## Knox County Clubs Lead Way In Annual 4-H Achievement Day Awards Saturday

**WALDOBORO** — The Warren Wonder Workers 4-H Club and the Silver Thimble 4-H Club of Rockland took away club honors at the annual Knox-Lincoln 4-H Achievement Day, Saturday, at Waldoboro High School. Donald Hamalainen of West Rockport and Susan Clark of Thomaston won individual honors as outstanding 4-H club members as Knox County took the lions share of awards.

The Courier-Gazette plaque for the number one Blue Ribbon club went to the Warren Wonder Workers who achieved its outstanding record under the leadership of Mrs. Irene Staretz. The plaque was accepted by the new leader, Miss Dianne Lunden, and the new president, Miss Laura Lundstrom. It was the 37th year The Courier-Gazette plaque has been awarded.

Second club honors went to the Silver Thimble Club of Rockland. That club received the Gregory's clothing store plaque which was accepted by Assistant Leader Mrs. Rose Marie Dean.

Susan Clark, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Aaron Clark of Thomaston, is winner of the WRKD award for outstanding 4-H girl in Knox-Lincoln County for the past 4-H year.

## Northport Lad Is In Good Condition After Being Shot At Lincolnville Beach

**LINCOLNVILLE** — The condition of 13 year old Kenneth Ryan of Northport, victim of Sunday's accidental shooting at Lincolnville Beach was reported Monday to be "good" at Eastern Maine General Hospital in Bangor where he was taken Sunday after treatment at the Camden Community Hospital. His name was not on the danger list and officials said he had improved overnight.

The youth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond B. Ryan, Sr., of Northport, was shot accidentally by six year old Dana Hemenway, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Hemenway, Jr., of Lincolnville. The younger boy picked up the

revolver, which he thought was a toy, from the floor of a car in which the two boys were playing at Lincolnville Beach while the elder Hemenways were inspecting shorefront property nearby. The bullet struck young Ryan in the center of the chin.

He was rushed to Camden Community Hospital for preliminary treatment and later taken to Bangor. Members of the Hemenway family said that the revolver had been used for target practice earlier and it was believed to be unloaded. They said that the Hemenways were away from the car for a period of only five minutes during which the mishap occurred.

## New Business To Open Soon On Park Street

A new business will open its doors soon on Park Street in Rockland. Robert Crowe of Rockland has announced he will open a wholesale and retail outlet for commercial fishing supplies in the shop formerly used for antique storage by David Rubenstein.

The business will wholesale and retail four weather gear, heading twine, Nautilus sardine twine and nets and trawls. Other items will be added to stock according to demand, Crowe said.

Ames, 50, of Thomaston told State Police that she was driving about 15 miles per hour when Sharon Benner, 7, who is staying with her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Elliot of Owls Head, ran out in front of her.

The injured girl was rushed to the Knox County General Hospital by ambulance where officials said she suffered a fractured left leg. Her condition was reported as satisfactory, Monday afternoon.

## HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS TO AID PLANNERS WITH HOUSE TO HOUSE SURVEY OF ROCKLAND

Rockland High School students will be ringing doorbells this week conducting a house to house survey for the Knox County Regional Planning Commission and as part of the Problems of Democracy course at the high school. The survey will seek to obtain information on population, shopping characteristics,

economic data, and news media preference.

Teams of students from the Problems of Democracy classes will go up one street and down another. A full week was spent outlining the mechanics of the survey. The calls will be made outside of school hours.

Data from each interview will be recorded on a sheet on which there will be no identification. It will be a purely statistical survey.

Directing the students are Lincoln Johnson and Ronald Banks of the Rockland High faculty. On the student committee are Alfred Anderson, William Brown, Lawrence Sellers, Gloria O'Sullivan, Patricia Powell and Judith Athearn.

The information will be compiled for use by the planning commission in its studies of the area and in talking with industrial prospects. It is hoped such information may be obtained in each community in the county.

## Use of Vacation Pay Expected To Help Employees

**THOMASTON** — Quarry, raw mill and kilns operations of the Dragon Cement Company in Thomaston will be shut down for lack of orders on Friday but the economic blow to the area is expected to be eased by many of the employees drawing vacation pay during a part or all of the shut down, plant superintendent James McCamant revealed Monday. The shut down is expected to last at least a month but will be governed entirely by the number of orders which come in.

A general slump in New England construction is blamed for the lack of orders.

For the first two weeks of the shut down, about 40 workers will be affected but McCamant explained many of them have vacation pay coming. The firm gave workers notice of the shut down two and a half months ago so they could plan to draw vacation pay. McCamant also explained the firm has a number of employees who are entitled to three or four weeks vacation.

