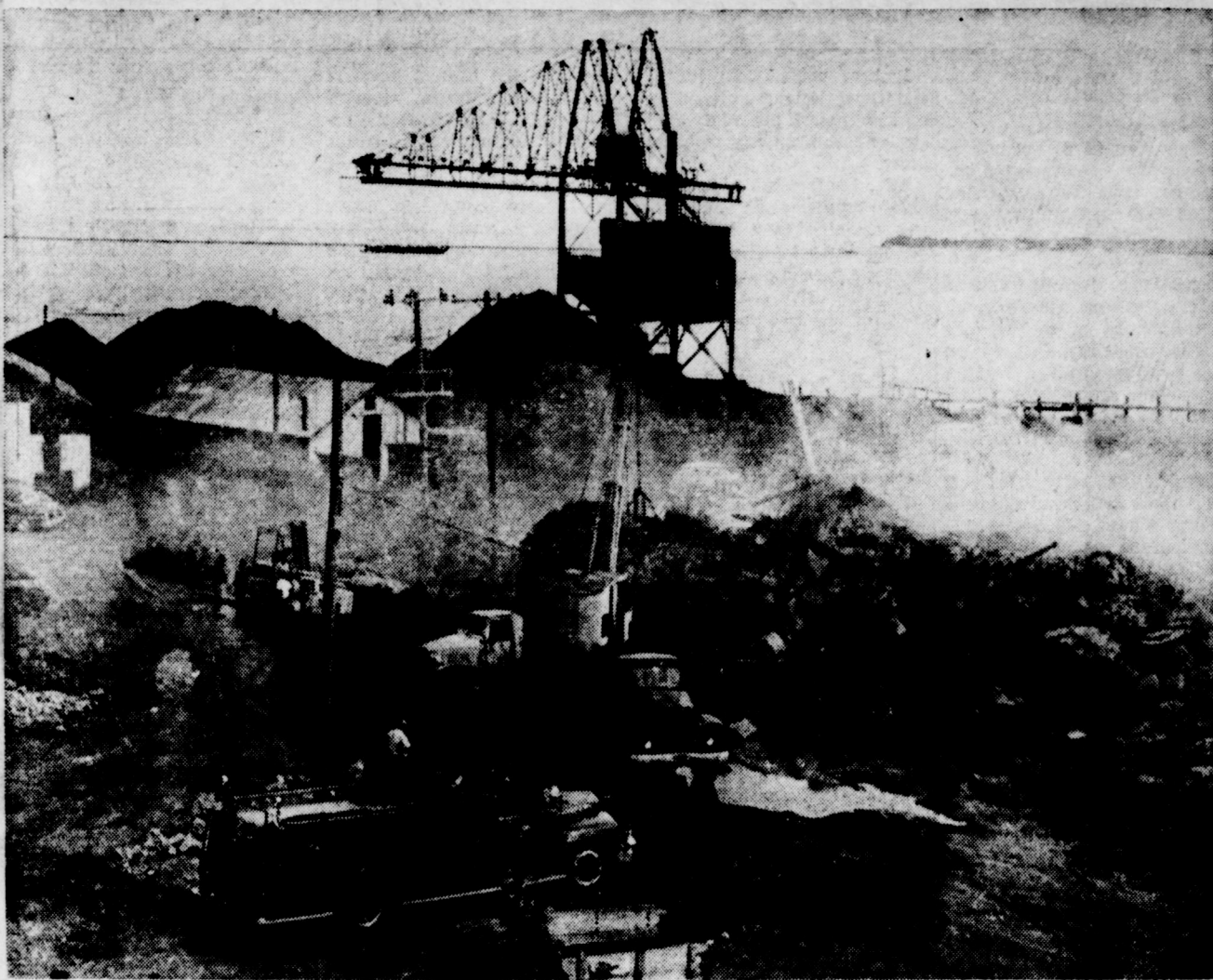




**RAGING FLAMES AND WRECKAGE**—Searing flames shoot high after the roof fell in at the storage shed on the Lime Company wharf early Tuesday morning. The left hand picture was taken about 2:30 a. m. and shows the aerial ladder's mounted nozzle pouring water into the seat of the flames at the north end

