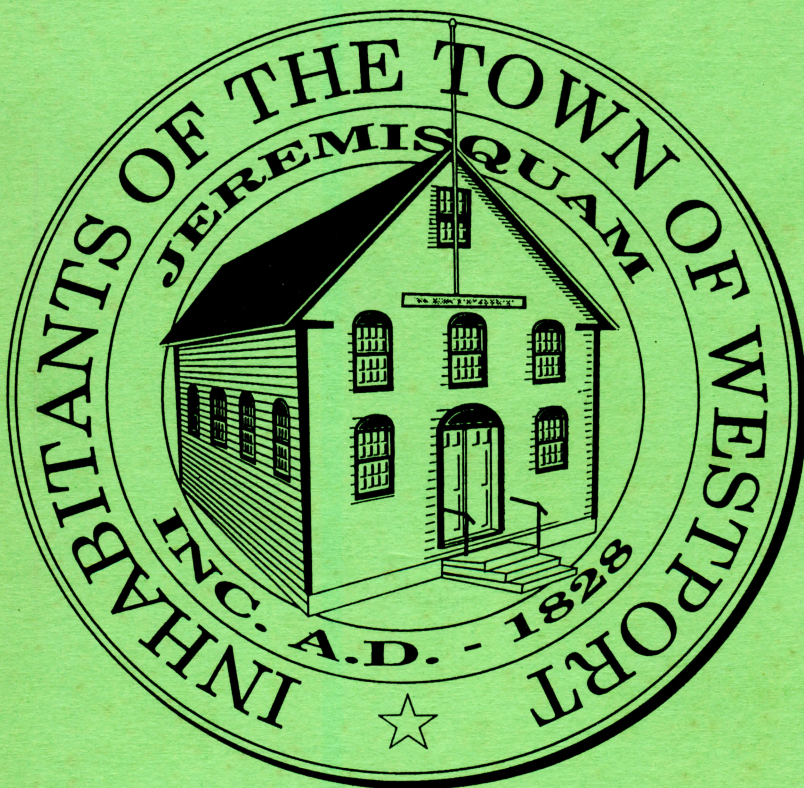

Superintendent of Schools Report

To the Citizens of Westport:

This past year has been an exciting one for me. I have been getting to know people and to become familiar with programs. The arrangement that allows Westport to send its students to Wiscasset Schools is a beneficial one for Westport. Wiscasset spent about \$6,594 per secondary student in 1993-1994 and about \$5,932 per elementary student. Westport got that education for its students at a cost of about \$2,757 for a secondary student and about \$3,441 for an elementary student. It looks like a good educational deal for the dollars!

Wiscasset High School has a new leader in principal Bob Strong. Bob has worked to accommodate various points of view about discipline, 80 minute periods, open campus, eligibility and many other issues. I feel very comfortable with the direction of the high school under his leadership.

Wiscasset Middle School has implemented a Respect and Responsibility program that has shown favorable results with students.

Wiscasset Primary School continues with the very worthwhile Reading Recovery program which addresses the reading difficulties of the lowest twenty percent of readers in first grade. Other teachers in regular classrooms are benefitting from in-service training that gives them strategies similar to those used in Reading Recovery to use with entire classes.

Maine Educational Assessment scores for grades 4, 8 and 11 in the Wiscasset Schools are above expectations in all areas. This performance indicates that the resources have made a difference!

Your school committee has worked diligently for a tight 1995-1996 school budget and will be holding an informational meeting again this year on the 23rd of March at 7:00 PM in an effort to give every citizen of Westport an opportunity to ask questions about this proposed budget.

Our 1995-1996 school budget will see an increase in expenditures this year. We do not know the final state share of Westport's costs, but estimate it to be much lower than last year's figure of \$74,000. This will contribute to an increase in local share.

The transportation department seems to have been running smoothly this year, and I appreciate the effort of our bus drivers in transporting our students in a safe manner.

In closing, I want to thank the school committee, selectmen and the community's other elected officials who continue to work cooperatively in providing Westport's children with an excellent education at a reasonable cost. I look forward to seeing interested citizens at the informational meeting on the school budget and at the annual town meeting.

Hi, Neighbors,

Hope this year finds everything well with all of you.

