Tigers Dump Old Town 67-57 As Local Club Shows Best Scoring Of Season

The Rockland Tigers had a strong second half and chalked up their second home court win by defeating the Old Town Indians 67-57 in a rugged battle at the Community Building Tuesday night. The win brings the Tiger mark to 3-4 and represents a lot of points in their quest for an Eastern Maine tourney berth.

Rockland used its height advantage to block numerous Old Town shots, especially in the second half, and Billy Barbour suddenly got hot under the nets to score on rebounds and layups after intermission. He hit for 14 and gave good scoring support to the 21 of Bob Brewer who was great on one hand pushes from the corners all evening.

Old Town used superior speed to take a three point lead at the half but did not have the same momentum after intermission, although the Indians stayed with the aroused Tigers into the second minute of the final quarter when the score was tied at 50-50. Barbour got underneath for two quick buckets at this point and Rockland was ahead to stay, even though Jim Shaffer, Barbour, and Floyd Montgomery all fouled out in the savagely played final session.

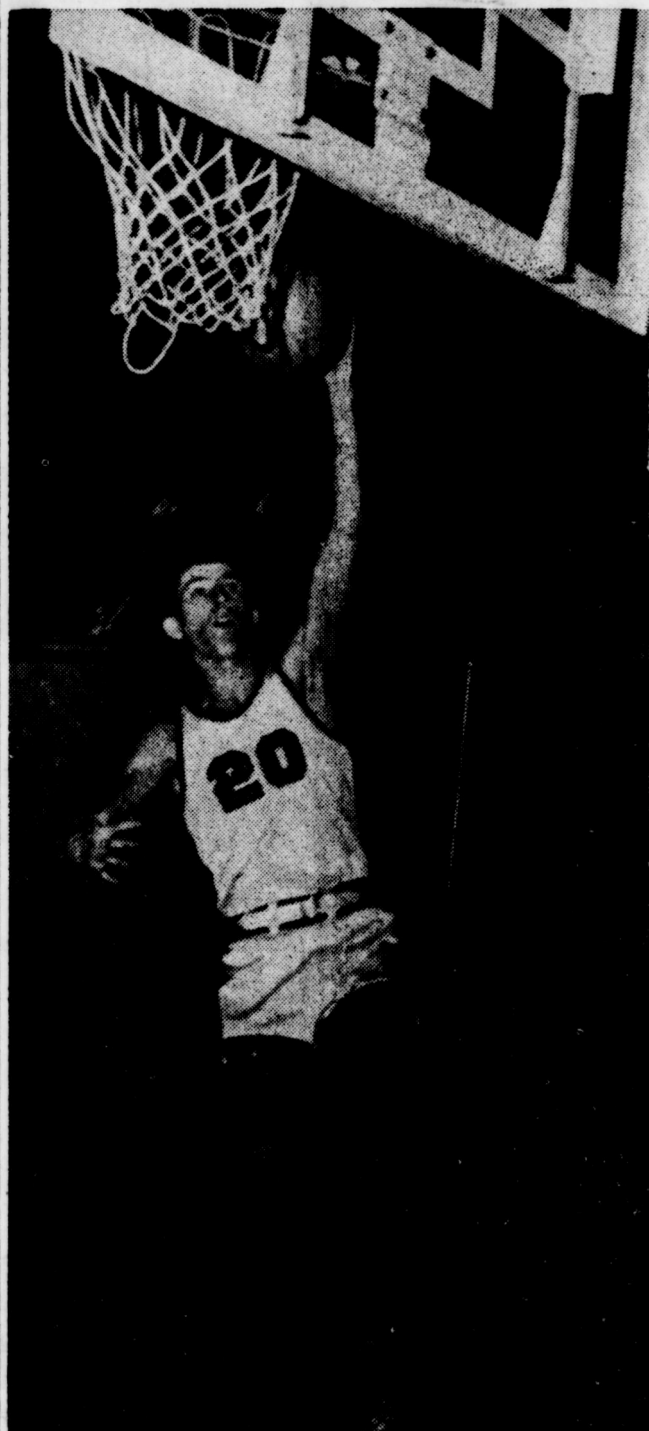
The third quarter was especially wild and the lead changed hands 10 times in the first five minutes as first one and then the other team hit from all points on the floor. Rockland had a 44-41 lead at the buzzer.

Rockland outshot the Indians from the foul line 25-21 and generally played its best game of the year with the defensive effort the key to the win. The Tigers forced Old Town into hasty shooting and blocked many of these. Seldom has a team made better use of a height advantage.

The Old Town Junior Varsity won the prelim 47-34.

