Tigers Favored Over Madison As Grid Season Opens Here This Afternoon

The Rockland Tigers football squad tapered off with a light workout Friday in preparation for the opener with Madison scheduled for 1:30 Saturday afternoon at South Field. Offensive and defensive assignments were reviewed as the Tigers completed a week of hard work, some of it in nearly 90 degree heat.

Gates at South Field will be open at 1 o'clock and plenty of parking is available, both on the long parking strip along Thomaston Street and beside South School which is handy to the field. The High School PTA will again operate the concession stand where plenty of coffee, cold drinks, and hot dogs will be available and with good weather in prospect, according to the weatherman, a goodly crowd should turn out to inspect the 1960 edition of the Tigers who are picked here to win the opener by two touchdowns.

Rockland is expected to field a line averaging around 175 pounds and a backfield averaging slight-

ly over 155, depending on who starts. One doubtful starter is Charley Finley, one of the captains, who injured his right knee in an early week session and has it tightly bandaged. He will probably see only limited service Saturday. His place is expected to be taken by Bernie Jackson, a sophomore better known for his kicking ability but who has desire and is game to play.

Once again the capable Bobby Walker will be directing the attack out of the single wing used by Rockland. The other halfback post is expected to be occupied by Francis Terrio and Wesley Nichols probably will get the call at fullback. The other two tri-captains will see service in the line, Sandy Delano at one of the guard slots, while Billy Barbour will be at end. Other probable starters, or those who will certainly see plenty of service are Bob Anderson, Parker Glover, Bob Fowler, Clark Earl, Sandy Ames, Charlie Wade, Don Carter and Billy Karl.

Donovan Plugs Aid Program For Fishermen

BRISTOL — Democratic Congressional Candidate John C. Donovan has proposed a three-point Federal-State co-operative program for assistance to Maine fishermen. In a speech to a Democratic meeting in Bristol, Donovan said:

"Our Maine lobstermen and fishermen need Federal and State assistance in seeking solutions to our difficult economic problems. On the basis of my experience in Washington during the 86th Congress, I would propose the following approaches:

"The establishment of marketing co-operatives.

"The establishment of an extension program for fishermen similar to the one used so successfully in the field of agriculture. If elected to the Congress, I will reintroduce the bill originally sponsored by Congressman Frank M. Coffin which would provide such an extension program.

"The provision of federal funds for basic research which would supplement the efforts of the Maine Department of Sea and Shore Fisheries.

"The Maine department has extremely able research personnel but they are handicapped by the limited funds available from State government. Congressman Coffin's amendment to the Kennedy-Saltwater Fisheries Act would provide research funds and is therefore deserving of the full support of the entire Maine Congressional delegation."

All winners will be recognized at appropriate ceremonies.

Tree Hit By Lightning Blamed For Small Woods Fire Monday At Pleasant Point, Cushing

PLEASANT POINT — Prompt action by the Cushing and Thomaston firemen averted what might have been a serious forest fire in the Pleasant Point section of Cushing Monday and Tuesday. It is believed a tree, struck by lightning last Thursday smoldered for more than four days before bursting into flames.

Fire was discovered Monday in the North Ridge section of the Point Monday and Cushing's fire department and that of Thomaston cooperated to promptly knock it down. However, dry conditions left some of it burning below ground and Cushing left a watch

over it all Monday night.

On Tuesday Cushing Fire Chief Ken Wilson and a crew with a bulldozer took in a tank truck to the isolated area and thoroughly doused it. Wilson said Wednesday that it was thoroughly out.

Although residents had noticed the smoke Monday it took Arthur Ross, 16, and David Ames, 19, to go into the woods to investigate. They were unable to put out the fire themselves so went out for help. Three other young men, Richard Ross, Randy Robbins and a summer resident, spent Monday night at the fire scene guarding against a flareup.

ROCKPORT GIRL SCOUTS FACED WITH SERIOUS PROBLEM OF LACK OF SUFFICIENT LEADERS

ROCKPORT — The Girl Scout Troop Committee and leaders in Rockport, who will meet Monday evening at the home of Mrs. Dorothy Bradford, Pascal Avenue, at 8 p. m., have a serious problem to discuss at the meeting. There are 51 girls enrolled this year, and as each troop can consist of only eight girls, a great many more leaders are needed to carry out the program for the

year. It is hoped that volunteers will attend this meeting and offer their services so that the girls may have the opportunity to participate in the many and varied programs that Girl Scouting has to offer. Without sufficient leaders, this would be an impossibility, and many girls in Rockport will be disappointed.

Small Increase In School Enrollments Brings Total In District Five To 2498

Bruce Kinney, Superintendent of School District 5, reports an increase of 28 pupils in the district as a whole over last year for a total of 2,498. The chief increase comes in Rockland High School which has 32 more pupils than a year ago. On the other hand, the elementary schools of the city have seven less than a year ago.

Other decreases find sub-primary enrollment 22 less than a year ago when the biggest starting group in the history of the city enrolled. South Thomaston schools reported a decrease of 24 over a year ago, while Owls Head, third member of the school district, has an increase of 27 over last year.

Superintendent Kinney states

that Rockland has the largest Senior Class since he has been here, numbering 161. This compares with the 127 who started the year as seniors last fall.

The overall total for the District is 2,498. Of this total 212 are in sub-primary; 1,832 in the elementary grades; and 667 in Rockland High School. The high school has come within three of doubling its enrollment over that of 1953 when Superintendent Kinney came here.

This year's enrollment figures in the other schools find South School, 455; North School, 419; McLain School, 236; Purchase Street, 169; Tyler, 192; Owls Head, 235; and South Thomaston, 125.

Precautions Against Storms Make Sense

The season for hurricanes is at hand.