The packing and shipping operations will be carried on as normally and the kiln firing mill will operate as needed to fill orders.

For the first two weeks of the shut down, a maintenance crew will be busy on several projects. How many will be laid off at the end of the first week will be determined by progress on maintenance work. Many in this section also have vacation time coming to them. By the end of the second week of shut down, it is expected that the maintenance program will be completed, McCamant said.

The firm has about 200 operating employees. Just how many will be affected will not be determined for at least two weeks after the partial shut down begins.

## Ten-Pound Bass Snagged Out of Georges River

**THOMASTON** — Ray Desy of West Street, Rockport, has the biggest striped bass catch of the year in the local area. Desy landed a 10-pounder near the Georges River narrows, last week. Using a spinning rod with a 10-pound test monofilament line, Desy snagged the lunker with a bass jig.

Stripers are still running heavily in the Georges and at the Keag. Desy caught seven fish Sunday night.

Harvey Small of Rockland also is a lucky stripster fisherman. He landed a four pounder recently.

Reports have it that the stripers are increasing in size. The run is long but up to this point has yielded few fish over five pounds.

## Rare Cattle Egret Seen At Dutch Neck Farm Is First In Lincoln County

**DUTCH NECK** — The cattle egret can now be reported as being in Lincoln County. Osborn Finch of Dutch Neck observed one of these rare birds feeding with a neighbor's cow one day recently. A member of the Maine Audubon Camp says, "Only two other birds have been reported in the State of Maine to date."

For those who may be unfamiliar with the cattle egret, it is a small white heron-like

bird with light tan on its head, breast and tail, and it feeds with cows, eating the insects they disturb while grazing.

A native of Africa, it first appeared in Venezuela around 1948. Since then it has worked its way north through Florida, where it is now common, to Cape May County, N. J., where it is known to nest.

In recent years a number have been seen in Massachusetts and now we have it here in Maine.

He was a member of the National Council of Episcopal Churches.

Surviving besides his daughter, Mrs. Porcher, resident of New Haven, Conn., are another daughter, Mrs. H. R. Edwards, also of New Haven; two grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Rockland quickly broke the tie which resulted when Hayden rushed the conversion point. First Wes Nichols, who Saturday showed fine running form, then Charlie Finley twice ate up yardage to the Bapst 3 from where Nichols bulled over on a quick opener. The point after was missed and intermission found Rockland leading by 13-7. The two teams battled on fairly even terms throughout the third quarter but the constant pressure of an inspired Tiger team told in the final period when they scored twice and kept the

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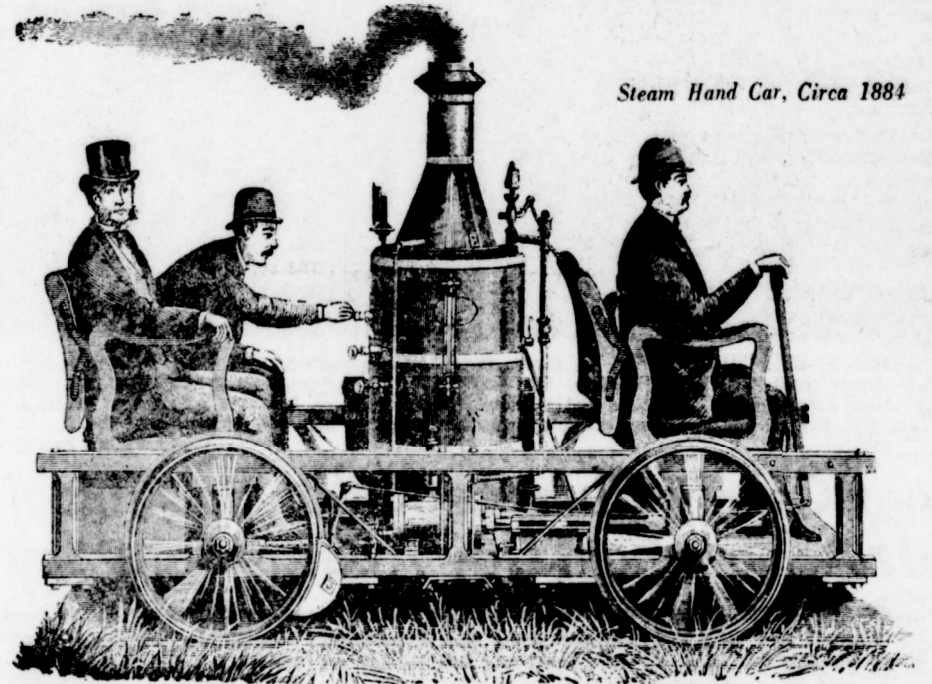