BEAVERS TAKE ON PERENNIAL FRANKLIN COUNTY HOOP POWER FROM NEW SHARON FRIDAY

The Rockport Beavers entertain the New Sharon team Thursday night and the result will be watched with interest as the Franklin County school is almost one of the powers in Class 8 Western Maine circles. Rockport has played several games against Class M schools and should take the visitors at home.

Friday night finds a thin slate of two games. The Rockland Tigers hit the road again as they play Gardiner, 3-2, there and are expected to pick up the win as Gardiner is not rated among the powers in the East. The Tigers got a big boost from their fine

victory over favored Old Town and realize that they will have to go full speed from here on in to make the Eastern Maine tournament.

In the other Friday game the Union Eagles host the Unity-Freedom team which is a member of the Waldo County League.

The Knox-Lincoln League and the Medomak Valley circuit do not see action again until a week from Friday, on Jan. 6 when they begin their stretch run. Waldoboro, with a two game lead, is heavily favored in the K-L circuit, while Rockport appears to have too much strength for the rest of the Medomak Valley teams.

BUCK WOUNDED BY POACHER NEAR CHICKAWAUKIE KILLED BY WARDEN, GIVEN TO HOSPITAL

Patients at the Camden Community Hospital will be served venison before the New Year. A wounded deer was discovered on Chickawaukie Lake in Rockland, Tuesday afternoon, and had to be shot by Game Warden Earle Kelley of Camden.

The eight point buck had struggled about 50 feet onto the ice before falling and children skating near by helped it back to shore before calling Kelley. The children said that they had heard a gunshot about a half hour before the deer appeared on the lake. Kelley said a wound where the buck's leg had been broken was apparently caused by a bullet.

The deer was taken to Camden for processing.

The deer came down from Dodge's Mountain. It was so badly wounded that only hide held the hind leg of the animal. Warden Kelley said it would have starved to death if he hadn't killed it. He estimated it weighed about 150 pounds. He dressed the animal before turning it over to the hospital.

Children who saw the deer were skating near the Rockland Public Beach. They took the deer off the ice.

Rockland Police were called and they stood about until Warden Kelley arrived.

MMA Prepares For First Cruise To Mediterranean

CASTINE—More than 350 officers and midshipmen at Maine Maritime Academy are busily preparing for their annual cruise aboard the Training Vessel State of Maine which gets underway Jan. 3. This year, students at the state's maritime school will cruise 11 weeks to the Mediterranean Sea and return on the 7,000 ton training ship.

As the sailing date approaches the tempo of operation increases at the Academy. This week, the State of Maine is being stored with provisions, loaded with supplies, and the midshipmen and officers are in the process of moving aboard the ship. Equipment is being tested and fire and boat drills held. For more than 100 freshmen midshipmen this will be their first cruise.

From Castine, the State of Maine will proceed to an East

Coast shipyard for annual overhaul and repairs. On Jan. 14 she will sail to Funchal, Madeira, then to Ceuta, Spanish Morocco, for fuel and to Barcelona, Spain. From Barcelona the ship will proceed to Marseille, France and then to Naples, Italy, where an eight-day stay is planned.

The ship will return by way of Gibraltar, New York and Portland arriving in Castine on March 19.

The operation of the training ship is a joint undertaking of both deck and engine personnel of the Academy staff. Under their direction and supervision the midshipmen actually keep the ship functioning. They stand all the watches necessary for the ship's operation and provide the manpower for its proper upkeep. In addition, they receive detailed instruction in the use and operation of lifesaving, fire fighting and both electronic and celestial navigation equipment.

The officers who are charged directly with the supervision of the midshipmen are by Federal Law required to hold valid licenses issued by the U. S. Coast Guard as Merchant Marine Officers. The training cruise instruction is designed to equip the midshipman in a practical way to go aboard an American merchant ship upon graduation from the Academy and to perform duties required for its safe and economical operation.

The midshipmen will spend 29 days in port this year. During liberty hours they will be permitted to go ashore in both the foreign and American ports. While in Naples this winter, the midshipmen will be allowed to take organized tours away from the city. Plans are underway for trips to Rome and a skiing trip to the Swiss Alps.

Five Apply For Two New Posts In Fire Station

City Manager Charles Haynes said Wednesday that there are five applications on file for the two openings as firemen in the Rockland Fire Department.

Three of the applications are new since the positions were advertised last week and it is expected that the contestants will sit for a written examination Friday afternoon. All applicants will then go before the Personnel Board for an oral examination within the next week or two before final appointments are made.

Fire Chief Wesley Knight said that he plans to use the men hired on alternate shifts. There are presently nine permanent men on the department's staff.

