## Storm Blasts County But Accidents Relatively Few In View Of Conditions

Accidents were reported as being light in Knox County, Monday, by the State Police in view of heavy drifting snow and gale force winds in the area. Coast Guard officials said that wind velocity reached a high peak of 40 miles an hour shortly before noon and ranged around 25 miles per hour for the greater part of the afternoon.

Rockland weather observer, Oliver Holmes, reported that six and a half inches of snow had fallen by 5 o'clock Monday afternoon in one of the heaviest snow storms experienced in Knox County for some time.

The only accident involving personal injury happened on Route 105 Monday morning when a woman motorist received minor injuries. The only other accident of a serious nature occurred in Thomaston causing \$330 damage. Rockland police reported that all was quiet in the city except for cars getting stuck in the heavy going.

The Rockland Public Works Department reported all trucks in action trying to clear the drifts which measured five to six feet in height in places. The bulk of the clearing was not expected to take place until late Monday night.

## FIRE FLATTENS LARGE HEN HOUSE ON SOUTH UNION FARM OF ROBERT GROVER THURSDAY

UNION—Robert Grover, South Union poultryman who lost a large brooder house by fire early Thursday morning, certainly has had more than his share of bad luck. His first disaster, a laryngo-tracheitis outbreak recently

destroyed over a thousand of his pullets, 700 dying in one week.

The three story poultry house valued at \$10,000 was emptied of his old flock just two days before the fire and he spent Wednesday cleaning and spraying in preparation for a new flock of baby chicks. The origin of the fire has not been determined by fire officials.

The fire was first noticed by Harland Prescott, night watchman in the Thurston Brothers Casket Factory, who summoned the Union Fire Department. The Grovers were aroused from a sound sleep by Fire Warden Elmer Savage who forced in the front door of their home to notify them of the fire burning within a few feet of their house.

The wind was blowing away from the main house at the time of the fire and Grover said this factor saved the rest of the buildings on his property. The owner, a retired fisherman, bought the land from Oscar Sorsa a year and a half ago and has been engaged in the poultry business ever since.

## Camden Woman Is Hospitalized From Auto Crash

CAMDEN—A Camden woman, Lazetta Money, was taken to the Camden Community Hospital with minor injuries following an auto accident on Route 105 in Camden Monday morning at 10 o'clock. Hospital officials said Monday afternoon that her condition was satisfactory and that she had suffered lacerations and bruises.

Camden Police said that she was rounding a curve on Route 105 and skidded into a 1951 sedan driven by George A. Rankin, 47, of Lincolnville, coming in the opposite direction. The Rankin car was a total loss while the Money car sustained an estimated \$200 damage.

As wreckers were trying to haul away the two cars, a car driven by Kenneth Mitchell, 45, of Burketville skidded off the road causing damages estimated at \$200. Police said that he tried to brake his car as he headed south on Route 105 and came on the scene of the accident. He was not injured.

## Couple Overcome By Smoke As Large Business Block Destroyed In Storm Whipped Blaze At Damariscotta

DAMARISCOTTA—A quarter of a million dollar fire struck the business district in the midst of the worst storm of the winter Monday morning putting an elderly couple in the hospital and destroying a three-story business block. The interior of the so called Austin Block on the west side of the main street was

still burning late Monday afternoon nearly 12 hours after the fire was reported.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Copp, described as being in their 60s, were in good condition at Miles Memorial Hospital suffering from smoke inhalation. It was reported a fireman was wounded in the hand when ammunition

exploded in the Damariscotta Hardware store.

Firemen from seven communities battled the blaze in near zero cold. Efforts were hampered when a water main burst so firemen had to turn to the nearby Damariscotta River for water.

The fire was discovered about 5:45 a. m. The Cops were carried from their second floor apartment by firemen. Two other families who lived on the third floor escaped unharmed.

Burned out were Damariscotta Hardware, Wheeler's Radio Shop, Copp's cobbler shop and the law office of Samuel King. Only a firewall prevented the blaze from sweeping the west side of Main Street, observers reported. Firemen also prevented the flames from spreading to the wooden home of Dr. Neil Parsons. It stands less than three feet from the block. When the water main burst, Main Street was flooded with water which quickly froze to add to the problems of firemen who were plagued by frozen hose lines.