There were no major fire calls this past year and to my knowledge, only 1 major medical call. Thanks to all of you for being fire safe in 1994.

During the past year we've had 1 call for a wood stove malfunction, 2 false alarms from private residences, 3 medical assists with the Wiscasset Ambulance Service, 4 10-55's (car accidents), 2 call for power lines down, 2 calls for trees in the road, 2 mutual aid calls with Wiscasset, 4 service calls (i.e., filling wells or swimming pools), and 1 burning without a permit. Everyone has done a good job this past year and the Department and I thank you. Please remember you need a permit for any outside burning, including incinerators, at any time. Also, if you see power lines down notify the Fire Dept. or the Sheriff's Office at 911 or 882-7332, because "no line is safe to touch, EVER"!!

Welcome to Westport to all those who have moved here in the past year. We're glad to have you as neighbors. Also, to those who have moved away, we're sorry to see you go. A special hello and thanks to those who have joined the Department in the past year. You do make a difference.

The bottle/can bin continues to be a real big help with our efforts to provide safety service to the town. We have recently purchased a generator and flood lights to assist in night-time calls and power outages. Also, from the bottle bin fund we've purchased small hand tools, office and cleaning supplies, and other items to help us help you. Thank you for your continued donations to the bin.

The Hunter's Breakfast and Raffle were a big success this year. Thanks to all who supported this event. The possibility of putting on a town-wide Thanksgiving Dinner at the Town Hall is being discussed. If you would be interested in attending or helping, please send me a note or call me at 882-5572.

The Department has been busy this past year with two major projects that will make a big difference to all our neighbors. The first is the mapping and numbering of all the residences on Westport. All roads with two or more houses had to be named to implement the new 911 enhanced system. This is a county-wide project and a pilot project that eventually will be state-wide. The purpose of this being - if you call 911 and cannot speak, or for some other reason have to leave your phone, your exact location will appear on a computer screen in the Sheriff's dispatch office, so they can send the help you need.

The other project we are working on is an ISO update on our protection to the town. Every Department is rated with insurance companies on a scale from 1 to 10. We have recently undergone an inspection and it looks as though we should be moving up another class. What this means to the homeowners and residents is a substantial saving on their insurance premiums. Some companies work different than others, so it all depends on your individual company. We will have more information on these projects at Town Meeting.

I want to thank the members of the Westport Volunteer Fire Department at this time for all of their time, support, and dedication. They do so much for so little, except for the fact that they do make a difference - this is all the pay they get.

Also, to the Towns' people who do support the Department, I want to say "THANKS". If there are any people who do not support us, please come to one or more of our meetings, which are held on the first Tuesday of each month, and every Wednesday night for training. These meetings are all held at 6:30 p.m. Let's talk and try to work out any problems. We are just neighbors helping neighbors trying to make a difference, and possibly save some lives and property.

Conservation Committee Report 1994

The greatest accomplishment in 1994 was the foundation of a Shellfish Committee which was able to draft and implement a Shellfish Ordinance for the Town of Westport. This is a very positive step toward the improved management of a valuable resource for the Town.

The annual Spring clean-up was done in cooperation with the Westport Fire Department. Many bags of litter were picked up and removed from the roadsides of Westport. Everyone in Westport is strongly encouraged to participate in this effort which occurs in early May of each year. It only takes two or three hours and does much to improve the appearance of the Town.

In the Fall of 1994, the Conservation Committee sponsored a newspaper article about hunting safety. This ran for two weeks in the local paper and was very well received.

The Conservation Committee republished a newsletter on winter bird feeding. Numerous birds such as chickadees, nuthatchers, jays, red polls, etc. do winter over in our area. Supplementing their feed with bird feeders can be very rewarding and enjoyable effort. Additionally, it provides a great opportunity for children to become familiar with and recognize our local birds.

Shellfish Conservation Committee

GREETINGS:

Shellfish conservation became a reality for the Town of Westport at last year's Town Meeting with the passage of a Shellfish Conservation Ordinance. As a result of that action, a Shellfish Conservation Committee was appointed by the Selectmen during the April - May 1994 time frame. The primary function of the Committee is to maintain an ongoing and evolving shellfish conservation effort for the Town of Westport.

