or low-key, high-fun traditional summer outings, the first weekend in August offers all the right elements great weather possibilities for deck, dock and park lounging mixed in with unique, local events or, if the weather doesn't cooperate, great possibilities for museum, library and shop visiting mixed in with unique, local events.

Topping the list of unique, local events are the Belgrade Lakes back-to-back Bean Hole Bean Supper put on by the Belgrade Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department and the Loon Calling Contest sponsored by Castle Island Camps.

Bean Hole Beans statewide date back to days of log driving while in Belgrade the culinary custom of the annual public bean hole bean supper dates to the 1960s.

In the cold, wet world of logging, baked beans heavy with molasses, brown sugar or maple syrup and salt pork were a rich staple of the camp diet, made possible because the cooking crews traveled down river a day ahead of the drivers, uncovered holes that had been dug over the years, banked them with red hot coals, and buried the beans overnight in cast iron pots to bake for the next 24 hours.

A similar ritual takes place in Belgrade Lakes, only it's once a year, there is no traveling by the cooks - the fire pits remain in the

same location and there are almost two dozen cast iron pots. The supper guests of nearly 500 are not lumberjacks but they do eat heartily the three types of "secret recipe" beans, hot dogs, cole slaw, breads, beverages and homemade pie




from a seemingly unending choice that stretches across several 8-foot tables. And all that from 5-7 pm.

Following the supper, Belgrade's very popular Loon Calling Contest, sponsored by Castle Island Camps, will take place at The Landing on the Rome side of the Belgrade Stream. There, callers can sign up starting at 6:30 pm for the three categories of competitors: adult, children under age ten, and ages 10-15. At 7 pm the contest begins. In each age category first, second and third place prizes will be awarded, as well as ribbons for all who enter.

Everyone is welcome to enter the Loon Calling Contest, or to watch and applaud this unique 30-years-old tradition.

Beans, loons – that's not all. Check the Calendar of Events for the wealth of activities surrounding the first weekend in August.

The North Pond Association is actively pursuing its mission to educate and promote stewardship efforts to benefit the natural environment of North Pond. Meetings are held intermittently throughout





Conservation –

Thile many of us are enjoying the late arriving summer, a dedicated STOP MILFOIL team is working hard to push back the infestation of invasive milfoil in the Great Meadow Stream and North Bay of Great Pond.

The good news is that they are making steady progress. The reality is that there is still a lot of work to do. Here's an update on the progress that's been made so far this year.

Milfoil Removal – As of July 18th a total of 5,800 gallons of invasive milfoil plants have been removed from Great Meadow Stream and North Bay. This compares to 14,655 gallons last year and 24,000 gallons in 2012, at this same point in the work season.

The lower numbers are not a result of less effort. The same number of hours has been spent pulling the plant all three years.

The reduction in the milfoil gallons means that as a result of the aggressive action taken in 2012 and 2013, the milfoil infestation is much smaller. There are simply many fewer plants to be removed.

Shrinking the milfoil infestation is the key to controlling it and stopping it from spreading in the future. But the battle is not over. We have to keep at it every year or all the headway that's been made will be quickly lost.

DASH Boat – This year the STOP MILFOIL team purchased and equipped it's own Diver Assisted Suction Harvester (DASH) boat. This specialized piece of equipment will greatly improve their productivity removing the milfoil plants. It will help reduce the amount of time and cost needed to control the milfoil in the future.

Lakes Survey -- A STOP MILFOIL team is survey-

ing both Great Pond and Long Pond again this summer for new outbreaks of invasive milfoil. The good news is that so far no new outbreaks have been found.

Adopt-A-Shoreline – Several training sessions are scheduled for Adopt-A-Shoreline participants. If you are interested in learning how to identify invasive milfoil and patrolling your shoreline for new outbreaks, please contact Toni Pied, Belgrade Regional Conservation Alliance Milfoil Director, at 207 215-2685 to sign up. Your help is greatly appreciated and could make a big difference in our fight to control this threat to our lakes and community.

Fund Raising -- The STOP MILFOIL Capital Campaign was awarded a \$100,000 matching grant in 2014. That means we must raise \$100,000 in donations in order to earn the full \$100,000 matching grant.

As of July 18th, the campaign has received a total

of \$68,780 in donations, including \$20,000 from the town of Belgrade and \$10,000 from the town of Rome. We have \$31,220 to go to receive the full matching grant. You can help.







My dear mother was left with only two kids, but I know and share these same feeling for my Dear Mom that he did for his.

—The Luckiest Boy—

My friends and I were just nine years old in 1956 when The Belgrade burned. It was an incredible inferno that took the old hotel, situated on a knoll up behind the Sunset Grill, right where The Village Peddler gift shop and home of proprietor Mary Ann Gee is now.

Before it was over, everyone in Belgrade Lakes and many who came from surrounding towns stood speechless as the behemoth landmark was gobbled up by fire and reduced to rubble. Fire trucks and volunteers came from miles away and the Waterville Sentinel reporter claimed that 21 trucks in total had arrived, though many were too late to put out any hose. Fire was not an uncommon fate for the old wooden giants that once dotted the landscape of the USA. Precious few have escaped the errant cigar spark or the knob and tube wiring short circuit, notwithstanding possible arson in some cases.

The Belgrade Hotel opened for business in 1900, originally built as a fishing camp by Waterville native Charles Hill. The original building was quickly expanded and by 1908 a scenic nine hole golf course had been added. Brochures claimed 75 rooms capable of handling up to 200 people, and additional cottages on the 250 acre property for large families or honeymooners. Several of the cottages are still in existence and are used as homes or camps today. A large and luxurious dining area was touted on the east end of the building where the turret can be seen in photos, with panoramic views of Long Pond and the hills beyond.