Responding to the call for aid were departments from New-castle, Bristol, South Bristol, Waldoboro, Wiscasset and Bath. It was reported considerable stock from the radio shop was saved but the hardware store lost everything, including a heavy Christmas stock. The families and law office were completely destroyed.

Reports from Damariscotta, Monday afternoon, said there was danger of the brick walls falling in.

Traffic was stopped for hours. The only route around the town is through Damariscotta Mills.

## State Reports Increased Bets At Union Fair

AUGUSTA — The sum of \$152,211 was wagered at the week-long Union Fair this year, an increase of \$27,457 over the season of 1959 when the sum of \$124,754 was bet. In both years five days of racing were held with a total of 42 dashes. The average sum of \$3,624 was wagered on each dash during the Union meet.

The state received 6 percent, or \$9,132 of the 1960 take; the Agriculture Stipend Fund received one percent — \$1,522.11; and the Association received the sum of \$15,221.10.

The total wagered at all of the state's 16 fairs was \$6,331,393 an increase of 2.58 percent over 1959, according to figures released this week by the Maine State Harness Racing Commission.

## YOU, TOO, CAN RAISE A DELINQUENT

Juvenile delinquency, as FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover and others emphasize, becomes a graver problem all the time—both in the extent of the crimes committed by juveniles, and in the crime's seriousness. If you, as a parent want to join the parade and raise a delinquent, there are certain rules to follow. Frank Brabant, an authority on the subject, who lectures around the country, recently listed them. Here are a few:

From infancy onward give the child everything he wants, so that he'll grow up thinking the world owes him a living. Don't give him any spiritual training. Avoid use of the word "wrong"—it may give him a guilt complex. Do everything for him, so that he'll become accustomed to throwing all responsibility on to others. Give him all the spending money he wants, and never insist that he earn any of his own. Satisfy his every craving and desire—after all, denial may frustrate him. Take his part against neighbors, teachers and the police. When he gets into real trouble, apologize by saying, "I never could do anything with him."

These rules aren't hard to follow and abide by—great numbers of parents have, as surging juvenile delinquency shows. You, too, can produce a delinquent, simply and easily. The authority adds one more observation: "Prepare for a life of grief. You will be apt to have it."