Over the past year, the Committee has been meeting to contemplate the numerous aspects of the shellfish conservation effort and to try to define and work toward some immediate goals in that regard. It has proved to be a challenging task for the group, primarily in our attempt to digest and deal with the various State regulations and requirements pertaining to shellfish harvest and related conservation issues.

In April, four of the Committee members attended a one-day training course offered by the Maine Department of Marine Resources (hereinafter referred to as "DMR"), which was designed to indoctrinate municipal shellfish conservation groups in the principles of "shoreline surveys", a mandatory task in the effort to open shellfish producing shoreline areas to shellfish harvest. Due to the real threat of shellfish-transmitted bacterial diseases such as those related to the E-Coli bacterium, strict regulations on the assurance of acceptable sanitary conditions in shellfish harvesting areas have been instituted. The shoreline survey is designed to seek out and document real and potential biological pollution sources within any given shellfish producing area. From this information, the DMR will undertake a comprehensive assessment of a given area, and in conjunction with regular sea water sampling in and around the area they will produce what is termed a "sanitary survey". If the results of this survey meet the sanitary standards set by the DMR and the National Shellfish Sanitation Association, a ruling will be made on the status of the area for opening to harvest.

In May of last year, Dana Cromwell, our Constable and a member of the Shellfish Conservation Committee, accepted the task of providing

shellfish ordinance enforcement as the "Shellfish Warden". A State requirement for the maintenance of a local shellfish ordinance is that the municipality provide an acceptable means of ordinance enforcement through the appointment or employment of a municipal shellfish warden. Additionally, a State requirement for an individual's eligibility for this position was the completion of a two-day training course, which Dana successfully completed. We in the Committee now affectionately refer to Dana as our "Clam Cop", a common label in the fishing community for such an individual, but curiously one which does not readily draw Dana's approval!

From June through September of 1994, our activity slowed somewhat as most of the members were busy with outside work during those precious "fair weather" days of summer. We did meet on a somewhat regular basis, and during that time we were able to schedule a couple of meetings with the DMR regional biologist to discuss our upcoming plans for shoreline survey work, and to get a better handle on what we were up against in the way of getting shoreline opened for clam digging.

In October, we began our shoreline survey effort, spending two days walking the shore from Fowle Point to McCarty Cove. The Committee and the DMR biologist were in mutual agreement that this appeared to be the best area to "get our feet wet" in, as it offers both potential for clam harvest and a relatively "clean" shoreline profile, as it is largely undeveloped. During that time we documented dwelling locations, water run-off locations, and any potential problems with septic systems or any other potential biological pollution sources. As a result of this survey, we located one "non-conforming" septic system which is situated about 10 feet from the high water mark! We are dealing with this problem currently and hope to get an expedient resolution. Otherwise, we have nearly completed this phase of the survey, now primarily paperwork which will go to the DMR, and when the melt waters start to flow (if there are any this year), we will be sampling all of the major run-offs in this area. During the shoreline survey we also made test digs to get some idea of the extent of the clam populations in potential production zones in this area. Generally, the area shows some promise for supporting a recreational harvest, but a viable commercial potential does not seem to be a realistic consideration at this time. If all goes well with this project, we hope to see this area opened in the April - May 1995 time frame.

Other major projects which we are currently anticipating for the 1995 - 1996 period include:

- * Discussions on and the possible amendment of the current Ordinance to include limited commercial harvest. We have been approached by some residents about the possibilities of commercial harvest, and although we wholeheartedly agree that this should not be ruled out eternally, we do not feel that it would be a prudent move at this time. There are many additional considerations involved with instituting commercial harvest, including ensuring a sustainable resource under commercial pressure, licensing procedures, detailed assessment of stocks, and heightened enforcement issues, none of which the Committee feels it is prepared to deal with presently. As we see it now, we should be prepared in one more year to take on the commercial harvest issue. We all must remember that this is our first year at this business and we are also very limited financially in what we can do. Again, any changes in the current Ordinance prior to its expiration date would require a hearing, a Town vote of approval, and the approval of the DMR to become effective (by State statute, municipal shellfish ordinances are valid for a maximum 3 year period, then must be acted upon again by municipality).