FORMER VA OFFICER IS NEW REHABILITATION COUNSELOR

It is announced by Gray H. Curtis, director, Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, Department of Education, that Alfred J. Morin of Waterville has assumed the duties of rehabilitation counselor in the Augusta District office at 312 Water Street. The area served by this office includes Kennebec, Knox, Piscataquis, Somerset, and part of Franklin Counties.

Morin, who came to Maine from Vermont in 1933, was educated at Craftsbury Academy and the University of Vermont where he was editor of the college newspaper and a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity. He also took special courses at the Sorbonne in Paris, France, and at Colby College. He was editor of a French language newspaper in Waterville from 1933 to 1938 when he became affiliated with a life insurance company.

He joined the U. S. Army Signal Corps in May, 1943, where he was trained as a cryptographer and cyptanalyst. During his 19 months of overseas service in Europe, his fluency in French and working knowledge of other languages caused him to be assigned to Military and Signal Intelligence Units for work in liaison teams with the French underground. He was interpreter for General Omar Bradley during the Battle of the Bulge in Luxembourg City and was discharged in November, 1945, with five battle stars.

Having been appointed contact representative for the Veterans Administration in March, 1946, he was a few months later chosen officer-in-charge of the Veterans Administration Waterville office where he remained until the office closed in the spring of 1948. At that time, he joined the staff of the Chief Attorney in Togus until August, 1949, when he left government service for work in general insurance with a Waterville firm.

Since late March, 1960, he has been claims representative at Togus for the Division of Veterans Affairs.

Morin has been active in community and fraternal affairs, having served on the Waterville City Council for one term and on

various charity drives. He is vice chairman of the Waterville Chapter of the American Red Cross. He is a member of the Knights of Columbus, American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and the Holy Name Society of Sacred Heart Church where he is a communicant.

Morin is married to the former Annette LaMarre and resides on the Second Rangeway, Waterville.

Get Estimates On Razing Church For Parking Lot

City Manager Charles Haynes said that several estimates have been received on the tearing down of the Universalist Church on Union Street ranging from \$1200 to \$3800. It is expected that the demolition of the building will be open for bids sometime during the month of January, he added.

The property was recently purchased by the county for \$8,000 and the city has agreed to pay \$500 to the county after the first of the year. Plans are to convert the area into a municipal parking lot with a lease agreement between the city and the county of at least five years, said Haynes.

Minus Readings Reported Around Knox County

Penobscot Bay was covered with a blanket of "smoke" Wednesday morning to tell those who hadn't looked at the temperature that it was mighty cold. The official Rockland minimum was four below zero early Wednesday at the home of Weather Observer Oliver Holmes. Unofficial reports from Rockland ranged from two above to five below.

Away from the ocean, the mercury tumbled to lows for the month. One report from Burkettville had the temperature at a frosty minus 15.

Garages were taxed to handle all the frozen radiator and gas line business. In some places a dozen or more cars were lined up waiting to be thawed.

The lack of wind contributed to icing in the small salt water coves. There is no doubt that lakes and ponds also "made" ice during the cold night. In Rockland the mercury hovered near zero all evening and plunged below zero early in the morning, Wednesday.

Lincoln County MOD Campaign By Mail Opens

WALDOBORO—The men who probably drive more than any one else in Lincoln County carried a message of hope Thursday from the 1961 New March of Dimes for many of their neighbors who cannot walk at all.

Local postmen began delivery of the envelopes that will allow Lincoln County residents to contribute by mail during January to the efforts of The National Foundation to prevent the crippling diseases of birth defects, arthritis and polio.

"We hope our message brings speedy replies in the form of cash, money orders and checks, because March of Dimes contributions are desperately needed to finance National Foundation programs in patient aid, research and professional education," said R. W. Pearson, campaign director.

"Approximately 250,000 American children are born each year with significant birth defects. These birth defects cripple more children than any other cause besides accidents.

"More than 11,000,000 of our neighbors suffer from arthritis or some form of rheumatic disease with a loss to the nation of some 31,000,000 work days every year," he added.

"So watch your mailboxes, and please say 'YES' to the New March of Dimes by mailing in your contributions to prevent crippling diseases," he urged.

Governor Nominates LaGassey Associate Judge Of Rockland Municipal Court Wednesday

AUGUSTA—Gov. John H. Reed posted the name of Galen P. LaGassey of Rockland, Wednesday morning, to succeed Dominic Cuccinello as associate judge of the Rockland Municipal Court. The Governor's Council is due to act on the nomination next Wednesday. No opposition from the all-Republican council is expected.

Cuccinello's two-year term expires on Jan. 2. The Council meets on Jan. 4.

LaGassey, recently elected a Rockland city councilman, was one of three candidates for the post. Cuccinello, a Democrat, was seeking re-appointment and Clifford O'Rourke of Camden, a Republican, was the third candidate.