of the building. The light colored squares under the ladder, along the edge of the building, are cherry red sheets of metal siding. A few minutes before this picture was taken the entire metal roof was glowing red. In the center of the building can be seen the main door showing how the building was filled with



stacks of fishmeal sacks on pallets. The right hand picture was taken almost 12 hours later to the minute. It was taken from the old railroad right of way looking down on the wharf. In the foreground is a Rockland engine standing by while two hose lines were working over the remains out of the field at the

left. In the center foreground are a crane and a truck belonging to Maine Sea Products along with a fork lift truck. In the background towers the Lime Company steam crane from which Clifton Lewis saw flames coming out of the building. Moored at the dock was the Danish motor ship Hadsund which completed unloading and left the pier by the time the picture was taken.

## Loss \$50,000 In Spectacular Fire that Levelled Warehouse

### Firemen Two Hours Containing Raging Flames; Crew Working Round Clock Overhauling Site

Smouldering flames erupted into a raging fire, the worst since the Bicknell Block burned in 1958, and completely destroyed a warehouse owned by the Rockland-Rockport Lime Company early Tuesday morning. More than 1500 tons of fishmeal belonging to Maine Sea Products were stored in the warehouse in stacks at least nine feet high which blocked all entrances preventing firemen from reaching the source of the fire as it raged out of control. Firemen were still on the scene 36 hours after the alarm sounded at 1:55 a. m. Tuesday and crews working shift hours kept hoses playing on the smoldering stacks of fishmeal into Wednesday.

The loss of the building and products is more than \$50,000 as estimated by officials of the Lime Company and the Maine State Sea Products. The value of the warehouse was stated as \$10,000 and the fishmeal which goes to Portland for refining as \$40,000.

The fire department reports that it used six hose lines totaling more than 5300 feet in length. There were 21 men who fought the fire until 4 a. m. when the fire was reported as under control. Chief Knight estimates that more than 700,000 gallons of water will be used by the time the all out signal is given.

As far as it is known the last person to be in the warehouse was last Thursday. The building was scheduled to be taken over by the Lime Company as soon as the contents were disposed of

said President Ardrey Orff. The building and contents were insured said company officials.

The origin of the fire was undetermined but could possibly have been spontaneous combustion said Chief Knight.

Clifton Lewis, one of two operators of the giant Lime Company crane, spotted the flames from his lofty perch. He and Lawrence Wilder were running the steam crane to unload gypsum from the motor ship Hadsund about 300 yards from the warehouse.

A crew employed by George Hall was hauling the gypsum right past the corner of the building. (Continued on Page Two)

### Gray Sentenced To Six To 12 Year Term For Offense Against Six Year Old Child

Silas W. Gray, a 32-year-old Rockland man, pleaded guilty to a criminal information before Superior Court Justice Leonard Williams on charge of attempted rape and taking indecent liberties. In Knox County Superior Court, Tuesday, he drew concurrent terms of five to 10 years and six to 12 years in the Maine State Prison.

A six-year-old girl identified

Gray as the man who attacked her on Rockland Public Landing on June 17. He was arraigned in Rockland Municipal Court on June 21 and has been held in Knox County Jail since then awaiting the October term of Superior Court.

Gray will start serving the six to 12 year term on the charge of attempted rape, and the five to 10 year term on the charge of taking indecent liberties.

### SUGGESTION BRINGS \$25 TO PAIR AT COAST GUARD MOORING

Two Coastguardsmen were presented cash awards for suggestions submitted at the Coast Guard base Tuesday afternoon. Larry Smith, engineer second class, and Louis Parady, engineer third class, were both presented \$25 for suggesting a valve hook-up on a return line of a filter condenser. The apparatus is used in conjunction with the wa-

ter supply for the base.

Smith is married with two children and comes from Jonesport. Parady is married and hails from Kittery Point.

The awards were made under the Military Incentive program which rewards members of the Armed Services for suggestions which can be used to improve equipment.

### Family Of Five Burned Out At North Waldoboro

WALDOBORO—The story and a half house and connecting barn on Route 220 owned by Avery Sidelinger and occupied by the family of Avery Sidelinger, Jr., was totally destroyed by fire on Tuesday afternoon. The Sidelingers, who have three children, lost everything but the clothes on their backs as the flames quickly spread from the barn.