- * Opening dialogue with other municipal shellfish committees, particularly with the Town of Wiscasset, to assess the potential benefits of entering into a "reciprocal agreement". This type of arrangement would essentially provide a channel of cooperation and mutual benefit in shellfish conservation efforts. This could also be means for Westport to realize some relief from enforcement costs and other costs related to the shellfish conservation effort, while allowing us a better chance to open up more resource areas and to share them with a neighboring town. This type of arrangement would be predicted primarily upon the viability of commercial harvest in Westport.

- * Assessment of other potential shellfish areas on Westport which are currently closed due to proximity of licensed overboard discharges (OBD's), to determine if it may be worthwhile to pursue abatement possibilities for such discharges. There are relief grants available to assist homeowners in dealing with the expense of replacing these systems with a conventional septic system. This would be our primary focus on this issue. OBD abatement would ultimately benefit the Town and the environment of its inhabitants, and would likely make a subject property a more attractive prospect in a future real estate market.

In the upcoming year, we will be making an effort to set a specific monthly meeting arrangement at the Town Hall. We have typically been meeting Thursday evenings at 7:00 p.m. and try to schedule field work for Saturdays. If anyone is interested in helping out, has any questions or needs further information, you are more than welcome to attend our meetings or contact any of the Committee members.

Please remember that our current Ordinance is for resident recreational harvest only and requires a license obtainable from the Town Clerk's office. Copies of the Ordinance are also available there. For those of you who are unaware, the DMR has generally posted an opening of the shoreline area between the Ferry Road (boat ramp) and Squam Creek for shellfish harvest. There are occasions, however, when the DMR will temporarily close this area due to water quality degradation. This is most always after heavy rains and run-off or if there is a potential for "red tide" contamination. If any of these conditions are prevalent, please make an effort to determine if the DMR has closed the area. You may do this by contacting the Maine Department of Marine Resources at (207)-624-6550, (207)-797-3380, (800)-232-4733, or the Shellfish Conservation Committee.

Again, many thanks to everyone for your support of shellfish conservation in Westport and remember, this is Our resource, for Our benefit, and Our enjoyment.

Most of it does NOT “rot and float away.” Any of our local lobsterman will tell you that much of it sinks and forms large underwater rat’s nests that tangle

with their gear. Sometimes retrieval is impossible as they cannot even get them to the surface. Please, for the sake of your neighbors, dispose of brush in legal ways. Options include: chipping, landfill, burning (with a permit), carrying to the transfer station, and making brush piles (which offer small animals welcome shelter).

b. Add the following as a new Section 15 (U):

U. Home Occupations. It is the intent and purpose of these provisions to provide liberal, flexible standards for the establishment and maintenance of home occupations that simultaneously provide the community with a practical mechanism by which to monitor and regulate their use.

1. Home occupations which meet the following conditions do not require a Code Enforcement Officer (CEO) or Planning Board Permit:

a. Do not employ any persons who do not make the residence their permanent home;

b. Do not display any exterior signs, exterior exhibits, exterior storage of materials or any other exterior indications of the home occupation or variation from the residential character of the principal dwelling or accessory building;

c. Do not generate any nuisance, waste discharge, offensive noise, vibration, smoke, dust, odors, heat, glare, radiation, fumes, or electrical interference detectable to the normal senses or which interferes with normal radio or television reception, or cause other nuisances which extend beyond the limits of the subject project; and

d. Are not likely to generate regular or seasonal traffic.

2. Home occupations that do not meet the provision of Section I shall obtain a permit from the Code Enforcement Officer and comply with the following conditions:

a. Not more than two persons who do not make the residence their permanent home may be employed (including part-time workers);

b. The appearance of the structure or accessory structure is not altered, subject to the provisions of subsection (d) hereinafter or the occupation within the residence is conducted in a manner that would cause the residence to differ from its residential character by means of colors, lights or sounds;

c. Signs and billboards relating to goods and service sold on the premises shall be permitted, provided that such signs shall not exceed twenty (20) square feet in area and shall not exceed two (2) signs per premises. Billboards and signs relating to goods or services not sold or rendered on the premises shall be prohibited.