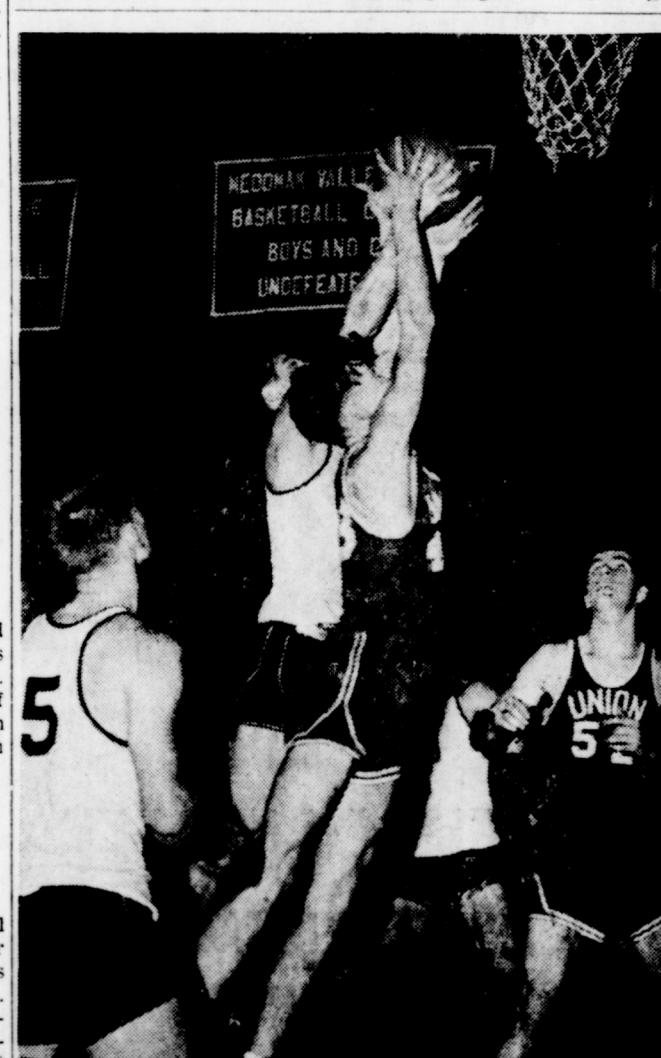

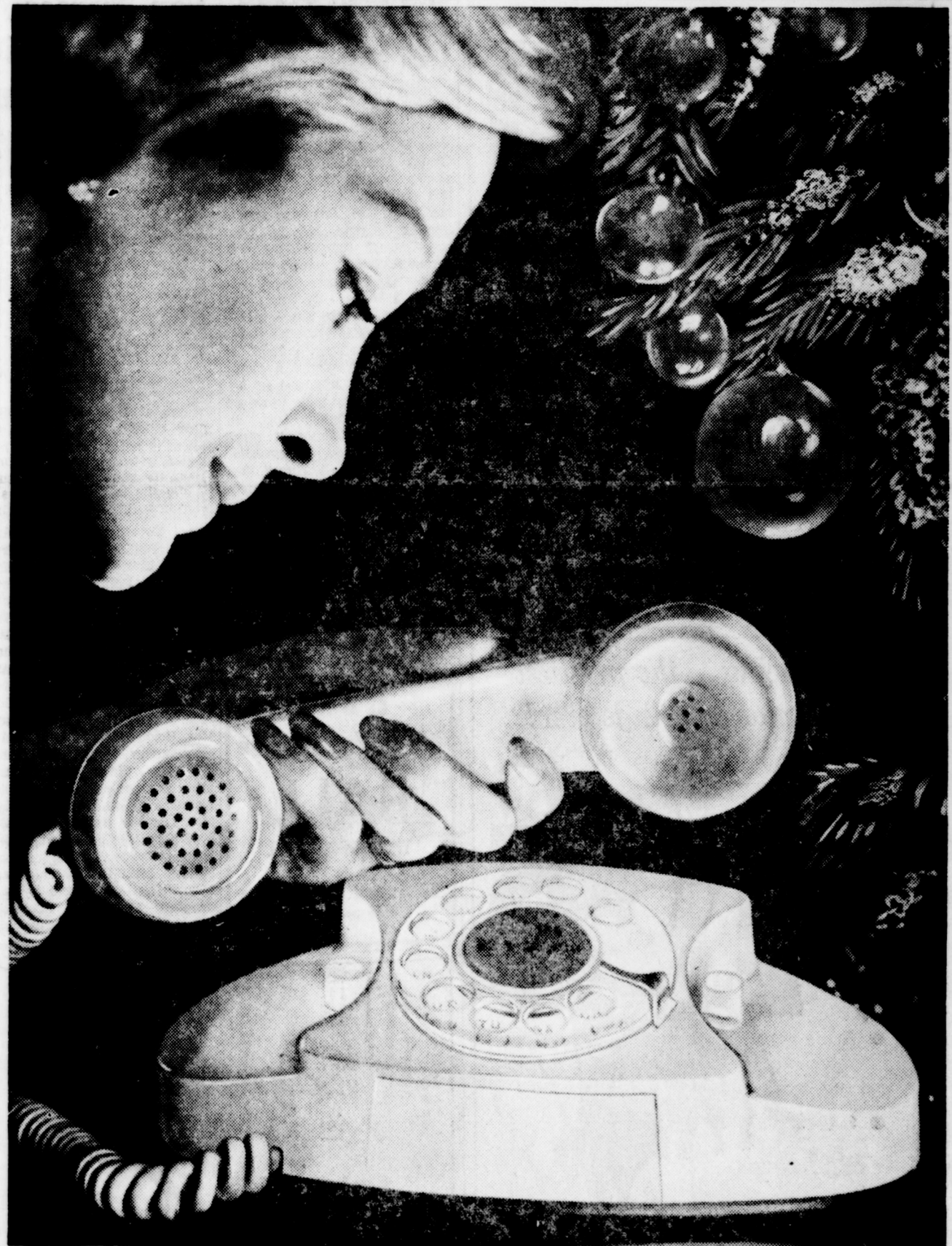

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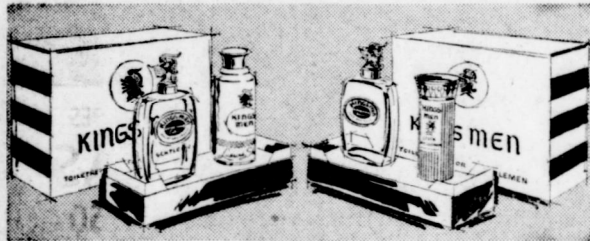

### Free Talk

How To Choose  
A Christmas Tree  
And Keep It Fresh For Weeks

A new wrinkle in keeping a Christmas tree fresh this year is to spray it with an anti-wilt compound. This reduces drying out and shedding of needles.

Anti-wilts with a plastic or rubber base may be purchased from a garden supply store. Mixed with water, the solution forms a fine film coating that even adds a sheen to the needles, according to Dr. Philip L. Rusden of the Bartlett Tree Research Laboratories.

But first select the Christmas tree early when the choice is wide. Apply a freshness test at the tree lot. Bounce the butt hard on the ground. If needles sprinkle down it's not fresh. Pull at the needles. If they come off easily freshness has gone.