In addition to the hotel and cottages, a large annex was available for overflow, which sat where George Hoy lives now, pretty much across from the Union church. Other buildings included boys' and girls' dorms to house the large number of seasonal employees needed to operate the hotel. Another service building on the West Road was nicknamed "the chain gang shop" where all the mowers and other golf course maintenance equipment was kept. The grounds crew met there each morning and were given their marching orders by Judge Pray, head honcho of all grounds and flower gardens. Judge ran a tight ship with his mostly teenage crew and often "sentenced" them to extra weedpulling stints in the gardens as punishment for goofing off. My brother was one of the grounds keepers and I would hear stories about who had weed duty from time to time. A cut-down 193? Ford named BLACKHAWK was used to pull the

fairway gang mowers and was always driven by Frank DiPetro, Larry's father. All trimming was done by hand with scythes and sickles, and the greens were done with special reel mowers. The available seasonal jobs required to staff the hotel with all its ancillary needs was considerable, and many if not most of the people in the area had jobs related to the hotel. My father told of driving Model T Ford trucks to the Belgrade train depot and hauling hotel guests' steamer trunks back to the hotel during the 1930s. Many people came and stayed for the whole summer season, especially during the early part of the century.

In 1941, the Hill family could no longer operate the hotel, and it was sold at auction to the Acheson Hotel Group for \$25,000. Acheson, owners of 3 other Maine hotels, continued operation for the next fifteen years until the fire occurred. The hotel's demise marked the end of an era, and most agree that the landscape had been changing since the end of WW II. The demand for big hotel living was waning and the desire to purchase shore land property and build individually owned cottages was here. As more camp roads were built to access shore land never before accessible by car, cottages began to pop up here and there. Over the next 50 years the greater Belgrade area became what it is today.

Several kids in town who were not generally in the summer work force in 1956, did have an opportunity to caddy just once the before the big fire. The hotel was hosting some sort of well-attended golf tournament and the older boys were picked first to carry bags. We 9 year olds hung out under the pine trees playing mumblety peg until finally getting a signal from the golf pro. We had to walk with a tipped- up shoulder to keep from dragging the bags. There were no carts, either power or hand type.

While the era of the grand hotel is over, golf continues to be enjoyed on the relatively new Belgrade Lakes course. Who would have thought this little village would ever have a second chance at golf. Thank you Harold and Bibby Alfond. The view to the northwest from the putting green atop the current day course on Smith Hill looks precisely over the area where the big hotel and surrounding course sat. How appropriate— and as the crow flies, not a mile between the new and the old. THE END (for now)

to my assigned territory and got there about 20 minutes early. I just happened to have a fishing rod with me and to kill a little time before the official count began, I decided to troll my way into the cove. I let out enough line to get a trolling spoon down to a depth of about 25 feet and headed over a 28 ft shoal surrounded by about 45 ft of water. Within minutes the rod bent over and the drag started streaming out. Thinking I'd snagged the bottom I grabbed the rod and started backing down. I instantly realized that I had a big fish on. It took about 20 minutes to get the large northern pike alongside the boat. Once I saw the fish, I realized it was very lightly hooked in the lower lip which gave me very little leverage. In fact, when I got it alongside the boat, the hook actually pulled out.





Wooden Boat – Local Boat: EM & ME

wned by Russ, Carol and Emily Sabia of Belmont, Massachusetts, this pretty little classic hails from the lower basin of Long Pond where the Sabias enjoy their summers. Carol Rosa Sabia grew up waterskiing on Long Pond and one might say that Em & Me's journey to the region originated from those fond memories. In fact, Em & Me's call name is a reference to Carol and daughter Emily. When the Sabias decided to purchase a ski boat, they readily agreed on the classic lines of an antique lapstrake. Russ found the Lyman in Rhode Island, where she was in salt water and owned by an elderly couple who could no longer keep up with her maintenance. The couple wanted her to go to someone who would appreciate a wooden boat and bring her back to her original allure. The Sabias could see her potential, and decided to bring her home to Long Pond.

Em & Me was built by Lyman Boat Works of Sandusky, Ohio, which manufactured wooden boats until the early 1970s. The company was founded by Bernard Lyman, who was a cabinet maker by trade and began building boats in Cleveland in the 1880s. Bernard's son, Bill Lyman, joined his father in the business in 1920 and is credited with Lyman Boat's increased popularity through the 1930s with their "Clinker Built" lapstrake hull construction. This method

of construction utilizes a technique by which the strakes, or planks, are slightly overlapped and secured with both clinch nails and bronze screws. (Source: Lyman Boat Owners Association). This lapstrake design gives the hull increased flexibility and what many believe to be a superior ride.

Staying true to her previous owner's wishes, the Sabias have had Em & Me totally refastened with more than 1,100 silicon bronze screws. Nine of her frames were replaced with steam-bent white oak. She has received new varnish in Interlux Schooner Gold, her hull paint has been

redone with Interlux Brightside White, her bottom painted in Petite Copper Bronze including the final touch, a complimentary red waterline. The Sabias chose to power her with an Evinrude E-TEC 75 HP based on its modern performance, low emissions, and lighter weight compared to four-stroke options.

The Belgrade Lakes region is prolific with classic and distinctive boats that intrigue both local and visiting boat enthusiasts. A prime example is EM & ME.