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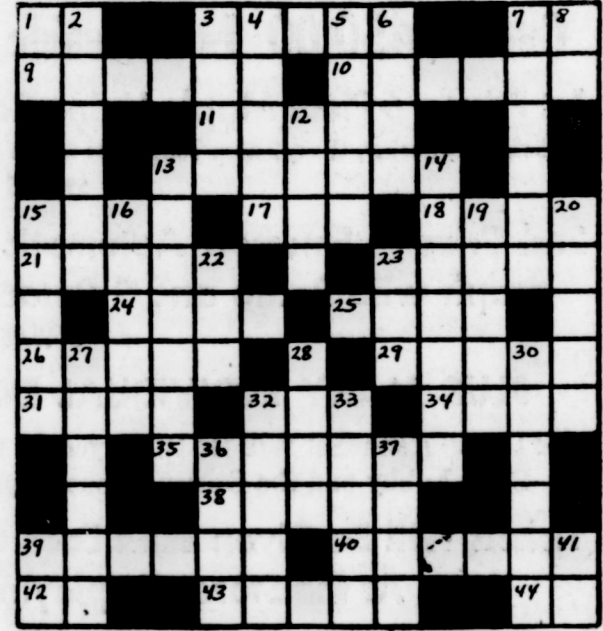

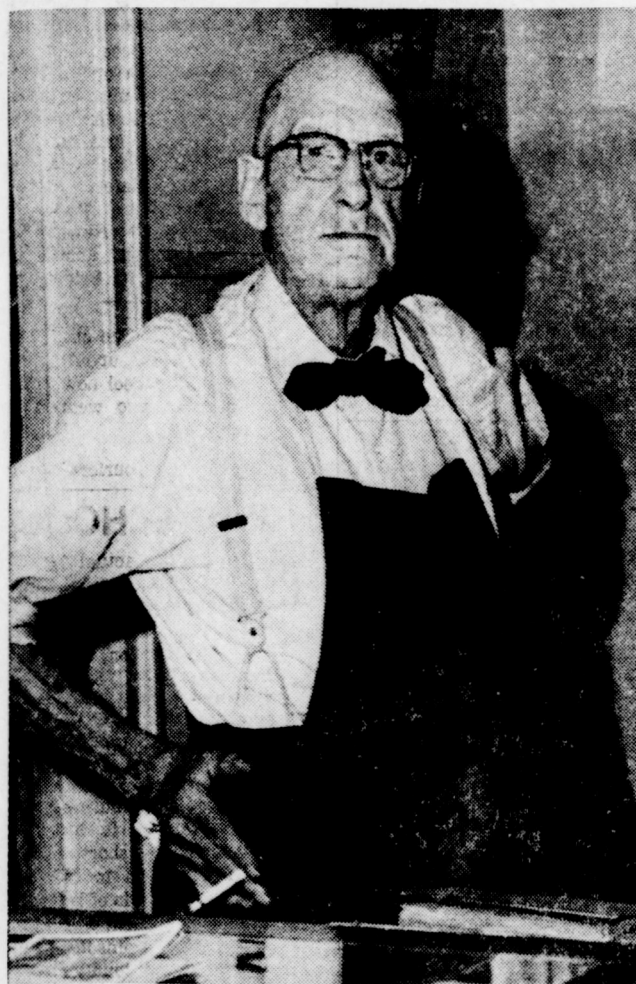

CAMDEN—Herbert J. Potter, 88, will retire on Oct. 15 after 62 years in his photography shop in Camden. During that time he has seen photographs develop from glass plates and printing papers that could only be developed in the sunshine to the present split second methods with prints being developed in a minute in some cases.

The present shop, at 12 Chestnut Street, has been occupied by Potter for the past 37 years. However, he started business in the building near the Village Green which now houses the D. A. Heald Company, and later moved to the location now occupied by The Smiling Cow Gift Shop. He is a widower whose wife died 11 years ago and the two did not have children.

When Potter became interested in photography through possession of a \$1 box camera in the 90's persons sitting for a photo had their heads resting in a fork arrangement to keep

them still as the cameras of the era were not able to catch movement. Things were not quite so urgent then and this was just as well because Potter recalls a stretch of nine days when he was prevented from developing any film because the sun did not shine. In the old days, he did a lot of photos for framing and did a great deal of portrait work but for many years has confined himself to developing film.

He is one of the oldest Kodak dealers in the country. He says that a drug store in Orono is the oldest. He himself has been dealing with them since 1901 and has always been happy with the association. At the turn of the century the most expensive camera cost only \$3 and it was possible to buy a good one for one dollar. He wishes he had one of the old ones now, both for sentimental reasons and because he says "they always took good pictures."