Run a finger across the stump. If it's sticky with resin that's a sign of freshness. Fragrance is another omen of freshness. Avoid a tree with patches of brown needles.

Now spread wide the lower branches. If they're springy and bounce back they should hold ornaments well. An ideal Christmas tree's lateral branches should measure half the tree's height. The stump should be six to seven inches long.

When you bring the tree home, cut an inch or two off the stump at a slant. Peel back the bark another inch. Then plunge the butt into a bucket of cold water. Keep it in this water filled container in a cool place — the garage or back porch — until the tree is ready to be brought into the house. Now spray on anti-wilt as an added precaution against needle drying out.

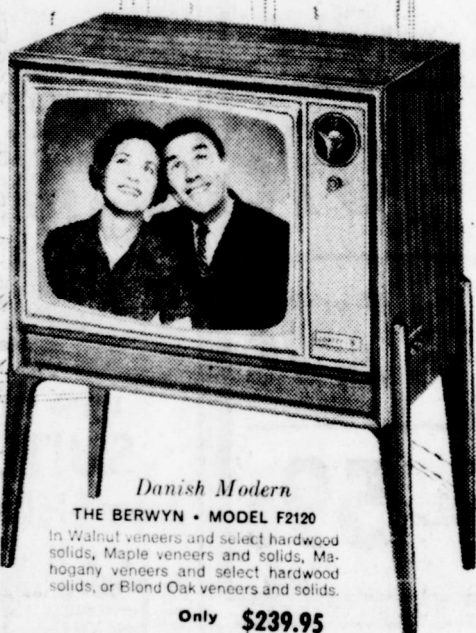

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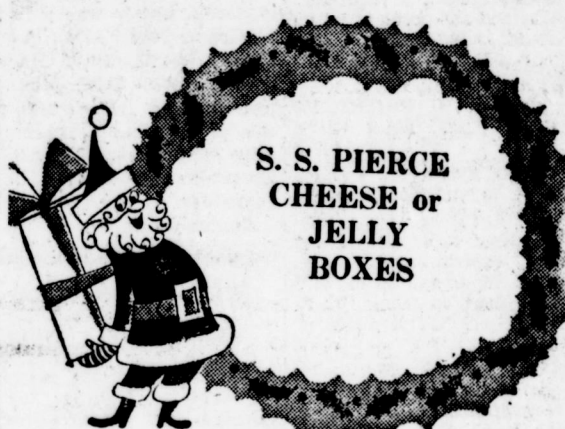
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