The Waldoboro fire department was alerted by the fire lookout station at Jefferson, but by the time they arrived at the house five miles from town, the structure was in flames. The Sidelingers managed to save a calf from the barn, but lost a few hens and two rabbits.

Damage was placed at about \$7,000 partially covered by insurance. The cause of the blaze is unknown but may have been from overheated hay, according to a Waldoboro fire official.

NORTH HAVEN—A new Community Building, the largest community improvement project on North Haven in many years, received its final formal finishing touch on Monday evening when a plaque was dedicated to the memory of Thomas W. Lamont, late summer resident who made the building possible.

Town officials honored the Lamont family in dedicating the plaque. Lamont set up a \$50,000 trust fund which was to go to the town for town improvement projects on his death. About \$35,000 of it was used for the Community Building.

Judge Adams also promised that he would send as many law enforcement agencies as needed to quell the uprisings on the island.

ing and reported noticing a peculiar odor as early as 9 p. m., some five hours before the first flames were spotted. The wind was blowing away from the unloading operation.  
Lewis blew repeated blasts on the crane steam whistle to attract attention of the trucking crew far below him. One of them caught on and notified the fire department. Box 411 was blown in at 1:55 a. m. Tuesday and had not blown out early Wednesday evening.  
When firemen arrived, the roof of the sheet metal covered building was cherry red over better than half its surface. A small bulldozer was used to rip off doors but firemen were confronted with high stacks of pallets of fishmeal and could not reach the seat of the fire with water.  
It wasn't until the roof started to fall in that water could be used effectively. Although size lines rined the building, it was the aerial ladder which was the most effective weapon. It poured tons of water from above directly down into the fire areas. Even it was hampered by sheet metal which had fallen in and formed a sort of roof over hot spots.  
Billows of choking smoke were carried over the harbor toward Marine Colloids giving firemen the benefit of a relatively clear air in which to work.

Embers poured into the sky and Chief Knight assigned two men to patrol the roof of the Feyer Fish Company with back tanks.  
After battling two hours, Chief Knight noted that he felt the fire was contained and he ordered the old crash truck, used chiefly for grass fires into action. It has four wheel drive and became an effective tool to literally peel off the east wall, or what was left of it, to expose the fire. A long chain was hooked to timbers and large sections were pulled down at a time.  
Later on, after daylight, the truck was put into play to completely tear down the remaining sheet metal. Then the long and arduous task of overhauling the remains began in earnest. Chief Knight said every pallet will have to be moved before every hot spot can be killed.  
During Tuesday Maine Sea Products turned its crew out to haul off all the sheet metal and begin to move the fishmeal. It will be carefully checked to see how much can be reprocessed.  
About 3 a. m. members of the Rockland Firemen's Auxiliary sleepily crawled out of bed to make preparations for coffee and doughnuts which were served to the crew at daylight at the fire scene. Also turning out was a Central Maine Power Company crew which cut lines near the building. No electrical service went into the building.  
Fire officials expressed pleasure with the hydrant pressure on the wharf. It was reported there was 100 pounds at the hydrant and a pump was hooked on only when Chief Knight ordered 150 pounds so the force of water from hoses could rip apart smoldering sacks. The new eight-inch main into the Northend was credited with an assist.  
Because of the hour, spectators were no problem. Many gathered on the old Limerock railroad right of way high above the fire scene for a ring side seat.  
The fire held up unloading of the freighter only a short time. Trucks used an alternate route to and from the wharf for a while, then when the fire was contained, hose lines from a hydrant at Camden and Main Streets were picked up and the trucks were able to use the main entrance.  
The building was 120 feet long and 50 feet wide with an addition on the water side 25 by 36 feet. At one time the building was used for coopers storage—that was when lime was shipped in barrels. It contained some machinery for grinding agricultural lime which had not been used for some time. Orff did not estimate the value on the machinery but said it was insured. Maine Sea Products was to vacate the building so the Lime Company could use it for bulk storage of agricultural lime. Orff said the building's replacement value was about \$25,000 but its real value was less.