d. Additions to the residence or accessory structure for the express purpose of a home occupation are constructed and finished in the same manner as the original

structure such that the character and appearance of the principal structure is maintained;

e. Retail sales are limited to the sale of products or goods produced, fabricated or substantially altered on the premises as a result of the home occupation. This may include products that are not manufactured on the premises as defined above, but which are customarily incidental to the product created by the home occupation;

f. There is adequate off-street parking on the premises for customer or clients use;

g. There is no objectionable increase in traffic over that normal for the traffic normal for the neighborhood;

h. It does not adversely affect any natural resource or environmentally sensitive area including, but not limited to a wetland, aquifer, watercourse, or water body.

i. The home occupation that uses chemicals not commonly found in a residence and any chemicals in quantities not commonly used in a residence shall be required to collect and dispose of said chemical in an environmentally safe manner.

j. The home occupation shall not generate any nuisance, waste discharge, offensive noise, vibration, smoke, dust, odors, heat, glare, radiation, fumes or electrical interference detectable to the normal senses or which interferes with normal radio or television reception, or cause other nuisances which extend beyond the limits of the subject property. All waste material from the home occupation shall be removed promptly from the premises, according to federal, state and local laws.

3. Home occupations not meeting the above standards shall be considered to be commercial uses.

ART. 53. It was voted to accept this article as written.

ART. 54. Shall the ordinance entitled "Westport Building Code", be amended as follows:

a. Add to Section 1, the following definition:

G. "A home occupation is defined as an occupation or business activity which results in a product or service and is conducted in whole or in part in the dwelling unit or accessory structure."

b. Add the following as a new Section 11 and re-number existing Section 11, 12, 13 and 14 accordingly:

Section 11. Home Occupations. It is the intent and purpose of these provisions to provide liberal, flexible standards for the establishment and maintenance of home occupations that simultaneously provide the community with a practical mechanism by which to monitor and regulate their use.

1. Home occupations which meet the following conditions do not require a Code Enforcement Officer (CEO) or Planning Board Permit:

a. Do not employ any persons who do not make the residence their permanent home;

b. Do not display any exterior signs, exterior exhibits, exterior storage of materials or any other exterior indications of the home occupation or variation from the residential character of the principal dwelling or accessory building;

c. Do not generate any nuisance, waste discharge, offensive noise, vibration, smoke, dust, odors, heat, glare, radiation, fumes, or electrical interference detectable to the normal senses or which interferes with normal radio or television reception, or causes other nuisances which extend beyond the limits of the subject project; and

d. Are not likely to generate regular or seasonal traffic.

2. Home occupations that do not meet the provisions of Section 1 shall obtain a permit from the Code Enforcement Officer and comply with the following conditions:

a. Not more than two persons who do not make the residence there permanent home may be employed (including part/time workers);

- b. The appearance of the structure or accessory structure is not altered, subject to the provisions of subsection (d) hereafter or the occupation within the residence is conducted in a manner that would not cause the residence to differ from its residential character by means of colors, lights or sounds.
 - c. Signs and billboards relating to goods and services sold on the premises shall be permitted, provided that such signs shall not exceed twenty (20) square feet in area and shall not exceed two (2) signs per premises. Billboards and signs relating to goods or services not sold or rendered on the premises shall be prohibited.
 - d. Additions to the residence or accessory structure for the express purpose of a home occupation are constructed and finished in the same manner as the original structure such that the character and appearance of the principal structure is maintained.
 - e. Retail sales are limited to the sale of products or goods produced, fabricated or substantially altered on the premises as a result of the home occupation. This may include products that are not manufactured on the premises as defined above, but which are customarily incidental to the product created by the home occupation;
 - f. There is adequate off-street parking on the premises for customers or clients use;
 - g. There is no objectionable increase in traffic over that normal for the traffic normal for the neighborhood;
 - h. It does not adversely affect any natural resource or environmentally sensitive area including, but not limited to a wetland, aquifer, watercourse, or water body.
 - i. The home occupation that uses chemicals not commonly found in a residence and any chemicals in quantities not commonly used in a residence shall be required to collect and dispose of said chemicals in an environmentally safe manner.
 - j. The home occupation shall not generate any nuisance, waste discharge, offensive noise, vibration, smoke, dust, odors, heat, glare, radiation, fumes or electrical interference detectable to the normal senses or which interferes with normal radio or television reception. or causes other nuisances which extend beyond the limits of the subject property. All waste materials from the home occupation shall be removed promptly from the premises, according to federal, state and local laws.
3. Home occupations not meeting the above standard shall be considered to be commercial uses.
- ART. 54. It was voted to accept this article as written.
- ART. 55. Shall an Ordinance entitled "Shellfish Conservation Ordinance be enacted? Copies of the Ordinance are available from the Town Clerk.
- ART. 55. It was voted to accept this article as written.