Neither the Knox County Legislative delegation nor the bar association made a flat recommendation. In a sense the bar association gave LaGassey a boost when it recommended that the associate judge's office be maintained in Rockland. It was unlikely that a Republican Governor, who received good support at the polls in Knox County, would appoint a Democrat, and O'Rourke practices in Camden.

LaGassey was an unsuccessful candidate in the Republican primary in June for the post of county attorney. However, he led four candidates seeking two

seats on the Rockland City Council, earlier this month, in the city election.

The 41-year-old attorney has been practicing in Rockland for five years. He has been active in Republican activities and prior to coming to Rockland was vice chairman of the Young GOP state committee. He also has been active in community affairs.

LaGassey would become the third young man involved in the county courts. Judge Christy Adams is near LaGassey's age and new County Attorney Peter Sulides is a little younger.

Attorney Challenges Right Of Municipality To Regulate Boating Speeds In Rockland Harbor

Whether or not the City of Rockland has the legal right to regulate boating in the harbor was raised in Rockland Municipal Court, Wednesday, when an attorney filed a written argument supporting a demurrer on a charge of speeding in the harbor last Aug. 14. The case could become a test of whether or not a municipality in Maine has that right.

Last Aug. 14, Harbormaster Bertram Snow charged that Mary Fraughton, 36, of Rockland operated a motor boat at speeds in excess of those set by city ordinance. She was charged, in two different warrants, with going 15 and 20 knots within 100 yards of the Maine Deck Marina at the Rockland Public Landing.

At her arraignment, Aug. 15, attorney Christopher S. Roberts filed a demurrer in which he challenged the city's right to regulate harbor boating. A demurrer, in effect, agrees to facts as set forth in a warrant in

but challenges either the law or the warrant.

The case was continued until its reopening, Wednesday, when Judge Christy Adams received Roberts' written argument and continued the case until Friday.

Roberts alleged that the Federal government has first jurisdiction over coastal waters and by issuing regulations of its own has preempted states and municipalities from regulating such waters. He also attacked the definition of Rockland Harbor because the Town of Owls Head forms its southern shore.

Judge Adams said he will rule on the demurrer on Friday unless County Attorney Curtis M. Payson asks for a further continuance to file an argument.

Other municipalities are watching the Rockland case closely to see what bearing it might have on their own ordinances. Camden and Vinalhaven, among others, have town ordinances concerning boat operation in their harbors.

"CANADA-FIRST" POLICY ENDANGERS OUR ASSOCIATIONS WITH THE MARITIMES

"Canada-First." The feeling is growing among the leaders of the Dominion to our north and east. Tax penalties are being levied against United States capital and enterprises. Trade restrictions and excessive tariffs on imports from the States appear to be in the offing. It is a disturbing thing to us who live so close to the Maritime Provinces and who have enjoyed commerce and travel with our neighbors for generations.

Not only do we have much to lose, but also the people, in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland. The United States is their largest customer in the commercial fisheries field and commercial fisheries are the economic mainstay of a good part of the Maritimes. Their largest fisheries firm even operates a fleet and processing plant here in Rockland. We would not welcome any disturbance of this arrangement. Should the economic barriers be raised by Canada, the United States would be forced to retaliate. No one would gain. Their lobster and fish markets could dry up through trade restrictions. This situation alone could cause economic chaos in the Maritimes for all of Canada could not consume the output of the fisheries operations in the Maritimes. We would feel it acutely here for we depend on Canada for lobsters to fill our market orders above our own annual catch. The same would apply in fisheries and could result in a curtailment of operations of Canadian fisheries firms which now give employment in the States.

We sincerely hope that cooler heads in Ottawa and Washington sense the possible troubles ahead and bring things to an even keel. Neither the United States nor Canada can stand alone for our peoples and economies are too closely entwined.

Applying the parking brake while in the garage or driveway during the winter months may freeze brake linings "on" so the car cannot be moved the next morning. There's no magic in the food concentrates. If you ate no more than 900 calories a day of anything — even chocolate ice cream with hot fudge — you'd lose weight. However, you might not be on a balanced diet. The better concentrates — check your brand name with your doctor — do contain adequate amounts of protein, fat, carbohydrate, vitamins, and minerals. What's more, they do the calorie counting for you. No chance to cheat.

Remember, the food concentrate is not a slimmer. It won't do a thing for your waistline if you use it in addition to your regular menu. But as a sub-

The practice of permitting visitors every weekday from 9 to 11 a. m. and 1 to 4 p. m. will continue, he said.

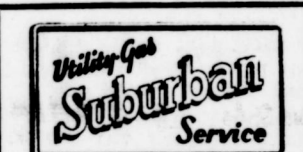
