Islesboro Youth In Good Condition After Being Wounded While Hunting

A 19-year-old hunting victim, George W. Pendleton, was reported in satisfactory condition in the Knox County General Hospital, Monday afternoon, after a bullet passed through his right leg shattering the bone Saturday near Lincolnville Center.

Waldo County Sheriff Noel Sanker said Pendleton was hunting with his father and two brothers, Leonard and Lawrence, all of Islesboro, when Kenneth W. Myers, 23, of Rockland fired at what he thought to be a deer and struck George. Myers, a soldier stationed at Fort Knox, Ky., was using a .303 British rifle. The bullet passed through Pendleton's leg about six inches above the knee.

The victim was rushed to the Camden Community Hospital and later to the Knox County Hospital in Rockland.

OVERNIGHT PARKING BAN IN ROCKLAND GOES INTO EFFECT THURSDAY FOR REST OF SEASON

Overnight parking on Rockland streets will be prohibited by ordinance starting Thursday, reminds Police Chief Maurice Benner. This applies to all streets in the city between 2 a. m. and 6 a. m. No vehicle may be parked for more than 15 minutes between those hours.

The overnight parking ban applies through the winter months from Dec. 1 to April 30.

In addition, Chief Benner reminded car owners that no vehicle may be parked so as to hamper snow removal or plowing at any time.

In both cases cars in violation may be towed away at the owner's expense. Frequently a storage charge also enters the picture.

Officers will be issuing reminder tags this week to give motorists in the habit of parking on the street an opportunity to find off street parking. The ban does not apply to municipal parking lots, Chief Benner said.

Crusade At Baptist Church To Continue All This Week

The Rockland for Christ Crusade conducted by Evangelist Bob Manderson will continue all this week with services nightly at the First Baptist Church at 7:30 p. m. Rev. Manderson will give several musical numbers at each service, playing the piano and singing, as well as preaching. Some of the topics to be considered this week will be "How To Know God's Will For My Life", "Today's Headlines In The Light of Bible Prophecy", and "From the Night Clubs to Christ," which will be his personal testimony of the change God wrought in his life.

Bob Manderson is a talented musician who spent many years in the entertainment world, singing and playing in night clubs across the country, before he committed his life and talents to Christ. At one time doctors had pronounced him an incurable alcoholic, but he found that when his life was changed by Christ he had complete victory over this desire.

For the past 14 years he has given his life in Christian service, first in rescue mission work then in evangelism. With his wife, Rita Manderson, they have established a home for women alcoholics in Fallston, Md.

Other special music will also be presented each night this week. Groups from the Christian High School in Glen Cove will be present on Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights; while on Tuesday there will be a ladies' chorus, Thursday a men's chorus, and Saturday a youth choir.

Friday night has been designated as "Sunday School Night" with classes attending in groups and recognition given to the Sunday School teachers. Sunday will be the final day of the Crusade when Mr. Manderson will preach in the regular services at 10:45 and at 7, and will also address the Sunday School and the youth groups.

Rockland Man Hurt When Car Rams Rankin Street Home Sunday Afternoon

A Rockland man was reported in satisfactory condition at the Knox County Hospital, Monday, following an accident Sunday afternoon in which he blacked out while driving his '56 sedan, struck another car and rammed into a house on Rankin Street belonging to Allen Gordon of Rockland. Police found Augustus E. Hunt, 69, in a semi-conscious state when they arrived at the scene shortly before 1 o'clock Sunday. Members of the Rockland Fire Department emergency crew applied first aid until an ambulance arrived and took the victim to the hospital where he was treated for a badly cut eye and chest pains.

The sedan struck a parked car on Main Street before rounding the curve onto Rankin Street and skidding into the house. The parked car belonged to Albert Ausplund of Rockland and sustained estimated damages of \$250. The Hunt car was considered a total loss.

Hunt told police he blacked out while driving south on Main Street and didn't remember a thing until he hit the building. His car glanced off the rear of the car parked near the Route 1

CAMDEN — The Snow Bowl will have the services of an experienced ski instructor this winter for the first time as Miss Helen Doherty of Rockland will take the post. She has worked as a ski instructor for five years at Sugar Loaf Mountain where she worked under the well known ski director Werner Rothacker.

Miss Doherty will be available on Saturdays for ski instruction, which is free to members of the Camden Outing Club, sponsors of the winter activities. Classes for members of the younger set through high school will be held each Saturday morning.

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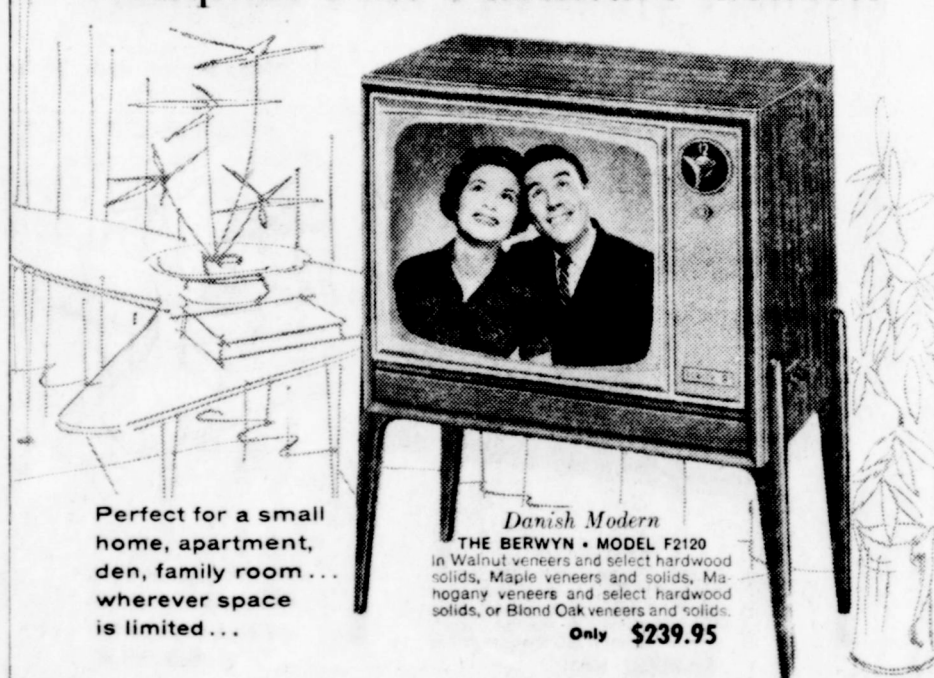

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VOTER APATHY IN CITY ELECTIONS
A DISGRACE

Monday, December 5 is election day in Rockland. It is no less important to residents of the community than the Presidential election held in November for it is at this time that the citizenry names those persons who will administer the affairs of the government closest to them. In selecting city councilors, the voters name the men who will, in turn, work with the city manager who directs the efforts of all the city departments. In electing school committeemen the voters name the persons who will be responsible for the educational programs for their children. In short, voters place in the hands of elected officials the affairs of the multi-million dollar corporation which is the City and the education of their children. Public apathy in municipal elections has reached the point of being a disgrace. The voters of the community should acquaint themselves with the qualifications of the candidates for public office and vote for their choice; not on the basis of whether or not he is a good fellow, but on the basis of what he can offer the public as an office holder and how well he can do his job. Certainly, it is no great chore to go to the polls; especially when the management of the city and schools is at stake.