Recommended by Selectmen that the necessary funds be transferred to Snow Removal Account and the balance be transferred to the Town Highways and Bridges Account.

ART. 45. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to put the Snow Removal Contract out to bid and to negotiate and execute a contract upon such terms and conditions as they deem to be in the best interest of the Town.

ART. 46. To see what the Town will raise and appropriate for Snow Removal.

Recommended by Selectmen that the necessary funds be transferred from Excise Tax Receipts.

ART. 47. To see if the Town will vote to authorize Selectmen to let out for bid any road construction or repairs as to their discretion.

ART. 48. To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town Roads and Bridges.

Recommended by Selectmen that the balance of \$11,199.81 be carried forward, the balance of the 1994 Excise Tax receipts, after the transfer authorized in Article 41 (\$25,000.00 Estimated) be transferred, and the sum of \$25,000.00 be transferred from the State Highway Account.

MISCELLANEOUS

ART. 49. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the tax year 1995.

ART. 50. To see if the Town will vote to set a date when taxes shall be payable and to set an interest rate due thereafter.

ART. 52. To see if the Town will vote to set a specified time for the Treasurer to pay Selectmen's warrants.

ART. 53. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen, at their discretion, to lease or rent the Town Hall facilities under terms and conditions voted under Article 39 at the 1977 Town Meeting, March 26, 1977.

ART. 54. To see if the Town will vote to accept, from time to time, gifts from the Dorothy Q. Doggett Trust and to authorize the Selectmen to expend funds received from that Trust in accordance with its terms.

ORDINANCE REVISIONS

ART. 55. Shall the ordinance entitled "Minimum Lot Size Ordinance" be amended as follows: (Changes are underlined)

I. No single family dwelling shall be erected or building altered, nor shall any existing single family dwelling be used to accommodate one family as a residence on less than a one and one-half (1 1/2) acre lot area.

III. No Commercial or Industrial Structure shall be erected, or building altered, nor shall any existing Commercial or Industrial Structure be used to accommodate a Commercial or Industrial Use on less than a three acre lot area.

ART. 56. Shall an ordinance entitled: "Model Addressing Ordinance" be enacted as follows:

Section 1. **Purpose.** The purpose of this ordinance is to enhance the easy and rapid location of properties for the delivery of public safety and emergency services, postal delivery and business delivery.

Section 2. **Authority.** This ordinance is adopted pursuant to and consistent with the Municipal Home Rule Powers as provided for in Article VIII, Part 2, Section 1 of the Constitution of the State of Maine and Title 30-A M.R.S.A. ss3001.

Section 3. **Administration.** This ordinance shall be administered by the board of selectmen who may assign road names and numbers to all properties, both on existing and proposed roads.

Section 4. **Naming System.** All roads in the Town of Westport that serve two or more addresses shall be named regardless of whether the ownership is public or private. A road name assigned by the selectmen shall not constitute or imply acceptance of the road as a public way. The following criteria shall govern the naming system:

- a. Similar names - no two roads shall be given the same or similar sounding names.
- b. Each Road shall have the same name throughout its entire length.

The registrar of voters will hold office hours while the polls are open, on Friday, March 24, 1995 to correct any error in or change a name or address on the voting list; and to accept the registration of any person eligible to vote and to accept new enrollments.

The Selectmen and the Registrar will be in session at the Town Hall in Westport on Saturday, March 25, 1995 at 8:30 o'clock A.M. for the purpose of correcting the voting list. You are hereby directed to serve this by posting at the Town Hall as least seven days before said meeting.

Therefore, fail not, and have the Warrant with your doings thereon at the above place and time.