Adequate warning of their approach is usually given so that precautions can be taken to prevent injuries and damage, the National Board of Fire Underwriters said today.

The Board said measures which minimize hurricane damage are equally valuable in other windstorms of lesser but none-the-less destructive magnitude. It issued the following precautions as safeguards to life and property in areas where storms threaten:

Before A Storm

Tune to radio and television broadcasts of latest Weather Bureau information. In case of

power failure, a battery-powered radio will come in handy.

Go inland. Get away from beaches and the low waterfront which may be swept by storm waves. Hurricanes bring abnormally high tides, high waves.

If your passage to safety is over a road likely to be under water, leave early. Otherwise you may be trapped by high winds and rising waters preceding the arrival of the storm center by several hours. Travel at the height of the storm is exceedingly dangerous.

If your house is out of danger of waves and is substantially built—anchored to strong foundations and with its roof securely fastened—it's possibly the best place for you to stay.

Put loose material and movable objects such as garbage cans and porch furniture where they cannot be blown against the building or through a window.

ROCKLAND LODGE OF MASONS PUBLISHES HISTORY OF LODGE COVERING SPAN OF 105 YEARS

The Rockland Lodge of Masons has just issued a history of the Lodge from the day of its first being approved for charter on Oct. 31, 1854 to the current year. The 174 page book was printed in the commercial printing plant of The Courier-Gazette.

James E. Stevens, acting secretary of the Lodge for many years, authored the book, a task which took five years and endless research in Lodge records.

Proceedings of the Lodge are covered in detail within the pages, but are presented as a day to day story which is most interesting and is not without

moments of humor. Every Mason who was raised in the Lodge, or affiliated with it, in the 105 years since being chartered is listed. Also, all the masters of the Lodge from the first who was Ephraim Hall who was appointed by the grand master Oct. 25, 1854 to the one hundred seventh master, John A. Low, who took office Jan. 12, 1960.

In ceremonies held during the first stated communication of the Lodge following summer recess Tuesday evening Master John Low presented a cloth bound, gold embossed copy of the history to Mr. Stevens in appreciation of his work.

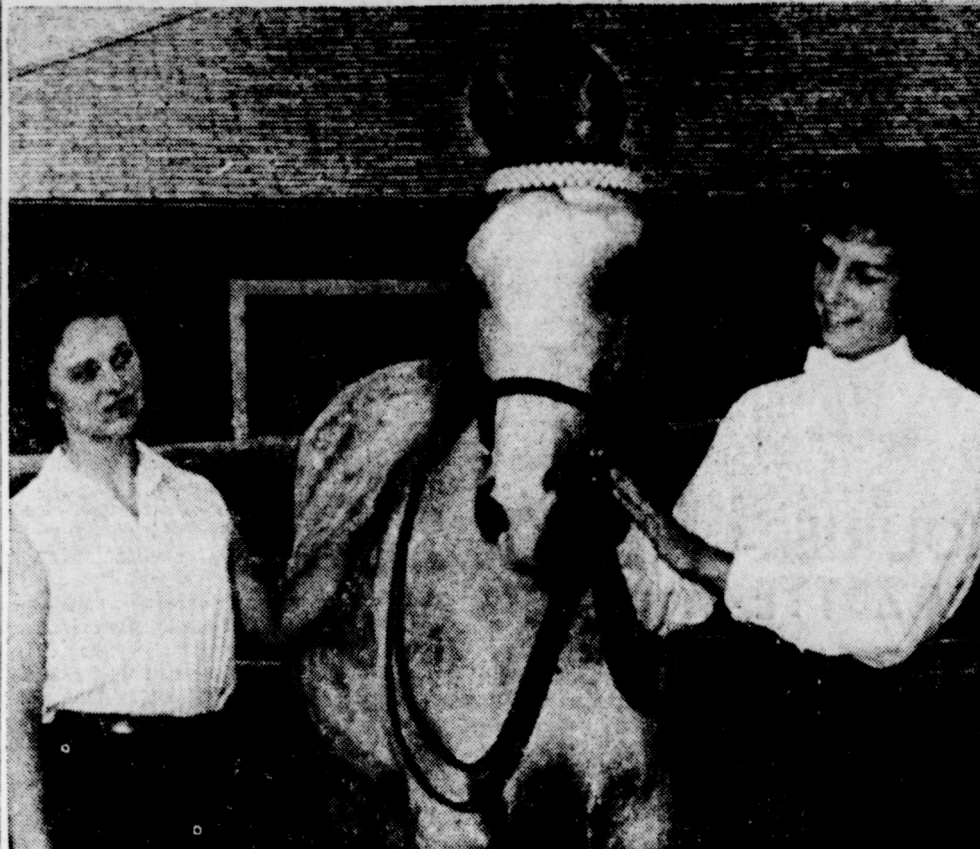

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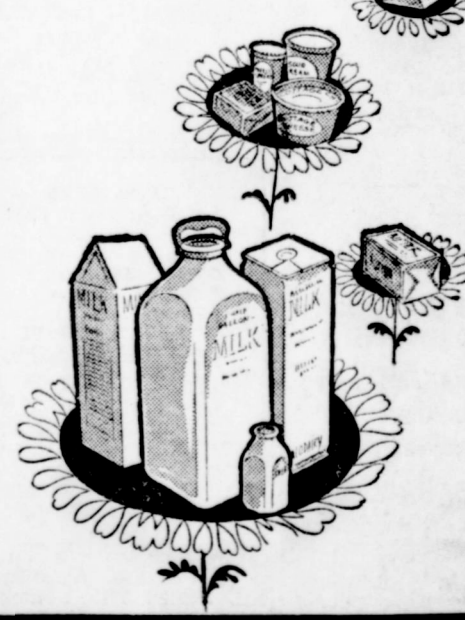