# Officials In Middle On Preservation Of Nature Versus State Aid Roads

**NORTH HAVEN** — A petition urging North Haven selectmen to carry out "maintenance rather than destructive construction" of roads has placed officials of the island squarely in the middle of a perennial conflict in a resort town between summer residents who would like to maintain the status quo and year 'round residents who seek progress.  
First Selectman Lewis Haskell said Tuesday that the problem is nothing new to the board; however, the petition brought it into the public eye on the island.  
The petition asserted that because the future of North Haven is concerned with those things that contribute to the pleasure of good living and that much of this pleasure is derived from the maintenance of roads, it is important above all else to consider such things as marginal roadside growth with the preservation of flowering plants, maintenance of open fields, and maintenance of the rural character of the island.  
The petition asserted that its points were facts of primary importance to the community and the signers were convinced that further widening or straightening of roads is uneconomic, destructive of those values which make North Haven a unique community, and may prove to be detrimental to its prosperity.  
The State Aid improvement project which aroused the ire of the signers was a project at Banks Swamp where the road was raised above the level of flood tide backwater and widened from 16 feet to 25 feet. In the process, a beautiful stand of birches which virtually enclosed the road had to be cut.  
First Selectman Haskell asserted that in two, or maybe three seasons, the natural undergrowth will cover the bare shoulder on the project. "By that time these folks probably will find another project that offends their aesthetic sense."  
The view shared by the petitioners is by no means unanimous. In almost the same mail which contained a copy of the petition, The Courier received a letter from a resident who pleaded for continuance of the State Aid road program on North Haven. "With all of our road improvements from year to year, most of us are delighted as to what has been accomplished in our town", the letter stated. "We are living in 1960 and most of us want good roads and progress, so let the work continue as it has been down through the years", the letter concludes.

## HIGHWAYS AND AIRWAYS ONLY NOW

Passenger train service came to an end in Maine Tuesday as the Maine Central Railroad ran its last trains over the main line between Bangor and Portland. Likewise, the Grand Trunk Railroad halted year around service from Portland through New Hampshire to the Province of Quebec. The move caused hardly a ripple in the state. All of the branch lines, including the Rockland Branch, had long since been discontinued. People had taken to cars, buses and planes years before and used the trains only in bad weather or when other circumstances forced them to do so. This time, not even the railroad buffs showed up to ride the last train. The last train incidents have become so frequent that not even those who would shed a tear over the passing of the passenger had a tear left to shed. Let us hope now that the fast mail, milk, express and expedited freight trains the Maine Central inaugurated Tuesday do the job for which they were planned. It will be interesting to read the financial reports of the Maine Central, now that the burden of passenger service, where they claimed heavy losses, has been lifted.

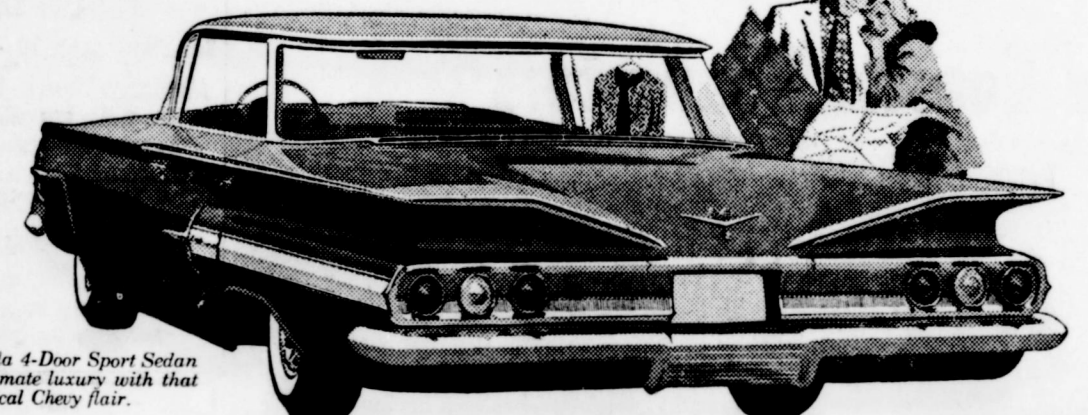

## Rockland Denies It Owes Dodge Any Money, Files Counter Suit For \$1,470

The City of Rockland has de-up his lease of the airport to nited that it owes John E. (Jack) Dodge, Jr., any part of the \$157,000 the latter seeks in his suit brought against the city in August for alleged damage to his reputation, business, and profession, as well as mental torment and injury. The city, through City Attorney Stuart C. Burgess, Tuesday filed a counter suit against Dodge claiming that he owes the city the sum of \$1,470.

The dispute grows out of alleged abuses of Dodge by the city during the time he was manager of the Rockland Municipal Airport in Owls Head. Dodge alleged that he had given

assume the permanent position of airport manager, and that he was later dismissed as manager without just cause.

The city's counter claim, which former City Attorney Jerome C. Burrows assisted Burgess in filing, alleges that Dodge in fact owes the city for rent of \$35 monthly for 42 months; it also seeks to have Dodge pay court and defense costs of the suit.

The case is expected to go to trial before the October session of Superior Court. Robert Stenger now holds the lease of the airport, which he is operating.

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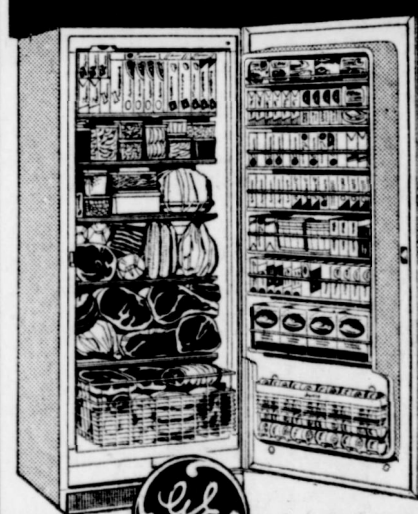

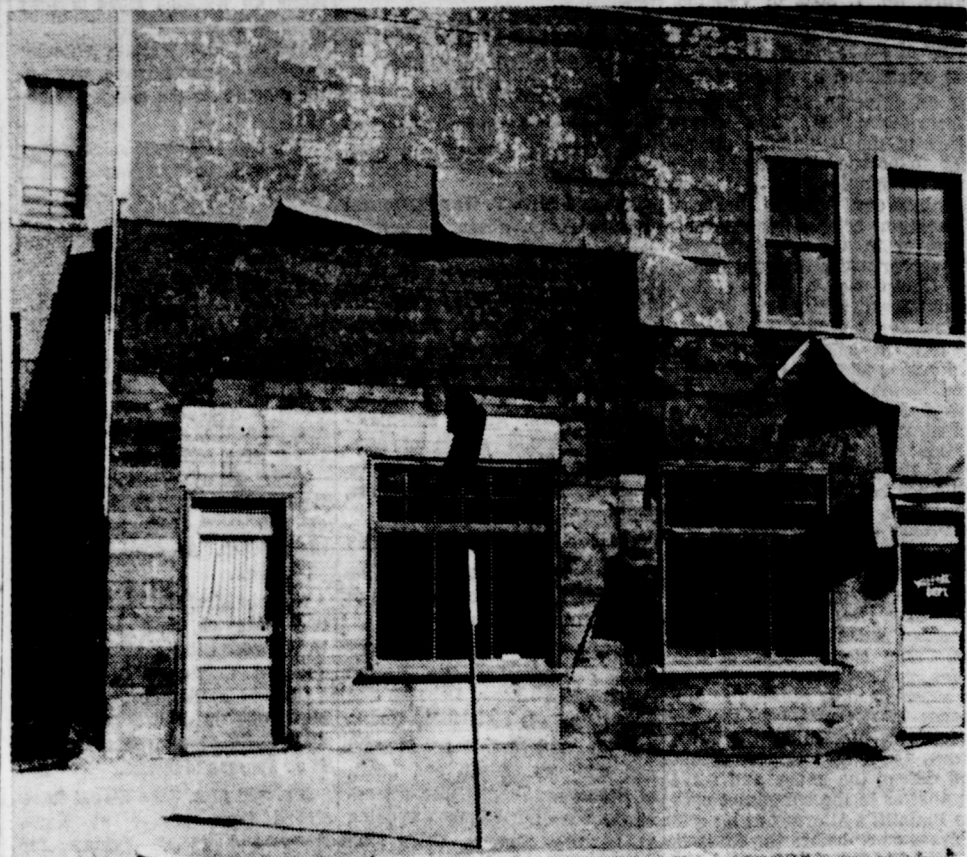
